## Rodeo starts tonight

Riders and ropers from throughout the Panhandle-Plains area and surrounding states will compete in the three-night Dimmitt Rodeo tonight, Friday and Saturday.

The Grand Entry at 8 o'clock tonight (Thursday) will officially launch the 1978 rodeo. Friday's and Saturday's performances also will begin at 8 p.m.

Dimmitt Rodeo Association members have put the local arena in top shape. The bleachers have a fresh coat of paint; lights, pens and fences have been refurbished; and the arena turf has been reworked.

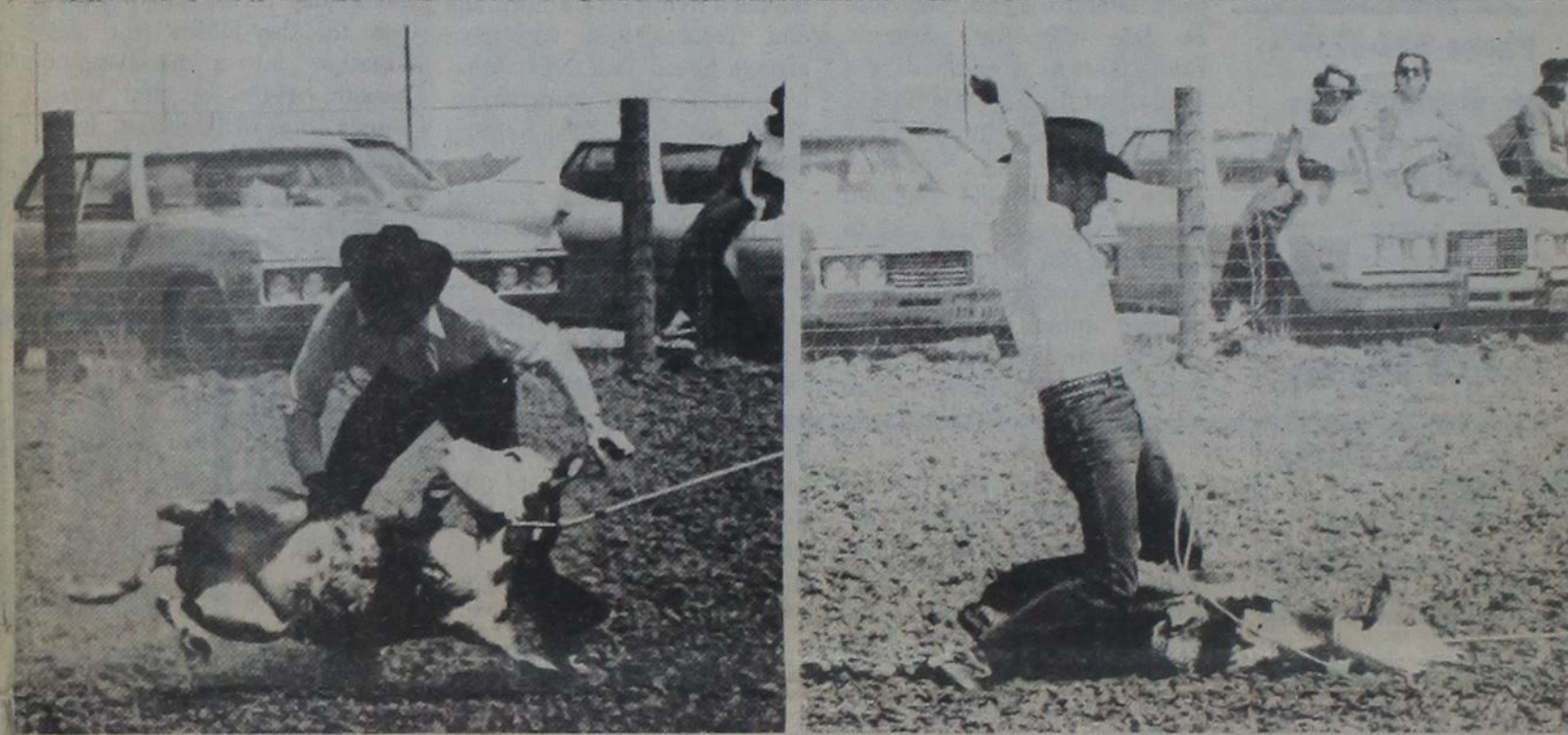
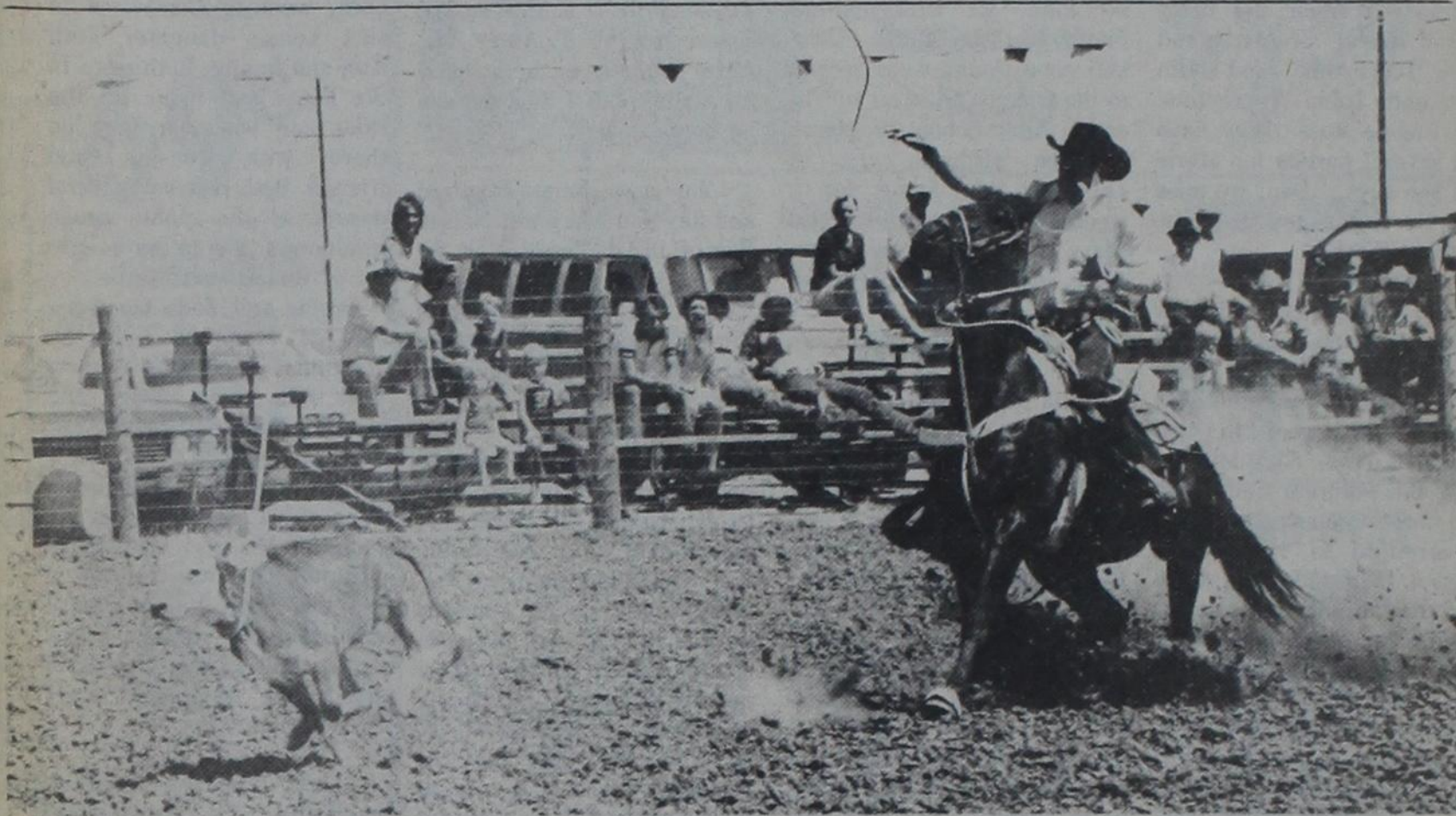
In addition to the arena action, rodeo weekend will include a parade and barbecue Saturday, and the crowning of the 1978 Rodeo Queen at Saturday night's performance.

