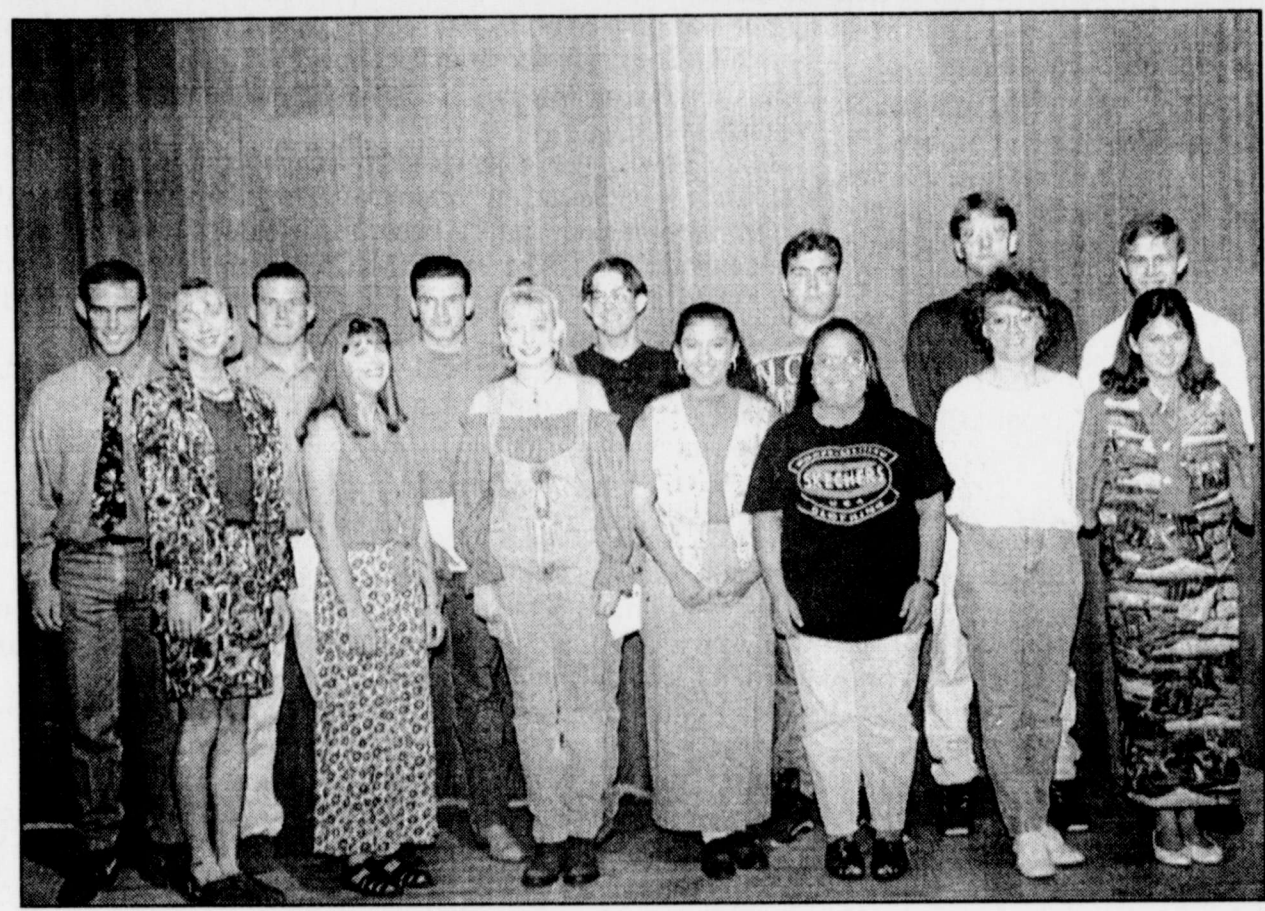

Riley Spill, 2, to be featured in Children's Miracle Network telethon

Miracles happen every day, but often they are so small and we're so busy that we fail to notice.

Yet, sometimes a miracle jumps up right in front of us. And in the case of 2-year-old Riley Spill, this miracle can literally stare you right in the eye and smile.

Riley is the daughter of Kelly and Krystle Spill and the granddaughter of Van and Nora Spill and Zelda and Terry Stewart of Winters. Kelly is a 1989 graduate of Winters High School and is presently serving in the Army in Fort Riley, Kansas.

