tendent Lancaster.

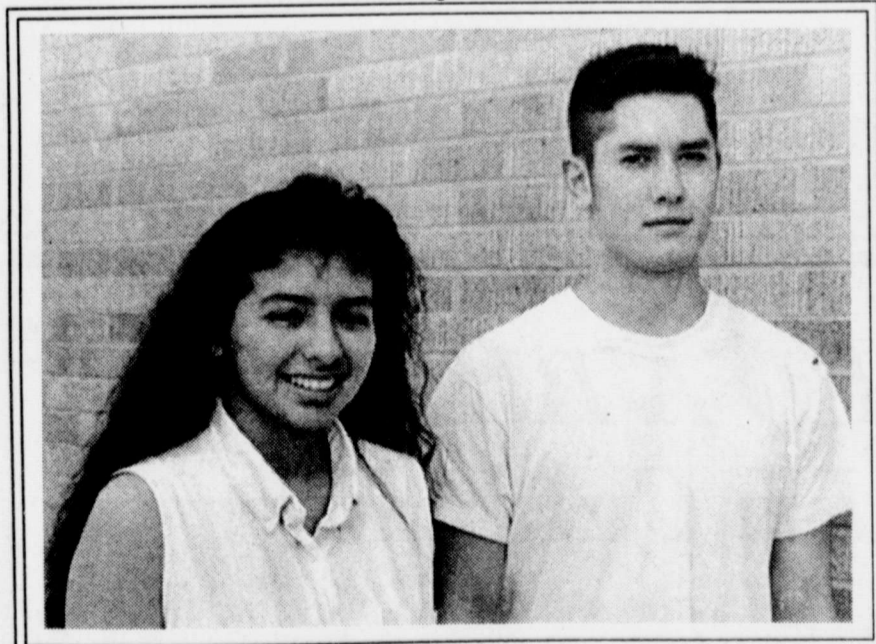
Diplomas will be presented by WISD Trustee Bob Webb.