The rodeo will feature six regular events and four special events each night.

Regular events will include bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, team roping, calf roping, bull riding and barrel racing.

Special events will be a kids' calf scramble for boys and girls 10 and younger; a stick-horse race for cowboys and cowgirls 5 and younger; a "hide race," in which a horseback rider drags a steer hide with his partner on it around a marked course; and a wild cow milking contest for four-person teams.

### First wheat is harvested

A reasonable amount of criticism of President Carter, or any president, is needed and justified, but there should be some restraint at least by some of the people who helped elect him. There is no doubt that he has failed to accomplish some, or many, of the things that he promised to do during the election campaign. However, his opponent was also making promises in the heat of the election campaign.

On domestic issues the president, by popular opinion polls, has had very low marks. It is possible that many of his detractors fail to take into account the sad state of affairs when he was inaugurated. He did inherit many problems created under previous administrations.

He did take office in January of 1977, at a time when huge surpluses of farm products had already accumulated and at a time when it was too late to restrict increases in the surpluses by the upcoming crop. The program adopted by the US Department of Agriculture, with the President's blessings, failed to anywhere near comply with the demands of the American Agriculture movement. However, with the cooperation of agriculture, the present government program may result in a healthy farm economy. The government did come through with low interest rate loans to tide farmers over the depressed prices of farm commodities caused by a production glut encouraged by former administrations.

The 1978 wheat harvest began in Castro County this week, with the first load reported by Farmers Grain at Hart. It was received Saturday morning from the Hill Farms and was cut Friday afternoon.

Manager DeWayne Brown said the load measured 13.2 percent moisture content and 60 pounds per bushel test weight.

A second load was received at Farmers Grain at 8 a.m. Monday from Arnold Gilcrease. It tested 60 pounds in weight also, and the moisture content was 13.9 percent. Dimmitt Agri Industries received its first load at 11:30 a.m. Monday, from the Fulcher place north of Dimmitt. It was delivered to DAI's North Point elevator six miles north of the city by Bill Potts.

Test weight was 58 pounds per bushel and moisture measured 9 percent, according to Bill Clark, DAI manager.

