

# OIL BIIDNESS . .

People will sometimes ask me: "What is the toughest place to operate in the world?"

Let's see, the North Sea is dangerous because of the elements, Central Africa is downright unsanitary, South America has the most difficult terrain, and the former Soviet Union is a political nightmare...

Yeah, without a doubt, the most difficult place in the world to operate in the oil and gas business

California.

And, no single community has worked harder to earn the unofficial title of the "Peoples Republic of California" than Santa Barbara, California.

The area is undoubtedly one of the most physically beautiful areas of California. It is the home to many of the elite in show business and the art world. There is a lot for which to be protective, and the local government there has made sure that they are protective of everything in the extreme.

Most of the power, when it comes to interfacing with the oil and gas companies attempting to do business there, is vested in the County of Santa Barbara. This area has been the single largest contributor to the financial success of environmental attorneys in the nation.

In a recent decision concerning the Point Arguello project, the final approval to commence production took almost fifteen years to obtain. In the approval, over 150 conditions were imposed, including requiring a Native American on hand at all excavations, building a new school building to replace one "too close to the unsightly development," and planting 14 trees for every one removed.

The whole project, which contained more oil than any discovery in U.S. offshore history, has proved to be a financial disaster for those companies involvedonly because of the burden of being in Santa Barbara County.

Of course, the county is not at all upset about accepting the \$7 million dollars per year in tax money from the two largest oil companies operating there. Nor are they ready to give back the jobs, salaries, and pensions being paid to half of the county's population. As a matter of fact, they often impose employment requirements on the oil companies even if they can never produce a drop of oil or make a profit.

Some have had enough and are packing up to go home. Chevron,

and second floors of the Moody house, Cliff Poe and I exited through the door in room G16, climbed steps to the front porch and walked around to the front

Adapting the style to Galveston's climate, architect William Tyndall included several porches, or galleries, important for coping with summer's heat before air conditioning, and gave the house maximum southern exposure to catch prevailing breezes.

Entering the house, one passes through heavy oak doors into a small vestibule with oak wainscoting and a vaulted ceiling that retains its original plaster and stencilled decoration.

A second pair of doors opens into the hall. In 1895, this would have been called a "living hall" because of its size, its decorations, and its furnishings.

As a introduction to the house, the hall clearly stated the social position of the owners. This use of the hall was common during the 18th and 19th centuries and is characterized by ornate, uncomfortable furniture. A central table with a small silver-plated tray that functioned as a card receiver is a reminder of the formal social practice of calling.

The hall, like the majority of rooms in the house, is lighted by the original combination gas and electric fixtures. Electrical power became, available in Galveston

To begin our tour of the first in 1882. The combination fixtures also provided gas as an alternate and more proven light.

> Formal calls took place in the reception room. It was usually decorated in a French style, often the Rococo or Louis XV style, complemented by gilt furniture, decorative painting, silks and lace.

> This is where the family received guests when entertaining on a large scale. For example, December 12, 1911, the night the Moody's marked their daughters introduction into society with a dance in honor of her debut. They received guests in this room, which was banked with floral tributes from friends and family.

> When Mary made her debut, 14 year old Libbie was too young to go to the dance, but not to young to want to. She sneaked downstairs and out in to the gallery where she made faces at the young men through the ballroom window until she was asked inside to dance.

Although large, the dining room never contained a great deal of furniture. The built-in sideboard and hanging light fixtures restricted the furniture placement.

The dining room continued as a center for family life even after the Moody children married and left home. The younger Moodys, with their spouses and children, came to Sunday supper each week, and after Colonel Moody's death in 1920, the major holidays were celebrated there.

Least formal of the first floor rooms, the living room was the heart of the house and family life for the Moodys. In 1909, W.L. Moody, III, a student a the Hill School in Pennsylvania, wrote a homesick letter to his sister Mary, evoking memories of the room's comfort and privacy. "Tonight I could see the sitting room, and imagine Papa sitting close to the fire eating ice cream, or snoozing, or reading the paper, Mama hearing Shearn his lessons, and you and Libbie studying. You don't know how nice that looks."

Furniture in the second floor bedrooms is in many of the same styles as that in the first floor rooms, but with far less decoration. Light woods, especially bird's eye maple, predominate.

From her desk, Mrs. Moody directed the household. She planned and directed major activities such as painting, refinishing floors and shutters in the summer when the family was away. Through close training and supervision of the servants, she kept the house running smoothly on a daily







The circuit will offer spectators the opportunity to watch the versatile quarter horse perform in a wide variety of events at no