When she was 8 months old, Riley had frequent and severe ear infections that didn't respond to medication.

and she soon returned to normal.

"All of us who took care of her didn't really feel the medications had anything to do with her recovery," Dr. Pope said. "It truly was a miracle."

"The doctors said they have never seen any case like this," said Krystle. Riley's official diagnosis was a rare Myelodysplastic Syndrome, but the condition was corrected — somehow.

Somehow? A miracle, according to the doctors and Riley's family.

"Everybody in Winters and Snyder was praying for her. Riley's recovery was a true miracle," says her mother.

Riley turned two on January 5, 1995, and weighed over 25 pounds, and now "eats everything

she can find," according to Krystle.

Because Riley's recovery is one of a kind, she has been selected to be "Miracle Baby" for the Children's Miracle Network.

"Expect a Miracle" is the theme for the 1995 telecast which will broadcast live on KTAB June 3 and 4. Riley's story will be featured as part of the telethon.

This telecast will be the 13th year for the national event which has raised more than \$775 million for children's services in more than 160 hospitals nationwide. In the six years that Meek Children's Hospital has been a CMN affiliated hospital, more than \$1,115,000 has been raised locally. More than 20,000 children were treated last year at Hendrick Medical Center and Meek Children's Hospital.

Locally, a benefit BBQ will be held Saturday, May 27, at Lawrence Brothers IGA supermarket from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Volunteers will be selling hot dogs, sausage, chicken, ribs, chips, sodas and Blue Bell ice cream. Cookies, toys and Lion King posters will be given away. Chances will be sold to win a \$50 gift certificate from Lawrence Brothers.

So make plans to be a part of the Children's Miracle Network. You just never know when you might be part of a miracle in someone's life. Just take a look at Riley — Riley with those twinkling eyes and cute smile, and so full of life.

OIL BUSINESS . . .

We continue our "Oil Patch Basics" series this month with a discussion of the completion of a new well.

As you may recall from our earlier sessions, we have drilled a well. We are going to assume the logs look good and all indications suggest a successful well. We can now move ahead with preparing the well for production.

First, the "production casing" must be set. This "string" of pipe is in addition to any other intermediate or shallow strings already set in the well (see earlier "Basics"). In most cases, the production string is 5-1/2 inch pipe running from the surface to the bottom of the well, but the pipe size can vary from 3 to 7 inches (or even larger) and can be "scabbed" (hung) from the bottom of an intermediate string (instead of from the surface as is typical).

The pipe must be cemented into place, and this is accomplished by pumping (in this order) a rubber plug with a rupturable bladder (bottom wiper plug), the cement slurry, and another wiper plug of solid rubber (top plug) down the casing. The bottom plug bumps against the "float" equipment at the end of the casing and ruptures to let the cement out of the casing and up the backside between the hole and the casing. The top plug then bumps against the bottom plug and the pumping stops. The cement is then allowed to cure, at which point, the well is ready for perforating.

Perforating a well is simply opening holes in the casing so that production (oil, gas, water) may enter the wellbore. It is not always required, since some wells are completed "open hole" (no casing over the productive interval), but most are perforated.

Perforations (or "perfs") are made by shooting holes in the casing with shaped charges. The charges are fired by a "gun" that is shaped like a 5'-10" cigar on the end of a wireline. Location of the perforations are selected by picking potential productive intervals from well logs. The perfs may now be produced, tested, or stimulated.

Stimulation can be accomplished in several ways. Acidizing is the most common method. It involves pumping acid (usually hydrochloric) under pressure into the perforations. The acid dissolves most drilling mud contaminants and other particles that may block flow. The acid will also dissolve part of the formation itself (if it is a "carbonate") to increase flow capacity.

Fracture stimulation is another method for increasing productivity. It involves pumping a viscous (goosey) gel at a high enough rate and pressure to actually crack the formation. The gel is followed by a sand-laden gel that will prop open the fracture to create improved flow capacity.

The well is now ready for production and the mechanics of getting that production to the surface become important.

Tubing is installed in the wellbore from the surface to the production zone (inside the casing). A "packer" is run as a part of the tubing string to provide an anchor for the tubing and to create a seal between the tubing and the annulus (space behind tubing and inside casing). The packer then forces production up the tubing, leaving the annulus space unaffected.

If the well will not flow under its own energy, then a "tubing anchor" is utilized to do what a packer does except that it provides no seal (not required since production will not flow into annular space). With a tubing anchor, the well will then be set up to pump fluid to the surface.