Wheat yield in this area is expected to be down substantially from last year. Charley Hill, director of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office here says this is partly because of reduced acreage.

"Quite a lot of wheat was grazed out this spring," he said, "and the yield will be cut also because of damage done by the drought earlier this year and the scattered hail recently."

Drought was a factor even on irrigated wheat, he said, and County Extension Agent Charles Hottel also mentioned that point. Both said the growers used as little water as possible on their crops be-

cause fuel prices are so high. "Wheat price prospects are not good this year, so farmers have been unwilling to spend any more to produce a crop than was necessary," Hottel said.

### Longtime city resident dies

Jess English, Dimmitt resident for 50 years, died Thursday in Plainview after a lengthy illness. Services were held Saturday at the Bedford Street Church of Christ with burial following at Castro Memorial Gardens. Dale Wells, pastor of the church, officiated.

Mr. English, the son of R. L. and Flora English, was born Nov. 30, 1893 in Montague County, Texas. He came to Dimmitt in 1928 and farmed southwest of town until 1949.

He moved into town that year and worked for the T. A. Singer Telephone Company and later for Nelson Drilling and Pump Company. He retired around 1971 and was a member of the Bedford Street Church of Christ.

Mr. English is survived by his five sisters, Dorothy Bell of Plainview, Frankie Oakes of Putnam, Okla., Texie Robnett, Ruth Thomas and Irma Lee Winton, all of Duncan, Okla.; two brothers, Ivan English of Waurika, Okla. and Jewell English of Seiling, Okla. Nephews were pallbearers.

### Lions to dish up food during rodeo

The Dimmitt United Lions Club will serve the Rodeo Barbecue Saturday evening, and also will operate the concession stand at the arena throughout the rodeo weekend.

The Rodeo Barbecue will be held at the County Expo Building immediately after the parade Saturday afternoon. Prices will be \$3 per plate for adults and \$1.75 for children under 12.

During the rodeo performances Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, the United Lions Club will have hot dogs, popcorn, soft drinks, coffee and snacks available at the arena's concession stand.

### Rodeo dances set Friday, Saturday

"Whiplash" will provide the live music for the Dimmitt Rodeo Dances at 9 o'clock Friday and Saturday nights in the County Expo Building.

The popular Dimmitt combo, composed of Jerry Frazier, Perry Graham, Steve Birdwell and Gary Crum, will perform western and western-pop music for dancing.

Admission will be \$3 stag and \$5 drag.

### Parade set for Saturday at 4

Past, present and future will blend in the Saturday afternoon parade planned as a highlight of rodeo festivities in Dimmitt this weekend, with a theme of "Stone Age to Wild West to Space Age."

Starting from the grounds of the Castro County Expo Building at 4 p.m. the parade will move over Dimmitt streets with entries in 16 divisions.

The parade will form up facing north alongside the Expo Building. From there, the parade route will be north to Jones St., west on Jones to SW 3rd, north one block to Bedford, east on Bedford to Broadway, south on Broadway to Jones, then east on Jones and back to the Expo Building.

Last-minute entrants will be received at the Expo grounds, or entry may still be made at the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce office.

J.R. Brown and Bob Caddell are serving as parade

chairmen and are assisted by division managers, members of the Dimmitt Lions Club. Chuck Braflaadt and Joe Jossel will have the job of lining up the entrants.

Parade units are to be at the Expo grounds by 3 p.m. to register and the division chairmen will direct the forming-up and judge each division between 3 and 3:30 p.m. so winners can be announced to parade spectators.

Dimmitt City Police will lead the line of march, followed by the Castro County Sheriff's Department car and then a US Marine Corps color guard from Amarillo. Mayor and Mrs. Elmer Youts, County Judge and Mrs. Weldon Bradley will occupy the next car, just ahead of Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department trucks.

Ribbons will be awarded to the girl and the boy on the best decorated bicycles. Best-dressed cowgirl and cowboy

will be picked from the riders' division, also judges will name Little Mr. Britches and Little Miss Britches.

Prizes will be given also for the most original entry and the youngest rider. The riders' division will include buggies as well as those riding horses.

Blue ribbons for bicyclists will designate the best dec-

orated boys' bike, best decorated girls' bike, best boys' costume, best girls' costume, most original decoration and youngest rider.

In all other categories, ribbons will be given for first, second and third places.

