Farmers hope for moisture as planting season arrives
As planting season draws near, farmers find them-
selves praying for a little help from Mother Nature-in selves praying for a liute help from
the form of rain.
J.D. Ragland, county Extension agent, said many J.D. Ragland, county Extension agent, said
farmers are pre-watering their farms now, trying to bring the soil moisture to fidd ing corn.
Getting beets planted is keeping farmers busy right sowing corm next week. After that, he said cotton and sorghum will be planted, probably in the latter part of April or in May.
"They (farmers) are just waiting on a good rain
now," Ragland said. "About $65 \%$ of the beets have now, Ragland said. Abont the peen the the the maint now, thing farmers are focusing on. Next week I think they'll start to plant corn."

## 'It doesn't get better than this'

Ragland said the soil moisture is adequate in most areas now, but "it won't last long."
"We sure could use a good rain. After the corn is planted, most farmers will probably have to water it in The wheat could also use a drink from Mother Nature, but Ragland said the crop looks good so far. g can beat this," said Johnson, -7 sophomore point guard and 5 starter for the Lady Raiders. "Winning national is a dream come true for me. I think I'm still recovering from the thrill. My cheeks are sore rom smiling since we won. This is

## Texas preschoolers are not immunized

By DAVID R. SMITH, M.D. Texas Commissioner of Health ccine-preventable diseases This sad fact should come as surprise, since immunization levels for preschool children in this state one out of $50 \%$. That means that dren in Texas are at high risk of serious, sometimes life-threatening diseases such as measles and whooping cough.
Within the past
Texas children five years, 3,717 have developed measles and 12 have died from complications of this totally preventable disease Neeaks whooping cough outIn also have occurred.
ry addition to causing unnecessary, senseless suffering and death burdens on our already over-bur-
dened health care delivery system. For example, during a 1990 measles outbreak in Dallas, 238 children and adults were hospita lized at a total cost of $\$ 3.4$ million Vaccine for the same 238 people
would have cost less than $\$ 3,700$. For years we have been aware the problem, but as a society we have ignored the blinking yellow warning lights - the reports and statistics that told us that fewer and fewer preschool children were ade quately immunized. Now the lights are no longe yellow. The warning signals have
been replaced with the piercing red of a moral stop light. Can we morally continue to ignore needles sickness among our children?

Survey asks health care of children
The "All Kids Count" im-
munization task force is asking all parents to fill out a survey form.
The task force hopes that the information from the survey will help identify where
gaps exist in children's health care services. Other surveys are being distributed to health care providers to find out what services are available. The four-county task force that includes Castro Count

Texas Dept. of Health's existing immunization efforts, making immunity from childhood diseases the birthright of every boy and girl born in this state. It will mandate create mechanisms to overcome barriers that leave so many of our children vulnerable to disease.

For example, this legislation will allow public health clinics to open earlier and stay open later to ac-
commodate the schedules of working parents. It will make hospitals and physicians responsible for reviewing children's immunization
histories and administering any histories and administering any
needed vaccinations or referring them to an appropriate immunization clinic.
This legislation also mandates hat all health insurance policies requisite childhood immunizations, exclusive of the policy deductible.
With these changes, we will be investing in prevention and in the healthy future of all our children,
And we will, in the long run, actually be saving money because we know that for every dollar spent
on immunizations, approximately on immunizations, approximately $\$ 14$ in health care expenses are
saved. saved
These proposals offer Texas the chance to take the national lead in health care reform, beginning logi-
cally with the children. It is cally with the children. It is a
sound, sensible start, both morally sound, sensible start, both morally
and economically. If enacted, it will serve as a model for the federal immunization initiative recently proposed by President Clinton.
Until now, we've been on a collision course, running through
the flashing yellow warning lights. It is time to heed the moral stop light, then proceed with a strategy to guarantee all our kids the health care they need and deserve. Otherwise, the inevitable crash will no be an accident, but the sad conse

In addition, the government's ne-

trade rely heavily on the census data. If the information is understated, then American producers may not get the best benefits possibl
