## Million dollar project approved by WISD board of trustees

In two called meetings and a regular meeting on November 7, the Winters Independent School Board accepted bids and amended the budget to pay the costs of upcoming construction.

The Board accepted bids to add an elevator to the high school building, build a new metal band hall, and add a new cafeteria to the front of the 1954 gymnasium.

The cost of the construction of these three items is \$962,322.00. The architect's fees are additional and will cost \$57,739.00. The total of \$1,020,061.00 will be taken from local reserve funds. Bids on demolition of the cafeteria are to be opened on November 11, and this will be an additional cost.

The cafeteria demolition is to start over the Thanksgiving holidays and should be finished in a couple of weeks.

The school administration has looked at several options for cooking and serving meals to students during this proposed construction

Nothing definite has been decided yet but the best option seems to be to rent the Ben's Diner restaurant building from Peoples National Bank. Food would be prepared at the restaurant and then taken to the activity building to be served to the students.

The front of the 1954 gym will be partially torn down to connect the new cafeteria. School officials stated that no schedule changes will be necessary for hosting basketball games except for making a change in entering the

Sometimes, we worry so much about the "big picture" of the oil patch that we forget about the small things that have to be done.

Small things like keeping a well pumping or patching a flow line get lost in the shuffle of setting strategy or positioning oneself for the future. Although it is important to understand the larger world of the oil and gas business, it shouldn't overshadow the importance of doing the small things

In this shuffle, the folks who do the things it takes to get the oil and gas to market are sometimes forgotten. This seems to be even more evident in the downsizing of the industry.

Many of the largest oil companies are run by "bean counter", MBA-types. They and the company directors they work for look at the oil business in a "macro" fashion. That is to say that they look only at the sales capacity of the entity, assuming that the inner workings of the company are a given. This view puts the oil and gas company in the position of being just a revenue generator, with little regard to the personnel who keep it producing.

When looking at it in this way, you can see how decision-makers see the costs of doing business as a place to cut expenses and increase profits. This assumes that any cuts will not affect the business of getting the oil to the sales line.

The effect of this is that folks jobs are cut to save money, and the people left are assumed to be able to pick right up (in their spare time) where the previous employee was before he/she left. The end result in many companies is too much work to be done by too few people.

Ten years ago, pumpers might have been responsible for 4 to 6 leases and maybe 15 (in sparselyspaced fields) to 150 wells (in closely-spaced areas). Today, pumpers handle as many as 600 wells in large units and as many as 10-20 leases in some areas.

The same increase in responsibility is seen in roustabout gangs, mechanics, drilling foremen, clerical staff, and technical office positions.

The net result is sloppier work, less thorough work, and less time to analyze and solve problems. Unfortunately, management in these companies expect results even with reduced staff.

The underground revolution that is going on is one being driven by these employees in a desperate struggle to stay ahead of the calls on their time.

We'll talk more about the quite revolution next time.



We will have a "Homemade of the Earl of Sandwich and to Bread Tasting Party" at our 10:30 activity on November 17. Sounds



## County monument honors those who served country

A new monument on the Runnels County Courthouse square honors those from the county who have served in the U.S. military.

A dedication ceremony for the monument is Veterans Day, Friday, November 11, beginning at 2

"This is to honor the people who served their country - those that served and lived and those that served and died," said Lee Roy Muller about the monument. Muller is a World War II veteran and a member of the American Legion Pat Williams Post #8 in Ballinger. Muller and fellow veteran Billy Rollwitz, Post #8 commander, spearheaded getting the monument built.

Rollwitz brought up the idea of a monument last Veterans Day and his American Legion counterparts agreed it would be a good idea. he and Muller set out to join forces with other veterans groups in the county to bring the monument to reality.

"It's to try to keep the history before the people," Muller said. "Not to remind them of war, but of what can happen."

Muller also said some veterans of war feel there is an American generation, from about ages 18 to 40, that don't know much about the history of American wars or those that served.

Muller, Rollwitz, and other veterans want people to see what veterans have done for them and possibly instill some patriotism in people.

The monument has seven stones altogether. The larger centerpiece describes the memorial and the two immediate side pieces have the names of those killed in action. The other four stones contain the names of those from Runnels County who have served in the armed forces.

There are more than 1,550 names on the monument and room for about 700 more names.

The monument was designed and built by a company in Georgia and shipped to Ballinger by truck. Veterans from the county donated money for the construction of the monument site.

The ceremony begins with the advance of the colors and features speakers from the Texas Army Reserve National Guard, area Veterans organizations, and Texas politicians.

There is a flyover at 3:05 p.m. by a Texas Confederate Air Force plane and the Ballinger High School band will be on hand along with an Air Force bugler. Everyone is encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets for seating.


