We better be on our toes around here. Something unnatural is happening and the consequences could be far-reaching---or maybe not.

For the first time I can recall, a northeastern congressman is siding with oil state representatives and senators in a call for support of the domestic producer. This is truly a once in a lifetime occurrence that goes against the natural way of doing business in which the consuming states tend to do anything to keep fuel cheap even

if it harms the producing states. Who is this white knight to our rescue?

Why, it is none other than Representative John Dingell (Dem.) who is the House Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman. You may recall his name on the proposed bill (that never reached a vote) for re-instating the federal excise tax on oil, a.k.a. the "windfall profits" tax during the Gulf War.

He has now signed a letter to President Clinton suggesting an "environmental equalization levy" that is basically an import fee on oil. The letter also discusses tax and regulatory relief to "insure a strong domestic energy business".

The other signatories to this bill were all oil producing state congressmen.

Why this sudden change of opinion concerning the domestic producing industry? Is it newfound understanding of the plight of the business? Has Mr. Dingell turned over a new leaf and is now considering the welfare of the entire country, not just his consuming state of Michigan?

Don't bet on it.

You see, Mr. Dingell is trying to put together an alternative health plan that is similar to Mr. Clinton's plan only with some concessions to small business. In order to be successful, he needs support from some of the oil state congressmen.

It is clearly a case of scratching backs and washing hands.

The good news is that it might cause something to happen on the positive side of the ledger for the oil and gas business, although I don't think the import fee is an acceptable solution. The bad news is that Mr. Dingell and those of his ilk don't really care about the domestic producing business. They just care about universal health coverage, cheap fuel, and whatever else may be beneficial to their re-election.

The joining of those asking for help for the domestic industry by a northeasterner is truly significant because of its novelty, but it remains to be seen if anything of substance will result.



Henry A. Sibley, Jr.

MARBLE FALLS—Henry A. Sibley, Jr., age 63, formerly of Winters, died on April 8, 1994, at Highland Lakes Medical Center in Burnet after an extended illness.

Mr. Sibley was born on August 9, 1930, in Shreveport, Louisiana. He attended public schools in Coushatta, Louisiana and also attended Northwestern State University in Nachitoches, Louisiana, where he played varsity basketball. He enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and was commissioned as an officer following graduation from Air Cadet Training at Randolph Field. He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, The Air Medal and United Nations Service Medal in recognition of his combat service in Korea. He was retired from the Air Force due to injuries sustained in the crash of his Sabre Jet when it was shot down in combat in May, 1952. Following retirement from the military he graduated from the University of South Florida at Lakeland, Florida.

A licensed commercial pilot, Mr. Sibley owned a flying school near Shreveport. He was active in Louisiana politics, serving as Executive Director of the Louisiana State Sovereignty Commission under Governor John McKeithen. He was appointed to the honorary rank of Brigadier General in recognition of his heroic service to Louisiana and the nation. After moving to Texas, Sibley was appointed by Governer Bill Clements to the Texas Aeronautic Commission and later served as Inspector General of the Texas Department of Commerce.

Henry Sibley, Jr., married Ira June Brannon Heidenheimer of Winters and Ballinger in 1979, and they made their home in Winters for several years prior to moving to Marble Falls. While in Winters, Mr. Sibley was involved in oil and gas exploration and civic and church activities. He was a member of Sons of Confederate Veterans, being a descendant of Confederate Army General Henry Sibley and was a member of the First Baptist Church of Marble Falls.

Mr. Sibley is survived by his wife, June, of Marble Falls; two daughters Jennifer Blackburn and Jane Sibley, both of Baton Rouge, Lousiana; one son, Hank Sibley, of Palestine; one sister, Shirley Attaway, of Shreveport; one daughter, Jill Heidenheimer West, of Beeville; four sons, Jeff Heidenheimer, of Coleman; Jay Heidenheimer, of Pflugerville; Joe Heidenheimer, of Winters and Jim Heidenheimer, of Abilene and eleven grandchildren.

Her name was Pearl. Pearl Jackson. And, she was one. Like what Jesus talked about in Matthew 13:45 and 46, "The kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it." She was not the kingdom. But she surely was and is one in the kingdom. A gem. Precious. And polished.

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The first time I really met her was after one of our worship services at the Nursing Home on Wednesday morning. That day I had preached on the presence of God, and how important it was for us to take care of our souls. Almost immediately after the service, this little lady came Up to me and said, "Soul, soul... what is a soul? People don't talk about souls anymore." I said, "I do." She said, "Well, come to my room and let's talk about it."

That day marked the beginning of a good friendship. This 100 year old teacher and this 65 year old preacher had some really good "goarounds". She must have really been a good teacher, because she was a good student. She asked all the tough questions - "Why is there so much pain in the world?", "Why do good people have to suffer?", "What happens after we die?" And she wanted good answers.

She talked about her experiences in the class room. Having lived for her students, she lived on the memories of them. She told of one of her students who came to see her long after she had retired. She was tired of living and wanted to die. She turned to him and asked, "Why doesn't God let me die?" He thought a moment, and then replied, "Because God doesn't need another boss!" And, then, she chuckled. Because it was true - she had been a strict disciplinarian. A task-master. Learning is not easy. It takes effort and concentration and stick-to-it-iveness. she gave her teaching her best. And she expected the same of her students.

