Blizzards lose to Wall 14-9; go to playoffs as district 6-2A runner-up

Last Friday night the Blizzards fought the rain, the wind and the Wall Hawks. The Hawks came out on top 14-9.

In the Big Blue's first defeat of the season, things just didn't click like they had in the past nine wins.

After a beautiful day, wind and rain blew into the Wall stadium about 45 minutes before game time. The rain fell hard during the first and third quarters, and the wind also was definitely a factor in the game.

Winters won the toss and elected to receive. Wall took the wind. The Blizzards started on their own 20 yard line. The first running play went for 2 yards.

On second down, the Blizzard offense was flagged for offsides. On third down, there was illegal motion. On fourth down, the punt went only 13 yards to the 35 yard line.

Wall scored eight plays later and went up 7-0 and never relinquished the lead.

The offense never got the ball moving consistently. Late in the second quarter, Winters had moved the ball to the 31 yard line of Wall but was intercepted.

With 42 seconds left in the first half, Winters got the ball back on the Hawk's 38 yard line. The of-

fense moved the ball to the 10 yard line when Robert Reed kicked the 20-yard field goal to put the Blizzards on the scoreboard and end the half at Wall 7, Winters 3.

Things didn't change much for the second half. Wall scored on a 35-yard pass with 2:26 to go in the third quarter. The extra point was good, making the score 14-3.

With 8:57 left to go in the ballgame, Robert Silva caught an 18 yard pass from John Belew for a touchdown to bring the score to 14-9.

The Blizzards went for two points and the pass was caught by both a Blizzard and a Wall Hawk and Wall ended up with the ball and the extra point failed.

The Blizzard defense held after the kickoff and Robert Reed returned the punt to the Hawk's 9 yard line. It looked like the Blizzards were back.

But after three incomplete passes, Wall intercepted on 4th down and ran it back to the 49 yard line.

The Blizzards didn't threaten again.

John Belew was selected on the *San Angelo Standard-Times* honor roll for 37 passes and 195 yards.

The loss to Wall allowed the Hawks (4-1 in district) to share the district championship with the Blizzards. Winters advances to the playoffs as district runner-up with a 9-1 season record and 4-1 district count.

The Blizzards meet the Ozona Lions this Friday night in Lakeview stadium in San Angelo. The bi-district contest will be at 7:30 p.m.

Winters head coach Robin Byrd states that the Ozona Lions were 7-1-1 with a loss to Class 3A Sonora and a tie with Class 3A

Million dollar project approved by WISD board of trustees

In two called meetings and a regular meeting on November 7, the Winters Independent School Board accepted bids and amended the budget to pay the costs of upcoming construction.

The Board accepted bids to add an elevator to the high school building, build a new metal band hall, and add a new cafeteria to the front of the 1954 gymnasium.

The cost of the construction of these three items is \$962,322.00. The architect's fees are additional and will cost \$57,739.00. The total of \$1,020,061.00 will be

taken from local reserve funds.

Bids on demolition of the cafeteria are to be opened on November 11, and this will be an additional cost.

The cafeteria demolition is to start over the Thanksgiving holidays and should be finished in a couple of weeks.

The school administration has looked at several options for cooking and serving meals to students during this proposed construction time.

Nothing definite has been decided yet but the best option seems

to be to rent the Ben's Diner restaurant building from Peoples National Bank. Food would be prepared at the restaurant and then taken to the activity building to be served to the students.

The front of the 1954 gym will be partially torn down to connect the new cafeteria. School officials stated that no schedule changes will be necessary for hosting basketball games except for making a change in entering the gym.

More information will be provided as it becomes available from the school board.

Proposed county jail bond fails; K. Collom wins Commissioner

With 56 percent voter turnout, 3,437 registered Runnels county voters cast their ballots in Tuesday elections.

In one of the most publicized issues of local interest, the proposed jail bond issue failed. Voters cast 1,229 votes for and 1,773 votes against.

Keith Collom was elected Runnels County Commissioner, Precinct 2, by a vote of 457 to 208 over opponent Richard Hamilton.

Richard Strube received 705 votes to win over Edgar Poehls who received 251 votes in the race for Runnels County Commissioner, Precinct 4.

In other local races, candidates running unopposed received the following votes:

Michael B. Murchison received 2,491 votes for County Judge;

Loretta Michalewicz received 2,601 votes for District Clerk;

Linda Bruchmiller received 2,594 votes for County Clerk;

Margarette Smith received 2,499 votes for County Treasurer;

Greg Lange received 1,683 votes for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1;

Joyce Weems received 846 votes for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2.

In the governor's race, George W. Bush defeated incumbent Ann

Richards. Bush will be only the second Republican governor in 121 years.

Charles W. Stenholm was re-elected as U. S. Representative in District 17, over Phil Boone.

Bill Sims of Paint Rock, defeated Hugh D. Shine to remain State Senator, District 24.

