Questions unanswered at Council meeting

Tempers were short and the wait was long for approximately 35 concerned citizens, many of whom are city employees, who attended the regular meeting of the Winters mayor and city council on January 10.

Mayor Joe Gerhart called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. with all council members present. After general business matters on the agenda were completed, the council recessed to executive session at 6:45 p.m. Items on the agenda to be discussed in executive session were "a.) employee sick leave and b.) evaluation, discipline or dismissal of employee".

At 10 p.m., the council reconvened to regular session, at which time Councilman David Evans "moved that the employee matters discussed in the executive session be carried out by the city administrator." Alderman Loudemilk seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

Mayor Gerhart adjourned the meeting at 10:05 p.m., leaving city attorney Kenneth Slimp to answer questions from a disgruntled audience.

"What happened? What was decided? You mean that's it?", were some of the questions asked by the audience. Attorney Slimp stated that the council members could not answer because they were still a quorum and could not discuss city business outside an official meeting.

As council members attempted to leave, Slimp tried to answer some of the crowd's questions. Without receiving answers which satisfied them, the crowd left grumbling.

The next regularly scheduled city council meeting will be Monday, January 24 at 6:00 p.m. at the Winters Housing Authority.

Winters wins 1st half of district play, 7-0

The Winters Lady Blizzards showed what teamwork is all about Tuesday night as they thrashed the state-ranked Jim Ned Maidens 69-47.

The win pushed the Lady Blizzards to a 7-0 record in district play and a first place win of the first half competition. This victory guarantees the Lady Blizzards a playoff berth at the end of regular district play.

The Maidens seemed to have all the marbles going into Tuesday's showdown. Jim Ned held a 21-0 season record and had the home court advantage before a capacity crowd at Tuscola.

But the Lady Blizzards, under the guidance of Coach Will Corley, had a different game in mind.

The first quarter seemed to be a "sizing up" time as each team managed only seven points. Then the relentless Lady Blizzard defense seemed to keep the Maidens out of step on their offense. Jim Ned managed only 7 more points while the Lady Blizzards kicked into second gear to score 20 points in the second quarter.

The first half ended with the Lady Blizzards leading 27-14 but in some foul trouble as seniors Jennifer Boles and Shana Poehls both had three fouls.

"We got into foul trouble early and everyone on the team handled their role exceptionally well," Corley stated.

Third quarter action started slowly for the Lady Blizzards and the time keeper. The Winters squad lost the ball on their first possession and the second offensive move was stopped by the clock.

The clock stopped working and it took several minutes to get it running again, causing the Lady

Blizzards to lose some momentum.

Poehls and Boles also picked up their fourth fouls and sat on the bench for most of the third quarter. With a young ball club of three sophomores and two juniors on the floor, Jim Ned edged closer to the Big Blue. The third quarter ended Winters 36, Jim Ned 29.

The Lady Blizzards then took control of the fourth quarter. With the two seniors back in the game, the lead started to be extended. Then Poehls fouls out. Boles follows two minutes later.

The younger ball players then took charge and continued to extend the lead. Rachel Edwards had the hot hand, making 18 of 21 free throws with most coming in the fourth quarter, and 24 points for the game. Brooke Killough added precious points and Karolen Biddix stole the ball with her quick hands to add several layups.

Erica Vega and Alisa Presley kept the ball moving and took time off the clock.

Corley said, "I expressed to them that we would be a team in every essence of the word and that's exactly how they played. That's what makes them so special."

The team made 37 of 44 free throws on the night.

Corley also commented: "I thought our defense played super! Jim Ned is an excellent ball club (rated #10 in state in Class AA) and you don't get to be 21-0 without being a good ball club."

OIL BUSINESS . . .

One's perspective can have profound effects on the views one holds.

After all, I work in the oil business, so I tend to think like an insider. Some of you reading this are in the same boat. Some others of you are just the opposite—you are not in the oil business, so you necessarily have views shaped as someone looking in from the outside.

All of this 'mumbo-jumbo' is about how I see the current low prices, high imports, poor business prospects in the oil patch, and other factors surrounding the current oil and gas business scenario.

You see, I see danger and foreboding in the current level of oil prices. I see people out of work. I see other countries in control of our major energy supply. I see a bleak future if things don't change.

Another of you might see it altogether differently. You see cheap gasoline, cheaper plane tickets, and better profit margins for those that consume petroleum in their line of work.

