At this time of year, the guard at the Tomb changes every half-hour. With precision, the Sergeant inspects the relief guard and his weapon for military bearing and readiness. While the rapid end-over-end rotation of the rifle in the hands of the inspector captures the attention of the visitors, the guard on duties continues his 21 steps and 21 seconds until the new guard is posted.

The Tomb of the Unknowns is set above the hills of Arlington

Cemetery, looking down onto the Potomac River. From there, you see the panoramic view of the U.S. Capitol and the Washington Monument, but your eyes focus on the hundreds of thousands of graves.

The white headstones make a pattern over the rolling hills, marking the sacrifices from Civil War to Space Shuttle Challenge. Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

Bryan Field accepted the Seventh grade Speech award and Courtney Tanksley, Eighth grade.

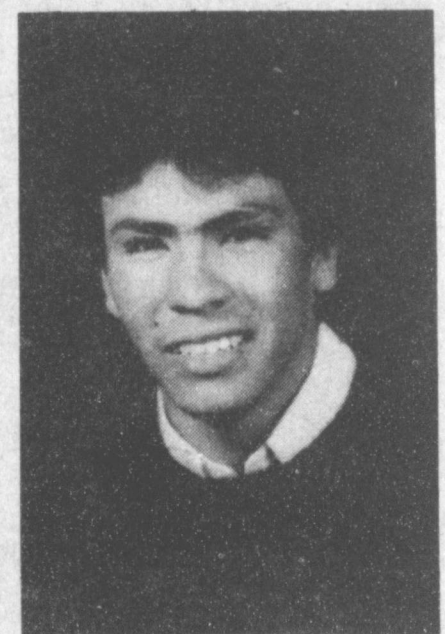

Hays, Kansas-Fort Hays State University junior Norman Perez, a native of Muleshoe, qualified for the NAIA National Outdoor Track and Field Championship.

Nationals were held this weekend in Stephenville, TX.

Perez claimed the District 70 Champion gold medal in the men's 800-meter run. He broke the men's 800-meter run record of 1:52.79 and set a new record of 1:51.8, just short of the FHSU record of 1:48.8, which in the process, qualified him for the Nationals.

Perez also ran legs on the third place 1,600 m relay in 48.9 and a sixth place finish in the 400 m relay.

Norman Perez is currently sitting fifth in the nation in the 800 meter run.

