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Martha Gehrels retires April 1

Ends 30 years of "life in the fast lane" by Jean Boles

Neither rain, nor hail, nor four active children have kept Martha Gehrels from making her daily route as a rural mail carrier for the past thirty years.

Martha's career will come to a close on Friday, April 1, as she is treated to a reception at the Winters post office from 7:45 a.m.-8:15 a.m. and at the Wingate post office from 9:30 a.m.-10:00 a.m.

Her longtime love of the post office actually began about 56 years ago. Martha's late father, Sam Cooke, worked for the post office for 42 years. He began as a clerk and advanced to rural carrier. He turned down a postmaster position because "being a rural carrier was the best job of all."

Martha's husband, James "Pec Wee" Gehrels, retired from the post office in October, 1992, after more than thirty years of service. He also began his postal career as a clerk, then advanced to city carrier.

Martha began her career when she was asked to "fill in" as a substitute carrier for Ray Hollingshead of Winters. Then she worked during other employees' vacations, holidays and sick leave. As other carriers retired and were replaced, Martha worked their positions until the official replacement personnel were trained.

She jokingly says, "I've never applied for a job in my life."

The laws changed at just the right times for her to advance without ever taking a civil service exam.

"I feel like God wanted me to do this. He put me out on the route so He could talk to me without four kids hanging on my legs."

Her four kids, now grown, are Kathy, Craig, and Curtis of Winters, and Chris of Beeville.

Throughout the past thirty years, Martha's family has been very supportive and helpful, including making repairs necessary to keep Martha on the road. Curtis has been especially handy by changing numerous brake pads.

But don't misunderstand. Martha has learned to be quite a mechanic herself. Driving 125 miles per day, six days a week, necessitated all sorts of repairs. Martha has changed more flat tires than she cares to remember but does recall changing three flats in one day.

She once pulled under the shade of some large trees in a nearby cemetery to work on her car. A man stopped and asked if he could help but when Martha, tire tool in hand, told him she was simply changing the brake pads, he turned and walked away.

Martha's driving record is unblemished, for the most part. She has never run over any animal, although she's had roadrunners "race" alongside her.

She once drove into a large snow bank and was stuck. Gilbert Smith of Wingate told her he watched her and "knew she was going to drive right into that snow." He pulled her car out with his tractor and somehow pulled the front bumper away from the car. When Martha got back to the post office, fellow worker Wilson Marks suggested that she drive her car into a telephone pole to push the bumper back into place. She did. It worked!

Quick to share her religious feelings, Martha says she knows that God has ridden many miles with her, giving her peace and confidence to face the challenge of the road each day.

She once drove into a giant mud puddle and got stuck, with no help in sight. She said, "Lord, if You can walk on water, You can drive on mud. Please get me out of here." He did.

About three years ago, she was making her usual route and drove into some very deep water — so deep that it came inside the pickup and caused her to stall. Martha got out and waded through the rushing water. County employees from Wingate came to the rescue, using a dumptruck to pull out her pickup, then hauled it to Wingate to dry out. Martha was back on the road within an hour.

She's made a world of friends along Route 1, Winters, and Route 2, Wingate. "I haven't had to bake at Christmas in all these years. My patrons have all been so good to me," she said.

Martha is also quick to give thanks to all her co-workers who helped train her and to the county employees who have kept the roads in good shape. She says she will miss them all.

While retirement will be a big adjustment for Martha, she is looking forward to doing all the things she's "piled up to do" — refinish furniture, play golf (she says with a laugh), visit friends, enjoy grandchildren Cari, Clay, Ross and Caid, and especially spend time with hubby Jim.

So for those rural folks who've seen Martha for the past thirty years, don't despair. She's still very much around — just taking a different route down the road of life.

Council o.k.'s center use

The Winters City Council met in regular session on March 28.

Johnny Merrill, Fire Chief, requested of the council that the Community Center be made available to the Fire Department at no charge for a fund raising event for the department. After being assured by Chief Merrill that arrangements had been made for adequate security for the events, the council voted to approve his request.

Chamber of Commerce president Jimmy Butler brought a similar request before the councilmen, asking that the rental fee for the Center be waived for Mayfest. Mr. Butler further stated that the Chamber hoped to have several business and industrial exhibits from Winters at Mayfest this year. The council approved the request.

City Administrator Hassan gave the council status reports on grants for which applications have been made. He read a letter from Peggy J. Mathias of Peggy's Paperworks concerning a grant for a meeting room at the Community Center. Ms. Mathias has completed the preliminary research of funding sources and has located several possibilities. She requested that the City obtain a cost estimate for the construction of such a meeting room.

Discussion was held concerning bills to be approved, as there seemed to be some duplicates. Administrator Hassan stated he would check for any discrepancy and make corrections if necessary. Bills were approved on this basis.

OIL BUSINESS

A major event occurred in 1993, but no one really realized it until now.

It seems that, for the first time in history, the value of the year's natural gas production exceeded the value of the year's oil production. Now that everyone has had a chance to look back at the year and add everything up, we are realizing that it was a great year for natural gas.

Natural gas surpassed oil for several reasons, including price, production, and demand spikes during the recent cold weather.

The *Oil & Gas Journal* reports that the wellhead value of natural gas in 1993 was \$38.8 billion compared with \$35.8 billion for crude. This was accomplished based on an average gas price of \$2.02 per thousand cubic feet, which is about 25 cents more than the 1992 average price.

Production of natural gas reached 19.2 trillion cubic feet in 1993 versus 18.7 trillion cubic feet in 1992.

Oil production decreased another 5%, marking the 8th consecutive year of decline. Oil prices also dropped from about \$16 per barrel to \$14.34 per barrel for 1993.