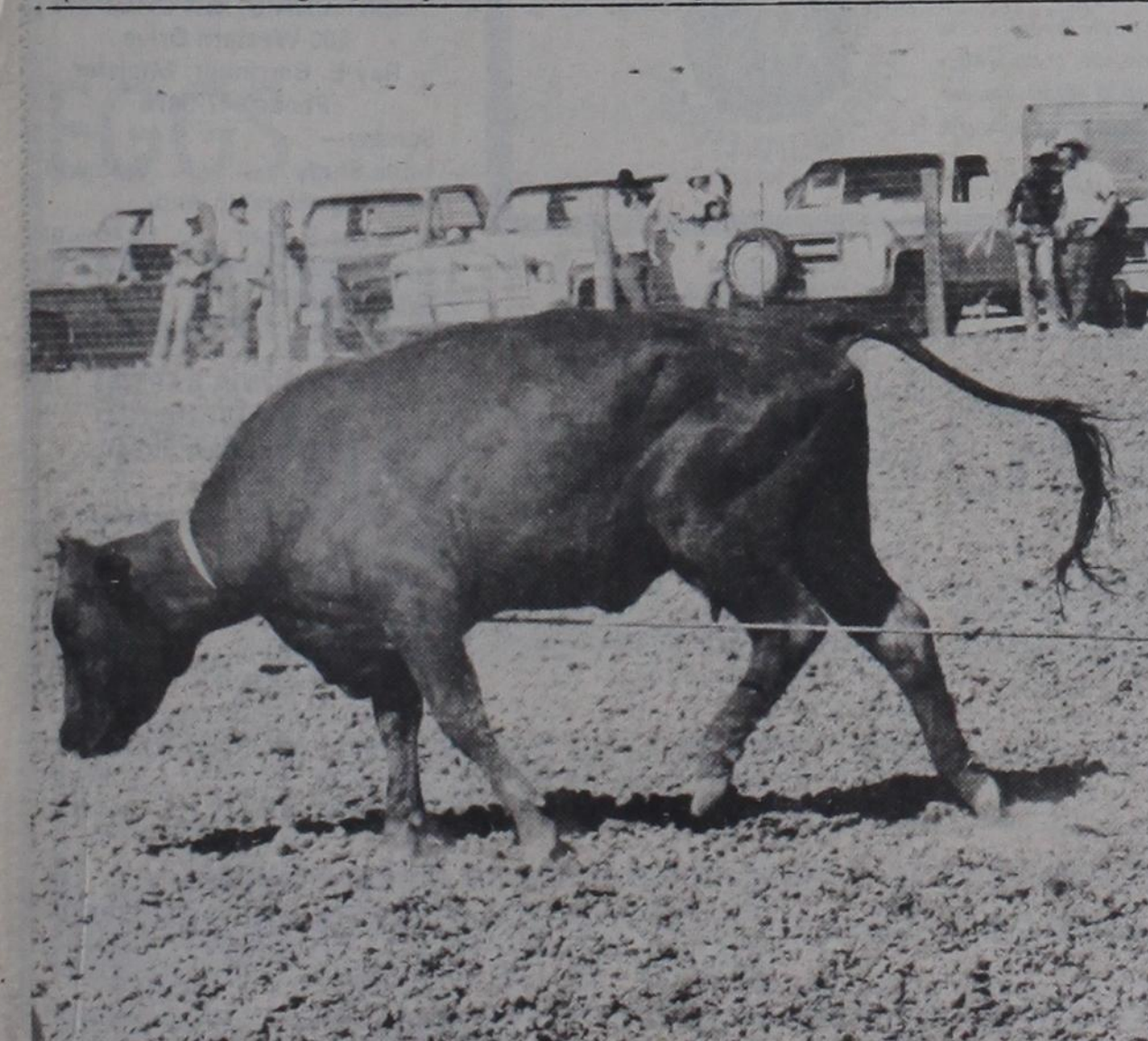

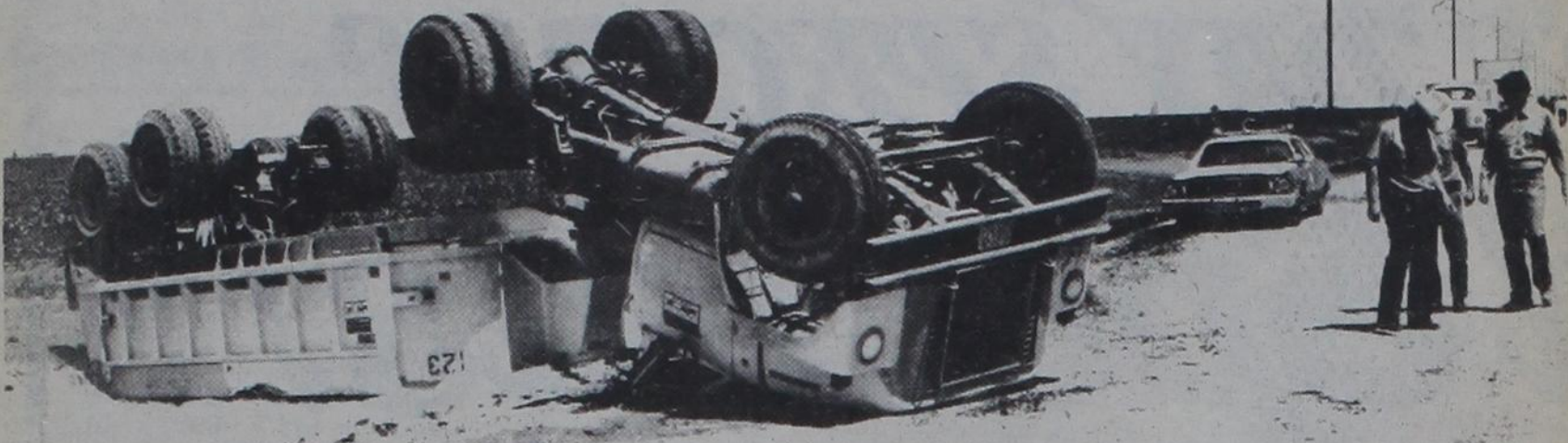

compete in each regular event each night. Entry fee is \$30 per go-round. The rodeo books opened at 10 a.m. Wednesday and will close at noon today (Thursday). Those wishing to enter should call the special rodeo number, 647-4351, or report to the rodeo office at the arena.

