## City Council delays dam repair

*Water level too high at present time*

Repair to the Elm Creek Reservoir dam will be delayed until late July or August. This was the unanimous decision by city council members who met in regular session on June 13.

Most of the dam work, which began in late April, has been completed. However, recent rains have caused the lake level to rise, preventing completion of the repairs.

The only alternative to finish the repair work was to let water out of the reservoir. All council members agreed this was not the thing to do with hot, dry summer months approaching.

Robert L. Carroll, Inc., contractor, requested the extension on the contract and permission was given to do so by the council.

Donald Williams, GTE Manager of Municipal Affairs, proposed to convert the franchise fee paid on telephone bills to an annual average fee.

This franchise fee is on all city

residents and business telephone bills, and is collected by GTE and returned to the city.

GTE wants to convert to an annual average fee to cut down on bookkeeping. At the present time, GTE has to keep up with this money paid in by its customers. With a flat fee, no bookkeeping will be necessary.

The council tabled this item for further study.

The council adopted the "City Vehicle Operator Standards" and the "City Safety Manual".

An easement agreement with Leona Jacob was approved. This easement allows a new sewer drainage system in the east part of town. Several sewer problems had surfaced in this area and this easement allows for new lines to be laid.

Donald McWright was contracted as temporary part-time Parks Attendant. This position

mows the grounds of the city park, scout hut and city hall. McWright's contract was contingent on providing a vehicle to pull the equipment trailer.

Also approved by the council was a one-year program of read-for-free-swim passes. Mrs. Joyce Krause, librarian at the Winters Public Library, had approached Mayor Gerhart with the idea of offering free swim passes to children who read a set number of books on their age level. The library will set up the guidelines for the children to qualify.

The bills and the minutes were approved, then the meeting was adjourned.

Those present for the meeting were Mayor Gerhart, Aldermen Manual Esquivel, Garry Goff and Nelan Bahlman, and Alderwoman Shirley Hall. Alderman David Evans and City Administrator Aref Hassan were absent.

## Three teens injured in wreck near Ballinger

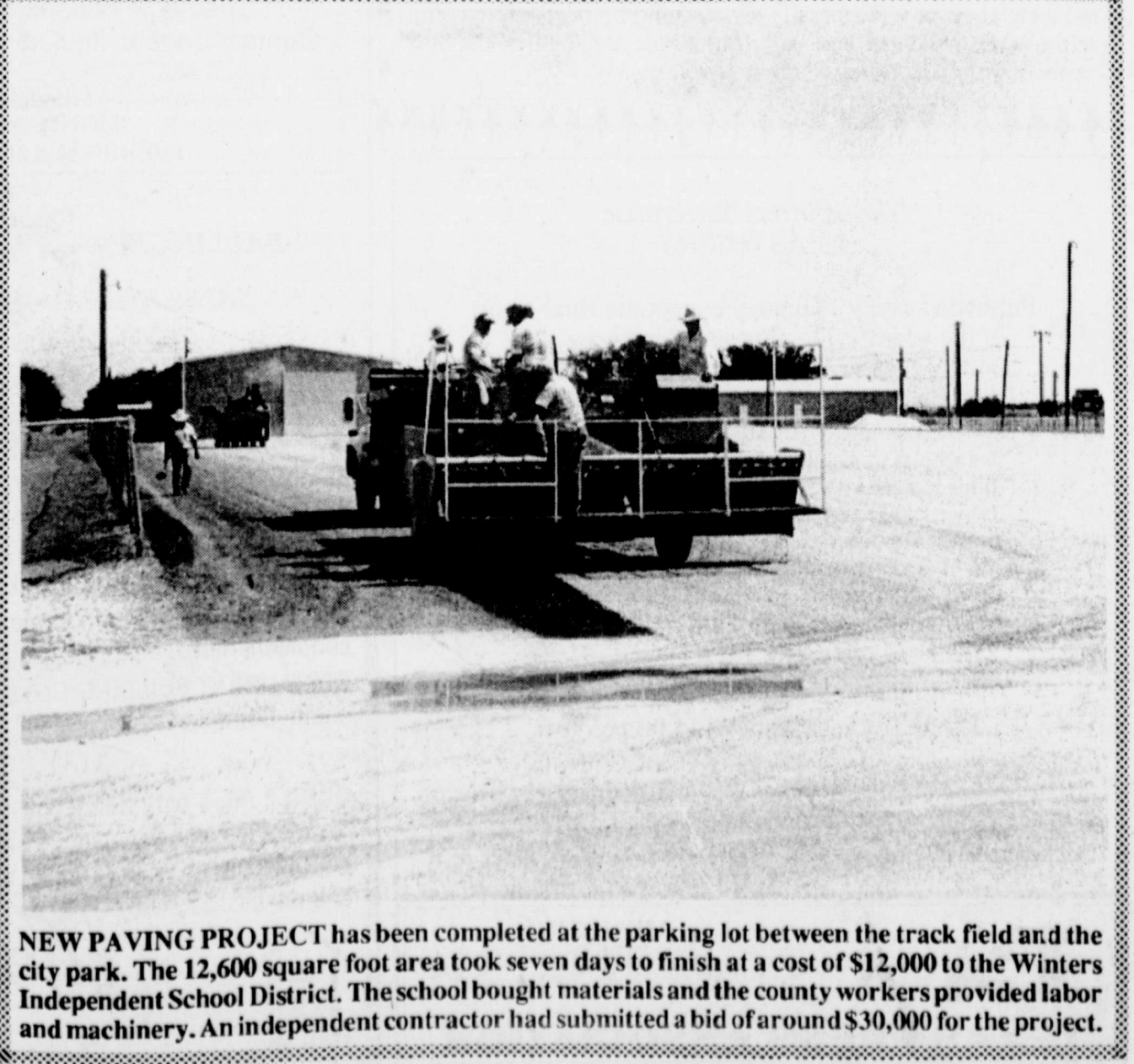
Three Ballinger youths were injured in a one-vehicle traffic accident on Texas Highway 158 west of Ballinger about 4:20 on June 8.

