

Oil Bidness

The annual survey of U.S. oil the most attractive area for future and gas companies from financial consultant Arthur Andersen has just been released, and it shows some interesting trends.

The survey is in the form of a questionnaire returned by approximately 100 oil and gas companies of varying sizes. Arthur Andersen covers topics from spending to prices, rig counts to employment, and financing to prospect generation. The full survey is available for order from the company at www.arthurandersen.com or at public libraries.

The survey is a U.S. survey, so foreign companies are not queried unless they have an established U.S. affiliate. Respondents are majors, large independents, and smaller independents (with substantial net worth).

As has been the case for some time, the survey shows a confident and positive outlook in the industry. Most companies expect to spend more, find more, and hire more.

Looking a little closer, a few important trends come to light.

Every company, regardless of size, picks the Deepwater Gulf of Mexico as the place to find oil and gas in the future. It is so "across the board" that it makes me wonder if the deep water can ever live up to its hype. Other areas of high potential according to the survey include Alaska, Permian Basin, and onshore Gulf of Mexico.

The majority of companies felt that significant oil and gas fields would be found in the U.S. in the 259, Harrison CSL Sur., A-235. future. When asked to pick a price at which industry-wide exploration for such reserves would reach meaningful levels, most companies said \$25 per barrel or greater. This was a lower price than previous years, and, not insignificantly, independents said it would happen at \$22 per barrel.

Dr. Hood is presently a staff member of the Lunar and Planetary Laboratory at the University of Arizona, where his research for the past several years has focused on theoretical and observational studies of lunar magnetism, outer planet magnetospheres and the terrestrial middle atmosphere.

One of the words that used to be used a lot by churches is the word "evangelism." It comes from a Greek word which means "telling the good news."

One of the great evangelists of our time is Billy Graham. He has almost always had a good, Biblical, lively presentation of the "good news." He will be missed.

For many of us, that's what evangelism means. It means a big name preacher, a mass effort, much publicity, and a lot of prayer. Sometimes it is called "mass evangelism." When it comes to conversions, or getting people to join a church, it's not that effective.

In fact, the people who study and analyze these kind of programs tell us that the most effective form of evangelism is when a friend asks a friend to come to church. It is often called "Friendship Evangelism." Billy Graham says it is the best way to evangelize.

Years ago I heard a wonderful story about such "friendship evangelism." It truly happened in a church just a few blocks away from the one I had served. In a small town, Hardin, Montana. Ramona and I had four and a half wonderful years there. Our two oldest children were born there. The town was located on the Little Big Horn River, and just 15 miles away from the Custer Battlefield. Where Custer made his last

I heard the story from a preacher who followed me when we went back for an anniversary. We were sitting in his office when he asked me, "Do you remember Alvin Unverzagt?" Did I remember? Alvin was one of those folks you never forget. He was about 6'2" tall. Dark hair. Good looking. Owned the 4-Aces Bar. Was president of the Local Licensed Beverage Dealers. He drove a big brand new Cadillac convertible. With leather seats. He dated pretty women. He was the big man about town. (Personally, I hated his guts.) Never had anything to do with the church.

He then asked me, "Do you remember Pete Pitsch?" Did I remember? Pete was another one you would never forget. About 5'10" tall. Stocky. He had a lot of sugar beet acreage that was under irrigation. His uniform was blue bib overalls, tucked into a pair of knee high rubber boots. He was truly a wonderful person. He was a deacon in the Lutheran Church just two blocks away from ours. Always had a smile on his face. Good man. Ever so often he'd stop in at the 4-Aces, have a beer, and talk with Alvin. They were kind of like friends.


Then the preacher told his story. Pete's church was about to have a Lutheran-type revival. His preacher wanted the deacons to do some visitation in advance. So, he made a bunch of 3x5 cards with the name of prospective members. One of the names on one of those cards was Alvin Unverzagt. One night prior to the meetings, he called the deacons together and literally dealt out the "name cards" to them. When Pete looked at his cards, he gasped. For one of the names was Alvin Unverzagt.

Pete really didn't want to make that home visit. He waited until the last minute before getting into his pickup and driving over there. It was the night before the services were to begin, and it was already dark. As he drove by, he couldn't see any light. "Good...he's not home," he said to himself. But, just to make sure, he drove around to the alley in back, and sure enough, there was light in the kitchen. Now he knew he just had to stop. And, so he did. He walked up to the front door. He knocked. Nobody came. So, he found the door bell. Rung it a couple of times. Was about to leave when the door opened. There stood Alvin. Pete took a big breath, and blurted out, "Alvin, Jesus wants you in church." He fully expected Alvin to slam the door in his face.

But Alvin said, 'Pete. Come on in. Let's talk about it." And they did. Alvin came to the services. Every night. Came every Sunday after that, for several months. But then he stopped. Not because he wanted to. Some weeks after the revival, he discovered he had cancer. The doctors said "terminal." And some months later he died.

But....in the faith. In the hope. Converted. Because of a friend, who under a lot of interior pressure, went and told him the truth. "Alvin, Jesus wants you in church." That, folks is truly "friendship evangelism," the kind that lasts forever.



Heartburn **How Is Heartburn Diagnosed and Treated?**

Simple heartburn usually can be diagnosed on the basis of the symptoms. If there is any suspicion that the pain is coming from the heart instead of the intestinal tract, an electrocardiogram should be done immediately.

Nonprescription antacids are usually sufficient to relieve an

- WHAT CAN I DO MYSELF? Prevention is the best approach to controlling heartburn. Eat small meals and avoid or cut back on aspirin, coffee, cigarattes, and alcohol. Wait at least 2 hours before lying down after eating. If heartburn occurs after going to bed, elevate the head of the bed by placing bricks under

If heartburn does occur, an antacid usually brings prompt relief. Check the ingredients to make sure the product does not contain unwanted substances, such as sodium.

- WHEN SHOULD I SEE MY DOCTOR? If the pain is usually severe and is accompanied by nausea or vomiting, numbness in a limb, or a cold, clammy sensation, it may be a heart attack instead of heartburn. If these symptoms occur, seek immediate emergency medical aid. A doctor also should be consulted if heartburn occurs on a regular basis (two or three times a week).

— WHAT WILL THE DOCTOR DO? If antacids or other simple remedies fail to control the problem, the doctor may order an



examination of the upper digestive tract. This may be done either by a series of x-rays after the patient swallows a barium drink, or by endoscopy, in which a thin, lighted tube containing a lens system is passed down the throat and esophagus. In severe cases, surgery may be required to strengthen a weakened esophageal sphincter or hiatal hernia.