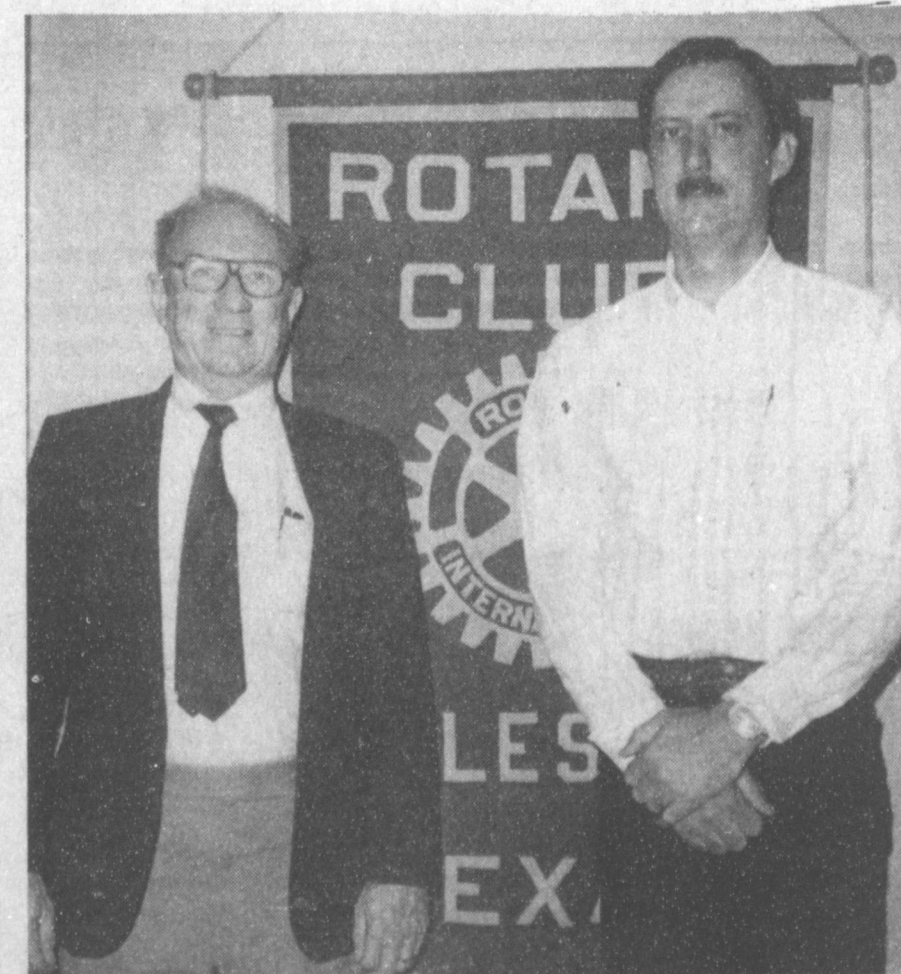

Workshop June 1 For Crop Scouting

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be conducted here June 1 at the Ollie Linder Agricultural Center, on South U.S. 87 (Business). The workshop is open to summer scouts of private crop consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. W. Pat Morrison, entomologist at Lubbock with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, which conducts the course. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4 p.m.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions which are based on pest populations and economic thresholds to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit, yet create minimal harm to the crop or environment. Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects which are enemies of the pests and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input. Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are: Principles of IPM and sampling, Dr. James Leser, entomologist, Lubbock. Cotton growth and development, Dr. James R. Supak, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock. Thrips, fleahoppers and aphids, Mark Brown, Crosby-Floyd pest management agent, Crosbyton. Bollworms and miscellaneous cotton pests, Leser. Major diseases and symptoms, Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist, Lubbock. Plant nutrient deficiency symptoms, Dr. Michael Hickey, soil chemist, Lubbock. Herbicide injury and common weeds, Kerry Siders, Castro-Lamb pest management agent, Dimmitt. Beneficials, Craig Forbis, Dawson-Lynn pest management agent, Lamesa. Corn and sorghum growth and development, Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist, Amarillo. Corn pests, Greg Cronholm, Hale pest management agent, Plainview. Sorghum pests, Morrison. Sunflower and soybeans, Mike Blanton, Bailey-Parmer pest management agent, Farwell. Pesticide safety, Morrison.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property;
- exemptions that may apply to you;
- cancellation of agricultural appraisal;
- whether your property is taxable;
- which local governments should be taxing your property; or
- you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

Informal Review: Call or visit the Bailey County Appraisal District to try and resolve any problems with your property before an ARB hearing is scheduled.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a *notice of protest*) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 104 E. Ave. C.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact the ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 104 E. Ave. C-Muleshoe, Tx. (806) 272-5501. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Property Tax Board, 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746.

Deadline for filing protests with the ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday)

Usual deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraisal value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests (if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.) Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact the appraisal district for more information.

Special deadlines:

Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land) Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed) Before the 10th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

The groom wore a black tuxedo with white cummerbund and the groomsmen were attired in black tuxedos with emerald green cummerbunds.

