AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE Congressman Omar Burleson

WASHINGTON, D. C.-UNDER THE PROVISIONS of legislation passed in the last Congress, there will be five experimental plants built in the United States to convert salt water to fresh water. A new lower cost method has been developed since 1957 at a plant located in North Caro-lina. Experiments in a small plant near Wichita Falls have produced most satisfying results. OF THE FIVE PLANTS to be Derived most satisfying results, OF THE FIVE PLANTS to be built by the Federal Government, one will be located on the At-lantic Seabord, one on the Paci-fic, and one on the Oulf Coast The other two plants will be lo-cated inland to convert "brack-ish" water to fresh water. West Central Texas certainly has an abundance of brackish water to convert. Efforts are being made to convince officials of the De-partment of the Interior of the feasibility of locating such an plant in the 17th Congressional District. Competition with this effort is not only provided by other areas in the State of Tex-as, but by New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and many others.