In the hide race, a \$5 entry fee will be charged and the winners will get the pot. Four two-person teams will compete in the hide race each night.

No entry fee will be charged for the wild cow milking contest or the children's events. The milking contest will be restricted to four to six teams per night.

"There will be different contestants in each event nearly every night," Rodeo Secretary Luan Ebeling said. "Many of them will be competing in rodeos at Dimmitt, Clovis and Hereford this weekend, and some of them will take part in all three rodeos the same night."

To help control the cost of the rodeo, members of the Rodeo Association will be working for free at jobs that usually are paid. The rodeo is expected to cost at least \$4,000 to stage.

This is the first time in 11 years for the annual Dimmitt Rodeo to be held in June. Since 1966 it has been a feature of Roundup Week in August, but has been moved back to June this year to attract more "rodeo circuit" performers and avoid a conflict with the start of school.

Also, the rodeo has a new stock supplier this year—James Martin of Spearman.

In the Rodeo Queen contest, the voting deadline has been extended until 5 p.m. Friday. Votes are a penny apiece, and the six contestants have five canisters each at different businesses in the city. Contestants' canisters will be picked up between 4:30 and 5 p.m. Friday at those businesses that aren't open Saturdays. The Rodeo Queen will be announced, crowned and awarded a decorative belt buckle at Saturday night's performance.

**Working student may be due some tax breaks**

If you are a student or are a parent of a student who is planning to work this summer, you may be entitled to some tax breaks, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The IRS points out that students who expect to gross less than \$2,950 in 1978 do not have to pay federal withholding taxes if they did not pay income tax for 1977. Also, a married student does not have to pay taxes if he or she expects to gross, with spouse, less than \$3,600. The Form W4, which employers can supply, is used to stop withholding.

The IRS advises parents that they may claim their son or daughter as a dependent regardless of how much income their child earns providing he or she meets basic dependency tests and are full-time students for any part of five months of 1978. One of the main dependency tests is that the parents must furnish their son or daughter more than one-half total support.

On the liability side of the ledger, students employed in businesses where they may receive tips of \$20 or more a month at any one job are reminded by the IRS that such income is taxable. The amount of these tips should be reported to employers, and a daily record of tips should be kept showing the employer's name, date and amount of tips received.

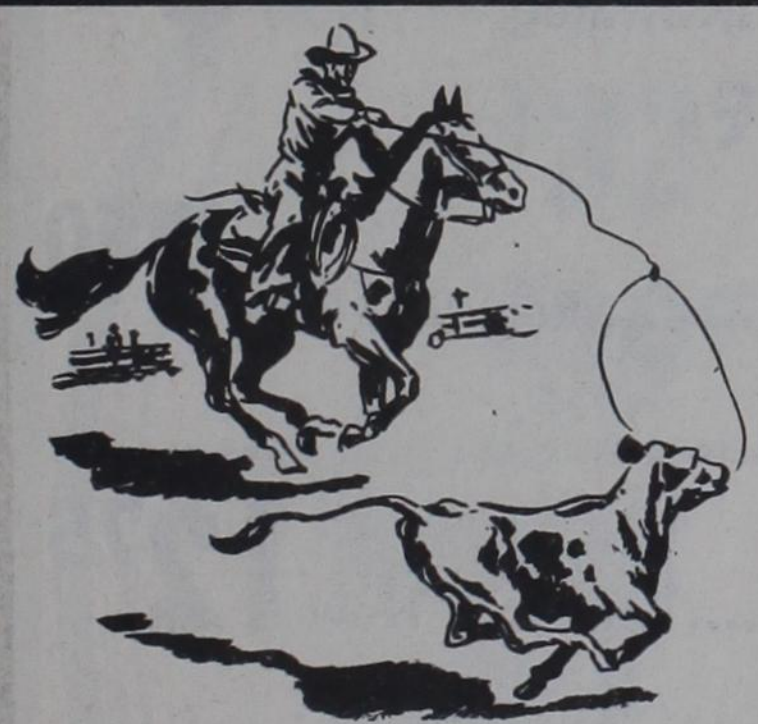

# Highway work in city reaches middle of downtown section

Construction work on East Hwy. 86 reached the Broadway-Bedford intersection in downtown Dimmitt Tuesday, in the first phase of a project to completely rebuild the two major highways through the city.

The south side of East Bedford from the east edge of town has been excavated 11 inches below the present gutter line, and workmen will turn south on Broadway and tear out the east half of that street to Belsher, two blocks, to complete Phase 1 of the \$927,000 project.

Parking is still permitted along the north curb of E. Bedford and around the courthouse. Also, parking is available in alleyways behind business houses as well as on side streets. High Plains Savings & Loan and the First State Bank have both announced

their parking lots will be open to the public during the project.

Shoppers will be able to park within a half block of any downtown store throughout the construction period, according to the Jake Diel Construction Co. and the Texas Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation which have assured businessmen that the work will be carried out to keep business interruptions to a minimum.

Only half-widths at a time will be torn out in the streets and work will be done in sections so two-way traffic and parking at curbs can continue on half of a street.

