



The annual meting of the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation took place in the Fine Arts Build-ing of West Texas State Univer-sity Sunday afternoon, January 26, at 4:00 p.m. The program consis-ted of reports on the state of the amphitheater and the project pre-sented by Dr. Crannell Tolliver and Mr. R. C. Neely, Jr. of the build-ing committee, Mr. Jerry LaGrone, Treasurer, Mrs. Kenneth Lanham, Secretary, Mr. O. P. Cowart re-ported on the recent visit of the officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife commission to the am-phitheater in the Palo Duro State Park and also on the construction of the sand table for the relief map of the Panhandle which is to be on the pylon at the front of the theater as one of its principal ornaments. 

The first was for a producton which Mr. Green who is working on the script for the show - has termed "homespun".