I might say that increasing imports is a bad thing, because it threatens our security. You might say that the free market is in control and that is just the way it is.

I might say that loss of the domestic oil and gas producer is a bad thing for this country. You might say it is no different than the demise of 'mom-and-pop' gas stations as they are replaced by cleaner, more efficient convenience stores.

I say that low oil prices mean the shut-in of 50,000 stripper wells this year alone, and that is bad for America. You might say that those wells were marginal and were a hazard anyway. After all, we can get cheap foreign oil in its place with no problem.

It may boil down to terminology.

I think that we have an energy security problem. You might say we have an energy price problem.

The ironic thing is that both of us would fight a war in the Middle East, but both for very different reasons. I would want to maintain energy security while you would want to maintain energy price stability (read that low prices).

You see cheap oil as the engine to continue driving our economy. I see cheap oil as a drug that makes us do things we ordinarily would not do.

Even more ironic is the fact that we both might be right. You aren't selfish just because you want to let markets determine prices and keep commodities at the lowest possible price to provide more efficient markets. And, I am right that energy security is just as important as cheap oil.

You see, both sides of the argument assume the same thing. We can't allow someone else to artificially prevent oil from getting to where it needs to be, by price or otherwise.

The difference lies in our perspective. I hope we can get together sometime to discuss our

differences and work out something that provides a good market-based solution that gets us both where we want to be.

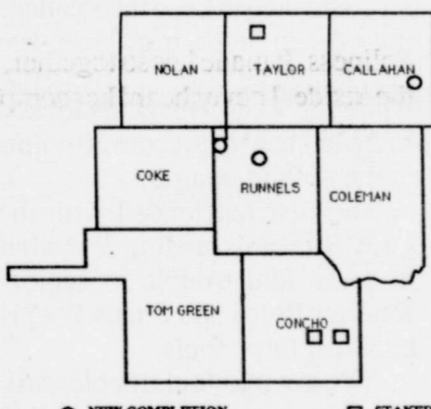

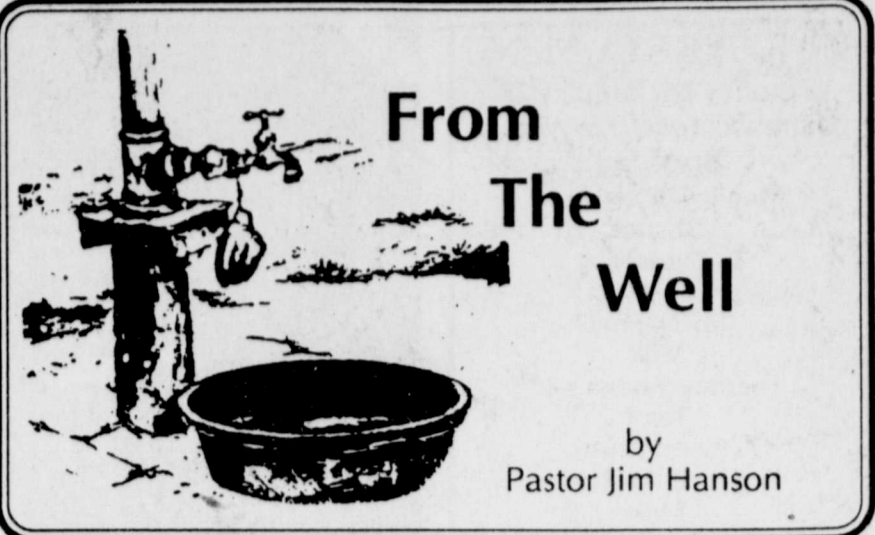

From The Well

This morning when I woke up, I thought about Grandma. My mother's mother. She came to live with us before I was born. For the first sixteen years of my life, I had a living "security blanket" right across the hall from my bedroom. Her name was Grandma.

I was so blessed, so privileged. She came to live with us because there was really no other place for her to go. She had broken her hip, the last in a series of events which would have killed most people.

It started soon after her husband and her had moved to a small city in northern Minnesota. They had done well as farmers, Grandpa having been a good man and a good farmer. With four sons, he had managed to accumulate over a section of good Iowa corn land. But, these sons and three daughters needed to be educated. So they sold the land, moved to a college town, and built a large house. The children could stay at home and go to college. But then, World War I came along and all four sons went off to war. Then Grandpa got sick and died of cancer. They said it was because he was gored by a bull.