Things look decent for a continuation of gas dominance. The perception of gas reliability received a real shot in the arm when the markets performed so well during the frigid winter with record gas demand. This portends well for future longer term contracts for natural gas.

Also, the long term outlook for gas as a fuel of choice is good. It is clean and plentiful in the domestic arena.

Ironically, the real near-term threat to the dominance of natural gas wellhead value is a low oil price.

A lower oil price allows oil to recapture market share lost to gas, as it becomes cheaper to use. Also, the psychology of the market is such that gas prices tend to get dragged down with oil prices, thus lowering the total wellhead value of the natural gas.

But, the long term outlook is bullish for natural gas. It will tend to dominate for the next decade, although there will be some anomalous years when oil will retake the lead for whatever temporary reason.

In any event, it was quite a phenomenal year for a product that was just thrown away as a nuisance during the early days of the oil patch.



Pat Ambrose will be our Master of Ceremonies and Tina Geistmann will be furnishing background music.


Cookies and punch will be served afterward.

Chasing Geronimo

When I was interviewing the Walter Spills, some years ago, about their family tradition of a yearly Easter egg hunt, we came across a picture of Geronimo in their family album.

"What's this picture of Indians doing with your family photographs?" I asked.

"Oh, that's Geronimo and two of his chiefs. Dad chased him all over New Mexico when he was in the First United States Cavalry," Walter answered, matter of factly. "Did they ever catch him?" I wanted to know.

"No, the troops that Dad was with didn't. Even while they were chasing Geronimo, the men didn't really want to catch him. They were just fulfilling orders," Walter answered.

The reason the Army was after Geronimo was because he was off the reservation and they wanted him back. He wouldn't stay. He was independent and wanted to be free. The men respected him for that. He was later captured.

August Spill, Walter's dad, said Geronimo never gave them any trouble. He more or less played a cat and mouse game with the men and was always a jump ahead. Once he stood on the river bank with one of his chiefs and watched the soldiers in swimming for about 15 minutes and then left. Of course, their clothes and guns were on the shore.

August Spill was born in Westphalia, Germany, June 8, 1871. His father, August, Sr. brought his wife and two sons to America in the 1870's. They came to Seguin, moved to San Antonio, and on to Runnels County and bought land before Winters was established. Spill bought south of the present Winters State Bank.

After the Spill family moved, August and Albert were sent back to the old home to gather the crops. When young August arrived the next year there was a drought and no jobs, so he went to San Antonio and joined the U.S. Cavalry at Fort Sam Houston. He spent the next four years chasing Geronimo.

The Cavalry was first stationed at Roswell, head rendezvous of the Apache Indian. Later they were sent to Carlsbad. The troops didn't have any way to move the horses and had to ride horseback from place to place. They built roads and played Army when not chasing Geronimo, August told his sons.

Sixteen years have gone by since my interview with the Spills. The *San Angelo Standard-Times* for December 10, 1993, carried a review of the Geronimo movie by Dolores Barclay for the Associated Press. She says the movie misses its aim by not being told from the Indian's viewpoint. But at last with this film and a story by Ross McSwain, *Standard-Times* writer, I know what happened to Geronimo.

After his people and his family are murdered, first by Mexicans and then by whites, and their land stolen, Geronimo declares war on the whites. He matches their acts brutality by brutality, and no human life is spared by either side. With his small band of a few dozen warriors, Geronimo takes on about 5,000 troops of the U.S. Cavalry.

Geronimo surrendered in 1886 after a five-year reign of terror fighting the government's attempt to subjugate all American Indians, but he never was defeated in battle by the Army.

Geronimo was tracked down by White Mountain Apache scouts working for the Army. He surrendered in September and was soon bound for Florida. He died while in captivity at Fort Sill, Oklahoma.





Mother pleads for social responsibility

Dear Editor:

I haven't forgotten. That's the phrase that screams from my heart like the wail of a banshee. And on its heels comes another soul rending emotion forcing its way into my consciousness as "I want my baby back!" How I keep these soul screams from forcing their way past my lips I have no clue. A strength of will I didn't know I possessed?, or the fear of being branded an inconsolable mother who cannot accept the death of her daughter? Social ostracism is a powerful thing!

I sit here attempting to put thought to paper because my daughter didn't die because she was a felon or criminal miscreant, but because she was in the right place at the wrong moment in time. The agony of her loss will be with me always.

The thought that keeps bothering me however, is how many more innocents have to die before we as citizens force the state to realize that our town needs a pedestrian-controlled signal at our children's school crossing? And more importantly, who's child will it be next time? Will the state survey the area and find there is a need for a signal after two die? Three? Or does the Governor's child have to die here before there is sufficient need? Maybe a senator's child? Perhaps a congressman's child? It is apparent however that neither my child nor yours are important enough to cause sufficient upheaval to warrant a pedestrian-controlled signal in our town.

The other matter of extreme importance to me is the absence of crossing guards at the main crosswalk where Winters school children cross Main Street to get to school. Last year the city council informed me that it was not the city's responsibility, it was the responsibility of the school board and they wished they could help. When I went to the school board they were ominously quiet and informed me that they would take the matter under advisement. It has been a year since my daughter's senseless death and I have yet to find the place where the buck stops. Do ordinary citizens have any power? Can we take charge of the future of our children? Or are we merely inhabitants who have elected officials decide matters for us that we could not possibly fathom due to our limited intellectual capacities? It is a question worth considerable ponder.

I cannot decide which upcoming date is tearing me apart the most: the anniversary of Rieca's death, March 20th, or her would-be fourteenth birthday March 28th? I will never, ever forget and therefore neither will those around me. I will always be here to remind those who forget that we are here to make life better for our children than it was for us.
