Grand Jury hands down indictments

The Runnels County Grand Jury dismissed one case and ruled on 19 others last week.

Members of the jury dismissed charges against Melissa Espinosa, who had been charged with the shooting death of David Edward Pearse last April.

Espinosa turned herself in to local police a month later.

An indictment failed to be reached by the grand jury after evidence indicated that Espinosa had acted in self-defense.

The grand jury handed down an indictment against Sharon Dyess Ischar for theft of more than \$750 but less than \$20,000.

Ischar was fired in March after 13 years of service to the City of Ballinger in connection with the alleged theft of approximately \$11,000 from the city.

If convicted, the felony charge could carry a sentence of two to ten years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Scott Bradshaw was named in four indictments. Three of the indictments were on charges of burglary of a building and the other was on burglary of a vehicle.

Ronnie Howard Holt was named in two of the indictments handed down by the grand jury. Both indictments were on charges of injury to an elderly individual.

Other indictments handed down were as follows:

- Leonard John Connor, aka John Connor, indicted on a charge of criminal mischief.

- Joann Ortiz, indicted on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

- James Vasquez, indicted on a charge of burglary of a building.

- Robert Leonard Huckaby, indicted on a charge of burglary of a building.

- Johnny Lee Nickles, aka Diamond, indicted on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon.

- Darryl Glen Campbell, indicted on a charge of possession of a controlled substance.

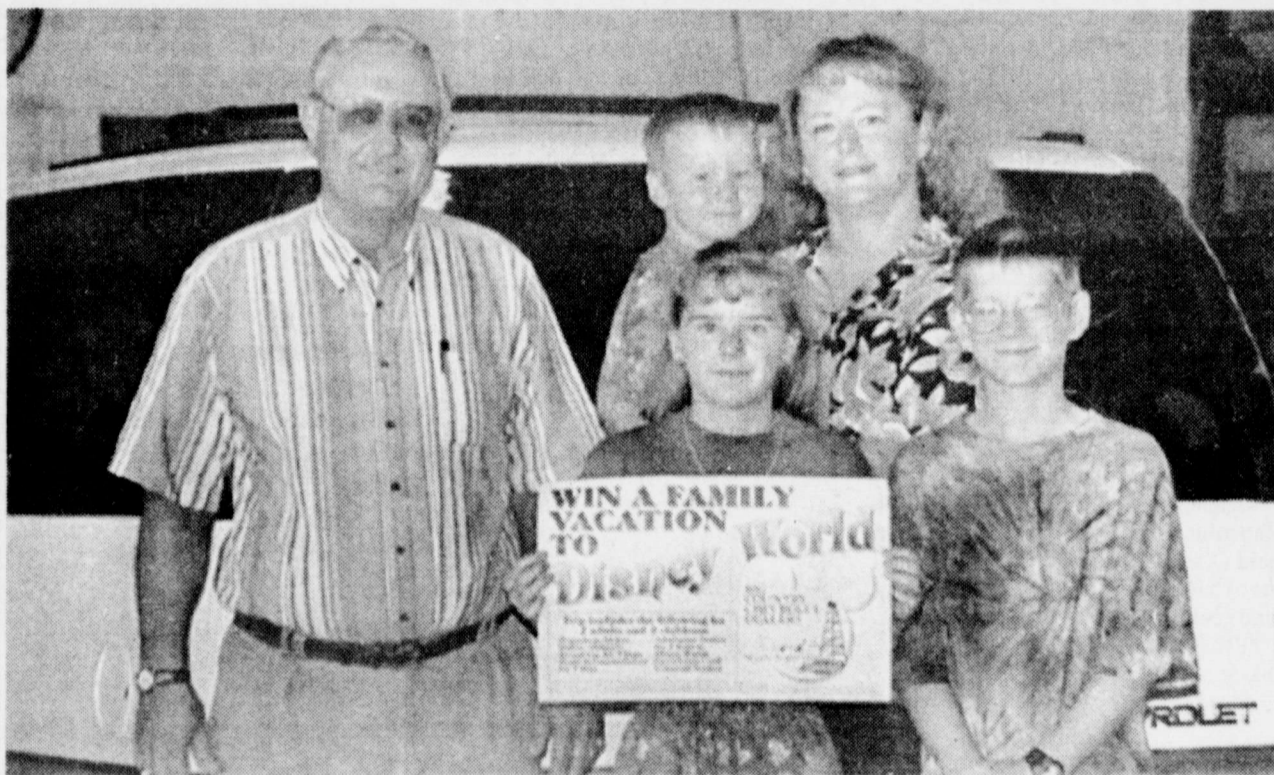

Ground breaking held for Juvenile Center near Bronte

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held Monday, August 18th at 5 p.m. at the site of the new Coke County Juvenile Detention Center.