And then came a series of "crashes", economic down turns, and suddenly Grandma found herself without any money or home and physically handicapped with a bad hip. Her youngest child, my mother and my father said, "Come and live with us." And she did, until she died.

Her presence in our home was the greatest present my parents could have given us. She couldn't get around a lot, and as she became older, became confined to her room. But she still gave herself to us. She would invite us into her room everyday and she would give my three brothers and me her attention. She would listen to us and she would tell us stories, mostly stories of her younger years. Like when her dad came home from the Civil War. He walked home, all the way from the deep south to Wisconsin. How glad they were to see him, for they hadn't heard from him for over a year! She was eleven at the time.

She told us about when she became married, and she and her husband hooked up a team of horses to a covered wagon, loaded their belongings into it and headed off to Iowa. That was their honeymoon. Every other night she would put together some fixings to make dough for bread. During the night it would rise. Then as they started out, they would look for a settler's cabin that had smoke coming from the chimney. That would be a sign to her that the cook stove was fired up. So they would drive their wagon over there and Grandma would ask the lady of the house if she could use her oven to bake bread. In exchange she would leave a loaf of fresh baked bread. You might say that Grandma baked her way to their homestead.

She never told me about the bank failures and the great financial loss she had. I didn't find out until after she died. All I knew was that while I was growing up, she was always there for me. And obviously she knew that everything that happened to her was designed to teach her holiness. It made her so together, so mature, so strong, and peaceful on the inside. I never heard her complain. I heard her praise God and thank others every day.