Business and Industrial Corporation seeking ways to improve town appearance

The Winters Area Business and Industrial Cooperation met in regular session, November 2.

Members present were Mac Sayles, Nelan Bahlman, Charles Bahlman, Aref Hassan, Archie Jobe, Larry Suit, Harold Andrews, Tommy Russell, and Gary Moore. The meeting opened with minutes and financial statements being read and approved.

It was reported that the entrance signs for the city are being built and the Downtown Beautification Committee is exploring ways to improve downtown appearance. The Main Street Program grant has been denied and will be applied for again next year.

Mr. Stewart of the appraisal district will be contacted in request for a letter stating that taxes will not increase because of improvement in building appearance.

North Runnels Home Health Care is in operation, while ABF Trucking is waiting for completion of legal work. Winn's is closing and several companies have contacted WABIC with inquiries about the building. Traylor Auto will host their grand opening November 12.

Charlie Stenholm visited Winters and stated that the new crime bill will allow more federal prisons to be built. He will forward more information.

Texas Midwest Network had their first formal meeting on October 20 in which they elected a board of directors. Aref Hassan of Winters will serve on the board.

A committee was named to ask the business community about seminars that might be helpful. Serving on this committee are Mac Sayles, Larry Suit, and Gary Moore.

The corporation voted to send two members to the North American Trade Corridor Committee at a cost of \$75 per person. The meeting will be held in Abilene on November 21 and 22.

November 30, celebrating 20 years of practicing medicine in Winters.

The group discussed the need for fundraisers and then adjourned.