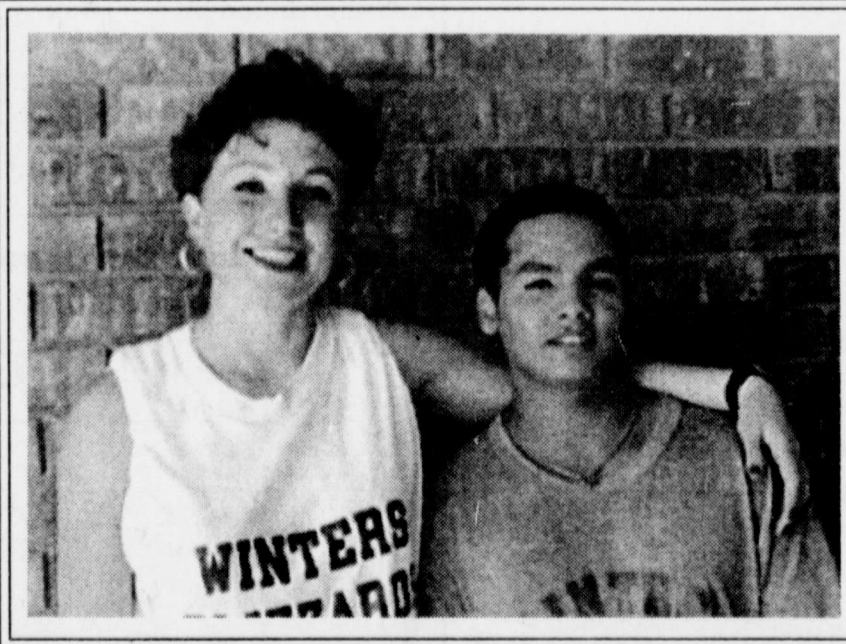

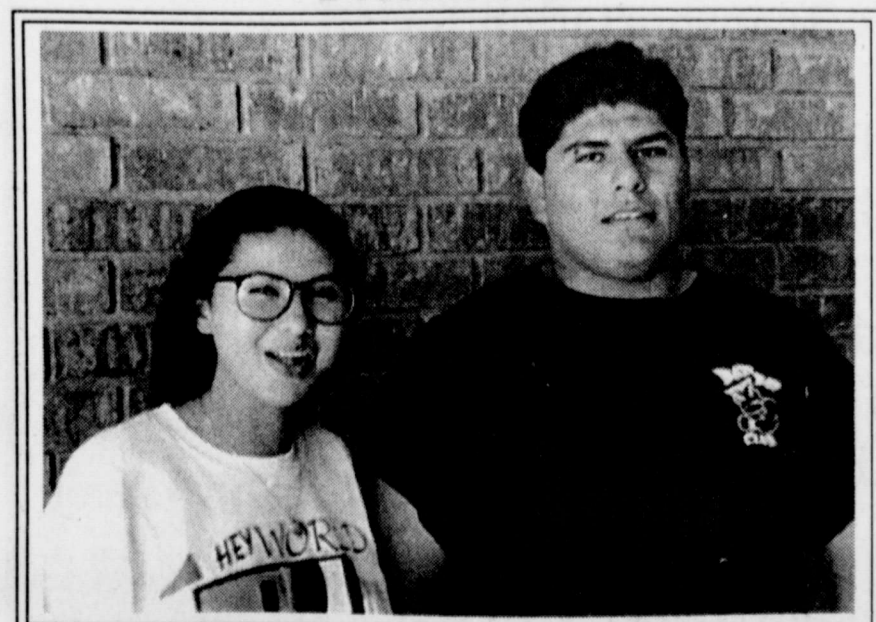

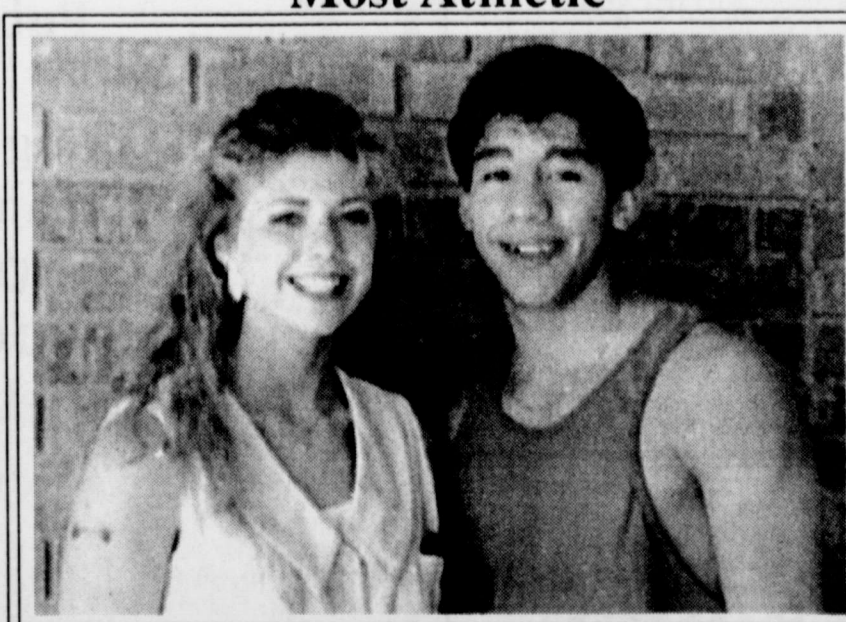

## WISD cited for excessive charges by TEA

The Winters Independent School District was recently cited by the Texas Education Agency that the WISD "exceeded its administrative cost standard in the 1992-93 school year."

Section 16.205 of the Texas Education Code (TEC) requires the Texas Education Agency to analyze district expenditure data to identify districts that exceeded established administrative cost standards in the prior year.

An analysis by TEA shows that Winters ISD's administrative cost ratio (0.1925) for the 1992-93 school year exceeded its established standard of 0.1561. This

means that for its instructional expenditure during the year, the district's 1992-93 administrative expenditure was \$78,215 greater than allowed by the standard applicable to the district.

Jimmy Butler, WISD Business Manager, explained that the excessive figure is a result of several expenditures which, in the past, have been categorized under "administrative expense" simply because they were processed through the administrative office. Some of these expenses include insurance for all school campuses,

## Never Give Up, continued

"Uncle Johnnie Ballew was farming in a period of time when a man's farming tools consisted of a double disc plow, single row planter and cultivator hoe, maize-heading knife and cotton sack; before terraces and contour rows," said J.A. Patterson, a neighbor.

He also said that Ballew wrote interesting letters about farming. He advocated planting your crops so that when you left the barn to work on the far side of the field you would be plowing going and coming. And no time wasted with the plow out of the ground. He wrote "I've made a crop with three trips to the row: one to bed, one to plant and one to cultivate."