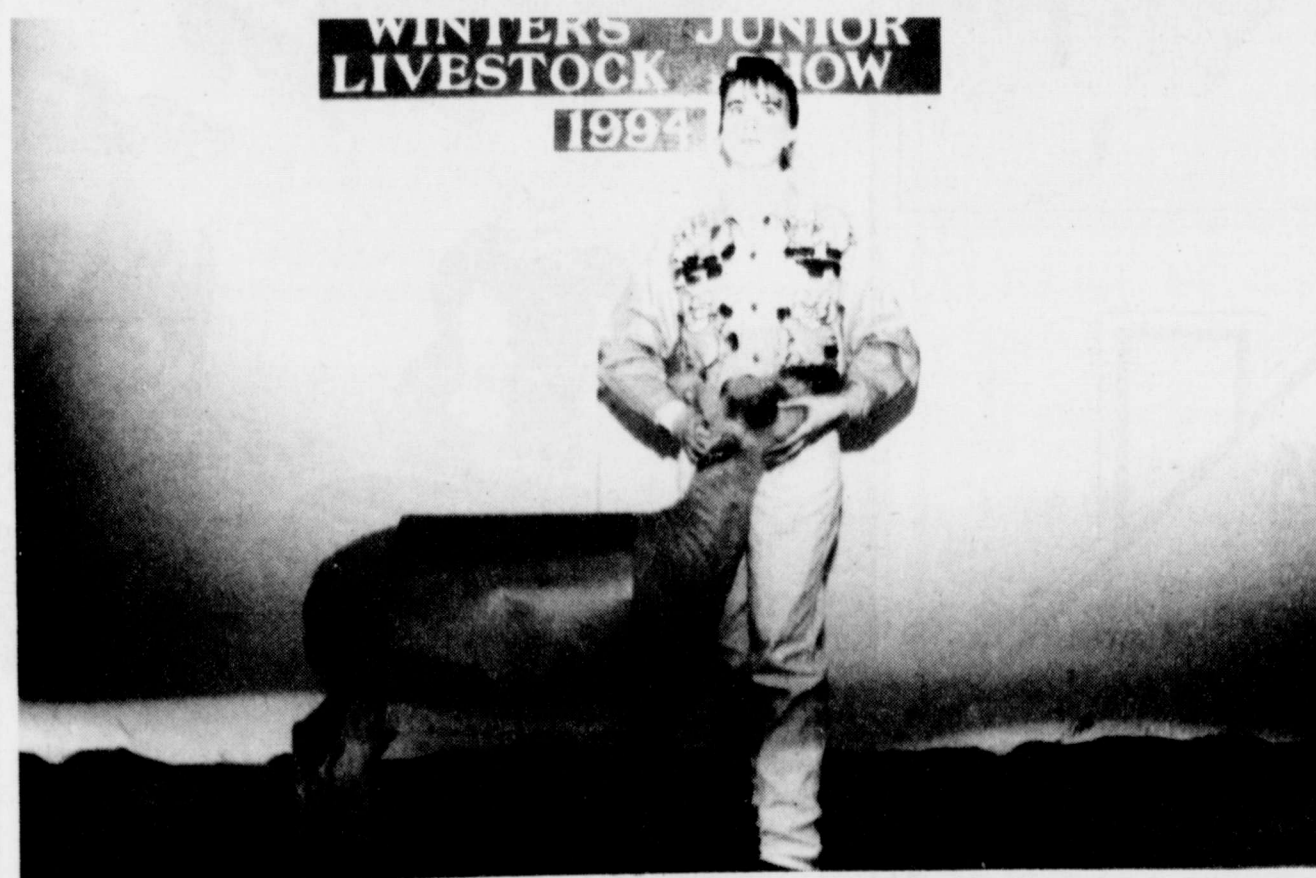

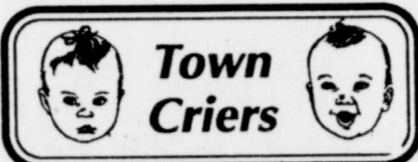
THE NEW WEIGHT ROOM portion of the newly constructed field house is now in use by WHS athletes. The new facility provides at least a dozen work stations for weight training.

RE: Education for Responsibility III (ESR III)

Dear Editor:
On Wednesday, January 5, 1994, the Texas Pro-Family Coalition sponsored a rally in Austin outside the Governor's mansion. More than 300 members and supporters from across the state attended the rally/protest to show their outrage for the Texas Education Agency's (T.E.A.) plan to adopt ESR III. The T.E.A. consists of 15 districts with 15 board members, respectively, Runnels County being in the 15th district and represented by Republican Monte Hasie of Lubbock.

The controversy stems from the recent vote on new textbooks for the state's public schools. The issues to be discussed in the classes as suggested by the books will be far different from the usual discussions of health and hygiene. The new issues, if adopted and accepted by the school board, will

be homosexuality, accompanied by information on how to access the Gay and Lesbian Alliance, AIDS, safe sex and child/parent divorce.

The protesters urged Ann Richards to take a stand on these issues and to tell the voters how she feels about ESR III. The book on homosexuality titled Making Life's Choices, published by West, deals with such topics as gay parent adoption. Holt Health, published by Holt, Rinehart and Winston, asks students under which conditions a person might choose to live or die. Other books

may be viewed as equally offensive to parents around the state.

Monte Hasie, our District 15 Representative, states, "While some issues like AIDS and abstinence-based sex education is important; others, such as homosexuality, death, etc...are not the responsibility of the school. Parents

need to know what their children are learning. This fight is an on-going fight to keep negative, unnecessary influences out of our schools. All parents desperately need to be involved." I asked Mr. Hasie if he thought the T.E.A. would be abolished if George Bush, Jr. was elected as Governor. Mr. Hasie stated that the T.E.A. would not be abolished, but that more control would be and should be given on the local level.

Many parents feel that adopting ESR III into the classroom in our public schools is like having a prostitute at school on Career Day. If we are going to separate church and state, then we must also separate homosexual agenda/state, Dr. Kavorkian/state, etc... as we have done in the past with evolution.

(The only time, at this council meeting, the public was allowed to speak was in reference to the budget.) How about a SHORT questions

and comments time for each item on the agenda? I think the public would have felt a little more welcome and at ease if they had been allowed (during the council meeting) to voice their opinions.

4. This council meeting was a very good learning experience for me, and I hope to be attending more council meetings in the future. I encourage the public to also attend meetings when ever possible, and contact your council members when you have a question. I have had a chance to speak to only one council member during this past week, and he was very willing to listen to my comments.