This is where we will pick up next time. Artificial lift and types of flow will be our main topics.

As you can see, the completion of a well has many parts, and each one could be the topic of its own one-week seminar. I have only touched on the basic methodology here, but give me a break. I only had a week to write this thing.

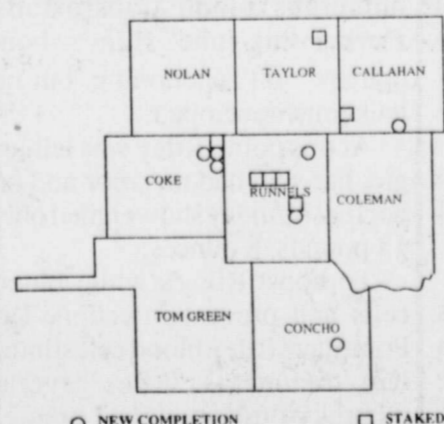

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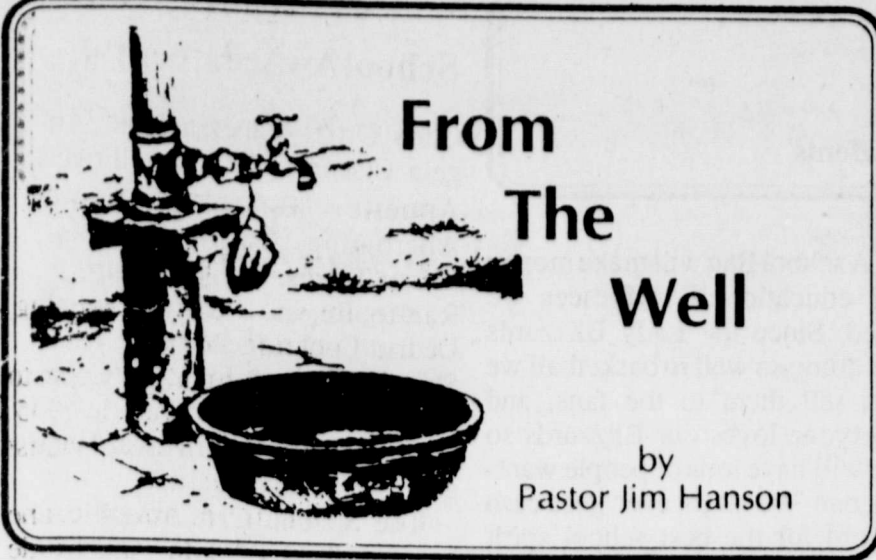
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From The Well

Last night, Ramona and I had a great time. It was after supper and before dark. We followed the crowd, that line of cars and pickups and vans headed for the ball park. Parents and kids, grandparents and friends going to play and watch baseball.

Years ago, small towns like Winters had a town team. And the whole town would come out and cheer for their hometown heroes. Sometimes, in order to fill out a roster with really good players, the locals would have to go get some good players from out of town. For sure every small town needed to have a team. And to have some connection with that great American game of baseball. One of Winters' claim to fame is that Rogers Hornsby, the great baseball player of yesteryear, actually lived in this area.

But today it is different. We don't have a town team, where the players are few and the crowd is many. We have many players, boys and girls, all sizes and shapes. Last night it started with T-ball, and those little ones came out and gave it their best shot. Hardly out of diapers and still struggling to keep their balance, they were out there. Then the older kids. Up through the sixth grade.

It's really a family affair. The coaches are dads and moms. If dad is the coach, mom is pretty apt to be keeping score. The crowd is mostly kin-folk to the players. Not always. I know some folks who wander over almost every night. To watch whoever might be playing. For the fun of it.

I'm sure I would not want to be an umpire. It would be very difficult to call one of those little guys out on strikes. Or "you're out" if he got caught trying to steal home. You might even have to commend with the kid's grandma after the game!

For the most part, the crowd is there to have a good time. It's hard to be totally for the team your kid is playing for. Some of your nephews or nieces might just be playing on the other team. Some parents might be very partisan, but most seem to be able to handle it all. And the kids are just something else.

Why, last night I saw a little guy, a second grader, put on all that gear—he was a catcher. He got down on his haunches, and he put that mitt right where the pitcher would have a good target, and he caught the ball! One after another. And when he stood at the plate, he swung that bat like a major leaguer. When he got a solid hit, the crowd exploded! Such fun.