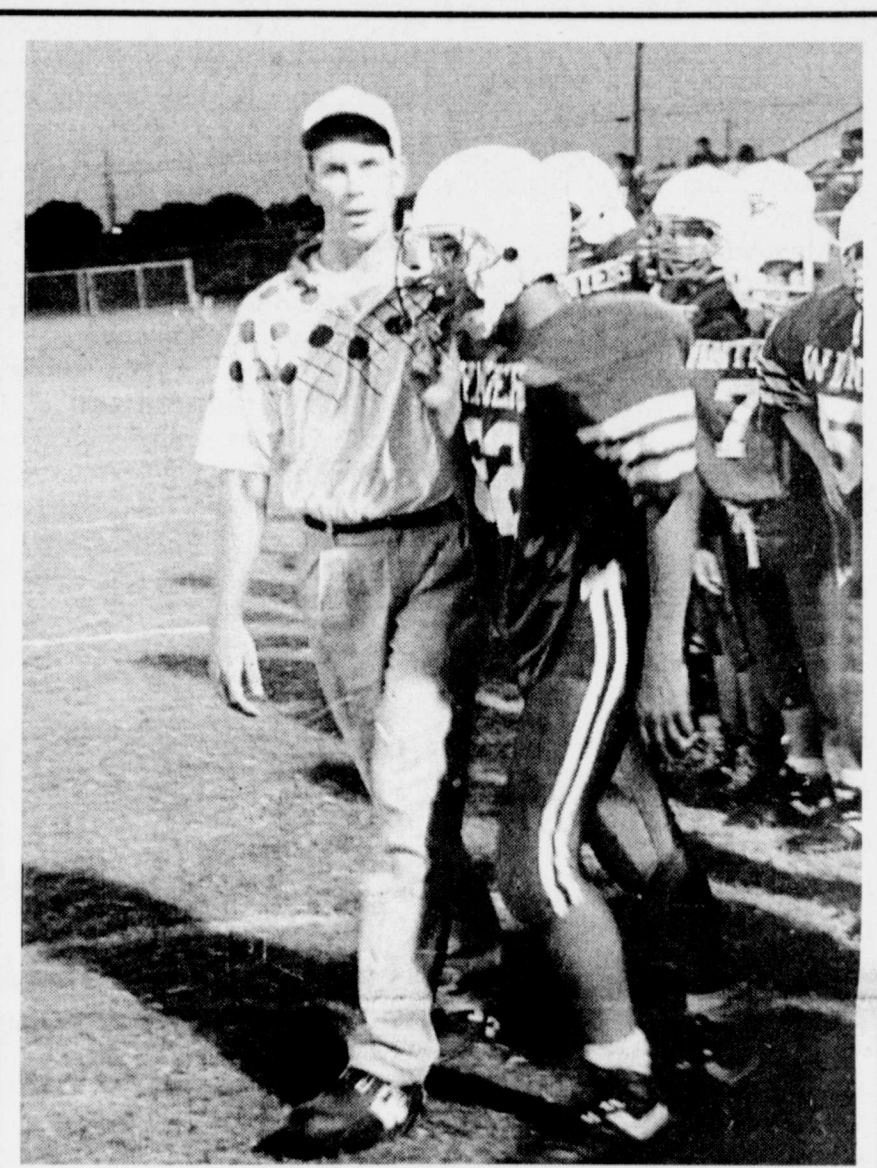

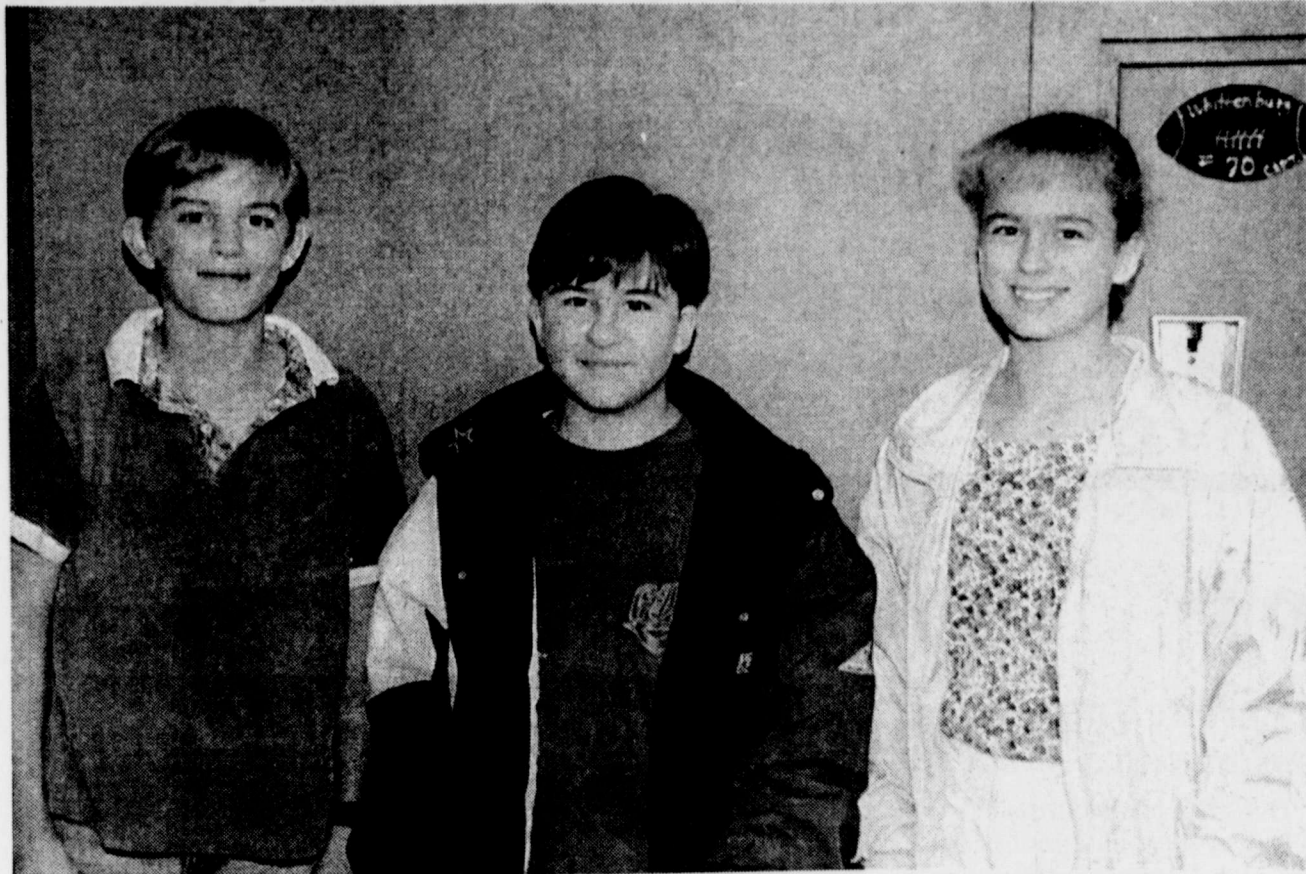

County monument honors Scouts Annual Food Drive this Thursday

A new monument on the Runnels County Courthouse square honors those from the county who have served in the U.S. military.

A dedication ceremony for the monument is Veterans Day, Friday, November 11, beginning at 2 p.m.

"This is to honor the people who served their country - those that served and lived and those that served and died," said Lee Roy Muller about the monument. Muller is a World War II veteran and a member of the American Legion Pat Williams Post #8 in Ballinger. Muller and fellow veteran Billy Rollwitz, Post #8 commander, spearheaded getting the monument built.

Rollwitz brought up the idea of a monument last Veterans Day and his American Legion counterparts agreed it would be a good idea. He and Muller set out to join forces with other veterans groups in the county to bring the monument to reality.

"It's to try to keep the history before the people," Muller said. "Not to remind them of war, but of what can happen."

Muller also said some veterans of war feel there is an American generation, from about ages 18 to 40, that don't know much about the history of American wars or those that served.

Muller, Rollwitz, and other veterans want people to see what veterans have done for them and possibly instill some patriotism in people.