Coke County officials, aided by State Rep. Rob Junell and State Sen. Bill Sims, and Wackenhut Correctional Corp. (a private prison management corporation based in Florida), submitted a bid to the Texas Youth Commission. Coke County was granted the bid for the all female facility over ten other Texas communities. October 1 is the scheduled completion date of the center located one mile south of Bronte on Hwy. 277. Site preparation began Wednesday, July 13.

Coke County Judge Royce Lee served as Master of Ceremonies. Rep. Rob Junell and Sen. Bill Sims made brief comments and recognized dignitaries from the

Texas Youth Commission as well as local representatives who supported and helped to acquire the new facility.

Approximately eighty people, not including construction personnel, will be employed. Most will be selected from local applicants, according to comments made by Wackenhut officials. Available positions at the center will be in secretarial, laundry/custodial, maintenance, teaching and counseling with the majority being in Youth Activity Service.

Work Fairs have been scheduled August 4th and 5th from 12 noon to 7 p.m. and on August 6th from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. A Vendor Fair is Scheduled August 4th and 5th from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. Both will be held at the Bronte School.

OIL BUSINESS

I saw some startling statistics the other day.

The headline in a publication that shall go nameless, said: "...Oil production up 15% from a year ago..."

This headline did not pertain to an OPEC country nor did it apply to some other currently 'hot' province of the world. It was meant to refer to the good 'ole state of Texas.

Now, I have been accused of being pretty dumb on occasion, but I was under the impression that oil production across Texas was declining. Declining so heavily, in fact, that there are some worries that the current slow drilling pace (caused by low oil prices) will result in an ever-increasing decline in production. This heavier decline would portend oil production reaching an end before the turn of the century.

I don't think this prediction will come true, by the way, but the seriousness of the decline is illustrated in this pessimistic outlook, never-the-less.

So, how does someone come up with the idea that oil production had increased at all, let alone 15%?

Statistics are the culprit, I'm afraid. As you have probably heard on occasion, statistics can be construed to support just about any position.

I did a little research on what was behind these numbers, and I find that the headline is the exact opposite of the truth, but is still backed by a logical, albeit contorted, set of statistics.

The number quoted was for 1994 versus 1993. The statistics imply that they are over the same period for both years. Although both figures were in the same units (barrels of oil daily), they were in fact not representative of the same period of time. The 1993 figure was taken over the last 15 days of a certain month, while the 1994 figure was taken over the first 15 days of the same month.

This little manipulation indicates an increase because of the quirks of reporting information to the various entities that provide statistics to the media. It seems that more oil production is reported in the first 15 days than in the second 15 days of any given month due to several logical reasons.

Some producers may be producing their allowable during the first half of the month and shutting in the second. Also, some producers just over-report the first half and make up for it the second half. There may be other reasons, but I think you get the idea.

(The best source of most information for such things comes from the Texas Railroad Commission, and they take only monthly information. So, they wouldn't have had this problem if they had gotten their facts from them.)

The moral of this story is to not believe everything you read, even if it's in this column. Think about the motivations of the reporter and think about whether they have the expertise to understand fully what they are reporting. Then,

ultimately, take everything you don't witness yourself with a pretty large grain of salt.

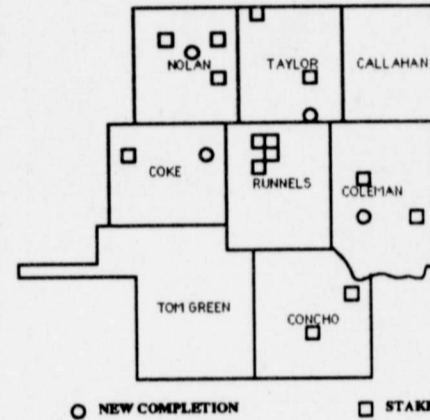

Roselyn, the youngest daughter, is Mrs. Alan Hudgens of Ballinger. In talking of her mother she says, "Every time one of us needed help she was there and for surgery she gave moral support."