But it's not just the players on the field. All over the place, kids playing catch. Throwing the ball high in the air, and catching it themselves. One came up to his mom and proudly said, "Mom, I threw the ball as high up as the powerline, and I caught it!" There's the concession stand, where you can get soft drinks, candy, and snacks. All the earmarks of the great all-American game.

Big league baseball is not my thing. Especially these last years. Especially last year! It's all so money oriented, greed oriented. Many folks are angry—at the owners and the players! They say "Those guys have stolen baseball from us. From the fans. From America."

I really don't think so. For in these little towns, where teams of little people, coached by parents, supported by family and friends, play almost every night, baseball is alive and well. Winters co-sponsors LCRA fact-finding meeting in San Angelo on water-quality issues

The Lower Colorado River Authority will hold a fact-finding meeting in San Angelo on Thursday, May 25, to hear comments from the public on water quality issues in the area.

The meeting, part of a state-mandated program to assess the water quality of the basin, will begin at 7 p.m. at the San Angelo Convention Center, 500 Rio Concho Drive.

The meeting is a follow-up to one held by the LCRA in San Angelo in April 1992 when more than 100 persons showed up to voice concerns about pollution problems created by an overloaded wastewater treatment plant in San Angelo. As a result, an assessment report by the LCRA in 1992 identified the plant and collection system as a major source of pollution to the Concho River, a tributary of the Colorado. Subsequently, the City of San Angelo spent nearly \$25 million to correct the problem following an enforcement action against the city by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC).

Water quality problems still remain in the San Angelo area, however. A 1994 assessment report by the LCRA identified fish kills on the North Concho River in San Angelo as a "high-priority" concern in the basin. The fish kills were attributed to polluted runoff entering a series of small impoundments on the North Concho, combined with minimal releases from the O. C. Fisher Reservoir immediately upstream to provide adequate dilution.

"We are inviting the public to bring to our attention any potential problems in the area, including the North Concho and other tributaries," said Ken Manning, LCRA manager of environmental protection. "We believe the public plays an important ongoing role as our eyes and ears for the watershed."

Co-sponsors of the meeting include the Upper Colorado River Authority, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Texas Alliance of Groundwater Districts, Glasscock County Soil and Water Conservation District, North Concho Soil and Water Conservation District, Lower Concho Soil and Water Conservation Authority, Concho Soil and Water Conservation District, and the cities of Ballinger, Bronte, Colorado City, Eden, Paint Rock, San Angelo, Sterling City, Robert Lee, and Winters.

The meeting is part of a program established by the Texas Clean Rivers Act of 1991, which requires river authorities and other designated entities statewide to conduct water quality assessments of their regions and submit reports each even-numbered year. Assessments of the Colorado watershed are conducted jointly by the LCRA, the Upper Colorado River Authority and the Colorado River Municipal Water District. The TNRCC has named the LCRA to coordinate the Colorado River assessments.