The accident occurred when the car they were in veered off the highway and flipped over after striking a dirt embankment, said Runnels County Sheriff's Deputy Sgt. Joe Stokes.

Most seriously injured was Barrett Belcher, 16, who was ejected through the back window, according to Stokes. As of late Tuesday Belcher remained in extremely critical condition at Angelo Community Hospital with a head injury.

Jeremiah Gore, 16, and Corey Williams, 17, suffered leg injuries. Gore remains hospitalized at Shannon Medical Center in San Angelo following leg surgery.

Williams, who was driving at the time of the accident, was released from the hospital on June 11.



NEW PAVING PROJECT has been completed at the parking lot between the track field and the city park. ## Veterans Memorial could be inscribed with 1800 names

Tentative plans have been made for the dedication of a Veterans Memorial on November 11. According to Billy Rollwitz of Rowena, approximately 1000 people are registered to have their names inscribed on the memorial, which is to be placed on the Runnels County Courthouse lawn after its completion.

Rollwitz stated that there is space for approximately 1700 to 1800 names on the monument. The inscription will carry first and last names and a middle initial.

Any person with an honorable

discharge from any military branch from World War I through the present is eligible for the memorial. This includes veterans who were members of the National Guard.

To register a name for inclusion on the Veterans Memorial, send \$35 to Billy Rollwitz, P.O. Box 195, Rowena, TX 76875 or call 442-3141 by August 1. After August 1, the cost will be increased to \$50 per name. Also, those who previously signed up should contact Rollwitz to pay the \$35 fee.

# OIL BUSINESS . . .

Let's broaden our scope for a moment and consider things well beyond the local oil patch.

We are going to discuss the hot spots around the world for oil and gas exploration and production.

The hottest place for newly discovered huge fields is South America, including Colombia, Argentina, Venezuela, and Chile. Some elephant fields (over 100 million barrels) are being discovered in the remote reaches of these countries. New concessions by the nationalized oil companies there have finally allowed much-needed technical expertise from North America into this market.

China is also a hot spot, but it is mainly a place of speculation with very little to show for all of the excitement.

Vietnam is also a place of much speculation, but it also lacks quantitative results. There is still some timidity in dealing with a brutal communist regime by most American companies.

Algeria is a place of new excitement, although oil and gas exploration has been a part of the landscape there since the post-World War II revolution. Huge gas fields and large condensate and oil reserves are being discovered, but the political situation is quite unstable.

