New phone services available in Winters beginning May 22

Effective May 22nd, GTE is bringing the most advanced technology and services to Winters—making your telephone service more efficient, faster, and quieter. You'll hear a slightly different dial tone, and you'll have to dial the seven-digit number for all local calls.

Beginning May 22nd, unless you have GTE's optional Touch Call Service, pushbutton phones will place calls only if the phone's switch is on "pulse." Phones on "tone" will not operate. Touch Call Service allows you to place calls and use other optional services faster and easier.

GTE's new Calling Number ID (CNID) service is being offered in Winters along with a wide variety of other new services. CNID shows the incoming caller's number on a CNID unit—a phone or phone attachment with a display window—if the call originated in the local calling area. Certain phone attachments store time, date, and phone numbers of calls.

CNID units are available at GTE Phone Marts and other stores specializing in communications equipment. An adjunct device which stores up to sixty calls can be rented from GTE. Customers may also purchase CNID units with varying storage capacities from GTE with prices ranging from \$44.95 to \$69.95.

"We're delighted to offer GTE customers these new services that deliver some of the most advanced technology of the modern telephone network into people's homes and small businesses," said Durwood Wilkinson, Area Manager—Customer Operations for GTE's West Central district. "We've found people appreciate

having more control over their phone, such as knowing who's calling them before they answer the phone."

Other new services that will be available include:

* **Automatic Busy Re-Dial.** This service keeps trying a busy number and rings you back when your number and the called number are free.

* **Automatic Call Return.** Stores the number of the last call you received and lets you return that call at your convenience even though the caller has hung up.

* **Call Block.** Intercepts calls from up to twelve numbers you establish and informs those callers their call is not being accepted.

* **Special Call Acceptance.** Allows you to list up to twelve telephone numbers from which you want to receive calls. Other calls are routed to a recorded announcement that says you are not accepting calls.

* **Special Call Forwarding.** Lets you decide which telephone numbers, up to twelve, get through to you when you are at another number.

* **VIP Alert.** Identifies up to twelve important callers by the sound of the ring.

* **Call Tracing Service.** Allows tracing of harassing, threatening, or obscene calls. By using the assigned code, the caller's number, as well as the date and time of the call, are sent automatically to GTE's Security Department in case further action is required.

The new services are in addition to SmartCall Services which include:

* **Call Waiting.** Gives you a tone when a person is calling while you are on another call.

* **Cancel Call Waiting.** Lets you cancel the call waiting feature anytime you want to avoid call interruption.

* **Call Forwarding.** Lets you forward your incoming calls to another local or long-distance company.

* **Speed Calling-8.** Stores up to eight of the most often called or emergency numbers for quick dialing.

* **Three-Way Calling.** Allows you to talk to two people in different locations at the same time—no matter who placed the call.

Another valuable service named Anonymous Call Rejection, allows the customer to reject calls from any caller who refuses to reveal their number and can be added to residence or business CNID for \$3.50 per month. Details will be announced in your monthly billing.

Per-call and per-line blocking options also are available.

SmartCall services are optional services available in most areas to most customers and will work on most calls to prefixes within your local calling area.

Costs of each service for residential and commercial customers will be announced in monthly bills.

You will be able to choose your long-distance provider: beginning May 22nd, you'll be able to use the long-distance company of your choice for calls you make to locations outside of your GTE long-distance calling area. "1+" and "0+" calls made within your long-distance calling area are handled by GTE.

Residential customers with questions about these services should call toll-free to 1-800-483-4400 and business customers should call 1-800-483-5400.

Light voter turnout seen in Saturday's three local elections

Three new names have been added to the WISD Board of Trustees following Saturday's local elections.

Debbie Sudduth defeated Barron Guy by a vote of 63 to 24 for the only contested spot in District 5. Jack Davis, Jr. ran unopposed in District 2, and received 15 votes. Rodrick Bredemeyer was the sole candidate in the at-large place in District 6, and re-

ceived 129 votes.

Retiring WISD Board members are Joe Bryan, who has served as trustee for 15 years; Gary Pinkerton, who has served for 18 years; and Charles Allcorn, who has served for 12 years.