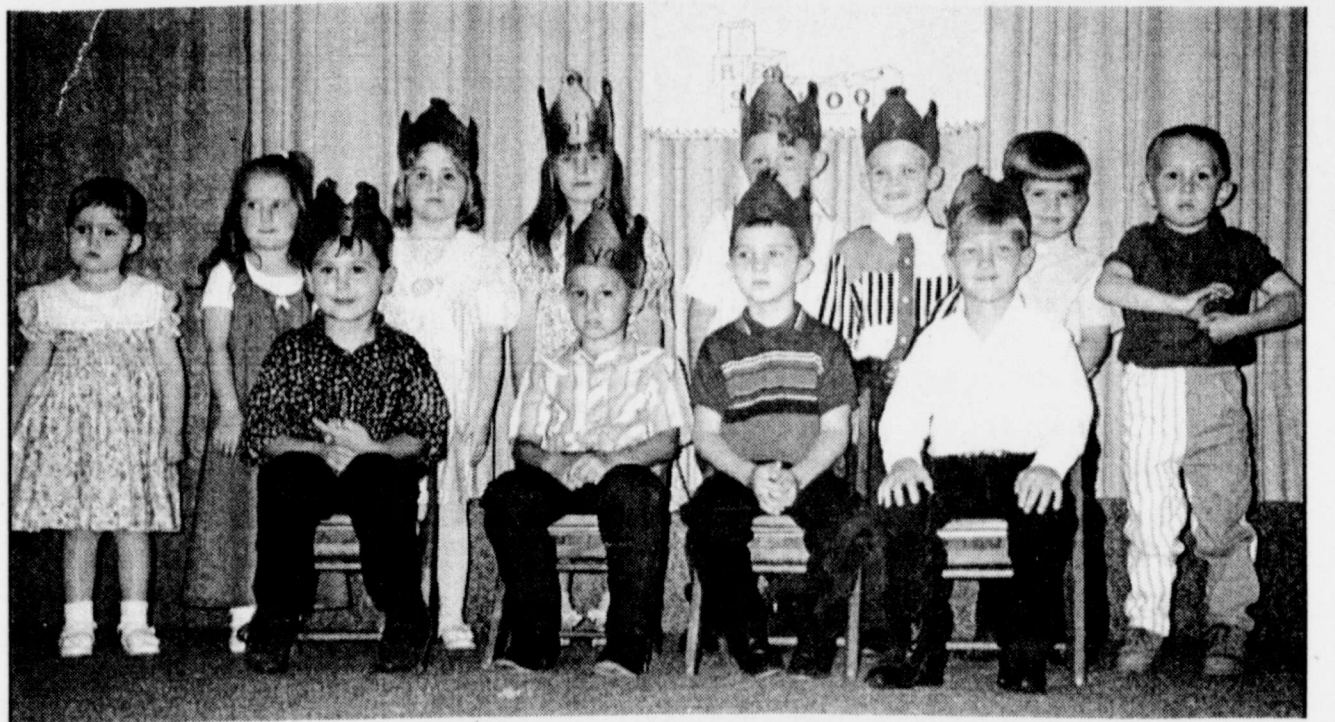

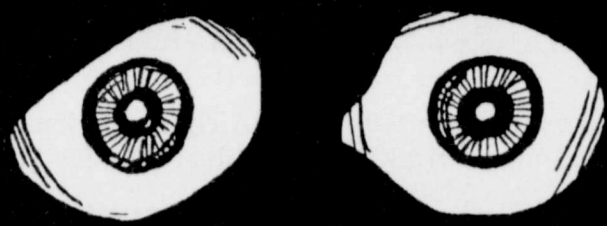

All too often, severe weather causes power outages. Wind, fallen tree limbs, and lightning can damage lines or equipment causing these outages.

Here are some steps you can take to weather an outage safely — and with as little inconvenience — as possible.

IN A POWER OUTAGE:

1. CHECK IT OUT.

When your power goes out, check all fuses and breakers. If they're O.K., check with your neighbors. If power is out around you, CALL WTU. You'll find our number in your local phone book, or on your WTU bill!

2. KEEP WTU PHONE LINES OPEN.

From the moment you call WTU, help is on the way — so a second call isn't necessary. Please leave our lines open for other callers.

3. REPORT FALLEN UTILITY LINES.

If you see a fallen power line, don't even go near it! And, keep others away, too! Call WTU, the police, or the fire department immediately.

4. UNPLUG APPLIANCES.

It's a good idea to turn off your air conditioner and unplug televisions, major appliances, and computers during storms. If you experience an outage, you may want to leave them unplugged until power is restored. Don't open your refrigerator or freezer unless absolutely necessary.

5. BE CAREFUL WITH GENERATORS.

If you have access to a portable generator, please

do not plug it directly into your circuit breaker box. It's unsafe — especially for repair crews. Plug appliances and lamps directly into the generator.

6. PLEASE BE PATIENT.

You may see a WTU truck in your neighborhood leaving before your power comes back on. This is not unusual. We send people out to assess the extent and cause of an outage. The source of your outage might be several blocks away.

7. CHECK ON YOUR NEIGHBORS.

Be mindful of neighbors who may have special needs.

8. TURN YOUR FRONT PORCH LIGHT ON.

Turning on your porch light lets WTU crews know your electricity is back on.

9. FOLLOW LOCAL NEWS MEDIA.

For updates on weather conditions and power restoration efforts, check local newspapers and radio broadcasts.

9. KEEP AN EMERGENCY SAFETY KIT.

It's a good idea to keep things like flashlights, batteries, bottled water, and a battery-powered radio handy.

