# OIL BUSINESS . . .

Please allow me to let my mind run amuck this week as I hit topics all over the board.

I read an article in *The Wall Street Journal* this week about industrial espionage in the oil patch. It seems that information brokers were hiring folks to spy on their companies and pass information regarding minimum bids, competitor bids, and other proprietary information as it related to construction projects and such. The information brokers sold this information back to companies who were in a competitive bid situation for a project to give them the upper hand.

I'm sure we have a little of that going on everywhere, only not so cloak-and-dagger. After all, most of us wouldn't know how to cloak a dagger, anyway.

But, it did give me pause to consider some of the secret weapons a 'poor boy or girl' has that he or she wouldn't want his competitors to find out about.

For instance, the 'ole bailin' wire valve handle: a unique use of wadded-up bailing wire inserted into a hole where the original valve handle was to allow someone to turn off and on the flow of oil or water at a well-head. Why, if someone else were to find out about this secret weapon, they too could save dollars upon dollars on new valves and handles.

And, how about the utilization of discarded farm implements as counterweights for automatic valves, to hold tank lids down, or to even provide extra weight to your pickup to prevent your tires from spinning when you leave a location? Just think of the cost-advantage an operator has with these types of secrets!

Onto other subjects. Did you hear where Clinton may take a trip to see the oilpatch for himself, up close? I'm a little suspicious, though. Says he wants to take a couple of Arkansas State Troopers along.

Here's a newsflash. OPEC admitted some mistakes were made during the twenty years since the first oil shock in 1973. They say they overestimated the rising demand for their oil and thus overpriced it. The fallout was that once everybody figured out that they could make some money producing at artificially high prices in other parts of the world, they effectively brought in new competitors which depressed oil prices below acceptable levels during 1986.

The biggest news is that OPEC admitted they acted a little greedily and they are now paying dearly for it. The old news is that they aren't all that repentant. They would like all of the consumers to cooperate more to help stabilize prices. They sound like drug addicts who say they aren't going to be able to control themselves, so other people need to do things to stop them from hurting themselves.

And, finally, can anyone tell me what you think the year 1994

will bring--good, bad, or ugly? I would like to know. It will give me things to write about in the coming year, too.