In the race for city councilman, incumbent Nelan Bahlman received 13 votes to win over Robert Cery's 8 votes for the district

2 contest. Incumbents Shirley Hall and Garry Goff ran unopposed in Districts 4 and 5, respectively. Hall received 23 votes. Goff received 53.

Three candidates ran unopposed for three spots on the board of directors for North Runnels Hospital. Sidney Tucker received 89 votes; Teresa Davis received 116 votes; and Tobin Burns received 125 votes.

City council hires park employee

Business was light in the 12-minute city council meeting on Monday.

An official canvassing of votes in the city council election on Saturday was done. The official count was determined to be Nelan Bahlman - 13, Robert Cery - 8 for place 2 on the city council; Shirley Hall - 23, for place 4; and

Garry Goff - 53, for place 5.


Mayor Dawson McGuffin administered the Oath of Office to Bahlman and Hall; Goff was absent for the meeting and will be sworn in at a later date.

Members of the council approved payment of \$5.00 per hour to the election officials. Also approved was a request from the

The council voted to hire Cotton Hubbard as a part-time park employee at a rate of \$5.00 per hour.

Minutes and bills were approved and the meeting was adjourned at 6:12 p.m.

OIL BUSINESS

Is there any truth to the rumor that oil is no longer king in Texas?

At least in terms of economic impact, oil and gas are no longer the sole provider of support for the economic infrastructure for this great state. Electronics, intellectual property, and manufacturing have taken a big leap forward in the last 15 years, and petroleum has a smaller piece of a larger economic pie as a result.

In the late 1970's and early 1980's, the severance tax from oil and gas was the lifeblood of the state budget in Austin. When oil prices stopped their meteoric rise in 1982, panic swept the aisles of the Texas legislature, as many elected officials had bet the farm on ever-increasing oil and gas prices to provide ever-larger government expenditures.

At that time, oil and gas tax revenues accounted for almost half of the state's income.

But, somehow, collapse was avoided, even as oil prices halved in 1986. Government continued and the pre-occupation with oil prices that elected leaders, and, to a large extent, the entire state populace, possessed slowly faded.

But, you may ask, how was catastrophe averted. Oil and gas prices have been flat or down for 10 years. What gives?

Slowly, but surely, the entrepreneurial spirit that was reserved mainly for the oil patch in Texas spread throughout the state's economy. Computers, information, service, and manufacturing has come of age, both in employment level and in raw economic impact.

Oil and gas tax revenue now only account for 12% of state government income. A huge amount, considering the size of the state's economy, but much less respectively than Texas was accustomed to in the '60's and '70's.

Here's the really neat part. Oil and gas are no longer the only big economic stick Texan's carry out into the world. It is now really our secret weapon.

How come? Well, while the rest of the country chokes on higher petroleum prices, Texas' economy is hedged by being diversified in and out of oil and gas. When everyone else pays more for energy, a large amount of that money ends up on Texas.

Texas has the best of both worlds, economically. Ain't it great?




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From The Well

I am writing this column on May 1, Loyalty Day. Shortly after rising this morning, I raised the American Flag and said the Pledge of Allegiance. It felt good. And I wouldn't even have known that today is Loyalty Day if the Veterans of Foreign Wars hadn't let me know by way of Mary Kurtz. She put some material for the celebration of this day on my desk, and I used it Tuesday at Lion's. It was well received.

It's about time to talk loyalty. More important, to practice it. The V.F.W. got congress to authorize it in 1958. May 1 is Loyalty Day. Why May 1? Because for years the communist nations adapted May 1 as their special day of celebration. It seemed appropriate and right that Americans have a special day to display their loyalty and devotion to the United States of America, our nation under God.

I don't know why I didn't know about it before this year. It hasn't really had good media coverage. Of course the "junk values" that reign in our culture hardly leave room for something as basic as loyalty to one's nation, one's family, one's spouse, one's church, or one's community. Loyalty means faithfulness to your nation — not rebellion. It means a sense of obligation to serve and defend your nation, not to bad mouth it and let it go down the tube!