Jewell seems to have had a good training for her future life. She was born to Joe and Ethel Chapman on a farm near Hatchel, July 18, 1909. She was the oldest of eight children, six of whom were girls. All of the sisters were present for the birthday party.

Bethel, the first consolidated school in the county, and considered one of the best schools, was built and ready by the time Jewell started to school. She went to

Bethel 12 years; the only school she ever attended.

Walter Kraatz was her first sweetheart. They went together four years before they were married September 22, 1937. Their honeymoon was spent going to the Plains to pick cotton with her mother and dad. After two weeks they returned and rented an apartment in Winters from Mr. Gee. Walter was doing construction work on the highway. Joe was born here.

The couple moved back to the farm where she was born and raised turkeys but a hail came and killed most of them, so they returned to Winters and Christine was born west of town where Brad's station used to be. The next two children were born at Ballinger; Walter Karl and Willie Lee. The rest; Charles, Ronald, Margie and Roselyn, were born at Winters.

In 1954 Walter began working in the oilfield and Jewell took over the farming. She plowed and planted with the tractor. The children picked cotton in the afternoons when school was out. One year she had all eight in school. When Joe was in the 8th grade Roselyn was in the first.

All of them had some college training. They worked in the summer to pay their way in school—some received scholarships. Willie is a computer analyst for Du Pont and lives in Wilmington, Delaware. Ronald was football captain and valedictorian of WHS. He finished Texas University and is now employed with the city of Manchester, Connecticut as Health, Welfare and Education Director. Walter Karl retired as a Master Sgt. from the Air Force and is X-Ray technician at Harris Hospital in Ft. Worth.

Charles was in the Marine Corps and afterward took diesel

engineering at Snyder Technical College. He and his wife live in Bryan. Margie and Lee Roy Chaney live in Brady.

After they moved to town in 1971, Jewell sewed for the public about five years and kept up her hobbies of embroidery, crochet and quilting. She worked on the conference level, as well as locally, for St. John's Lutheran Church and is president of the Ladies Aid Circle. She served two terms as president of the Z.I. Hale Museum and is now vice-president.

Walter kept making homemade bread for the family and bringing in good fish from the Colorado River until he became ill with leukemia in 1985. He died in 1990.

Jewell continues to carry on much the same, useful wherever she is needed.

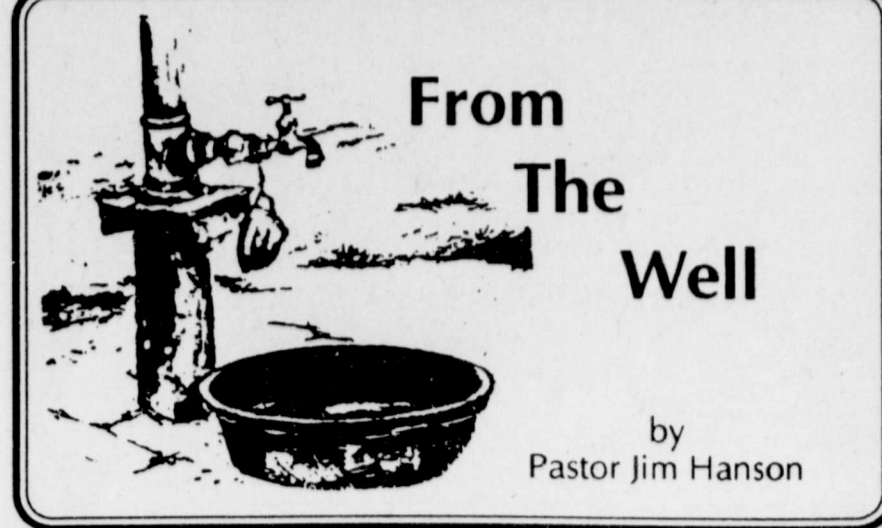
Social Security Rep. in Winters on July 25th

It's Vacation Bible School time at St. John's. It's the time of the "little people", those who aren't too big to go. Pre-schoolers, mostly - some barely out of their diapers. Then - the beginning readers. And then the bigger ones, all the way to the fifth grade.