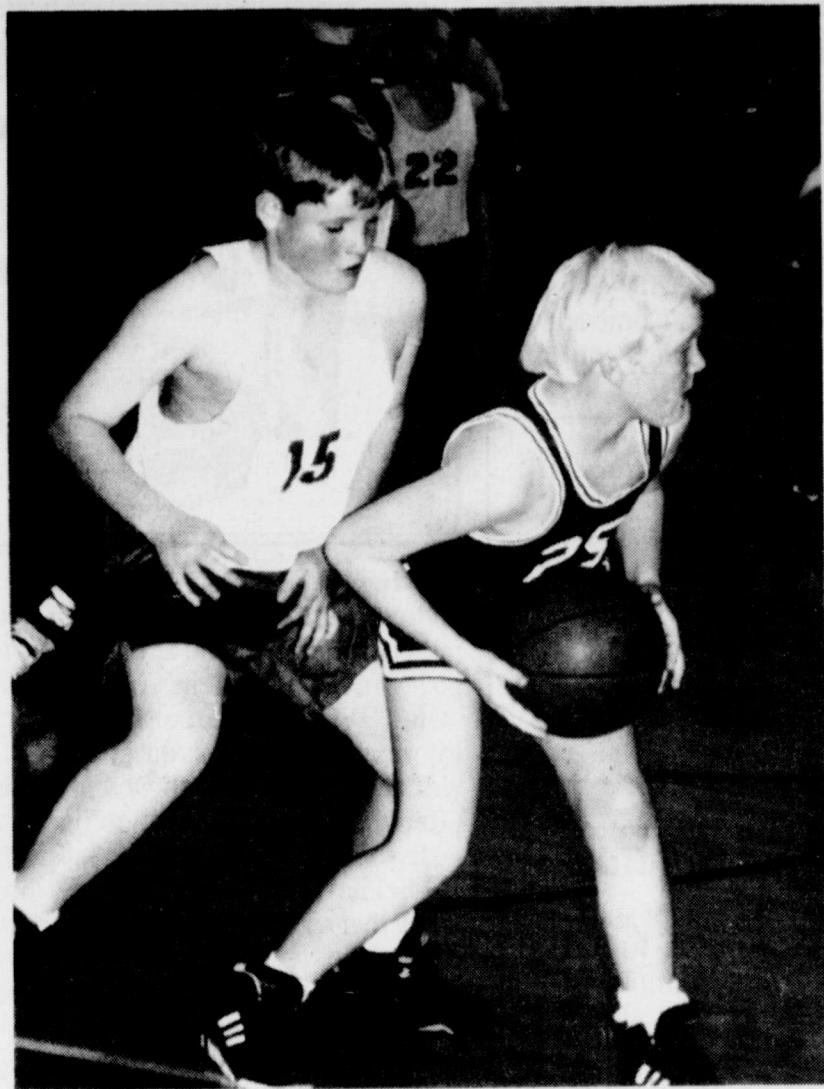

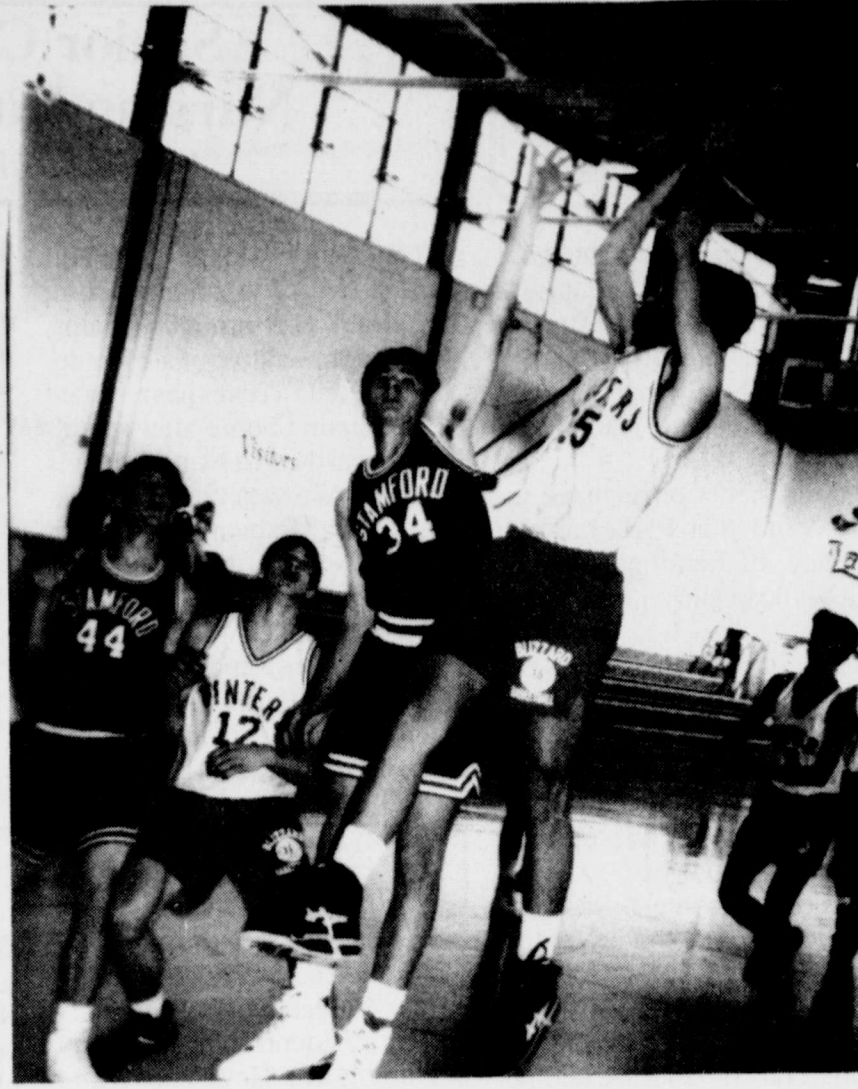

After 29 years in Hong Kong, they didn't mind a bonus year, so Logan stayed on while another missionary took a furlough, shifting their retirement to August, 1992.