The rest of Africa, including, Gabon, Nigeria, and Egypt are very active as outside companies are being allowed in. The unrest there is adding quite a bit of uncertainty, but many majors remain interested.

Speaking of unstable, Yemen is a tiny country south of Saudi Arabia, and it was the hot spot of the Middle East until the recent civil war broke out. Large fields with generous concessions made this a prime place to be for many large independents and majors. The future is uncertain, but money remains to be made there.

Russia is down the list recently, as many of the deals there have run into rough going due to the political turmoil and onerous economic burdens placed on American and other western companies. The potential is huge there, but it remains to be seen if any company can make a profitable deal there for oil and gas.

Indonesia is really taking off as a hot bed of activity for gas field development as the demand for gas increases as the industrialization of the area expands.

Australia is also participating in this demand for gas by the Asian countries and its proximity thereto. There is quite a large domestic petroleum industry in the island continent.

Add to all of this localized booms in Italy, France, and the Gulf of Mexico and you have a very active oil patch.

And, of course, you have the North Sea, Domestic U.S., Canada, and the Middle East with their ongoing work which makes for a lot of capital at work.

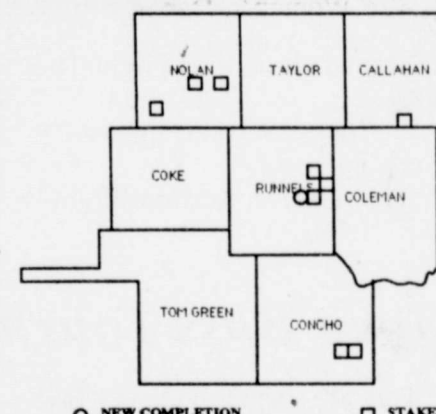

### A Soldier's Memories

Gaston Boatright is retired and sits at home where he lives with his son, Bennie. But he recalls vividly everything that happened during his service in World War II.

He was making \$1.00 a day working at C.L. Green's mill operating the elevator. He filled flour and feed sacks by hand up until May, 1942, when he received his call from Uncle Sam.

Private Gaston Boatright was sent to the Field Artillery Training Center at Camp Roberts, California, 11th F.A. Training Regiment. He successfully completed his basic training course for Field Artillery on September 12, 1942.

The troops were immediately moved out. They landed at Casablanca in North Africa and went to Tunisia where they were loaded on a boat. Through the Straits of Gibraltar the soldiers reached Salerno, Italy and traveled all the way up to Cassino Monastery. Here they made a push into Rome and came back as far as Naples.

Boatright said he was on the front line 64 days when they landed in Italy. He recalled that the troops were unloaded in the water and went into Naples at night. The ship could not enter. "We shelled cities and nothing was left standing. We went as far as the Leaning Tower of Pisa and ended up in Austria."

The troops regrouped at Naples and crossed the Mediterranean into Marseilles, France. They returned to "Camp Lucky Strike" at La Harve, France. The war was over.

Boatright was in the combat unit as a tank destroyer because that was what he wanted. He never had a furlough, but now he wanted to go home. In order for him to receive permission it was necessary to return to his unit—which he did.

Gaston Boatright was honorably discharged from the military service September 30, 1945.

His country needed him and Boatright was glad to volunteer for a salary of \$21.00 a month, without any thought of reward. However, he is proud of the citations and medals that he received:

Good Conduct Medal; Distinguished Unit Badge with 2 oak leaf clusters; EAME Campaign Medal; five Bronze Stars; Bronze Star Medal.

A summary of Boatright's military operation lists him as an anti-tank gun crewman. He performed work as gun loads gunner, and vehicle driver in a mobile anti-tank gun crew; operated gun to destroy enemy tanks and strongholds in combat; maintained and made minor repairs to gun and vehicle. He was Operator I.

He served as A+ Gun Crewman 610 at Tunisia, Naples, Foggio, Rome, Arno Rhineland and Central Europe.

Home from the war, Boatright went to work for Winters Sheet Metal. He was employed as a driver for Floyd Sims' oil company for a time. In 1992, when he became ill, he went to the V.A. Hospital in Big Spring for treatment. When Boatright's war record was called for, his commanding officer Louis J. Wadle wrote the following:

"If circumstances were to repeat themselves, I would be proud to have Gaston Boatright as a member of my command."