The monument has seven stones altogether. The larger centerpiece describes the memorial and the two immediate side pieces have the names of those killed in action. The other four stones contain the names of those from Runnels County who have served in the armed forces.

There are more than 1,550 names on the monument and room for about 700 more names.

The monument was designed and built by a company in Georgia and shipped to Ballinger by truck. Veterans from the county donated money for the construction of the monument site.

The ceremony begins with the advance of the colors and features speakers from the Texas Army Reserve National Guard, area Veterans organizations, and Texas politicians.

There is a flyover at 3:05 p.m. by a Texas Confederate Air Force plane and the Ballinger High School band will be on hand along with an Air Force bugler. Everyone is encouraged to bring lawn chairs or blankets for seating.

The Scouts Annual Food Drive to benefit the Winters Food Pantry will be conducted Thursday evening, November 10, between 5 and 7 p.m. Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts of all age levels will combine efforts to canvass the town asking for donations of canned food items.

Anyone planning to be away from home during that time may leave a donation in a sack by the door and the scouts will pick it up. Also, boxes for donations will be located at WTU and Lawrence Brothers IGA for those who need to contribute at another time.

A fort that refused to die

Fort McKavett is running a race with the proverbial cat of nine lives when it reaches its fifth life the third Saturday in March with its living history reenactment program.

Some 50 men and a few women dress up and play soldiers to bring living history to the visitors.

The western movement created a necessity for forts to protect the trails, and Fort McKavett came into being in 1852, product of the Mexican War and the California Gold Rush.

The U.S. Army constructed a line of military posts stretching from the Rio Grande to the Red River. McKavett was one of these.

Five companies of the Eighth Infantry arrived on the San Saba River March 14, 1852. By October the camp had been named in honor of Captain Henry McKavett who was killed in the Battle of Monterey during the war with Mexico.

The military reservation covered 2,373 acres. The Post continued to build and carry on its frontier duties until abandoned in 1859.

Federal forces returned in 1868 and rebuilt it under the command of Colonel Ronald S. Mackenzie who made it his headquarters. New facilities were added until there were stone barracks for eight companies of men, plus stables, officers quarters, hospital, guard house, magazines, post office, storehouse, and a headquarters building.

Water was plentiful and excellent communications were maintained by a military telegraph connecting points as far north as Denison, more than 300 miles away.

Fl. McKavett's usefulness ended when the U.S. Army won several major victories over the Indians. One significant battle that marked a turning point was led by Mackenzie in Palo Duro Canyon in 1874. His strategy of overrunning a huge village, burning it, and slaughtering nearly 1,400 horses destroyed the Indians. Without shelter, provisions, and the use of their horses, they had no choice but to plod back to their reservations in Oklahoma.

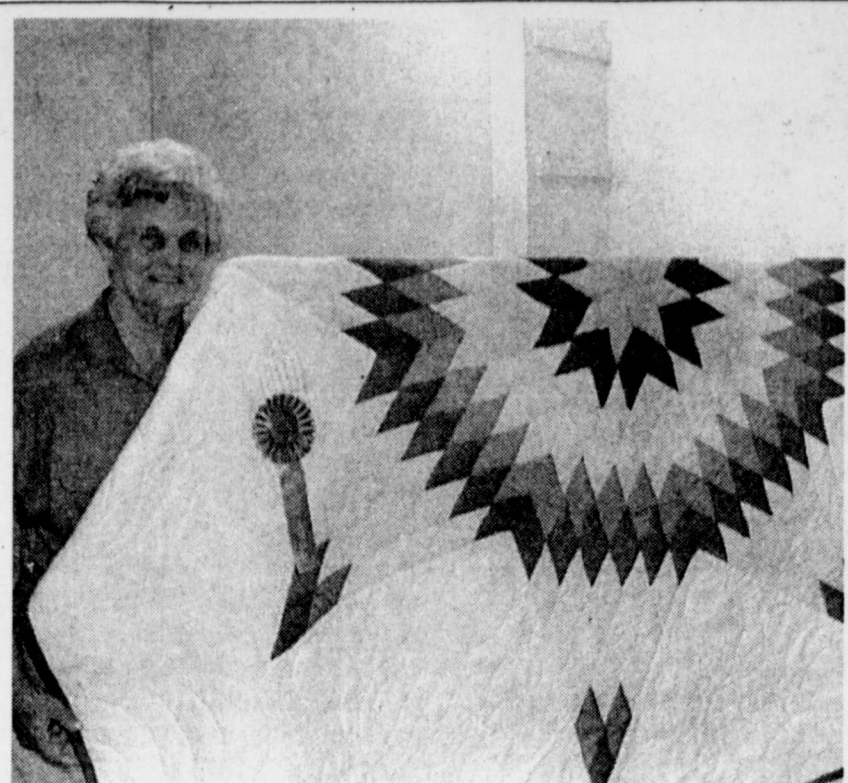
The living history program was begun by Superintendent David Bischofhausen of Fort McKavett State Historical Park, a part of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department system.