UNCLE JOHNNIE WEA-THER PROPHET is the heading of an article written for the *Banner-Leader* April 2, 1909. "Rains will come in due season to make a big crop" is the sub-story which closes with the following paragraphs:

"The thing to do is to work the land into dust and then get a can of worms and go fishing.

"Go to every picnic. Put away your tear jug. Store up your energies and when the season is far

enough advanced for the cold northerners to quit coming, it is going to rain to beat the dickens. It always has. It always will. Then get your canopy topped cultivator and make it sing a tune.

"We are in good company. Other sections are dry. No use to take the dry grins. Put up a liquid smile and be sure it don't wear off. Our minds and hearts and ambition need stimulating."

Uncle Johnnie  
The very next month, RUNNELS LOSES GOOD CITIZEN was the heading of a column in the *Banner-Leader* for May 7, 1909. Uncle Johnnie sells his place near Mazeland and will go west to hunt cheaper land.

"John Ballew (Uncle Johnnie) has done much for Runnels County. He came here with confidence in the country and made good. He was found preaching the good things in life continually, and always looked on the bright side of life. His writings have appeared in nearly every paper of any consequence in the State, and quite a number of other states, and as a booster he has no equal.

"Uncle Johnnie owned 240 acres of land, and sold it for \$27

per acre. He bought the land in its unimproved state and made a splendid farm of it. We regret to see him leave and hope he will not find anything that will suit him better than Runnels and will come back and continue to live in the best land in the world."

The last of UNCLE JOHNNIE'S MUSINGS FROM MAZELAND appeared in the *Banner-Leader* on May 14, 1909.

For once Uncle Johnnie is feeling glum. "The time has come for us to part hands. We have come to the forks of the road and however sorrowful the parting, we must keep to the right."

In a long emotion-packed article, Uncle Johnnie thanked the people for their kindness when his pathway was swept by flames and afflictions. "It is not a matter of dollars and cents. Gentlemen, there is something more to it. It is one thing to live. It is another thing to live in the confidence and esteem of noble men and women."

After Ballew's sad farewell to his beloved Runnels County, no evidence can be found that he ever moved, not even for a time.

John Lollar said that Ballew taught him to farm and he was with him from 1909 until 1915 and he thinks he would have known it if he left. "At least, he never told me goodbye and he wasn't glad to see me when he returned."

After Lollar left Uncle Johnnie he farmed on a place next to him. "He ruined more cotton and maize for me, going across my field without raising his plow. He never took his plows out of the ground for anything, not even pastures. He used rope and pieces of chain for harness."

When Dave Compton moved to Runnels County in 1910 from Itasca, Uncle Johnnie was saying, "Use a buster on the land, don't plow with a disc."

Ballew made good crops, but Compton recalled that when the farmers in the area saw a weedy field, they said, "Uncle Johnnie, you'd better get a plow!"

The couple is planning a July 2 wedding in Roscoe at the Roscoe Church of Christ.

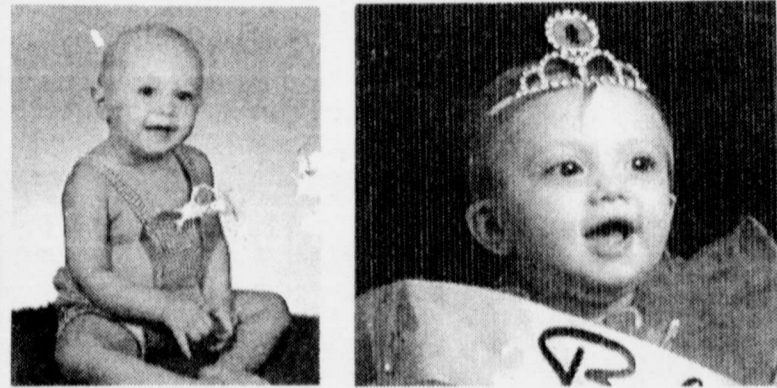
Following their marriage, they will make their home in Roscoe.