I love that word — loyalty. It calls for commitment, for dedication, for service. It means getting out of self-service, and getting into doing for others. It means reverence for God, for humans, for nation. It's like pledging your allegiance to "one nation, under God." It stirs up within me the sounds and words of the Star Spangled Banner. Makes me want to march. To yell, "I am an American, and I am so glad to be one." It makes me want to do another project, to start another program to make our small town a better place in which to live and serve.


Whew! Loyalty Day reaches down into my well, deep down. Goes so deep. It means I have this land, this flag, this United States as a gift from the great God Almighty. It means that our wise and benevolent God was hovering over us from the very conception of our nation, and before. The hand of God has been with us during the difficult days of the Revolution (when a handful of common people won their freedom from the mightiest nation in the world), the divisive days of the Civil War, through two World Wars and some smaller ones, through a great panic and a ravaging depression.

But, as many have said, more and more it seems, "America has forgotten God." So, it is so important that this year we celebrate the National Day of Prayer on the first Thursday of May. Russell Clearman in his book "Which Way, America?" put it this way, "She (America) is rolling in luxuries, reveling in excesses, rollicking in pleasure, revolting in morals, and rotting in sin. What can we expect of a society in which passions are riderless horses; in which there is a desolation of decency; in which love has become a jungle emotion, lust is exalted to lordship, sin elevated to sovereignty. Satan worshipped as a saint, and man magnified above his Maker?" He goes on, "It is sheer folly to suppose that the strength and security of America lies in its vast economic resources... industrial prongness... scientific ingenuity... diplomatic skill or military might."

"Our real defense as a nation rests in the spiritual convictions, character and commitment of our citizenry."

"We must return to the Faith of our Fathers. We must go to our knees in humility and prayer, in contrition and confession, in repentance and the forsaking of sin. Something miraculous must happen in the heart and soul of America...now, before it is too late."

Loyalty and Prayer, like love and marriage, belong together. Let's be loyal and do prayer for our nation...before it is, indeed, too late!

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
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


Yo-yo dieting not good for your head

Here is another reason not to yo-yo diet: It may be hazardous to your mental health.

In the first study of its kind, researchers have discovered that the yo-yo method of losing and regaining weight frequently is linked to poor self-esteem and depression, said Dr. John Foreyt, director of the Behavioral Medicine Research Center at The DeBakey Heart Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

In the study, nearly 500 men and women were monitored for weight maintenance, gain and loss for a year. To check for stress, abnormal eating behavior and weight perception, the study participants completed a series of questionnaires.

"The successful weight maintainers had a greater sense of well being, a lower stress level and better control of their eating," Foreyt said.

Crews is news

The Runnels County area was early recognized as being suitable for farming. As the farmers came, they gathered in little communities where wood and water were easily accessible. They improved their farms, built a small schoolhouse, then a church, and perhaps a store.

These settlements played an important part in the development of the county. Although they have all declined and some of them have ceased to be, the fertile farmland in these areas continues to be highly productive.

A few of the larger communities have retained their identity, such as Drasco, Hatchel, Norton, Wingate, Pumphrey, Valley View, and Victory and Crews. However, Crews is the only community that has kept close contact with the settlers and descendants of the area.

Monthly fellowship meetings are held in the school gym and young people go there to play ball. Dennis and Audine McBeth are in charge of these meetings. The semi-annual reunion is conducted by Therin and Nila Osborne.

Crews is located at Farm to Market Highways 53 and 382, 12 miles east of Winters. It had not been founded when the first settlers came. The land was covered with tall grass and a few mesquite trees. There were hog wallows, prairie dog holes, rattlesnakes and coyotes. Antelope roamed the prairies but the herds grew smaller as the years passed. After the drought of 1918, they all disappeared.

Mrs. Betty Craig Sims rode horseback to Glen Cove for the mail and since there was no school, she taught the neighbor children in her home. Those she taught included the Browns, Hales, and Daltons.

When the post office was established, the name of the town was chosen for C.R. Crews, a Ballinger businessman. Wise and Broughton built a store and J.D. Wise became the first postmaster on June 28, 1892. Two years later I.S. Baldwin bought the store and was appointed postmaster.