We begin with raising the flag, saying the pledge, and singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee". 3 or 4 Cub Scouts are the color guard. They are extremely careful lest the flag touch the ground. As the flag goes up, they follow its flight and, stretching their necks, sing at the top of their voices. Our country may keep prayer out of the school, but they surely can't keep the flag ceremony out of the church. Of course, the country's job is not to make good church people. But it surely is part of the church's job to make good citizens. We do songs and hymns and spiritual songs. We do physical things, and have an obstacle course. We have lunch break and eat good food - nutritious because we are stressing the importance of taking good care of our bodies. In keeping with the theme, the children are divided into 3 groups "Hands", "Feet", and "Heart". We are learning how important these "gifts of God" are to us - and how important for us to care for our bodies. After all, the Apostle Paul teaches us that our "body is a temple of the Holy Spirit".

Of course the main content is the Bible. This year we are studying some of the strong men and women of the Bible. Abraham, Joseph, Moses, Daniel, and Ruth. I sometimes think we should have Bible hero cards like the baseball cards and other sports cards. With a picture on one side and their "records" on the other side.

And we use the Bible. It is fun to see some of the youngsters who can't even read yet learn to hold the Bible, and open it up. This sacred book is meant to be held and to be read. I never will forget hearing a famous linebacker from the Minnesota Vikings tell a group of young athletes, "My Bible is my sword. I carry it with me all the time except when I'm playing football. And, right now, I'm memorizing the Book of Hebrews."

He was, of course, referring to that passage in Hebrews which says, "the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and spirit, of joints and marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart." (4:12).

And we memorize passages, and the 10 commandments, and songs. Of course it is work! It is a lot of work. And all of us are amateurs - not a professional among us. Teenagers, mothers, young women, grandmas all pitch in to help. Heading up our school is a wonderful woman who spends a week of her vacation for Bible School. She does puppets, tells stories, writes scripts, plans the crafts and the activities. She volunteers!

Every day there is a hitch of some kind. But, the school goes on, powered by the fuel of the Holy Spirit. I can't imagine a summer without Vacation Bible School. When I get too old to do them in church, it would be fun to start one in a nursing home.

Every day they come, with smiles on their faces. These children of God. They sing from the heart, and with enthusiasm. They bring their quarters and their offerings of food and clothing for the "poor people." On Friday they'll do a program at the Nursing Home. Then wind up the week with a hot dog lunch.

I have just read an article. The question the author raises is not "will our children have faith?" but, "will our faith have children?" I agree, and I'm quite certain that these children of faith will have faith. As long as there's Vacation Bible School. And volunteers to teach them.

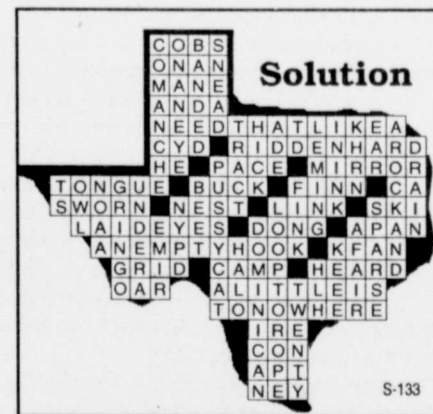

A clean, safe Winters begins in the corner where you live

The Mayor, City Council and City Administrator of Winters urge all citizens to make an effort to keep Winters a clean, environmentally safe place in which to live.

One way everyone can contribute to this effort is to correctly dispose of used oil. In Texas, 18 million gallons of used motor oil is dumped on the ground or down a storm drain. This is oil that may end up in our water supply.

The City of Winters now has a used oil recycling center. To use this center, simply take your used

oil to the front desk in City Hall. This is where you pay your water bill. Register your name, address and the quantity of used oil you need to dispose of, no more than five gallons at one time. You will then be directed to the City's Street Department yard where you can empty your containers. Oil used by businesses is not accepted - only that of private individuals.

With only this small amount of effort, citizens will not only help to keep Winters free of pollution, they will also be keeping their own property clean and safe.

Wackenhut operates private prisons nationwide and will operate the Coke county center for a planned sixteen years at which time the facility becomes the property of Coke County. At that time the facility would be managed and operated by either Wackenhut or a similar firm through contract with Coke County and the Texas Youth Commission.