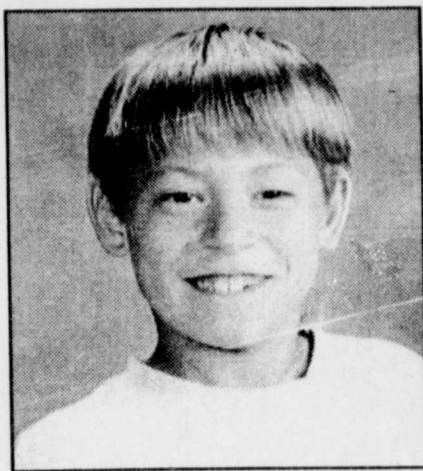

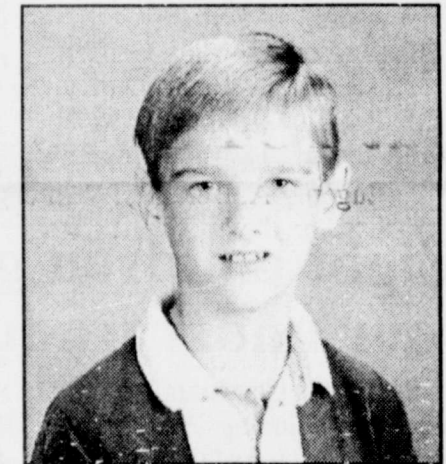

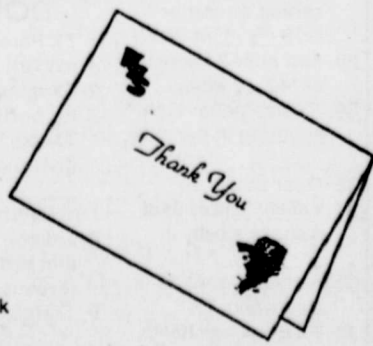

Memories of long ago

Former Winters residents often write me about their memories evoked by some story I have written. Such a letter by Willa Faye Roper was received on April 24 from Conroe, Texas.

The letter follows:

"When *The Enterprise* printed the articles and pictures about the stained glass panel, 'God's Love,' from the old First Baptist Church building, I was very interested. Then your article, 'Three Little Words,' was in the paper. (My thanks to those who requested the repeat of your speech.)

"All of these articles and pictures brought tears to my eyes and are treasured by me. They will be kept in a special family book. Let me explain why.

"My husband, Aubrey Lee Roper, and I were married on March 18, 1948, in the old First Baptist Church building. Rev. L.L. Trott was pastor at the time and officiated at our ceremony.

"The enclosed copy of us coming down the church steps, after the ceremony, shows the glass panel overhead. We were pleased the photographer got it in the picture.

At the time, we were both members of FBC. Aubrey was employed at the Winters State Bank. Our two oldest children were born while we lived in Winters. We moved away when he became a Bank Examiner for the State Banking Department. After living in San Antonio and Tyler, the State transferred us to Houston. A few years later, Aubrey went into a bank in Houston. Our third child was born in Houston. While in Houston, Aubrey was ordained a deacon in the Baptist Church.

"On November 3, 1992, he

went to be with the Lord Jesus. Through it all, we came to know, as you stated, God's love is never ending. It is given unconditionally and is available to all.

"My thanks and appreciation for the articles.

"Sincerely, Willa Faye Roper, P.O. Box 2847, Conroe, TX 77305."

After receiving Willa Faye's letter I began trying to place Roper in my memory. All I could think of was M.G. and Desley Roper, but their son would be too young. Several people remembered Aubrey Lee at school and in town, but not many details of his life.

I wrote Willa Faye and she helped me:

"Aubrey Lee Roper, my husband, was the son of Jewell Kincannon Roper Allen. His father was Clyde Everett Roper, who was a barber in Ballinger for many years. His parents divorced when he was about four-years-old. Jewell later married Lee E. Allen, one time mayor of Winters. (He was mayor just before George Poe.) M.G. and Desley Roper were relatives. My parents were Frank and Irene Wood. Addie Beth Stanley was my oldest sister.

"Our daughter, Jeanetta Brewster, works for the state in the chaplain's office at the prison system in Huntsville. Our oldest son, Steve (Charles Stephen) is a detective with the Conroe Police Department. The youngest, Adam Lee, is in business in Conroe. There are eight grandchildren."

The two sons and their families attend the same church as she does. Willa Faye plans to be at the "Wood Cousin Reunion" in Ballinger the first weekend in June.