Another turn of events finds the Templetons in Tokyo, Japan, at Shibuya-Ku, in 1993.

Dear Friends,  
We're grateful we can reach across the years and miles and get in touch with you again. If we drew a time line of our personal history, it would probably show a brush with your time line over the years at Christmas. It's a brush we enjoy and look forward to.

Since last Christmas, our line has taken some unusual twists and turns, just as yours probably has.

Last Christmas, we were anticipating a transfer to the Japan Baptist Mission so Logan could fill in for their treasurer until April, 1995. In March, after 30 years in Hong Kong, we moved to Tokyo just as the cherry blossoms burst forth in all their glory. What an experience the move has been! Learning to get around in Tokyo, adjusting to a new culture, finding ways to witness without speaking Japanese, and a hundred other new challenges have stretched us to our limits. But we are as happy as we have ever been—anywhere, anytime. The Lord is good.

The United States has found that Japan doesn't want its products. Japan doesn't want our product either. Less than one percent of the country is Christian. The people we have met are interested in knowing about Christianity, but not interested in becoming Christians. It's as if they have no sense of need for a personal savior. Christians in Japan are praying that the Billy Graham Crusade in January will be a turning point. A turning point is coming. Christians have tilled, planted, and watered too diligently in Japan for there not to be a harvest coming. Will you pray for us for Japan?

While we were making these changes in our lives, our children were also making a few. Jim is in Taiwan now, working for a securities company. Betsy's husband Henry is in Boston doing post-doctoral studies at Harvard while Betsy and baby Heather take care of each other in Ft. Worth. Jay married his Japanese sweetheart and they live in College Station where he's finishing an MBA. Sam is at the University of Missouri for graduate studies in communications.

We trust, whatever twists and turns your life took in 1993, our Lord was beside you giving joy, courage and new insights as you meet the challenge of living in this crazy world.

On a historical time line, the first Christmas peaks on the graph signifying the greatest event in history. It brought a way to escape the self-destructive forces that seem to possess us, and all these years later, Christ is still the way.

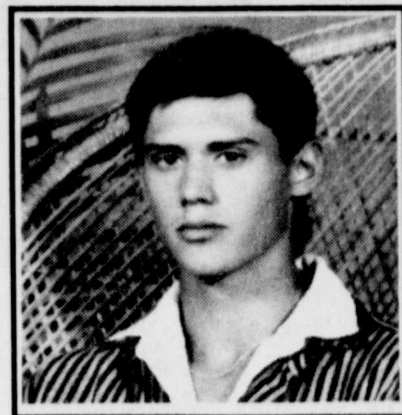

### Baptist women have AIDS study

The women of First Baptist Church met in Fellowship Hall Monday, January 10 for the study "When AIDS Hits Home," led by Susan Conner.

Jo Olive Hancock, president, opened the meeting with prayer and reading of the Beatitudes. Charlsie Poe read the names of missionaries with birthdays that day and led in prayer for them.

Conner, in presenting the program, said that if any of us didn't know someone who is HIV positive or who has AIDS, it's just a matter of time until we do. In an area like Winters, the greatest need would possibly be to help those who are coming back home with the illness.

The first priority is education and awareness. Conner distributed some booklets from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services toward this end.

