With drilling capital harder and harder to scrounge, the independent deal makers must work harder than ever.

These companies are trying more innovation to attract capital for drilling and other development work. This requires more than a dry prospectus quoting astronomical return possibilities.

If you look at the history of companies that promote deals, they have not always been the most forthcoming when it comes to fully educating the prospective investor. The biggest sellers were those that knew how to present just enough information to make the deal enticing without providing too much information that might spook the investor.

This wasn't necessarily meant to trick or deceive the investor (although some bad apples did intend to mislead). Things evolved this way due the innate complexity of the oil business.

In order to sell a deal, whether Coleman County it be on paper, in person, or by phone, the presentation must be of sufficient brevity to maintain interest, yet complete enough to tell the story. This is not easy when there are so many possible outcomes, contingencies, etc.

As a result, most deal makers and promoters did not really spend much time educating the investor as to the more subtle nuances of the business, especially the scientific and economic aspects of the deals. This would only serve to lengthen the time it takes to sell a deal and, at its worst, it might cause one to lose an investor.

Now, however, deal makers are finding that people are so frightened of investing in the oil and gas business, anyway, that education is not such a bad thing. What I mean to say is that the few that are interested in investing are serious about it. They want to know the guts of the deal, the downside, and the upside, and the chances of each occurring. In order to give those serious investors-to-be what they want, promoters are utilizing newsletters, free seminars on investing, and follow-up phone calls to keep investors informed.


Hattie May (Mrs. Lee) Reed


Juanita Wright







TEAMS. Section 101.2 of the Texas Administrative Code sets forth the requirements for the TAAS and TEAMS testing programs at the exit level. It states that any individual must demonstrate mastery of each section of the exit level examination in order to be eligible to receive a high school diploma.

The tests will begin as soon as possible after the first tardy bell. Parents can help by assisting the student in getting plenty of rest and in getting to school on time. This is an important test and all efforts should be made to help the student to his/her best. Students have been working hard during the last several months and should show mastery at this time. If you have questions concerning TAAS testing, please contact the campus. Individual scores will be distributed to parents and guardians at the end of May. Individuals who are out-of-school and wish to take the May administration should contact the school counselor by April 22, 1994, to reserve a place for testing.

gible for program benefits on their 1994 wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice crops," said Dwaine Lange, County Committee Chairman of the Runnels County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The sign-up period ends April 29.

He said producers will not have the opportunity to change their minds and sign up after this deadline. Producers who have already enrolled and those who sign up before April 29 have the option of withdrawing and returning any advance payments.

To be eligible for price support loans and target price protection on this year's crops, farmers are required to meet acreage reduction requirements of 11 percent for upland cotton and 15 percent for extra long staple cotton acres. "There are no acreage idling requirements for wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley and rice," Lange said.

Target prices protect farmers' incomes if market prices fall below the federally-established levels. Through the ASCS price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing to operate and have time to wait for a better market.

Additionally, the 1994 farm programs offer advance payments in cash and flexible planting options.

"If producers do not sign up, they should clearly understand that they will not be eligible for benefits offered under the 1994 programs," Lange concluded.