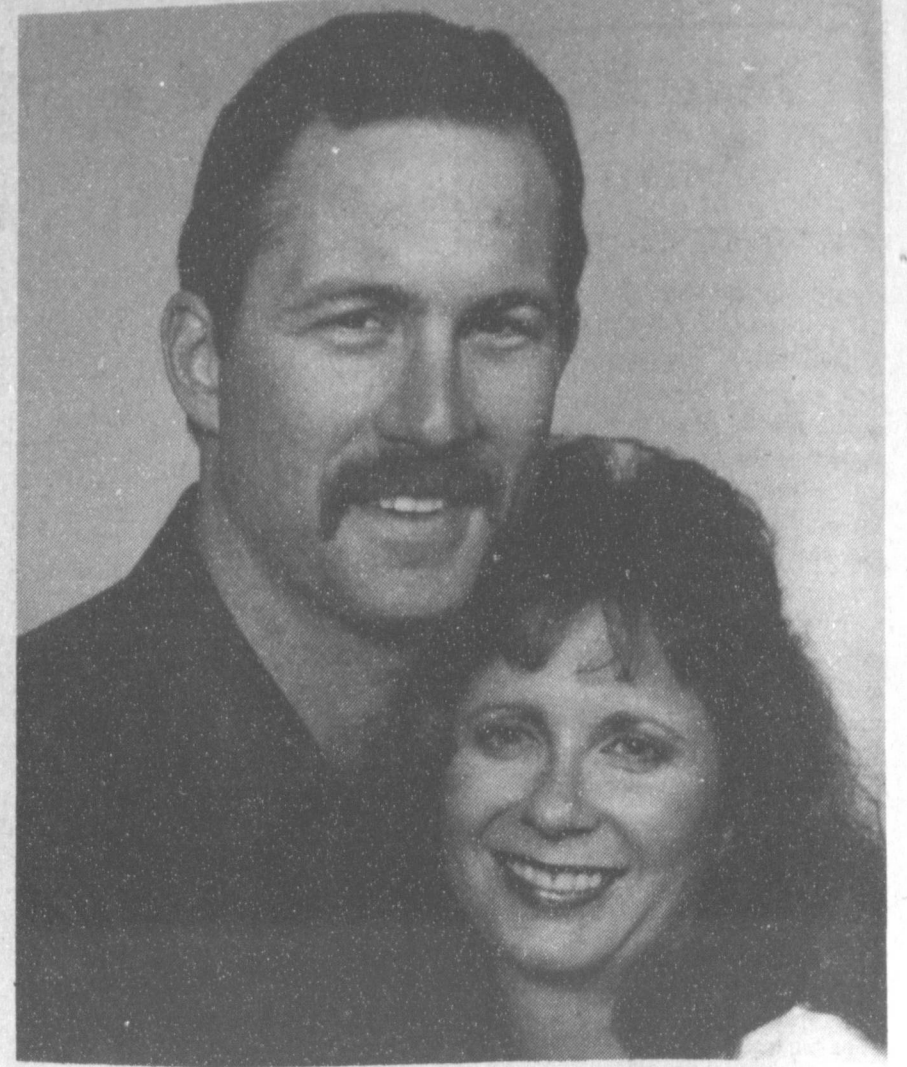

ger. Men and women of the military lie buried in the same way they fought, side by side. Their highest-ranking officer, General of the Armies John J. Pershing asked only for a simple white marker; he was buried atop a hillside surrounded by his soldiers from World War I.

Arlington has room for veteran and like Audie Murphy who distinguish themselves in combat and those like a Technical Sergeant named Joe Louis Barrow, known for his civilian title as Heavyweight Boxing Champion, Joe Louis. History continues with each row of markers. At the Memorial for Desert One's Iranian Hostage Rescue Mission, parents kneel next to their children to explain the significance of the marble and bronze marker. In other sections of the cemetery, children ask about Vietnam, Korea, or the World Wars. At Arlington, parents remember and children learn.

When wreaths are laid at the Tomb of the Unknowns, school children step with the Honor Guard to gently touch the wreath as it is backed into place in front of the large white sarcophagus. As the honor guard gives a hand salute, the school children place their hands over their hearts while the bugle sounds Taps. The attentive look in the eyes of these young people answers the question of whether we are teaching them our traditions and respect for this country.

Arlington will continue to be an active cemetery until the last burial in the year 2020. An average of 15 funerals each day contribute to Arlington's role as a continuing reminder of the men and women whose military service secures our freedom. Arlington National Cemetery is a place of history that teaches us that we owe our children a better understanding of their heritage on each Memorial Day.

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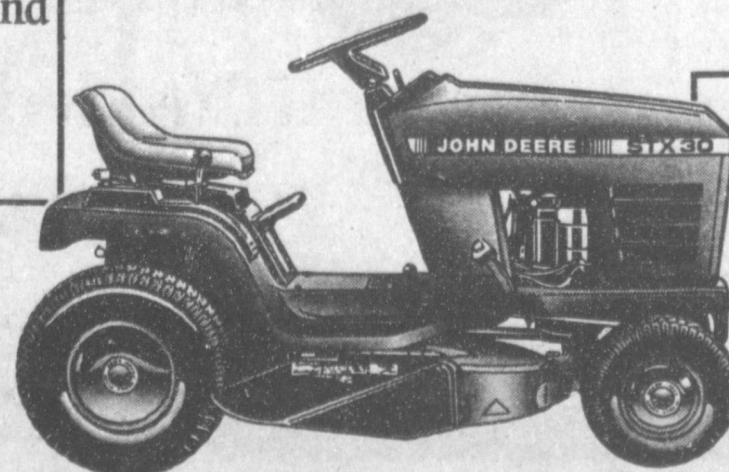

