



In an effort to draw attention to the problem of stripper well shutins being caused by low oil prices, the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact Commission (IOGCC) has recently published a study documenting the economic impact of these shut-ins.

The study, for the first time, attempts to quantify the effect of stripper oil production to the economy-in-macro--not just the oil business. For years, the champions of 'poor-boy' outfits who produce most of the stripper oil have been bragging about how much economic impact these guys make to a state like Texas or even a community like this one. Now, there is quantitative evidence that supports this view.

The IOGCC study found that each dollar of stripper oil production creates an additional 51 cents in U.S. economic activity. This means that every barrel of oil produced creates a flow of money equal to about \$7 to \$10 dollars, depending on oil price, on top of the money changing hands from the sale of the oil itself.

The study also found that each \$1 million of stripper production creates 9 new jobs. In other words, each 60,000 barrels per day of production secures almost 10 jobs for people who need the work. For your information, stripper wells produce about \$1 million [dollars of revenue every one and one-half hours.

In 1992, the latest year available, stripper wells made 368 million barrels of oil, which is about 14% of the U.S. daily production. By current accounts, about 100,000 barrels per day of production has been shut-in this year due to lower oil prices.

I don't advocate that we do anything particularly special for these producers, because I believe in the free market. But, I do believe we should understand the impact of this part of the industry and appreciate how much they contribute to our economy.

Part of this appreciation should be a level playing field with other producers and other types of energy. This means fair taxation, not burdensome levies. It means allowing them to be good environmental citizens without regulating them out of business.

We need these guys as much as they need us, their customers. Just try to remember them, if you can.



Never Give Up

John Ballew, a self-styled one horse farmer, was a colorful Runnels County character who liked writing even better than he did farming. He signed many of his newspaper articles "Uncle Johnnie."

Ellen Ballew, a daughter-inlaw, said that he sat up until the wee hours of the morning writing for the various newspapers, including the Dallas Semi-Weekly Farm News. He also wrote for Farm and Ranch and Progressive Farmer.

She recalled that he entered a farm improvement contest sponsored by the Semi-Weekly Farm News and won the prize. When the newspaper sent a representative out to take pictures of his farm, none of the proposed improvements were found and Uncle Johnnie was asked to return the award money. He refused because, he said, he didn't tell them he had made the improvements, but only how it could be done.

Edna Williams of Fremont, California wrote that she had vivid memories of her father: walking over his acres of cotton in the early morning and sitting tipped back in a cane-bottom chair writing with a dictionary nearby. "I was eleven when he died but will never forgethis taking us to church dollars and cents." every Sunday morning, and for evening services."

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Ruby Martin of Big Spring wrote that she remembered very well when her father received a check for \$100 for an article on "How to Grow Irish Potatoes," sent to the Progressive Farmer.

She also wrote, "Though my fatherdidn't belong to any church, his firm belief was there should be no religious denominations separating the children of God. His family was required to attend all churches.

After his grand introduction, Ballew gave an example of what he had accomplised with a piece of prairie land that had never felt the touch of the plow. He broke some of the land and, with the boys' help, at the end of the season picked 30 bales of cotton and sold it for sixteen-hundred and eleven dollars. In August he didn't think he would make over ten bales. He also made about 1000 bushels of maize on 20 acres.



Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

· the value placed on your property · any exemptions that may apply to you

the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal

· the taxable status of your property • the local governments which should be

taxing your property · any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you

Informal Review Upon receiving your appraisal notice post cards, check the previous year value and the current year value. If you have any questions you may call our office at 365-3583 or come by our office corner of 6th & Strong and speak with an appraiser about your property.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the corner of

6th and Strong in Ballinger, Texas. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB

hears it. Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the

ARB's order. More information

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before June 20, 1994.

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.





An order was passed to accept the resignation of Commissioner Self as Records Management Officer and to appoint Judge Murchison in this capacity.


Approval was given to the City of Ballinger to close a city street. The City gave the County the option to buy the right-of-way, since the County owns adjacent property, but the Commissioners declined.