When he came to the Fort, 11 years ago, it was approaching the 100th anniversary of its closing on June 30, 1883. This was when he conceived the idea of a living history. Historical groups in Fort Concho were contacted to start the event. Since then other groups have joined in the celebration.

As part of the program, the soldiers go through infantry, cavalry, and artillery drills. Assembly of units, inspection, retreat, parade, and flag lowering complete the events.

Once called "the fort that refused to die", Fort McKavett still lives as a town of 25 residents and a trading post that doubles as a restaurant, general store, curio shop, and museum.

Seventeen miles west of Menard is an opportunity for a side trip on FM 864 to the site of Fort McKavett. The short drive winds through rolling hills, woodlands, and farms often irrigated from the San Saba River.

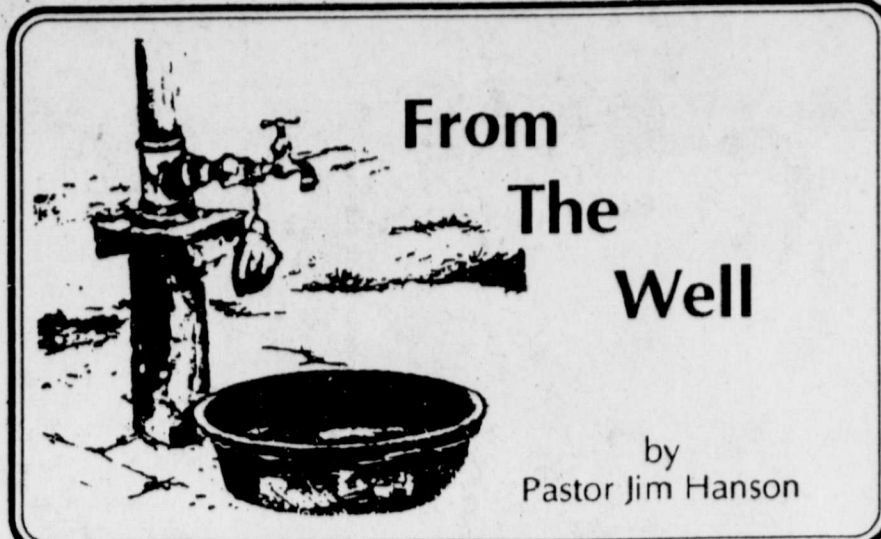

From The Well

This past week I was at a camp. A Bible Camp. About 20 miles away from Omaha, Nebraska. Nestled in the rolling plains of that part of the country, it afforded a wonderful view of the land. The weather was beautiful - fall colors in full flush, skies were blue. Harvest time. The corn combines and corn pickers were out - doing their job.

It was a good setting, and a good time for us to be there. About 40 of us, representing some 1,000 congregations of our denomination. Representing rural churches and small town churches. Not the kind that are on T.V. Rather the kind that most of us living in rural America grew up in. Small churches. Family oriented churches, where everybody knows everybody.

We came together, as we have for the past 3 years, to encourage each other, share stories of our successes and failures, worship together, and plan our next meeting. We have no great plans, and no great aspirations. We are bound together with a hope - a hope that God still has a place for little churches and little groups and little people living on the Great Plains in His plan. We believe He has. And everytime we get together and share our stories, we are certain He has.

Of course these small churches have the same problems that the communities in which they are located have. We don't have the clout we used to have - politically. As a result we have to buck the system - which is built on the premise that "bigger is better", and that all good ideas and plans for the future come from the learning centers, task forces, and big cities. The little guy in the little town - the country boy - doesn't have the same chance. We have to work harder and work better and work longer to get our fair share. And sometimes it gets discouraging and sometimes downright depressing.

So we get together. And we listen to people who know what they are talking about and who know the rural scene. This year we had 2 speakers, I was a young preacher who has become a real inspiration to many of us. He presented several speeches on "The Lord's Harvest and the Rural Church". He showed us how the rural, small town church need not give up and close its doors. It can survive and it can even grow.

The other speaker was Bob Bergland, former Secretary of Agriculture under President Carter, and then President of the R.E.A. He talked to us about the small church and economics. He also had an encouraging word. Both of them stressed that the key to growth is in your church and in your community. Discover what you've got - your real resources. And develop them. It's harder - but better. It is the way of the steward.

On Wednesday morning the T.V. showed us the signing of the peace-pact between Israel and Jordan. One of our group reminded us of the time, in 1973, when Begin and Sadat, the leaders of Israel and Egypt, signed a similar pact. She asked me to ask Bob Bergland to tell us about that event which took place at another camp - Camp David.