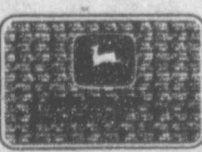

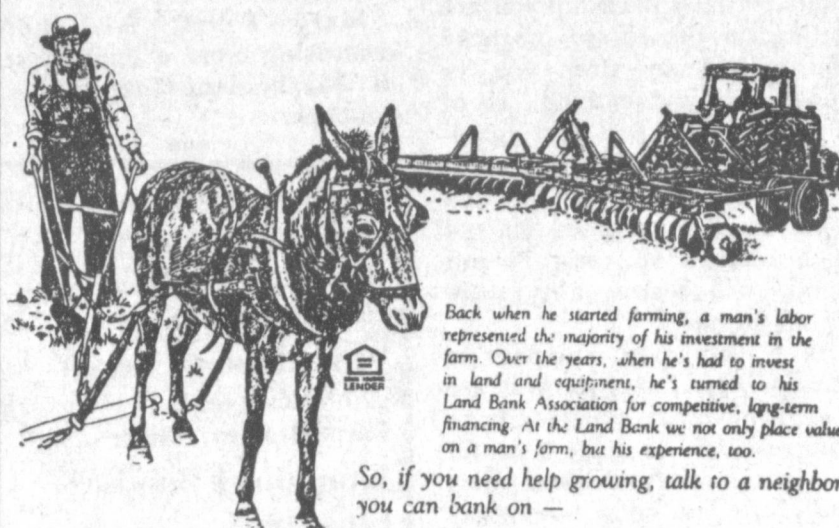

Question? What is happening at Muleshoe High School? Is it only Spring Fever? If so, it has gotten a little bit out of hand this year, students, don't you think so?

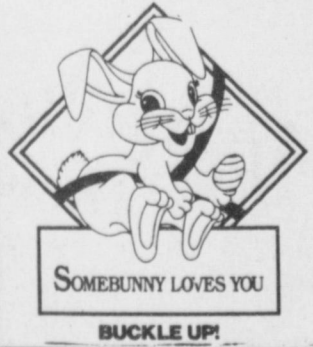

Muleshoe Pulls Off First Playoff Victory

Muleshoe, suffering through a 45-day drought without a win, quenched its thirst in a big-gulp way on Tuesday.

Muleshoe took advantage of six Dalhart errors and lived off the gritty pitching of Larry Gonzales to stun the Wolves 8-5 in Class 3A bi-district baseball action before 200 fans at Randall High.

It was the first baseball

playoff win in Muleshoe history. For first-year Muleshoe coach Paul Davis, the win ended a 10-game losing streak. Davis said the Mules' last victory was on April 7.

"We were in a real slumper," said Davis, dripping wet from having a bucket of water dumped on him. "Boy, this is sweet."

Muleshoe, 8-16 overall and the runner-up in the two-team District 2-3A, advanced to this weekend's area round against Kermit. District 1-3A champion Kermit defeated Fabens 12-1 on Tuesday, Davis said a one-game playoff will be held.

Dalhart saw its second consecutive trip to the playoffs finish in a crash landing. The

Wolves, 10-12 overall, had won six games in a row and earned the No. 1 seed in District 1-3A with a 10-1 trouncing of Childress last week.

But not until the four-run seventh inning, when it was too late, did Dalhart show its potential.

"No excuses," said Dalhart coach Earl Smith. "We got beat. I kept thinking we would get back in the game. But we never did."

One reason for Dalhart's failure: six errors that led to seven unearned runs. The other reason was Muleshoe's Gonzales.

The Mule's rightly entered the game with a 3-10 record. But had revenge on his mind. "Last year Dalhart beat us in bi-district," said Gonzales. "I

didn't get to pitch and I wanted to. We've been waiting for this. We worked hard in practice the last few days. There was no laughing."

Gonzales kept the ball inside on Dalhart hitters and allowed six hits. He struck out nine and didn't walk a batter until the seventh inning.

Gonzales may have sealed Dalhart's fate in the bottom of the fourth inning. At the time, Muleshoe was ahead 1-0 and Gonzales was battling Dalhart starter Eric Keller for king of the hill honors.

Dalhart's Brad Finch looped a double to left field to score pinch runner Zach Shepherd and knot the game 1-1. Travis Combs reached base on an error, then stole second, to put Dalhart runners at second and

third with one out.

But Gonzales then forced a routine fly to first and an infield ground out to shut off the Dalhart rally.

"His (Gonzales) record doesn't show how good he really is," Davis said.

"I still had no doubt we'd score runs," said Dalhart coach Smith.

But it was Muleshoe that busted loose in the fifth and sixth innings.

Thanks to two walks and an error in the fifth inning, Muleshoe scored two runs without a hit for a 3-1 lead. Then in the sixth inning, Muleshoe produced four runs - zero earned - on two Dalhart errors.