Postmasters who followed were: Harvey A. Bradley, 1897; W.W. McKissack, 1898; L.C. Hickson, 1899; Ben T. Hale, 1902; A.E. Wilkerson, 1905; J.W. Rainwater, 1910; E.T. Branham, 1915;

and L.R. Wilkerson, 1916. The office was discontinued on April 15, 1922.

From 1888 to 1890, children attended school in a log building with a dirt floor and split log benches, located a mile northeast of Crews. The teacher was Dan Fannin and the school was referred to as the Pig Pen. In 1890, a frame building was erected nearer town, called Lone Star, and the teacher was the Reverend Lockhart.

In 1905, the school was moved to Crews and consisted of two rooms. In 1922, a four-room brick school took its place. In 1930, the Dietz school was consolidated with Crews and seven teachers were employed. In 1940, a gymnasium was erected which serves as a community center today. The school was consolidated with others in 1948.

A.D. Talley was the justice of the peace and performed weddings for many people. Stephen F. Hale was an early operator of the blacksmith shop. A peddler's wagon was a familiar sight in the rural areas. A frame built on the wagon with shelves on the sides made it possible to display wares. The peddler traded merchandise for chickens, eggs, and other produce. They were welcomed by the housewives who seldom went to town as they do today.

Crews had numerous doctors. Those staying the longest were F.M. Hale, C.A. Watson, and R.E. Burrus. An epidemic of typhoid fever started in the area in 1904 and was not completely under control until 1915. During this time, many people died.

In 1907, Dr. Hale established a telephone system with the switchboard at his home and his wife was the operator. It was later bought by the Ola Johnsons and operated until 1920. In 1961, a modern dial system was installed with 75 members.

The town had three streets running north and south with residences on each side, and a group of rock buildings housed the eleven business firms. The Methodist Church was organized in 1890 and the Baptist in 1894. Both churches were destroyed by a storm in 1922, but they were rebuilt.

Today all that is left of the town is the school gymnasium.



Pest Management News

Caterpillars invade the area

Western Tent caterpillars have invaded the area this spring. Most heavy infestations are found on live oak and red oak trees right now. Tent caterpillars attack several kinds of broadleaf trees and shrubs and produce unsightly webs, or tents, which detract from the home landscape. Trees with substantial defoliation will have reduced growth and vigor. Caterpillars also can be very common, and thus a nuisance, as they move around the exterior of the home. The key to eliminating tent caterpillars problems is early detection and the use of appropriate cultural or chemical control measures.

In late spring or early summer, female moths deposit egg masses encircling small twigs or on tree trunks. Egg masses are present on trees during most of the summer, fall and winter.

Caterpillars, or larvae, hatch from the eggs about the time host plants leaf out. The western tent caterpillar feed on new leaves, forming small webs within a few days after hatching and enlarging the webs as they grow. Tent caterpillars feed in groups, and thus concentrate their defoliation.

During the later stage of larval development, which occurs in late spring, larvae wander considerable distances and may feed on a variety of trees, shrubs and even herbs before finding a site for pupation or cocoon spinning.

Control programs should be based on the need to eliminate unsightly webs, defoliation and/or the nuisance caused by caterpillars. Several things should be considered before deciding to spray for tent caterpillars. Once feeding damage occurs it will remain throughout the season. If tent caterpillars have been allowed to feed and have completed their development, it is useless to spray.

If caterpillars are detected early, spray may be applied as spot treatments on webs. Broadcast treatments are unnecessary and wasteful. One carefully applied treatment, properly timed, is sufficient for control.

Any of several insecticides can be used for controlling tent caterpillars. Not all insecticides are labeled for use on all host plants. Some insecticides effective in controlling this pest are as follows: Orthene®, Dipel®, Dursban®, D-z-n®, and malathion. To eliminate caterpillars as a nuisance around buildings, use an aerosol spray containing synergized allethrin, synergized pyrethrins or tetramethrin.

Safety precautions should be followed when applying insecticides, and instructions on product labels must be followed carefully.