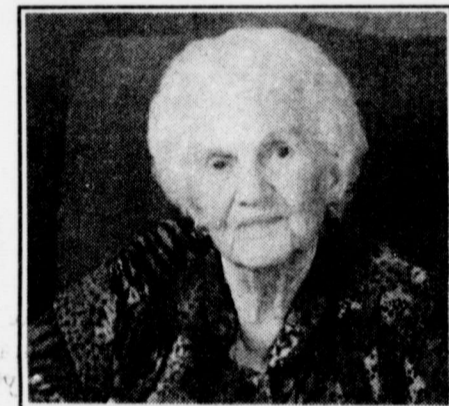

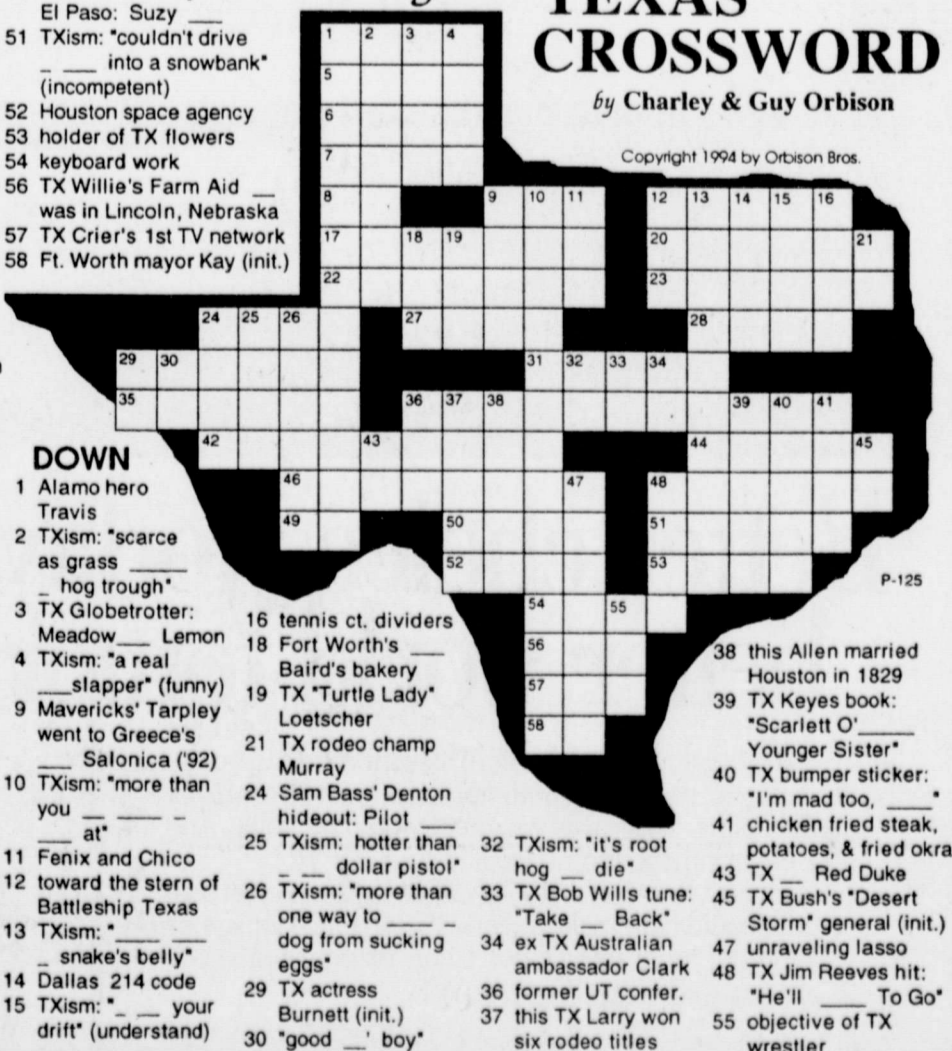

David is the son of Hal and Pamella Smith Miller of Grand Prairie.

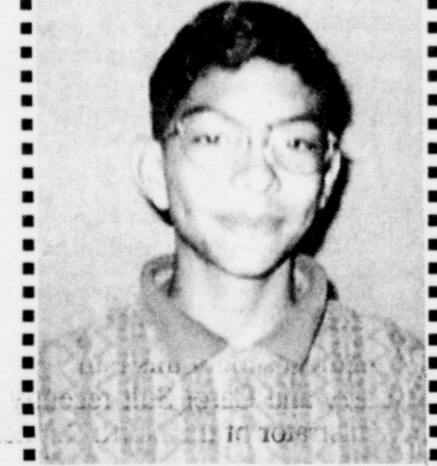
## Girl of the Month

Noemi Vega, 14 year old daughter of Paulina and Luciano Vega, is May's "Girl of the Month". Noemi is an 8th grader.