According to Judge Lee, no new taxes will be needed to finance the project. Wackenhut will construct and operate the ninety-six bed facility aimed at meeting the special needs of female residents whose ages upon arrival at

the center will be fourteen through sixteen. Immediately upon the center's completion, residents from correctional facilities in Brownwood and Giddings will begin arriving.

Coke County's correctional facility will be a prototype unlike any other juvenile correctional facility. Rehabilitation through education and counseling will be the goals. An agreement with Bronte ISD will allow the girls to take high school classes.

At this time, no all-female detention center exists which has rehabilitation goals to compare with those of the Coke County center, making it an example for the state and nation.

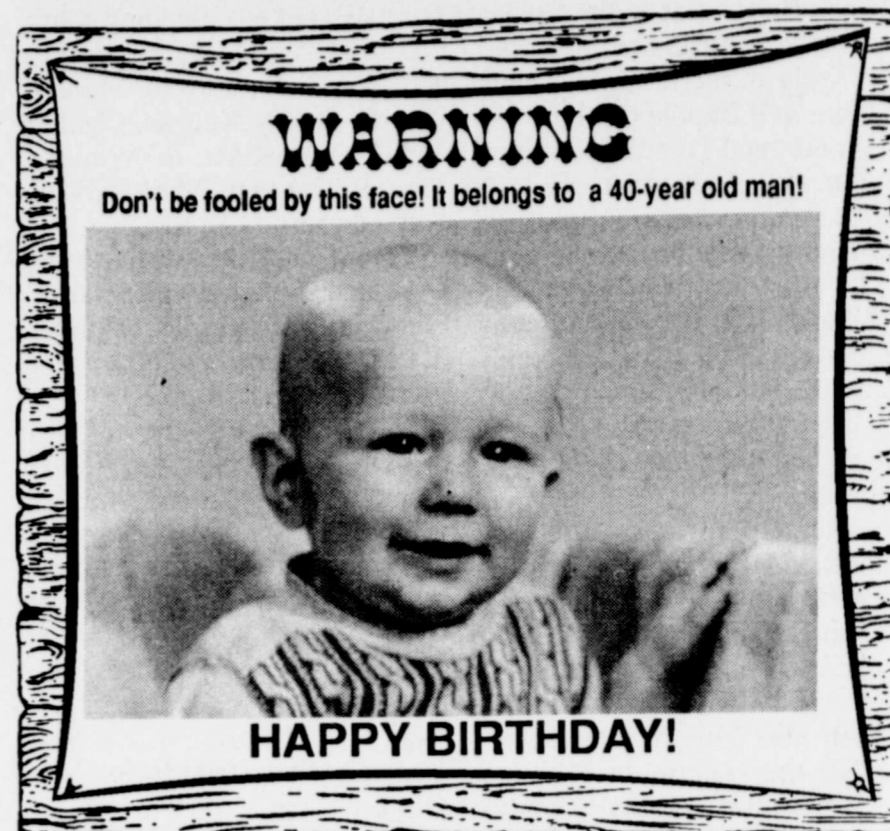

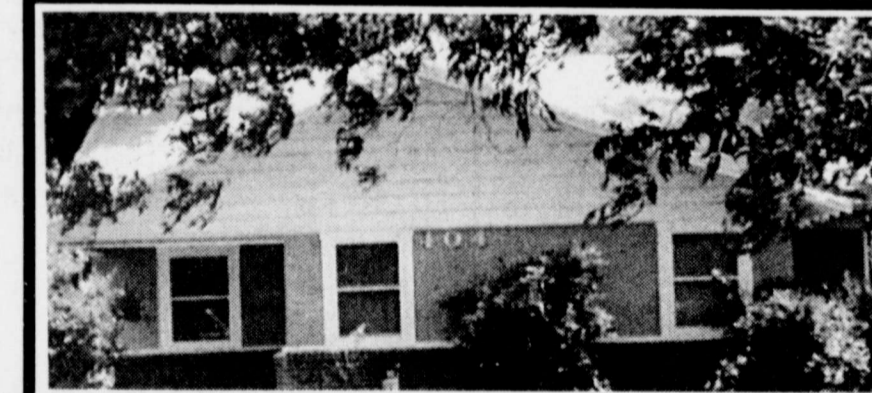


