





Please allow me to let my mind run amuck this week as I hit topics all over the board.

I read an article in The Wall Street Journal this week about industrial espionage in the oil patch. It seems that information brokers were hiring folks to spy on their companies and pass information regarding minimum bids, competitor bids, and other propietary information as it related to construction projects and such. The information brokers sold this information back to companies who were in a competitive bid situation for a project to give them the upper hand.

I'm sure we have a little of that going on everywhere, only not so cloak-and-dagger. After all, most of us wouldn't know how to cloak a dagger, anyway.

But, it did give me pause to consider some of the secret weapons a 'poor boy or girl' has that he or she wouldn't want his competitors to find out about.

For instance, the 'ole bailin' wire valve handle: a unique use of wadded-up bailing wire inserted into a hole where the original valve handle was to allow someone to turn off and on the flow of oil or water at a wellhead. Why, if someone else were to find out about this secret weapon, they too could save dollars upon dollars on new valves and handles.

And, how about the utilization of discarded farm implements as counterweights for automatic valves, to hold tank lids down, or to even provide extra weight to your pickup to prevent your tires from spinning when you leave a location? Just think of the cost-advantage an operator has with these types of secrets!

On to other subjects. Did you hear where Clinton may take a trip to see the oilpatch for himself, up close? I'm a little suspicious, though. Says he wants to take a couple of Arkansas State Troopers along. Here's a newsflash. OPEC admitted some mistakes were made during the twenty years since the first oil shock in 1973. They say they overestimated the rising demand for their oil and thus overpriced it. The fallout was that once everybody figured out that they could make some money producing at artificially high prices in other parts of the world, they effectively brought in new competitors which depressed oil prices below acceptable levels during 1986. The biggest news is that OPEC admitted they acted a little greedily and they are now paying dearly for it. The old news is that they aren't all that repentant. They would like all of the consumers to cooperate more to help stabilize prices. They sound like drug addicts who say they aren't going to be able to control themselves, so other people need to do things to stop them form hurting themselves.

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





When I was a boy, there were several times in my life when this dialog would take place. I would come in just before supper, and my father would greet me at the door with this question, "Where did you go?" Since I really didn't want to tell him the specifics, I would answer, "Out." Which was true, I did go out of the house, but that's all the information. The next question was, "What did you do?" My answer was, "Nothing." Which was not true. I did do somethings, and more often than I care to admit, things I probably shouldn't have done.

It wasn't too much later that a change took place in my life. My father knew that such wandering aimlessness was not good for me. He knew that such a life of no accounting could make me a "no account" person. So, he would ask me before I left the house the "big four" questions. These questions are "account questions." They were:

- 3. Who will be going with you?
- 4. When will you be back?

Until I answered these questions, I was house-bound. I was not released to just "go out" and "do nothing." It was a painful procedure. No longer could I just wander off with my buddies looking for some "grape-vine" to light up and smoke like a cigar. Or some "corn silk", dried up and rolled into some kind of cigarette paper, a good hot smoke!! Or maybe someone had a deck of cards and we could play some "penny ante" poker.


There was no way that I could get out by saying, "Dad, I'm going out to go smoke with some of the guys behind the garage in the bushes, and I'll be back in an hour."

The point is, he didn't have to lay down a bunch of rules. He didn't have to scream at me. All he had to do was make me responsible and accountable for what I was doing. And, in the process, preventing some bad actions.

> My children have all learned the importance of the "big four." They have helped them a lot. And they are passing them on to their children. And I pass them on to you. They're not original. But, they really work.



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

vaccine that prevents the disease. Fortunately, the AIDS virus is hard to catch and can be prevented. One should know the facts:

AIDS is not spread by casual contact in schools, at parties, in swimming pools, stores or the workplace. It cannot be caught by hugging, shaking hands or being near a person who is infected with the virus. No person has ever been infected by an insect bite, nor caught AIDS from a toilet seat.

Three main ways the AIDS virus is spread: having sex with an infected person, sharing drug needles with an infected person and infected mothers passing the disease on to their babies.

William Tillman said, "Every time someone dies of AIDS, a part of humanity dies. Each of us is touched, no matter how small the effect may be."

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