He was separated from the U.S. Army under honorable conditions and is entitled to all benefits for which he is eligible and deserving."

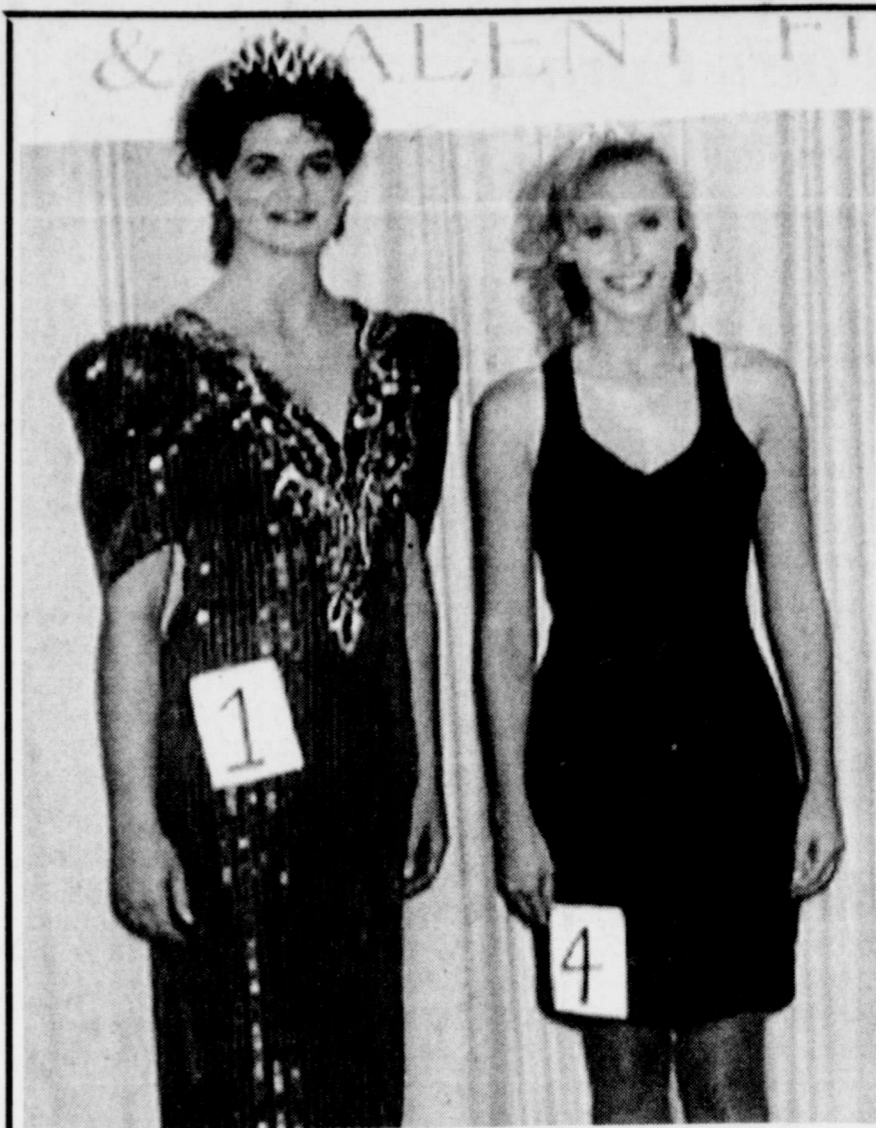
Ballinger's 5th annual fireworks display and free watermelon feed will be held at the new City Lake Park on Sunday, June 26th.

Meeting was adjourned.