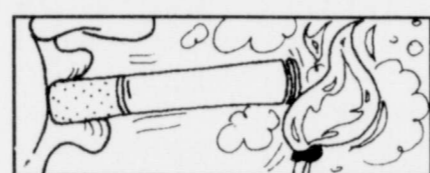
Noemi hopes to become a horse trainer after attending college. Her favorite school subjects are math and history.

## City plans park project, hires pool workers

In the regular meeting of the Winters City Council on May 23, two agenda items were approved to take advantage of State grant money.

From a grant of \$152,850 for a proposed park at Elm Creek Reservoir, Hibbs and Todd Engineering will be paid \$8,000 to prepare a park project design and specifications.

Although the cost to Hibbs and Todd Engineering might go as high as \$19,000 for such a design, Scott Hays, a representative of Hibbs and Todd, said, "we came as low as \$8,000 since we are working for the City of Winters."

Hays also stated that as much as six months may be needed for the design and approval. "The State must approve the plan and that could take up to two months of the six months," Hays said.

A planning service is the second state grant to be utilized by the City of Winters. The grant is for \$38,250 with matching funds from the City of Winters in the amount of \$6,500, for a total of \$44,750.

The City Council approved a contract with Tim F. Glendening and Associates to prepare the Planning/Capacity Project. Hibbs and Todd will handle the engineering on this project.

A partial list of items to be reported on include Street System Plan, Water System Plan, Sewer System Plan, Drainage System Plan, Parks and Recreation Plan and Economic Development Plan.

Glendening stated that the plan will be used to help different areas of community development and help bring in new business. The plan will also help with future applications for grants.

In other business, Scott Hays reported on the progress of the dam repair at Elm Creek Reservoir and said that it should be completed before the June 22 deadline.

Councilman David Evans was appointed by the Council as Mayor Pro-tem.

After executive session, the Council hired six part-time temporary employees as pool manager and lifeguards at the city swimming pool for the summer of 1994.

Administrator Aref Hassan said that city employees will begin spraying for mosquito control as soon possible.

Bills were approved to be paid and the meeting was adjourned. Those present were Mayor Joe Gerhart, Aldermen Manuel Esquivel, David Evans, Shirley Hall, Garry Goff, Nelan Bahlman, Administrator Aref Hassan, and City Attorney Kenneth Slimp.

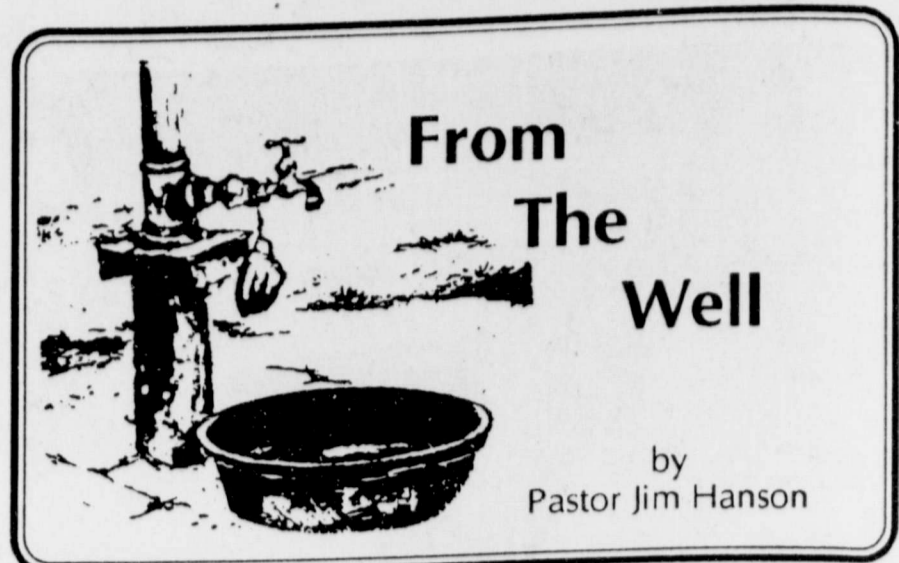

It's graduation time. High School graduation is probably the most important. For many of us it is the deepest emotional time of all our graduations.

It's not the ceremony - the diploma, or any of that. I don't remember feeling any great jolt within when I received my diploma in May of 1946. To be perfectly honest, I was numb. It wasn't the ceremony - it was the recognition that I was no longer a student there, and was going to leave my class, my school, and soon, my home and my home town. I wasn't at all sure I wanted to go.