If the next phase of the project, tearing out the two-block section on Broadway from Bedford to Belsher Streets, is done before Saturday it will cross Jones

Street where the Dimmitt Rodeo Parade is scheduled to come through.

Parade officials said they were told by the Highway Department, however, that a ramp will be built across Jones if necessary.

Phase 2 of the construction will begin after all old pavement in the Phase 1 area is torn out and crews have laid base material and then a layer of asphalt and stabilized base, so that side of the streets will be usable again.

Starting at the FW&D Railway crossing at the north edge of the city, Phase 2 will be rebuilding the east half of Hwy. 385 to the downtown stop light, then the remaining half of Hwy. 86 back to the Phase 1 starting point.

Phase 3 will work on the west half of US 385 from the railroad crossing to Belsher. In two stages, Phase 4 will be work on W. Bedford from the Broadway intersection to 10th St., half the width at a time, according to Rhea Bradley, project engineer with the State Highway Dept.

# Howard Quiett is new Methodist pastor

Rev. Howard Quiett assumed his duties this week as new minister of the First United Methodist Church of Dimmitt, coming from the Quana Methodist Church where he and his family served four years.

## Beet sugar loan raised

The loan rate on refined beet sugar was increased by 1.33 cents per pound, according to Charley E. Hill of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The new loan rate is 15.57 cents per pound, effective immediately.

Processors who have outstanding loans made under the old rate of 14.24 cents per pound may request the new rate. ASCS officials say there will be no change in the 13.5 cents per pound loan rate for raw cane sugar.

The refined beet sugar loan rate was increased to cover fixed marketing costs which processors must bear, and to place raw cane sugar and refined beet sugar loan rates more nearly in line with historical market relationships.

## 993 county farms listed in set-aside

A total of 993 farms in Castro County were enrolled in the 1978 Set-Aside Programs as of May 31, according to Charley E. Hill of the Agriculture Stabilization & Conservation Service office here.

These farms intend to set aside 13,566.6 acres of wheat, 12,755.7 acres of corn, 67.5 acres of barley, and 3,386.2 acres of sorghum.

ASCS officials say participating farms will also divert an additional 2,081.8 acres of cotton and 13,999.5 acres of feed grains, and have designated 9,771.9 acres of wheat to be grazed or cut for hay.

Farmers who participate in the set-aside programs are eligible for price support loans, disaster payments, and deficiency payment.

# County adopts \$932,200 base budget

A \$274,000 excess is included in the 1978-79 budget which was unanimously approved at the Monday meeting of the Castro County Commissioners' Court.

The total budget allows for expenditures of \$932,200, with receipts estimated at \$969,550 and a beginning balance of \$237,645.

County Auditor Harold Irlbeck told the court that about the only way to increase revenue at this time would be to raise taxes. The commission-

ers tabled further discussion on that possibility until after the meetings of the tax equalization boards.

In other business, the commissioners discussed two road improvement projects and approved a \$2,584.92 expenditure in Precinct 2.

Both improvement projects were tabled until estimates could be obtained. One project involves the road just north of the city dump grounds, and the other is to a feedlot in the northeast part

of the county.

The expense in Precinct 2 was a payment to Pioneer Natural Gas Co. for work in clearing the right of way in last year's improvements on FM 1524.

The commissioners also discussed:

-The need for fencing an area for the Sheriff's Department to use in impounding cars or protecting the cars of county prisoners.

-A lease-purchase agreement on a used tractor and shredder for Precinct 3.

-Changing the method of payment of the county's portion of the rent of the Mental Health-Mental Retardation building in Dimmitt.

Also, a representative of the Community Action program in Dimmitt discussed how the Commissioners' Court could refer needy persons for housing assistance.

The court studied further information on the status of the Southwestern Public Service Company's rate-change proposal.

## Buddy Pierce hired as Longhorns' coach

Buddy Pierce was employed as athletic director and head football coach for the 1978-79 school year in Hart High School, at a recent called meeting of the Hart Independ-

ent School District's board of trustees.

Pierce, who comes from a similar position in the Garrison School District, will replace Coach Bill Taylor, who resigned at the close of the past school term.

At the regular meeting of the Hart school board Monday, Pierce submitted an athletic budget totaling \$14,083 for the next school year and it was approved by the board.

Other faculty members employed for the coming term were Marsha Su Cox in the language arts department and Patsy Pierce as an elementary teacher.

Resignations were accepted from girls' coach Kim Ratliff, Diana Long, Deanne Vance, Lanette Henry, Lonnie Joe Howell, Rosalind and Steve Ragsdale and Pamela Bates.

In other action the school board rejected a bid on a 1969 Chevrolet bus and will advertise again for bids on the vehicle; approved student insurance for the next year; approved contracted service fees relating to Title I, drug education and crime prevention, from the Region 16 Service Center; and approved contracted services of a Lubbock firm to maintain typewriters.

According to highway patrolmen, Roberto Gonzales of Hart was treated for minor cuts and bruises while Mrs. Margaret Acker of Nazareth received a broken collar bone.

The accident occurred when a south-bound 1974 Ford Maverick driven by Mrs. Acker reportedly crossed the path of the west-bound truck and the two vehicles collided.