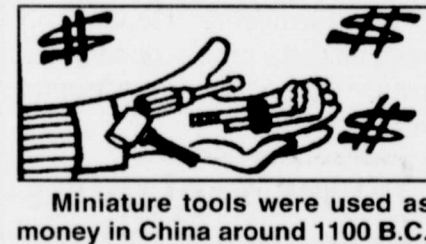

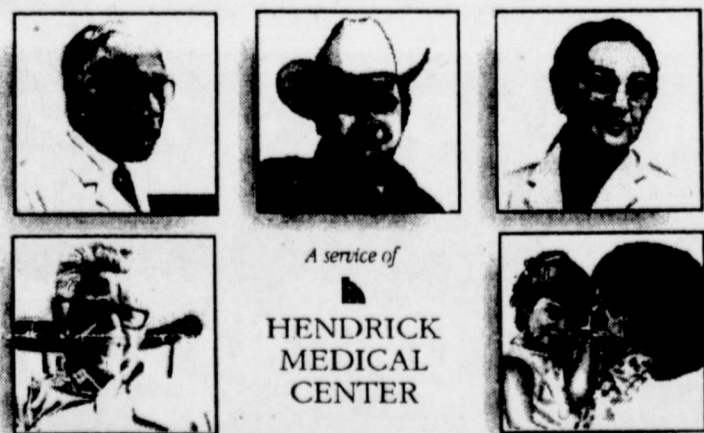

Texas Agricultural Extension Service receives Governor's Award for Integrated Pest Management Program

The Integrated Pest Management Program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service was awarded the 1995 Governor's Award for Environmental Excellence in the agriculture division. This award recognized achievement for protecting the environment in Texas by Governor George W. Bush and the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission's CLEAN TEXAS 2000 program.

This award was given to the 23 members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at the county, district, and headquarters level who conduct the IPM program. The program represents 22 locations around the state involving the 11 commodities in 60 major agricultural producing counties.

Mr. Rick Minzenmayer, Extension Agent-Entomology, directs the local integrated pest management program in Runnels

and Tom Green Counties. The IPM program includes an intensive cotton insect field scouting program, education programs for producers, weekly radio broadcasts during the growing season, weekly newsletter throughout the growing season and as needed through the year to address immediate problems or events, and extensive applied research.

The Governor's Award specifically identified the use of the uniform delayed planting date as a non-pesticide control method in planting in the Rolling Plains. Minzenmayer says this management tool has increased the net profit to growers and reduced pesticide use for the control of the boll weevil. Producers annually select the uniform delayed planting date by voting conducted at meetings held in each county. The planting date selected for this year for both Runnels and Tom Green Counties was May 22.

Pest Management News

Spray now for pecan nut casebearer control

Surveys for pecan nut casebearer eggs conducted in the area indicate that the time to treat for this pest is rapidly approaching. The prediction dates for this area should be from May 27 to June 3. Close monitoring of nut clusters for egg deposition and/or feeding damage will be necessary for proper timing of an insecticide treatment.

Adult female moths will soon be laying eggs on the pollinated nutlets. Eggs should hatch in 4 to 7 days then the young worms will attack the nutlets. Eggs are usually placed singly on the tips of

nutlets. Eggs are flat and blue-greenish white in color when first laid, but take on a pinkish red color after 1 or 2 days. Eggs are small in size, about the size of a pinhead. Young worms hatching from eggs first feed on leaf buds and then attack the small nutlets.

At least 100 pecan nut casebearer clusters should be checked on trees in home yards for eggs and worm feeding damage. Check trees 2 to 3 times a week for the next two weeks. Where eggs are detected, chemical treatment should be applied in 3 to 5 days. Where feeding damage is detected, chemical treatment should be made that day.

There have been several questions on what insecticides to use for pecan nut casebearer control. A short summary of insecticides labeled for pecans and their uses are:

Lorsban® 4E, chlorpyrifos, provides good control of most insects and good to fair aphid control.

Sevin®, carbaryl, has several formulations. Early season applications tend to flair aphids and mites. Provides excellent control of pecan weevils.

Thiodan®, endosulfon, is labeled for black pecan aphids, pecan nut casebearer, and spittlebug. It is highly toxic to cattle, both oral and dermal, and highly toxic to humans.

Guthion®, azinphos-methyl, will not control aphids. It is labeled for pecan nut casebearer, shuck worm, fall webworm, walnut caterpillar, spittlebug, southern green stick bug, and twig girdlers.

Dipel®, Bacillus thuringiensis, and other Bt products provide good control of pecan nut casebearer, fall webworms and walnut caterpillar.