The story he told filled our minds and hearts with hope. This is how he told it. "The room was filled with a kind of fear. Would they sign? Centuries of hostility were in the air - going all the way back to the days of Moses, when Israel was captive to Egypt. The situation had not really improved over the centuries. In that tense situation, prior to the official opening of the meeting, President Carter took his Bible, and started to share the Old Testament stories - of Abraham and Isaac, of Moses. These Bible stories were part of the religion of all in the room - Mohammedans, Jews, and Christians. As he told the stories, God came into the picture. He is creator. We are all accountable to Him for what we do. He is in our history. The tensions were relieved. The pact was signed."

There is a lesson here. For us as communities and churches in small towns - as well as the counties of the world. As we get God back into the picture, the picture changes. Hope is born again. How good He is.

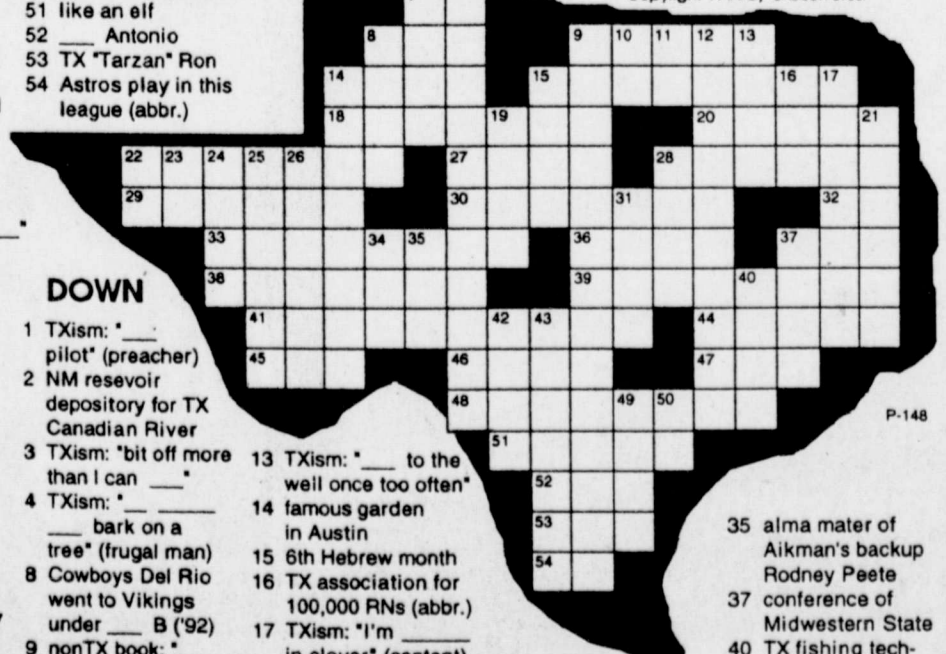

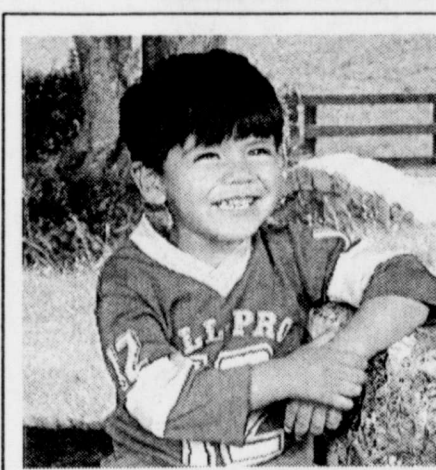

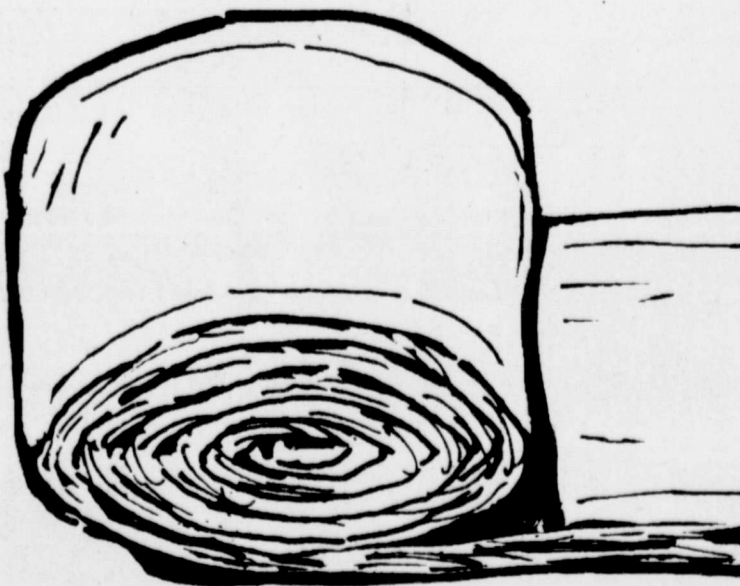

St. John's Lutheran Church celebrates 90th anniversary

St. John's Lutheran Church of Winters observed its 90th anniversary Nov. 5 and Nov. 6 with a variety of celebrations.