#### Scouts Annual Food Drive this Thursday

## A fort that refused to die

Fort McKavett is running a race with the proverbial cat of nine lives when it reaches its fifth life the third Saturday in March with its living history reenactment pro-

living history to the visitors.

The western movement created a necessity for forts to protect the trails, and Fort McKavett came into being in 1852, product of the Mexican War and the California Gold Rush.

The U.S. Army constructed a line of military posts stretching from the Rio Grande to the Red River. McKavett was one of these.

Five companies of the Eighth Infantry arrived on the San Saba River March 14, 1852. By October the camp had been named in honor of Captain Henry McKavett who was killed in the Battle of Monterray during the war with Mexico.

ered 2,373 acres. The Post continued to build and carry on its frontier duties until abandoned in 1859.

Federal forces returned in 1868 and rebuilt it under the command of Colonel Ronald S. Mackenzie who made it his headquarters. New facilities were added until there were stone barraacks for eight companies of men, plus stables, officers quarters, hospital, guard house, magazines, post office, storehouse, and a headquarters building.

One significant battle that marked a turning point was led by Mackenzie in Palo Duro Canyon Some 50 men and a few women in 1874. His strategy of overrundress up and play soliders to bring ning a huge village, burning it, and slaughtering nearly 1,400 horses destroyed the Indians. Without shelter, provisions, and the use of their horses, they had no choice but to plod back to their reservations in Oklahoma.

This past week I was at a camp. A Bible Camp. About 20 miles away from Omaha, Nebraska. Nestled in the rolling plains of that part of the country, it afforded a wonderful view of the land. The weather was beautiful - fall colors in full flush, skies were blue. Harvest time. The corn combines and corn pickers were out - doing their job.

It was a good setting, and a good time for us to be there. About 40 of us, representing some 1,000 congregations of our denomination. Representing rural churches and small town churches. Not the kind that are on T.V. Rather the kind that most of us living in rural America grew up in. Small churches. Family oriented churches, where everybody knows everybody.

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We came together, as we have for the past 3 years, to encourage each other, share stories of our successes and failures, worship together, and plan our next meeting. We have no great plans, and no great aspirations. We are bound together with a hope - a hope that God still has a place for little churches and little groups and little people living on the Great Plains in His plan. We believe He has. And everytime we get together and share our stories, we are certain He has.

Of course these small churches have the same problems that the communities in which they are located have. We don't have the clout we used to have - politically. As a result we have to buck the system - which is built on the premise that "bigger is better", and that all good ideas and plans for the future come from the learning centers, task forces, and big cities. The little guy in the little town - the country boy - doesn't have the same chance. We have to work harder and work better and work longer to get our fair share. And sometimes it gets discouraging and sometimes downright depressing.

So we get together. And we listen to people who know what they are talking about and who know the rural scene. This year we had 2 speakers, I was a young preacher who has become a real inspiration to many of us. He presented several speeches on "The Lord's Harvest and the Rural Church". He showed us how the rural, small town church need not give up and close its doors. It can survive and it can even grow.


The other speaker was Bob Bergland, former Secretary of Agriculture under President Carter, and then President of the R.E.A. He talked to us about the small church and economics. He also had an encouraging word. Both of them stressed that the key to growth is in your church and in your community. Discover what you've got - your real resources. And develop them. It's harder - but better. It is the way of the steward.

On Wednesday morning the T.V. showed us the signing of the peace-pact between Israel and Jordan. One of our group reminded us of the time, in 1973, when Begin and Sadat, the leaders of Israel and Egypt, signed a similar pact. She asked me to ask Bob Bergland to tell us about that event which took place at another camp - Camp David.


The story he told filled our minds and hearts with hope. This is how he told it. "The room was filled with a kind of fear. Would they sign? Centuries of hostility were in the air - going all the way back to the days of Moses, when Israel was captive to Egypt. The situation had not really improved over the centuries. In that tense situation, prior to the official opening of the meeting, President Carter took his Bible, and started to share the Old Testament stories - of Abraham and Isaac, of Moses. These Bible stories were part of the religion of all in the room - Mohammedans, Jews, and Christians. As he told the stories, God came into the picture. He is creator. We are all accountable to Him for what we do. He is in our history. The tensions were relieved. The pact

There is a lesson here. For us as communities and churches in small towns - as well as the counties of the world. As we get God back into the picture, the picture changes. Hope is born again. How good He is.

The next pastor was the Rev. SteveByrne, who served from 1984 to 1991.


On Sept. 15, 1991, Pastor James Hanson and wife, Ramona, arrived at St. John's, and continue to serve here.



The 72nd annual Fall Festival of St. Joseph's Parish has set for Sunday, November 13, 1994, at the Parish Hall in Rowena, Texas.


