To boost Riley's white blood cells and prevent infection, Dr. Pope gave Riley blood cell stimulant treatments. After several months of treatment and no sigand Riley's parents began the search for a bone marrow match for a transplant. During the search, Riley also began a steroid treatment to prepare her for the sur-

We continue our "Oil Patch Basics" series this month with a discussion
As you may recall from ou earlier sessions, we have drilled well. We are going to assume the logs look good and all indications now move ahead with preparing the well for production. Fill for production. ust be set. This "string" of pip s in addition to any other inter mediate or shallow strings already et in the well (see earlier "Ba ics"). In most cases, the produc tion string is $5-1 / 2$ inch pipe run ning from the surface to the bot can vary from 3 to 7 inches (or even larger) and can be "scabbed" (hung) from the bottom of an in ermediate string (instead of from he surface as is typical)
The pipe must be cemented lished by pumping is accom plished by pumping (in this order) rubber plug with a rupturable cement slurry, and another wiper plug of solid rubber (top plug) down the casing. The bottom plu bumps against the "float" equip ment at the end of the casing and ruptures to let the cement out of the casing and up the backsid between the hole and the casing. The top plug then bumps agains. the bottom plug and the pumping
stops. The cement is then allowed to cure, at which point, the well is ready for perforating r perforating. pening holes in the casing so th production (oil, gas, water) ma enter the wellbore. It is not alway required, since some wells are completed "open hole" (nocasing over the productive i most are perforated
Perforations (or "perfs") are casing with shaped charges. The charges are fired by a "gun" that is shaped like a $5^{\prime}-10^{\prime}$ cigar on the end of a wireline. Location of the
perforations are selected by pickperforations are selected by pick from well logs. The perfs may now be produced tested orstimu lated.
Stimulation can be accom
plished in several ways. Acidizin is the most common method. involves pumping acid (usually hydrochloric) under pressure into the perforations. The acid dis nolves and owner gractes contam block flow. The acid will also dissolve part of the formation it self (if it is a "carbonate") to in crease flow capacity.
Fracture stimulation is another method for increasing productiv ity. It involvespumping a viscous (gooey) gel at a high enough rate formation. The gel is followed by a sand-laden gel that will prop open the fracture to create improved flow capacity.
The well is now ready for production and the mechanics of get ting that production to the surface

Winters co-sponsors LCRA fact-finding meeting in San Angelo on water-quality issues

The Lower Colorado River Authority will hold a fact-finding
meeting in San Angelo on Thurs meeting in San Angelo on Thurs-
day, May 25 , to hear comments from the public on water quality issues in the area.
The meeting, part of a statemandated program to assess the water quality of the basin, will begin at 7 pm . at the San Angelo Convention
Concho Drive.
The meeting is a follow-up to one held by the LCRA in San Angelo in April 1992 when more than 100 persons showed up to voice concerns about pollution problemscreated by anoverloaded wastewater treatment plant in San Angelo. As a result, an assessment report by une Lent collection system as a major source of pollution to the Concho River, a tributary of the Colorado. Subsequently, the City of San Angelo spent nearly $\$ 25$ million to correct the problem following an enforcement action against the city by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission
(TNRCC) (TNRCC).
remain in quality problems still remain in the San Angelo area,
however. A 1994 assessment report by the LCRA identified fish kills on the North Concho River in San Angelo as a "high-priority" concern in the basin. The fish kills were attributed to polluted runoff entering a series of small impoundments on the North releases fromine O. Fisher Reservoir immediately upstream to provide adequate dilution.
"We are inviting the public to bring to our attention any potential problems in the area, including the North Concho and other
tributaries," said Ken Manning, LCRA manager of environmental protection. "We believe the public plays an important ongoing role as our eyes and ears for the
watershed." watershed."

The meeting is part of a program established by the Texas Clean Rivers Act of 1991, which requires river authorities and other designated entities statewide to
conduct waterquality assessments of their regions and submit reports each even-numbered year Assessments of the Colorado watershed are conducted jointly by the LCRA, the Upper Colorado River Authority and the Colorado River Municipal Water District. The TNRCChas named the LCRA to coordinate the Colorado River assessments.