Beginning Saturday, church members and visitors were treated to a program and mini-pageant written by Frances Bredemeyer. The production highlighted events and people of the congregation, beginning with the establishment of the first building of St. John's which was dedicated in October of 1904 by the Rev. G. Langner.

The following details are taken from Mrs. Bredemeyer's pageant information.

Charter families included Friedrich Andrae, Fritz Ambrecht, Henry Ambrecht, Fredrick Bredemeyer, Carl Ernst, C. F. Ernst, Otto Gans, Ed Garhart, Friederich Gerhart, Richard Gottschalk, J. D. Grewe, Fritz Hechler, W. Kiefer, Carl Meyer, Henry Minzenmayer, Wilhelm Minzenmayer, George Onken, Gus Pruser, F. Ransel, Wilhelm Redner, F. Voelker, and Carl Vogler.

Descendants of these families were recognized during the pageant.

Also depicted were the coming of the first resident pastor (Rev. W. F. Hertel), the railroad, the drought of 1911 and 1912, the arrival of pastors Czerkus, Woerth, and E. Meier.

Ernest Meier of Cuero, and Edwin Meier of Uvalde, sons of the late Rev. E. Meier, attended the 90th celebration.

Rev. Meier endured many hardships while serving in Winters. According to some church members, he was tarred and feathered because he spoke German from the pulpit during WWI.

World War I veterans recognized during the pageant were Fritz Andrae, E. C. (Dick) Bredemeyer, Adolph Ernst, Hans Gottschalk, Ewald Henniger, Paul Haupt, Adolf Keifer, and Max Keifer who, at age 101, currently lives in a Veterans Hospital in Kerrville.

Other church members who

have served in the armed forces were also recognized as were all young men who have become Eagle Scouts.

The first person in Winters to reach the Eagle Scout award was Boyd Bedford.

In 1913, St. John's purchased a 900-pound church bell from Montgomery Ward & Co. and continues to use the bell in present day.

Mr. and Mrs. Fritz Bredemeyer donated acreage for a Lutheran Cemetery in 1916. The flu epidemic of 1918-19 brought many deaths.

The Rev. E. O. Baach filled the vacancy from 1919-1924. Rev. H. C. Wehmeyer followed until 1929 when Rev. H. Schliesser arrived.

At this time, the congregation was ready to begin construction of the new church building. The original plans called for a 35' x 82' building with a basement. As the building progressed, new ideas were added such as stained-glass windows, cork tile floors, fire-proof roofing, side gables, and new furnishings.

The total cost of the new building was \$23,446.93, and was dedicated on Feb. 2, 1930. The congregation celebrated its 25th anniversary during the building's dedication.

In 1938, funds for a new pipe organ were started. Chiefly through the donation by August Spill, a two-manual Moller pipe organ with eight ranks of pipes was installed and dedicated on April 16, 1939, and is still in use today.

Pastor C. N. Roth came in 1934 and served twelve years during which time a 40 percent increase in membership was noted.

(His wife, Eleanor, was acknowledged during the service last Saturday.)

In 1946, the Rev. L. D. Braun came to St. John's. German services were discontinued all together that year.

The Rev. H. K. Flathmann arrived in May of 1954 and served

until 1962. (Rev. Flathmann and his wife, Edith, were present for the pageant).

In March of 1961, the Education Building was dedicated.

Pastor Lehne of Fredericksburg served as Interim Pastor with the Rev. Albert Holck arriving in 1962. In his four years at St. John's, he baptized 44 people, confirmed 35 children and 2 adults, and performed 17 weddings.

Pastor Renslo served as Interim Pastor until Jan, 1966, when Pastor Walter C. Probst, Sr. arrived. He served seven years. Then Rev. Mel Swoyer arrived, fresh from seminary.

Rev. Swoyer's wife, Gail, established the Lutheran Pre-School which is currently directed by Mary Kurtz.

Pastor Rueckwald served as Interim Pastor until Pastor A.R. Wolber arrived. Rev. Wolber died May 27, 1979.

On September 16, 1979, the Rev. Lawrence Keene came to St. John's and helped celebrate the 75th anniversary.

The next pastor was the Rev. Steve Byrne, who served from 1984 to 1991.