Fred Loper, a doctor in Oklahoma City, a national medical missionary for the Home Mission Board, serves as a resource person, providing information and

guidance to people, churches and agencies dealing with the AIDS epidemic. He also conducts workshops on medical ministries.

At the present time there is no known cure for AIDS, and no vaccine that prevents the disease. Fortunately, the AIDS virus is hard to catch and can be prevented. One should know the facts:

AIDS is not spread by casual contact in schools, at parties, in swimming pools, stores or the workplace. It cannot be caught by hugging, shaking hands or being near a person who is infected with the virus. No person has ever been infected by an insect bite, nor caught AIDS from a toilet seat.

Three main ways the AIDS virus is spread: having sex with an infected person, sharing drug needles with an infected person and infected mothers passing the disease on to their babies.

William Tillman said, "Every time someone dies of AIDS, a part of humanity dies. Each of us is touched, no matter how small the effect may be."

Howdy Winters! Sorry it's been so long since I've written. Finals and the Christmas holidays kept me from writing until now. I hope everyone had a good Christmas. My wife Lori and I wish you the best in the new year.

We spent Thanksgiving in Winters and Christmas in Tyler at Lori's folks'. It was good to see family and friends in both places.

While I was in Winters, someone suggested that I talk a little about Lori and what she's doing. Good advice. Lori found a job this past September on the Texas Tech main campus. She works as a secretary for the Communication Disorders (speech pathology and audiology) department and enjoys it very much. This semester she also will be taking two classes at Tech to try and complete her master's degree in English. Yea, she's one of those right-brained liberal arts types. We balance each other out, though. We have really enjoyed our first few months together!

Wesley Pounds, I'm sorry I missed you in the hospital when you were here in Lubbock. I tried to visit the Tuesday after I read about you in the Enterprise, but you had already been discharged. I hope your recovery is going well.

One more item before I get to this month's topic. Every now and then, someone will tell me about a bad experience they've had with a doctor and then say, "Keith, don't you do that when you become a doctor!" Since you folks are paying for my education, I want to become the kind of doctor you want. If you have some advice for me on how to treat patients or what not to do as a doctor, write me a letter in care of the Enterprise and tell me about it. I would greatly appreciate your comments and suggestions. There are lots of things they don't teach in medical school, and personal interaction with patients is one of them. Maybe you can help fill the gap.

Okay. Now to the subject at hand. The Clinton Health System Reform Plan. It's fairly complicated, so be prepared. I plan to

spread this out over several articles because it is a rather lengthy subject. I'll begin with a brief overview for this article since I don't have much space left. I have read and heard several analyses; two in the Lubbock newspaper, one by the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP), and one presented by U.S. Representative Larry Combest who represents the Lubbock area. First, let me say that just because I'm going to be a doctor doesn't mean I automatically stand behind the platforms of all medical organizations such as the AMA and AAFP. Sometimes, it seems that they promote things for their own interest that do not benefit the patients, which I believe is contrary to the practice of medicine. Before I wrote this article, I tried to obtain as much information as possible from as many different sources as possible so that I could

form my own opinion of the health plan. And as I've already indicated, I had to be wary of my

sources of information. Sometimes TV news and newspapers don't give both sides of an issue. We all should read critically.

The Clinton Health Plan was formally introduced as a bill in the House and Senate on November 20, 1993. The following are some highlights:

---Universal access: all Americans would be guaranteed access to health care.

---Comprehensive benefits: it wouldn't be just basic health insurance. Preventive medicine and primary care would be items that are covered.

---Cost containment: a "national health board" would set a budget for health care spending each year.

---Paperwork reduction: measures would be taken to reduce the amount of paperwork a physician has to do for each patient.

There are many other minor points, but these are the biggies. Unfortunately, I'm out of time for this month. Next month I'll begin talking about each of the above points in detail. In the meantime, read your newspaper or any other source you may have and keep up with what's going on with the Clinton Health Reform Plan. It could affect you personally. See ya next time.