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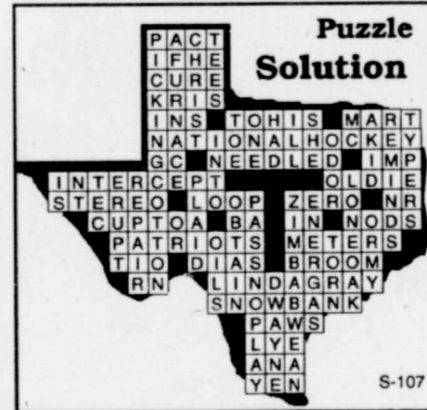

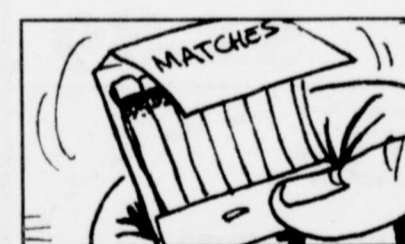

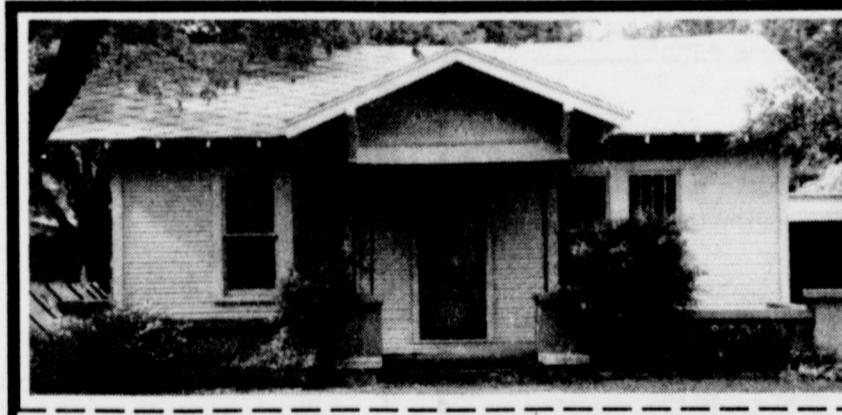

Winters in 1940

While putting down new floor covering in her farm home east of Winters, Henrietta Lewis found a copy of a 1940 *Abilene Reporter-News* under the lineoleum she removed from the kitchen. It was the October 6 issue and carried a news story about the progress in Winters, written by the correspondent Ruth Little.

The report follows:
Runnels County, and the Winters territory in particular, looks forward to the best conditions prevailing for several years, because of the fine crops throughout the county.

C.L. Green, owner and operator of the C.L. Green Mill and Elevator Company here, has just completed an addition to his warehouse, adding two concrete walls, and putting on roofing, to enlarge the warehouse to 100 x 70 feet, to take care of maize pummies. Green now employs an average of 20 men, and owns seven large grain trucks, which operate from El Paso to Fort Worth. He shipped 140 carloads of grain this year, by truck.

Winters now has seven gins, running virtually on a 24-hour schedule. Cotton is better than in five years, over the entire county, and gingers here look forward to a busier and longer ginning season than since that time.

Dave Hinds, who farms a large place, said: "I will average one

third bale to the acre of cotton, and I feel assured the county will average that as a whole. Picking is just now getting underway, and Mexicans are coming in in sufficient numbers to gather the crop without loss, barring a long siege of wet weather."

Playgrounds
This year Winters equipped three playgrounds with WPA projects, and WPA supervision for the grounds. One of the projects is on the athletic fields of the school property, and affords year-round tennis, volleyball, baseball and other sports.

Mrs. Allie Brooks who operates the Blizzard Igloo, a school store and eats shop on the school corner, has remodeled her place, decorating in blue and white, the school colors.

The school cafeteria now can take care of more student lunches than formerly. As a summer project, the WPA women canned enough fruit, vegetables and meats to feed the school's underprivileged children. The school has a progressive vocational agriculture class, with many of the members showing prize stock and products each year. Wallace Martin, VA instructor, will hold the annual project show this year.

Clarence Gambill of Gambill's Variety Store has just completed an addition to the place, enlarging to take care of expected fall trade. "I needed this space last year, but I am sure I will need it much more

this fall," said Gambill.

Winters has one of the largest and most progressive Lions Clubs in the district. It has had a better than 100 percent gain in membership in a drive this year. The club now is working on a free mail delivery project for the town. It is co-sponsor of the playgrounds projects. The club members have been instrumental in securing many improvements for the town, including the new dial system telephones, which are now installed and are in operation. The system belongs to Southwestern States Telephone Co.

Women's Clubs
Winters has three women's clubs and a writer's club. The Diversity Club, with Mrs. George Poe as president, will study world conditions for the coming season. As is its custom, it will carry some charity projects as well as improvements projects. The club also encourages any deserving student in the local schools.