She knew how to help her students "catch on". Because typing is sort of like playing the piano - it helps if you have a sense of timing and rhythm - she brought into her room a record player and a record. And the students would type along to the music. It helped. The only problem was that, after a while, hearing the same record became somewhat monotonous. Especially to the custodian who was out in the hall. So, one day he brought her another one. She wasn't offended. She said, "I knew it was bothering him and wondered what he would do about it!"

She kept on learning all of her life. When she knew her eye-sight was going bad, she started to memorize poetry, to fill her mind with good thoughts, to store them up for use when she couldn't read anymore. And she kept on teaching, showing us how to live. When she moved into the nursing home, she did not give up. She made of her room a hospitality place. She received her friends and her guests there. She had some books, and she did some writing. But she also served. She went up and down the halls - visiting her neighbors, trying to help them. One of her last acts in the home was to give a new patient a back rub. Two days later she died.

She was no stranger to death. She had been there when her father died when she was 12, and years later when her husband died. She sat with brothers and sisters when they died. She was not afraid. When her final hour was about to come, lying in a hospital bed in Abilene, waiting for surgery the next morning, she told her cousin, "I'm not going to have surgery in the morning. I'm going home." And she did. Her last lesson to us was, how to die. And her greatest lesson to us - no matter where how old you are, or who you are, give life your best. "Trust and obey. There is no other way."



The Education of a Small Town Doc

Keith Boles has signed a contract with North Runnels Hospital to come back and practice medicine in Winters once he is through with medical school and his residency. At this time, he is a second year medical student at Texas Tech in Lubbock.

so long! As one of my classmates said, medical school is like trying to drink from a fire hydrant. And here lately, they've been tweaking the valve open a tad bit more. I apologize for not writing sooner.

In my last article I promised to talk about the Clinton Health Plan in this article. But, hey, politics is boring and from the way it looks now the final product may look nothing like the existing plan. So, why talk about it? Instead, I'll update you on what's happening with school which is more the purpose of this article.

I just finished a test block on Thursday (3/31) so Lori and I relaxed this past weekend. I went fishing at White River Lake on Friday but didn't have much luck. I caught a 21" Walleye there last year!

Two things are making life a bit more tense this spring than usual. One is the USMLE and the other is not knowing where Lori and I will be living next year.

USMLE stands for United States Medical Licensing Exam. There are three exams total. I take the first one on June 8th and 9th. All medical students must take (and pass!) these exams in order to become a licensed or "boardcertified" physician. The "board" in board-certified is either the National Board of Medical Examiners or the appropriate state medical board.

In the U.S., a license to practice medicine is granted only by state their own rules but all 50 require passage of a licensing examination. It is expected that in the very near future all will accept the USMLE.

Hello Winters! Sorry it's been the NBME (National Board of Medical Examiners). The USMLE has replaced these two in an effort to make licensure more standard and uniform across the nation. Every medical student in the U.S. must take the same series of three exams in order to be licensed.

The first exam is taken in June between years two and three of medical school. The second is taken during the spring of the fourth year. The third is taken in the summer after the first year of residency.

Let's talk about the one I'm most concerned about, the first one (officially called USMLE Step I). It's a two-day examination with approximately 800 multiple choice questions. The exam is broken into four 3-hour sessions with about 200 questions per session. If you're calculating like I am, that's a little less than a minute per question. Not much time for dilly-dallying. The big kicker is that it covers all the material we've covered in the first two years of school and we only have three weeks to study for it. There's not much time during the regular semesters to prepare for it.

There is some comfort in the fact that the average passing grade for all U.S. medical students is about 60%. And I've heard that if a student has done at least fair over the first two years and conducts a decent review in the three weeks allotted, he or she should have no problem passing.

But still I have these unrealismedical boards. They each have tic scenarios run through my head every now and then. Like, forgetting to set my alarm and sleeping through part of the exam or completely going blank in the middle of the exam and not even being There used to be two different able to remember my name. Then licensing exams: the FLEX (Fed-there's the one where my car eral Licensing Examination) and breaks down on the way to the



exam or the one where the electricity goes out during the night and completely messes up the three alarm clocks I have set and I wake up two hours late. These are completely unrealistic, I know, but every medical student has had these thoughts at one time or another, I assure you. Needless to say, I'll have at least three alarm clocks set for the mornings of the exam, at least two of which will be battery powered and I'll leave two hours early for the exam so I can walk the rest of the way if my vehicle breaks down. Ha! There's not much I can do to keep my

mind from going blank. Concerning our city of residence for next year, at Tech they divide the class into thirds and send one-third to Amarillo, onethird to El Paso and one-third stay in Lubbock to complete their third and fourth years. Currently, Lori and I are scheduled to go to Amarillo but we would really like to stay in Lubbock. Lori has a really good job, she is able to take classes at Tech, and we've made lots of friends through our church here. Tech does have a campus transfer policy. If a student has a good excuse and a space is available, they can be granted a campus transfer to Lubbock.

Sixteen people in our class asked for transfers to Lubbock. So far, five have been granted transfers. Lori and I are next on the waiting list for a Lubbock spot to become available. How spaces become available is a complicated process. We've been told it could be as late as three weeks before time to move before we hear any news. This could really mess up housing and moving plans. But Lori and I are happy with the way things have gone so far and we've both said we can deal with a move to Amarillo if we have to. Things could be worse!