Mrs. Acker had just halted at the north stop sign and reportedly did not see the oncoming truck, which was bound for the road construction site in Dimmitt.

An ambulance was called to the scene and the two were taken to the hospital. The accident is still being investigated by the Highway Patrol.

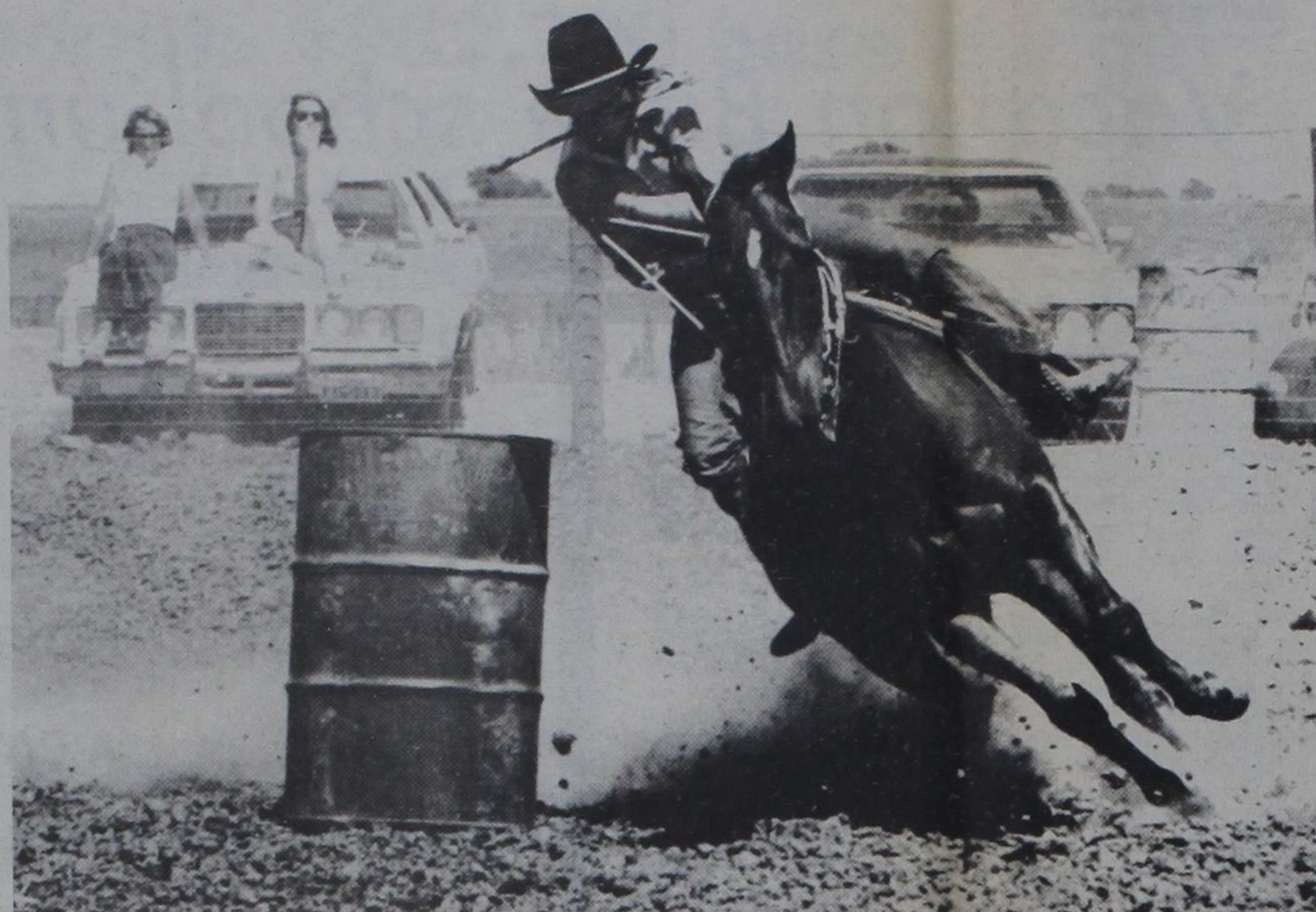

**Cotton loss reports due**

Due to the recent hail storm there has been some cotton lost, and May 31 was the final planting date for cotton in Castro County, according to

Charley E. Hill, Castro County ASCS executive director.

"This doesn't mean that you could not plant cotton after this date, and still be covered by low yield provisions of the disaster program," Hill said, "but in any case you will need to come by the ASCS office prior to making other use of the land, complete form ASCS-574 certifying to all your cotton acreage on the farm including the acres you wish to make other use of."

"We will not only make appraisal on the cotton loss, but also as to the accuracy of the reported acreage," he added. "The above also applies to grain sorghum and corn affected by a natural disaster."

The final planting date for grain sorghum is June 20 and May 31 for corn.

