James Cross started the Tuesday, April 12 School Board meet-
ing with a request for junior varing with a request for junior var-

These companies are trying more innovation to attract capita for drilling and other development work. This requires more than a dry prospectus quoting as
tronomical return possibilities If you look at the history companies that promote deals, they have not always been the most forthcoming when it comes to fully educating the prospective investor. The biggest sellers were those that knew how to present just enough information to make the deal enticing without providmight spook the investor
This wasn't necessarily meant to trick or deceive the investor
(although some bad apples did intend to mislead). Things evolved this way due the innate complexity of the oil business. In order to sell a deal, whether it be on paper, in person, or by phone, the presentation must be interest, yet complete enough to tell the story. This is not easy when there are so many possibl outcomes, contingencies, etc. As a result, most deal makers
and promoters did not really spend much time educating the investor as to the more subtle nuances of the business, especially the scientific and economic aspects of the
deals. This would only serve to lengthen the time it takes to sell a deal and, at its worst, it might cause one to lose an investor. Now, however, deal makers are finding that people are so frightened of investing in the oil education is not such a What I mean to say is that the few. that are interested in investing are serious about it. They want to know the guts of the deal, the downside, and the upside, and the chances of each occurring.
In order to give those serious
investers-to-be what they want, promoters are utilizing newslet-
ters, free seminars on investing, ters, free seminars on investing, investors informed.
They are also providing engineering reports, economic analy ses, and any other requested back ground information on a project. All of this is wrapped in a more person-to-person type approach. Luncheon meetings with groups
of potential investors, cocktail of potential investors, cocktail
parties, and dinner parties are being held in major cities by dealmaking oil companies to provide more personal contact between investors and promoters.
The good news is that is working, at least for the best, most reputable deal-making independents. Oh yeah, it's still more dif-
ficult than ever to sell enough working interest shares to drill a prospect, but when one does sell it, it is sold to a knowledgeable, up-front investor.

This spring the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) in Reading and Mathematics will to allow for the useof the growth measure in these subjects. TAAS esting will continue for grades 4 and in Writing Reading and Mu 2) in Writing, Reading and Math ematics. In addition, assessments grades 4 and 8 will be imple mented. In the fall of 1993 the State Board of Education adopted a redesigned Student Assessment Pro gram which includes modifica gram. The spring schedule for TAAS includes test administra tions in March and May. The Writing portion of the test was given in March. Grades will take Reading on May 10 and Math on May 11. Additionally, he TAAS exit level tests for iors only in Writing, Reading an Math will be administered agae
on May 5,6 and 9,1994 , respec tively. Only graduating seniors or out-of-school individuals who have met all graduation requirements may participate in this administration. Make-up sessions are not allowed for TAAS or TEAMS. Section 101.2 of the Texas
Administrative Code Administrative Codesets forththe
requirements for the TAAS and TEAMS testing programs at the exit level. It states that any individual must demonstrate mastery of each section of the exit level examination in order to be eligible to receive a high school diploma.
The tests will begin as soon as possible after the first tardy bell. Parents can help by assisting the

"Farmers have only two more weeks to sign up and become eligible forprogram benefitson their 1994 wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice crops," said Dwaine Lange, County Committee Chairman of the Runnels County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The sign-up pe-
riod ends April 29 riod ends April 29.
he said producers will not have minds and sign up after this deadline. Producers who have already enrolled and those who sign up before April 29 have the option of withdrawing and returning any advance payments.
To be eligible for price support
loans and target price protection loans and target price protection
on this year's crops, farmers are required to meet acreage reduction requirements of 11 percent for upland cotton and 15 percent for extra long staple cotton acres. "There are no acreage idling requirements for wheat, com, grain sorghum, oats, barley and rice," Lange said.

Target prices protect farmers' incomes if market prices fall beels. Through the ASCS price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing to operate and have time to wait for a better market.