Dalhart's sophomore pitcher Keller, 6-2, held Muleshoe to two hits through five innings. But he walked in a run in the sixth inning before giving way

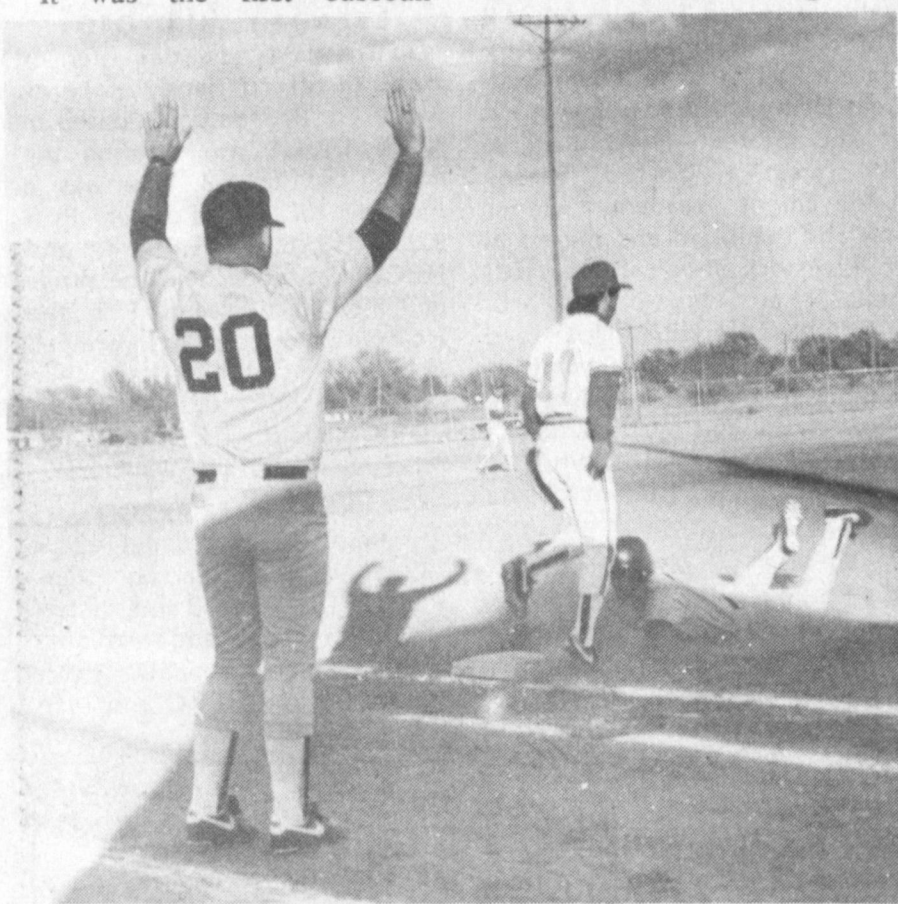
to Nick Zundel, who had to leave the game after the sixth because of a rapid heartbeat, allowed an RBI single to Ricky Flores. Flores' clutch bases-loaded single emptied the bases thanks to a Dalhart throwing error.

Dalhart trailed 8-1 entering the seventh and scored four runs, but it was too late. This was Muleshoe's day.