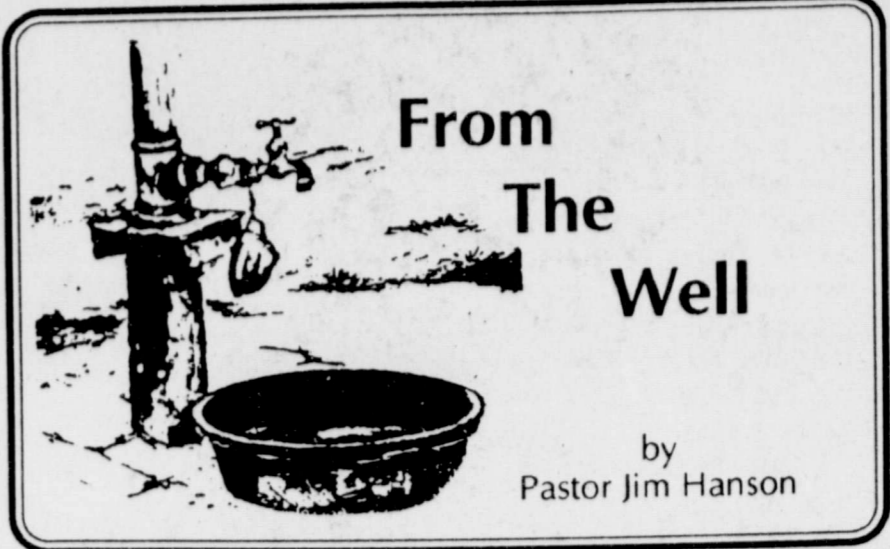
## Tennis camp set for June 27

## From The Well

June 6, 1944. D-Day. Normandy Beach. The largest invasion of all of history. Very costly - of the most precious possession we have - human life. The blood, the bodies - the toll was tremendous. The waves were full of the living and the dead - the beaches were littered. It was awesome. It was awful.

As I watched the T.V. coverage, my spirit was deeply moved. Tears started to flow. What a tremendous sacrifice! Why did these men do it? The T.V. people interviewed a number of survivors. Asked them - "Why did you do it? Why did you risk your life?" Many could not really give eloquent answers. Most replied, "Somebody had to do it." Or "It was my duty."

One younger person, watching the T.V. coverage, was overcome with the courage and commitment of the servicemen. Choked up, he called in to the T.V. station and said, "I'm not sure that - if we were put to the test today - that we would do it. People like me don't have that sense of duty, of patriotism." I'm not sure either.

These men - who took part in the invasion, were sons of the depression. They were born and raised in hard times. Life was not easy. Jobs were scarce. Money was not around. You put in long hours every day. But - you made your own fun. Entertainment was a game of baseball played in a pasture on a Sunday afternoon. You came to church on Sunday morning to worship God and then, after church, to visit your friends and neighbors. Families were important, and, you stuck together. And, somehow, your home town was the most important place in the world - and, worth fighting for. Hometown, small town, midwest towns - were what life was really all about.

Back in 1946, Eric Sevareid, a CBS correspondent who spent much of World War II in Europe, wrote his autobiography Not So Wild A Dream. In it he wrote about what it was like to grow up in a remote little North Dakota farming community - Velva, not much smaller than Winters. He wrote about the importance of hometowns, and how they affected the war, and the war's affect on them. "All that America truly meant, all that Americans perished for, would be devoid of consequence or portent unless the image of society that America showed the World was that of the little Velvas as I had known, remembered and cherished them. From such communities American youth went off to war carrying "America's bright tools and great muscles, her giant voice and will." Sevareid felt it was this country's destiny to "create a world in its own image". He defined that image in terms of his small midwestern hometown.

That's really what they fought for. And it was not SO wild a dream. We have moved, as a culture, from that dream to nightmare America, with overcrowded cities teeming with violence, drugs, and breakdown of morality and family life. It seems as if we won that war in Europe and lost the one at home.

For sure, Winters is a small town. For me and Ramona it has become our hometown. For Pastor Steve Byrne and his family, coming back here for a weekend was a "homecoming". My hope and prayer is that we who live here will keep the dream alive, and work and pray for our community - that it will become more and more a model of what America is really about, and certainly what God wants it to be.