Herbicides regulated May 26 to October 1

The Northwest part of Runnels County will be a herbicide regulated area again this year, according to Mike Mauldin, Runnels County Extension Agent.

The dates that this relation are in effect is May 26 to October 1, 1995. All persons within the designated area are asked to abide with these regulations.

The relations for Runnels County are as follows:

That portion of Runnels County beginning on the west county line at the point of intersection with the Colorado River, east-southeasterly along the Colorado River to its intersection with U.S. Highway 83, thence north along U.S. Highway 83 to its intersection with the north county line, thence westerly along the north Runnels County line to the northwest corner of the county, thence southerly along the west county line to the Colorado River, the point of beginning, is regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law.

In regulated areas, no permit is required from October 1st through May 25th of the following year. The application of Ester formulations of regulated herbicides is prohibited from May 26th through September 30th of each year. The application of other regulated herbicides will be allowed beginning May 26th through September 30th of each year provided that a spray permit is obtained prior to each application.

All hunters born on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed a course to hunt in Texas. Minimum age for certification is 12 years of age.

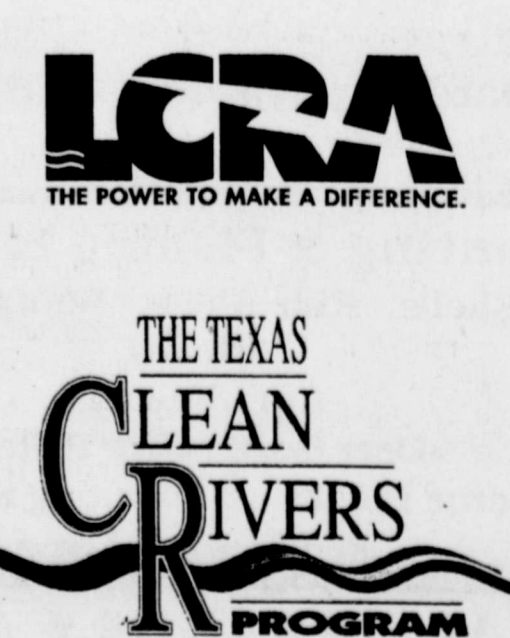

Kelly is the son of Dean and Kay Thompson. Born August 19, 1976. Attended Early schools 1-6 and Winters 7-12.

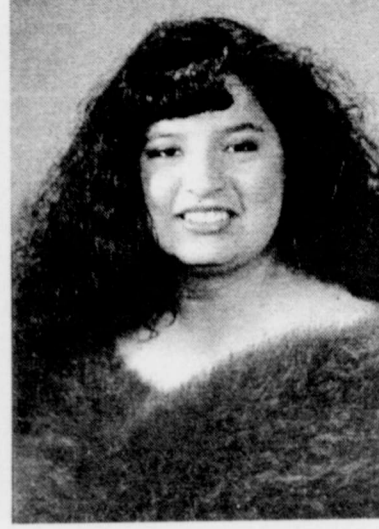

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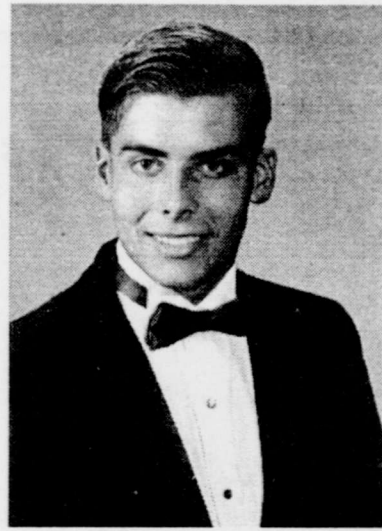

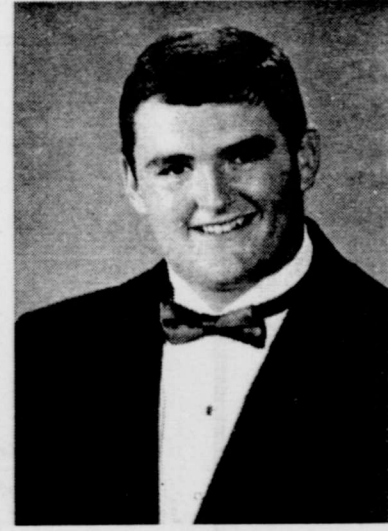