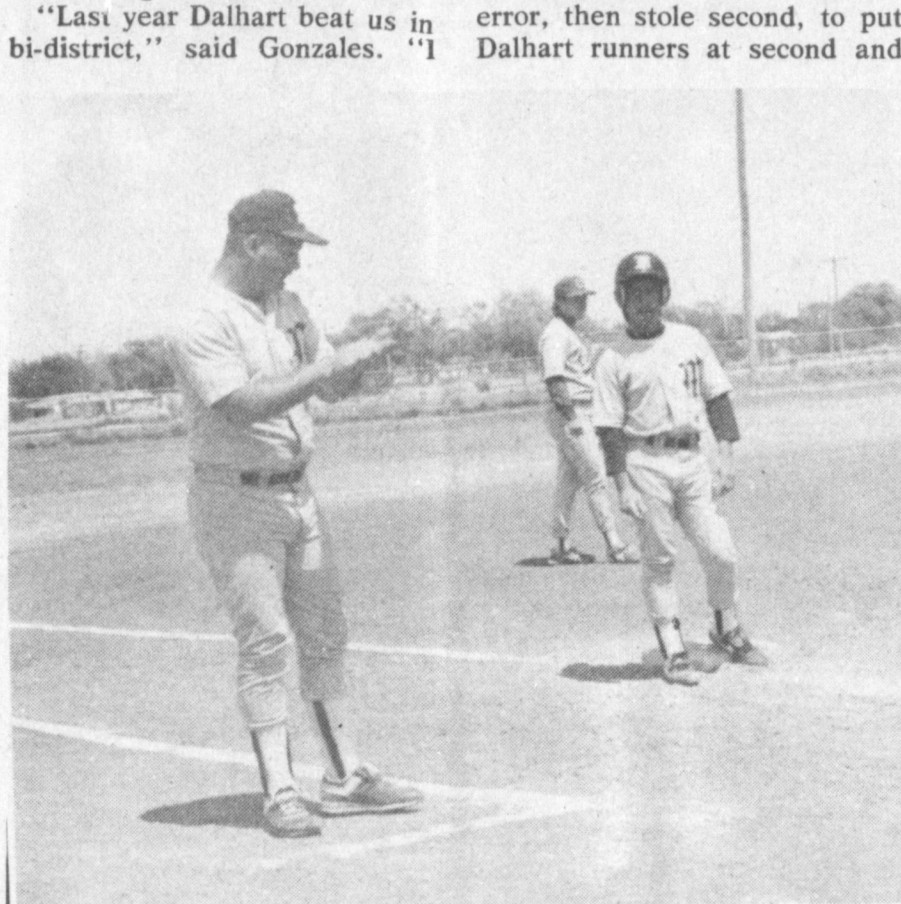
"During the losing streak our spirits were down," said Davis. "But the kids rebounded. It was live or die today (Tuesday)."

The Mules are alive and kicking.

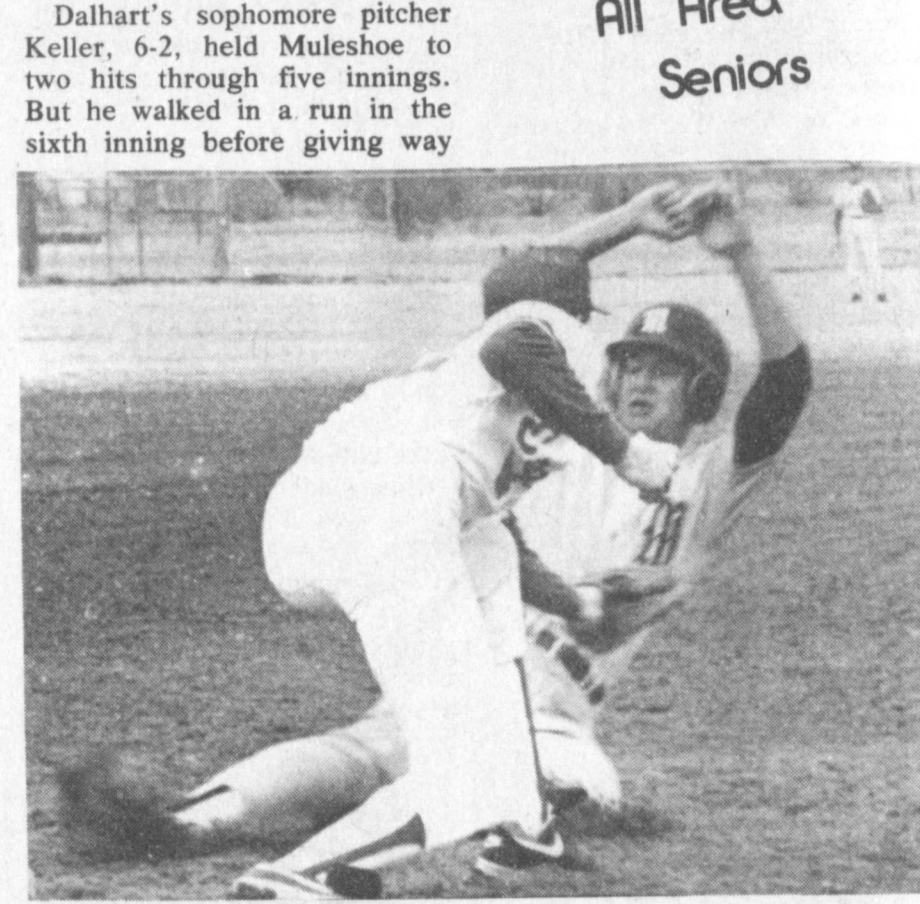