The Literary and Service Club, oldest club in Winters, with Mrs. John Carlisle as president, will make a study of cause and effect of world conditions and changes. The year's program will include Red Cross work and helpfulness to the Community Chest.

The Mother's Study Club, with Mrs. W.A. McDonald as president, will study the pre-school child this year. It will contribute to Christmas cheer funds.

The Winters Writer's Club is

purely a study club. Its program consists of "how to do" the different phases of writing. Within the past four years four of the members have had work published. Mrs. McFarlane and Mrs. William Stevens in *American Voices*, *Anthology of Contemporary Verse*; Mrs. G.T. Pounds in the *Progressive Farmer* and in newspaper columns. Mrs. George Poe had two poems in the Christmas *Anthology* last winter, was first place prize winner in the movie-script contest run by the State Theater in the summer.

The largest development project Winters has had for the year is the clinic and suite of offices of Drs. Barron and Jensen.

Molly Smith is laboratory technician, and two office girls are employed. Dr. John Barron, formerly of Wingate, has practiced here for more than 15 years and is now working in connection with the Winters Municipal Hospital as well as in the clinic.

Dr. Martin H. Jensen came here recently from Sweetwater, where he practiced several years. He specializes in X-ray work. He is also a medical and surgical doctor.

Mrs. Smith, a veteran laboratory technician, is prepared to make all laboratory tests that formerly had to be sent to other towns. Her office is completely equipped for X-ray, basal-metabolism work, and electro-cardiac work, as well as all other phases of medical-laboratory tests.

Mayor T.A. Smith said, "Prospects are better here than in several years. Fall business will be in full swing in another week or two.

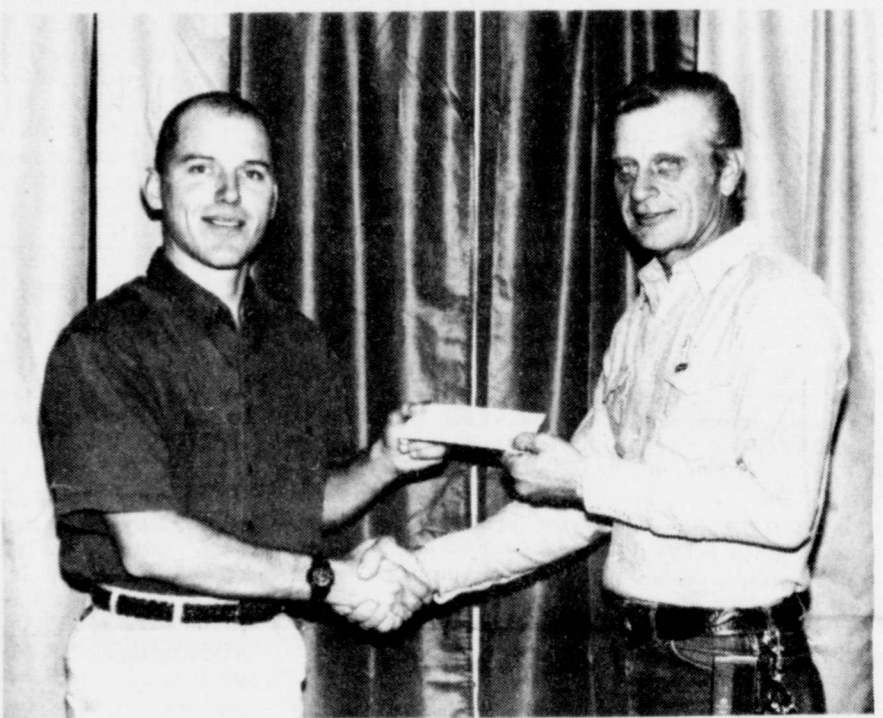
Our new dial system telephones will help trade facilities, and we have just received \$1,000 from the county funds for the WPA sewing room here."

G.B. Mullins, manager of the West Texas Cotton Warehouse, anticipated a good fall. "I already have more than 4,000 bales of new cotton in storage," he said, "and I expect to handle more than 10,000 bales this fall." About 11 months ago the company erected a \$10,000 addition to the storage space, to take care of the increase in hold-overs, due to cotton loan business.

Winters has advanced in many ways since 1940, and continues to progress. Its people look to the future with hope and anticipation.