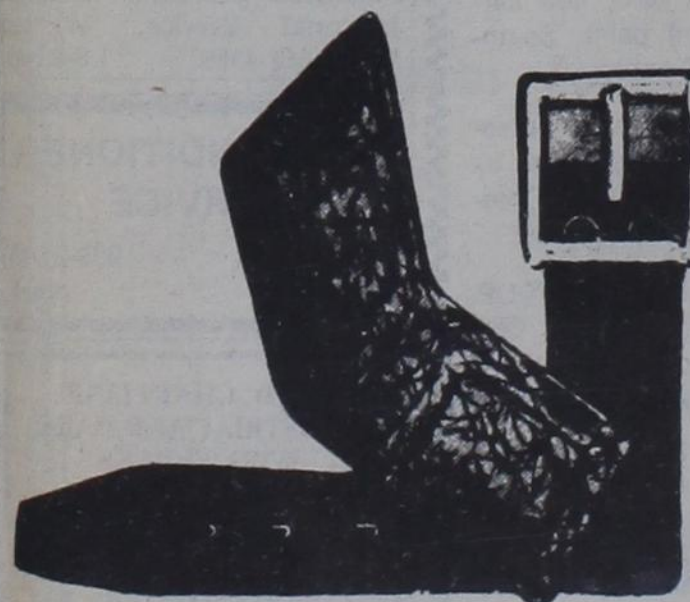

**On Wall Street**

Would you believe a black market in railroad grain cars? It's true. But the shortage of all railroad grain has spread far beyond the grain belt. There is no end in sight because the supply of railroad cars is still shrinking.

The squeeze in grain cars is a result of having to handle two harvests at one time. There is the new winter wheat crop and last year's grain crop, which farmers held for higher prices. Grain exports are up, prices are climbing and farmers are unloading.

The current quote for a black market grain car is \$250 under the table. A shipper can make as much as 30 cents per bushel additional profit if he can just get the grain shipped.

There is a severe shortage of gondola cars. The supply of these cars has dropped from 280,000 in the mid 1950's to 160,000 today. As utilities and other coal users ordered up extra coal supplies to replenish depleted reserves resulting from the coal strike, a reported daily shortage of 7,000 open hopper cars developed. There was a shortage of 5,000 gondola cars and 31,000 covered hopper cars. There is even a shortage of 13,000 boxcars.

Railcar shortages are expensive for both shippers and railroads. A major grain company reported that it lost \$500,000 in the last three months because of lack of equipment. Some shippers are turning to barges and trucks, even though operators

have jacked up their prices substantially. Grain elevator operators buy grain from farmers based on the published rail tariffs. But when they use more expensive means of shipping grain in unregulated carriers such as barges and trucks, they will reflect the higher shipping cost in what they pay the farmer.

There is no immediate solution to the problem. Railroads are ordering additional cars but manufacturing backlogs are huge and deliveries are falling behind.

**Continental to aid Egypt's phone system**

Continental Telephone Corp., General Telephone & Electronics Corp., and Western Electric Co. have agreed to develop a joint proposal for providing the necessary services, facilities and equipment to meet the Arab Republic of Egypt's requirements for its 20-year telecommunications development plan.

The joint proposal is expected to be made to the Egyptian government within the next several weeks.

President Anwar Sadat and senior Egyptian government officials met at Cairo recently with Continental Telephone Corp. Chairman Charles Wohlstetter and executives of the other firms.

According to State Treasurer Warren G. Harding, state cigarette stamp collections for May were \$27,071,883 — 4.463 million more than during April, and the largest in the history of the cigarette tax collections.

A comparison of the first nine months of this fiscal year and the first nine months of last year show that cigarette tax collections increased by \$10,117,660.

**Texas Cattle Raisers protest beef imports**

The Carter Administration's decision to suspend beef import quota limits triggered strong reaction from the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. The Fort Worth-based group represents 14,000 cow-calf producers in Texas and surrounding states.

In a telegram sent Thursday to Robert S. Strauss, Carter's ambassador for trade negotiations, the Cattle Raisers called the move by Carter "intensely disappointing."

Copies of the telegram, signed by John B. Armstrong, TSCRA president, and other officers, were sent to Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland, Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen and Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe.

The Cattle Raisers had been in close contact for the last 10 days with the Administration urging that President Carter not make any decision that would result in depressed prices for beef producers.

In the telegram, Armstrong reminds Strauss that the consumer price index has increased 43 per cent and per capita disposable income has gone up 55 per cent since 1973, the last time live cattle prices reached the levels they are at today. He added, "Throughout this period, we cattlemen have been subsidizing consumers with the best food bargains in the marketplace, while we have taken the worst financial bloodbath in this century."

The cattlemen want President Carter to withdraw opposition to the Bentsen Bill, which would automatically provide for decreased imports during periods of domestic oversupply and increased imports in periods of short supply. The bill, a major overhaul of the Beef Import Act of 1964, has the support of cattlemen nationwide.

They also ask that Strauss

make every effort to open up the market for American beef in Japan, a nation "with a very favorable trade balance and the highest beef market in the world."

Armstrong, in a telephone interview from his South Texas ranch, said that most cow-calf producers in Texas do not sell their calves until the fall of the year and, as a result, have not enjoyed any significant profits from the increased beef prices of recent weeks.

Carter's move will let in 200 million pounds of foreign beef, but according to US Department of Agriculture analysts, the price of hamburger to consumers will be reduced only three cents a pound.

"The impact of this political move on prices will be small, but the psychological damage to cattle producers will be considerable. Without an incentive to expand beef herds, cow-calf producers will continue to cut back and that could mean decreased beef supplies and higher beef prices down the road," Armstrong said.