For seven years, nine months each year, I had been going to the same school campus, seeing the same faces - classmates, school mates, and teachers. There was not a lot of moving around those days. People stayed put, and that in itself lended a kind of stability and security to this young knight in shining graduation gown.

I loved my home-town, Brookings, South Dakota. And the school. Most of the time it was a safe place. Teachers and parents worked together to make sure that we students got a good education. Learning was not just processing facts and formulas.

We were also taught how to live, how to behave. And we were graded, marked, on our deportment. The back side of our report cards recorded how we were doing in such virtues as honesty, reliability, loyalty, courtesy, and respect. If you did good, you had a clean slate. There were no check marks in the appropriate column for those areas that needed improvements.

However, if you were deficient in deportment, there were those tell-tale check marks. To make matters worse, my father always read the back side-first! It was most important to him.

As a young man growing up, school really taught me a lesson, one that I will never forget. I was in the 6th grade. My home room teacher was Miss Sheffelbein. Six feet tall, straight as a pin, sharp as a tack, and strict. Not always loved. But always respected.

One day, while taking a test, I came across a question to which I had no answer. My mind drew a blank. I started to panic. I looked around - and there, across the aisle, on the desk of my friend Jack Johnson, was the paper on which the answer lay.

I could see it - plain as day. So, I copied his answer and put it on my paper.

I had just completed this when I felt a towering presence over my left shoulder. I looked up to see the wide-opened eyes of Miss Sheffelbein. "James, are you cheating?" Zingo! Right to my blackened heart. I gulped. I gasped. And I lied. I choked out a feeble "No". She didn't say a word. She just picked up my paper, tore it in two, and put it in the waste basket.

The next weeks were hell. I was in the fires of the pit. I had cheated. And lied. And was caught in the act. What was going to happen?

My teacher didn't call my parents. She made me responsible.

That six weeks the back side of my report card was filled with check marks. When dad saw that he simply asked, "What on earth has happened?" And this child of earth with feet of clay told the truth. Together we went to my teacher. I apologized, confessed my sins of lying and cheating to her, received her forgiveness, and - that's the day I really was graduated, elevated, lifted up to a new level of life. I had learned, the hard way, not to lie and not to cheat. Good lessons, learned in school. No wonder I was somewhat numb when I had to leave. I was leaving a dear old friend - my school, where I learned a lot more than facts and formulas. I had learned about living the good life! Praise God.

## Letter to the Editor

### Reader urges others to be on guard

Dear Editor:

Almost two years have passed since my daughter and her children escaped from a ritual abuse situation in Oklahoma.

The Taylor County Sheriff's office has been very supportive when help has been needed due to ongoing harassment and stalking. The District Attorney's office has not.

Twelve years ago she unknowingly married a Satan worshipper from north Runnels County. He immediately took her to Oklahoma City where he apparently had connections with a cult.

The members of this particular cult live seemingly normal lives during the day. They are doctors, lawyers, teachers, stalwart church members, and scout leaders. People from all walks of life can be involved.

At night they take their victims to a designated place for the rituals of torture, sexual abuse and murder of adults and children. Many times these perversions are photographed to be sold or to be used as blackmail.

There are certain dates during the year when special rituals are held. The date determines the type of ritual, and the sex and number of victims required. If victims can-

not be provided from among their own group, then they are kidnapped from the community.

The adult victims are usually drugged and hypnotized, consequently they will have recurring nightmares that are so bizarre no one will believe them. Sometimes the victims do consciously remember the abuse, yet, those they tell will not listen or give validation to the memories.

These people who do remember are then afraid to tell someone else for fear of being thought crazy, especially if it happened in a church. They also fear to tell what was done to them because of the guilt they may feel.

These memories are real. There is no reason for guilt feelings by the victim, no matter what was done to them or what they were forced to do under drug induced mind control.

When many people come forward with their memories, then the mainstream of the population will begin to realize that Satan worship in this country is a reality and a threat to our existence as a Judeo-Christian nation.

## O'Dell and '68 Firebird take drag race

and each contestant must enter the E.T. (estimated time) that he thinks his car will take to go 1/4 mile. A car cannot run the course in a faster time than the time estimated or it will cause a "break-out" and the race will be lost.

O'Dell's winning time was 11:14 seconds, clocked at 110.48 MPH at the finish line. At that speed, his car covered 60 feet in 1.532 seconds.