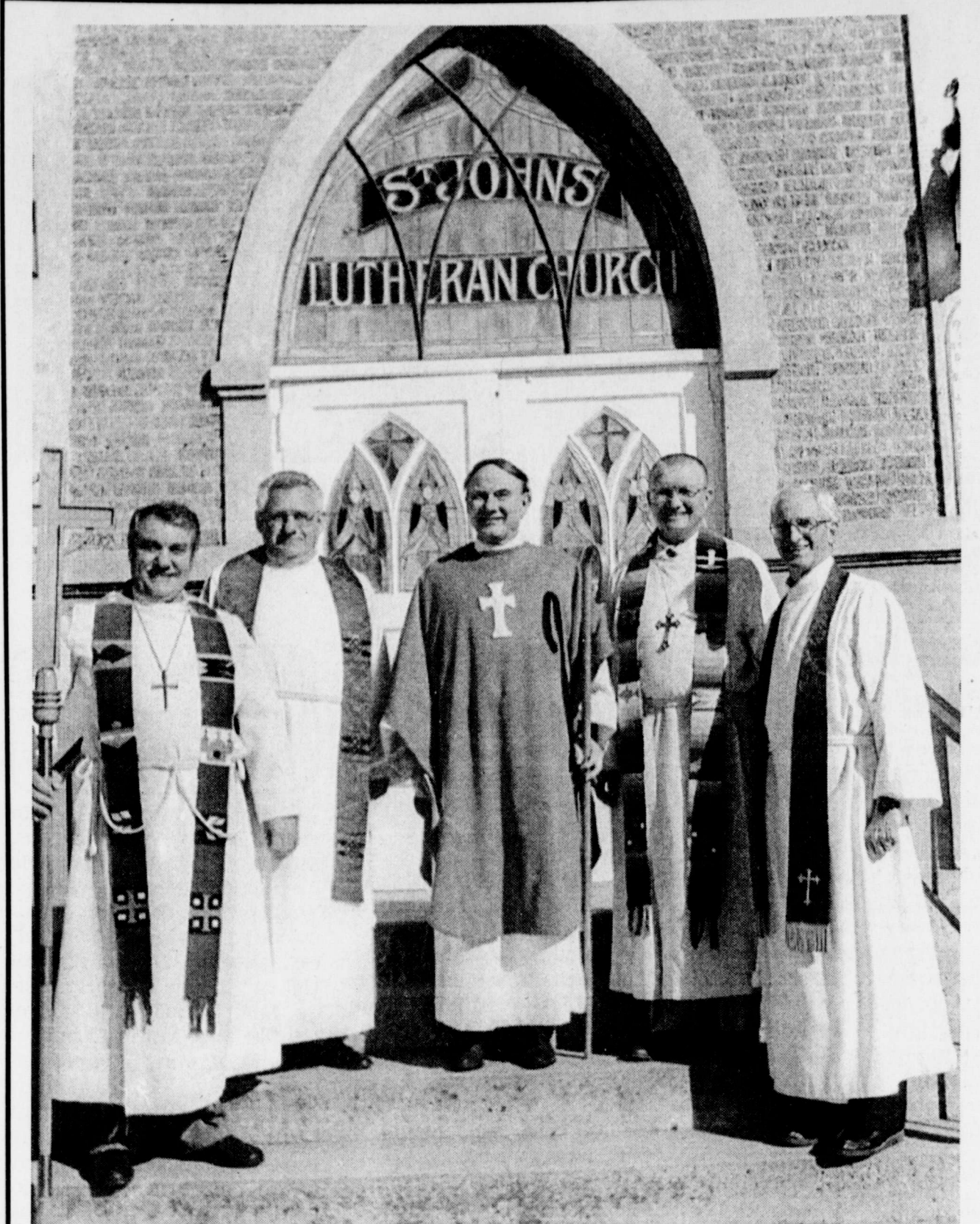
On Sept. 15, 1991, Pastor James Hanson and wife, Ramona, arrived at St. John's, and continue to serve here.

During the pageant, a tribute was given to the pioneer women who worked alongside the men and helped shape this community.

Mrs. Hilda Deike Kurtz, age 84, made a "splashing" entrance in her 90-year-old wool bathing suit. The special attire came from a swimwear factory in California that was owned by Mrs. Kurtz's grandmother's family.

More than 500 people attended the pageant that was repeated on Sunday afternoon following a noon luncheon for approximately 300 members and guests.

Special guest speakers were Bishop Mark Herberner, Larry Hendrix, Joe Kraatz, John Jackson, James Hanson, Elnor Roth, H. K. Flathmann, and Virginia Spill Flathmann.

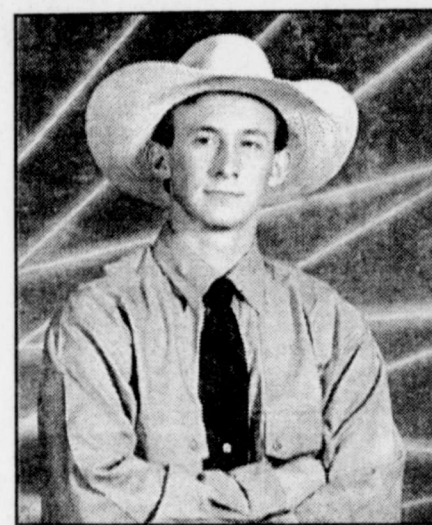
