

Buy fireworks from a licensed vendor.

Know the law in your community. Read and follow the directions exactly.

Note: All fireworks sold in Texas must be clearly labeled that they conform to the standards of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission and the U.S. Department of Transportation. Federal law says that all fireworks must have easy-to-read cautionary labels and instructions for proper use.

Use fireworks outdoors only, in a clear area away; from houses and other flammable materials.

Keep a bucket of water nearby while setting off fireworks.

Never let children use fireworks.

Texas is one of 29 states that allows the sale of Class C fireworks or common fireworks." In Texas, these fireworks are prohibited:

Certain sky rockets, also known as bottle rockets.

Any other fireworks determined to be not acceptable by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission.

According to state law, fireworks cannot be sold to anyone who is under 12 years of age or is intoxicated or incompetent. State law also say that you may NOT:

Set off fireworks within 600 feet of churches, hospitals (except veterinary hospitals,) asylums, licensed child care centers or school buildings (including college and university building);

Sell or set off fireworks within 100 feet of places where flammable liquids or compressed gases are stored and dispensed (such as service stations):

Light fireworks within 100 feet of a place where fireworks are sold or stored; or


Set off fireworks inside or from a motor vehicle.





Everyone can breathe a little easier, now.

According to Hazel O'Leary, Secretary of Energy, we don't have anything to worry about. Sure, over half of all petroleum used in the U.S. is imported, and approximately 65% will be imported before the year 2000.

But, Ms. O'Leary is not concerned.

She says that she takes comfort in knowing our "diversity of supply" is broad. Meaning (I think) that, since we don't depend on any one source for all of it, we shouldn't worry about an undue reliance on other sovereigns for what is the single most important component of our domestic economy and national security.

She pins this faint hope of security on the fact that we aren't purchasing as high a percentage of our imports from the Middle East as we were in years past. While that is technically true, as long as one is careful to compare to certain time periods, we are Coke County actually purchasing the same absolute volume. It's just that we are purchasing more overall, and we are having to buy the extra somewhere else.

Thus, as a percentage, the purchases from the Middle East are lower.

Now, don't think that Ms. O'Leary is not a hawk on national security, though. As she was quoted recently: " ... why, if I were seeing all of our oil coming from the Middle East, I would be the first one to stay up nights worrying...but I feel secure in our current situation and for the foreseeable future." Yeah, right.

The fact is that we depend on unstable sources for all of our imports. For example, the Middle East (a boiling cauldron of trouble), South America (drugs and civil unrest), and Africa (need I say more about instability?).

In 1923 H.H. Stephens became pastor. It was voted to have a church bell to ring on Sunday morning. The budget plan of finance was adopted. The next year property west of the church was bought for a parking lot.


In the next three-year period, lights were installed on all four sides of the church in an effort to stop theft of car tires and accessories. The church and parsonage were piped for gas and new Sunday School rooms built in the basement and balcony. A kitchen was added and adults divided into two departments. Bro. W.T. Hamor became pastor in 1928.

In the period between 1940-45, our nation was plunged into war and five young men of the church gave their lives for our country.

L.L. Trott became pastor in 1945 and a new educational building was erected. On May 28, 1950, my birthday, Sunday School classes were moved into the new building. Up to this time I was director of Intermediates, 13-16 year olds; in the basement. I was moved to the new building to work with half that number of 13 to 14 year olds.

B.T. Shoemake became pastor in 1950. The discovery of oil brought new people and new wealth. This was offset by a sevenyeardrought. However, the church continued to make progress. In 1958 the present sanctuary was

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
four sons, was there. (He was ordained six years later.) Ramona, my fiance was there. Four days later we were married. A great day in my life, celebrated at First Lutheran Church in Duluth, Minnesota. Just across the street from the shore of Lake Superior.

It took some work to get to that day and that place in my life. One had to be certified for ordination. That meant the academics requirements: to have completed your college education (4 years) and Seminary (4 years). Seminary was difficult and thorough. Church Margie and Brenda Jacob, history, Church doctrine, Old and New Testament, courses in preaching and teaching, counseling and administration plus "a working knowledge" of Hebrew, Greek, Latin, and German. (These were "tool several days at Cancun Lodge. languages", to help us uncover the real meaning of the words of Scripture - by being able to read it in its original languages and it's first translation into a modern language - Luther's translation.)

I had received such a call after visiting, after their request, First American Lutheran Church in Hardin, Montana. Bylaws of Coleman County Electric Cooperative ARTICLE II

Meeting of Members

Section 1. Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of members shall be held at such time, during the month of July as the Board of Directors may direct, and such meetng shall be held at such place in the Cooperative service area, as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports covering the previous fiscal year, and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. If the election of directors shall not be held on the day designated herein for any annual meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as conveniently may be. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or

dissolution of the Cooperative. Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the members may be called by the President, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority thereof or upon a written request signed by at least ten per centum (10%) of all members and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Secretary to cause notice of such meeting to be given as hereinafter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within the County of Coleman in the State of Texas specified in the notice of the special meeting, or elsewhere within the area served by the Cooperative as may be designated by the Board of Directors. Section 3. Notice of Members'

Meetings. Written or printed notice stating the place, day, and hour of the meeting and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or by persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which

directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the Cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members at any such meeting.

Section 4. Quorum. As long as the total number of members does not exceed one thousand (1,000), at least fifteen per centum (15%) of the total number present in person shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. In case the total number of members shall exceed one thousand (1,000) then at least one hundred fifty (150) of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

Section 5. Voting. Each member shall be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. At all meetings of the members at which a quorum is present all questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by mail, except as otherwise provided by law, the articles of incorporation of the Cooperative or by these bylaws. If a husband and wife hold a joint membership they shall jointly be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members.

Section 6. Voting by Mail. In addition to the method of voting for directors of the Cooperative as provided by the existing bylaws and by a member being present and voting in person, each member shall be and

is hereby permitted to vote by mail for directors of this association. At the time notices of members' meetings are given as provided by Article II of these by laws and with a notice of member's annual meeting, or any postponement thereof, there shall be sent to each member either personally or by mail a ballot which shall contain the names of all members who have been nominated as candidates for directors with a statement of the number to be elected and with appropriate instructions to the member to vote for such members: EACH MEMBER SHALL BE IN STRUCTED AFTER VOTING FOR THE REQUIRED NUMBER TO SIGN SAID BALLOT AND RE-TURN THE BALLOT TO THE CO-**OPERATIVE AT ITS OFFICE** PRIOR TO THE DATE OF SAID MEETING. Said ballots when so received shall be retained and placed in a locked ballot box until the date of the members' meeting at which time shall be delivered to the inspectors of Election and counted together with the votes cast in person at such members' meeting. The Directors who receive a plurality of the vote shall be elected. Drawing by lot shall resolve, when necessary, any tie votes.

Section 7. Order of Business. The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows:

1. Report the existence of a quorum.

2. Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the due publication of mailing thereof, or the waiver or waivers of notice of the meeting, as the case may be.

3. Reading of unapproved minutes of previous meetings of the members and the taking of necessary action thereon.

4. Presentation and consideration of, and acting upon, reports of officers, directors and committees.

- 5. Election of directors.
- 6. Unfinished business.
- 7. New business.
- 8. Adjournment.