### NRH offers basic EMT course

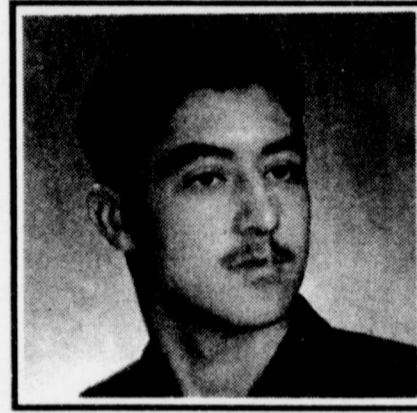

## Soccer camp to be held in Ballinger

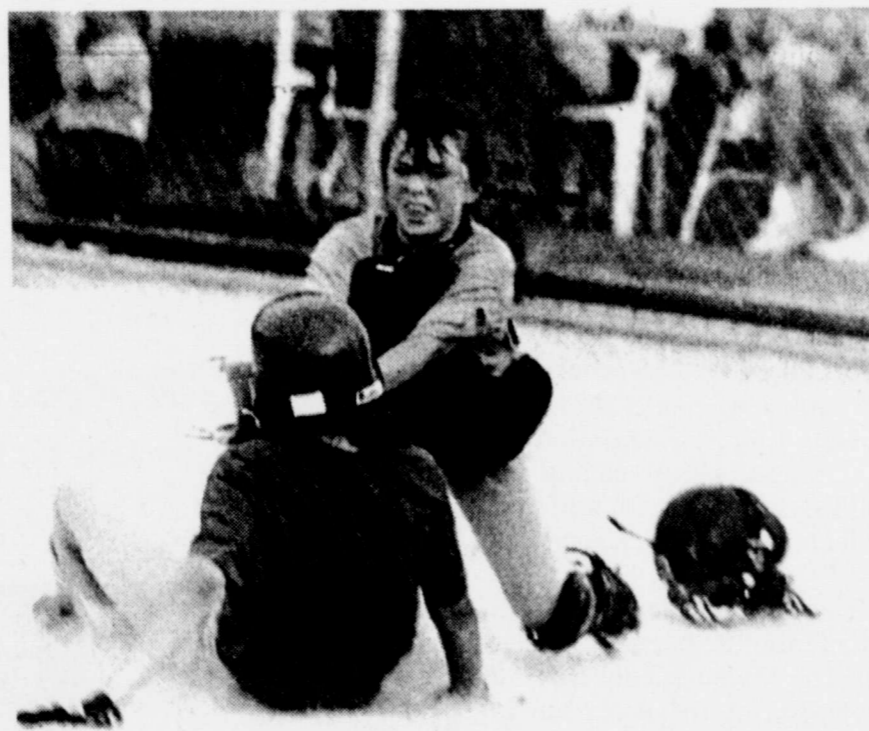

### Mesquite window is open

By RONNIE VANICEK

The brush spraying window is here. That being 45-90 days after bud break of the mesquite trees. This year, the bud break was approximately March 25th. For those of you near cotton fields or in the restricted spray zone in the county, your options for chemically treating brush are limited.

For the other producers, the conditions needed for good mesquite kill when aerially applying herbicide are: soil temperature 75-83 degrees at 12-18 inches deep, good growing conditions for 30 days prior to spraying, no foliage damage to the trees prior to spraying and all foliage needs to be mature and dark green in color.

Other options for mesquite control, are individual plant treatment with pump up sprayers spraying a band of herbicide around the trunk of each plant. Low volume basal application involves a 25% herbicide solution sprayed in a 4" wide band approximately 12-16" up the trunk from the ground or above the woody bark.

Basal application involves a 2% solution of herbicide sprayed on the trunk from the ground up to 16" height. This needs to circle the entire trunk and reach the runoff point.

The basal treatments are cost effective if you have 150-200 smaller mesquite trees per acre. Over this number, will justify some type of broadcast control method. For more specific recommendations, call or come by the Soil Conservation Service at 2000 Hutchings Avenue in Ballinger.

## Pest Management News

## General Situation

Moisture conditions have improved substantially over the past 10 days. Rain showers fell across the Concho Valley last week dropping as much as eight inches of rain in some areas. Heaviest rains were in Northern Runnels County. Grain sorghum, corn, and cotton are responding well to the hot conditions. It seems like the grain sorghum has grown a foot this week.

Beneficial insect populations are very high in grain sorghum fields and greenbug populations remain low as a result.

Boll weevil trap catches were extremely high this week with over 400 weevils per trap in some areas. This sounds terrible but it's not. We may very well see our 95% peak emergence occur as much as 10 days earlier this year. Once these weevils emerge from overwintering habitat they normally can only survive approximately 9 or 10 days on pre-squaring cotton.
