
According to Mr. Robinson's submitted budget, the total mount for the airport maintenance is \$20,000.

fees before services are connected. The City reports numerous occasions where the occupants and/ or property owner has turned on water without application. When this action takes place, correct

billing is impossible. Violaters will be fined and

charged with "Tampering With Utility Meter," Ordinance 92-06, Section 1D.

The ordinance reads as follows: The waterworks will charge for all labor, material, and equipment necessary to repair or replace all equipment damaged due to tampering or bypassing of a meter. Minimum charge for tampering of equipment damage or bypassing will be two hundred dollars (\$200), or actual costs, whichever

Oil Bidness

It is "Oil Patch Basics" time again, and, this time, we are going to discuss (in some detail) the way an interest owner in an oil well gets paid.

Although it may not seem like it, oil is just like any other commodity, i.e. wheat, cotton, gold, etc. Someone has to actually buy it. Just because it comes bubbling out of the ground doesn't mean that it turns into money all by itself.

The buyer is usually a crude gatherer. A crude gatherer can be a major oil company, a local refinery, a pipeline company, or a totally independent middleman. In any case, the gatherer is the one ultimately responsible for payment for the oil. The total payment does not (usually - see below) go to the operator alone. It is paid out to whomever is listed on a 'division order.'

A division order is a document prepared to show exactly who owns what interest in a property. It shows not only working interest owners, but also the royalty owners. It shows all direct owners in a property. The direct owner is sometimes an individual that represents several other folks, but usually it is the actual individual (corporate or personal) who owns the interest.

The gatherer pays based on a posted price.' That price can change whenever the gatherer cares to change it based on market conditions and competitiveness.

The gatherer will usually issue checks to each owner with detail concerning volumes sold, price, taxes collected, etc. The net amount left over is the amount on the check to the owner. The gatherer is responsible for paying severance taxes, ad valorem taxes (in most cases), etc. directly to the proper authorities, unless a very special (read that as almost never) arrangement has been made.

The owner will then receive the check in the mail and thus completes the cycle from production to payment to the owners.

But, the owner must account for these amounts collected over a year's time for Federal Income Tax purposes. He or she must also keep track of what is happening on a property by the information that is on a stub. The gross production volumes, prices, etc. can be very informational as far as determining the happenings on a property.

In a limited number of situations, an operator may collect all monies paid out on a lease. In such a case, the operator is acting on behalf of investors that may not have all of the time nor the

expertise to collect checks, decipher them, and deposit the proceeds. The operator is charged with collecting payments, subtracting operating expenses, and paying the net to the interest

Or, the operator may just be a go-between to keep investor's names confidential or to consolidate several payments from several gatherers into one check for the owner. In that case, operating expenses may be invoiced but not subtracted from the net proceeds.

In any event, it is every interest owner's dream to be able to have a little money left over after paying operating expenses, taxes, etc. Why, a lucky few may even be able to buy lunch at the local diner with the net.



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
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Pastor Jim Hanson

Some time back Ramona pointed out a statement to me that really connected with my deeps. A simple statement.

So profound that it could almost become a proverb. Indeed it has become that for me.

I may have written about it before. If I have, it's worth repeating. This simple statement of fact in a Lions magazine: "In spite of all its achievements, humanity exists because of six inches of topsoil and the fact that it rains."

So true. So necessary. Especially in our space age mentality which seems to be so infatuated with technology. We can hurl humans through space and land them on the moon. We can transmit words all over the world in seconds of time on the Internet. Great achievements, but humanity has existed for centuries without them. And, should they all disappear one night, humanity would still exist. Because of the good earth. And...the fact that it rains.

It's like the incident contained in one of my favorite books, "Unspoken Wisdom, Truths My Father Taught Me," by Ray S. Anderson. He describes it this way:

"It happened only once. There was no suggestion that it was planned or premeditated. We were sitting on the edge of a furrow behind the plow, facing the freshly turned soil over which sea gulls swooped in search of worms. It was second-cup-of-coffee time. A newly lit cigarette had loosened his tongue.

"Stick you hand down into the soil, son,' he suddenly said, breaking the rules by looking into my face and talking directly to me. As I did, he said softly, 'Son, this soil is part of your life, you take care of it and it will take care of you.

"No response was expected, of course. Nor did I give one — I knew the rules and lives by ritual as well. He said no more and he never spoke of it again. I never questioned him about its meaning. It may have been a premonition on his part, of his own transition from a tiller of the soil into a part of the soil itself. Or it may have simply been the only gift he knew how to give me: the wisdom of desire being fulfilled in destiny.'

The lesson was never forgotten. We start with the soil. The creation story tells us that we, through Adam, were created by God out of the soil, the good earth. We are rooted in the soil, and then we become detached. We lose contact with reality. Another sociologist, a rural sociologist, once said to a group of us that most of the crimes and violence of the city could be greatly reduced if every apartment had a window box, filled with earth, planted with seeds, watered, and cultivated. He had the picture. Those inner city folks, by getting their hands into the soil, feeling it with their fingers, stirring it up, seeding it, watering the seeds — would be getting in touch with reality. The good and the bad. The blossoms and the weeds. The watering and the drying up. The butterflies and the cut-worms. Reality. Hands on and in the earth.

My grandson Timothy is only three. He has a room filled with toys. Mostly plastic. Wagons and four wheelers, chairs and table, trucks and tractors...all plastic.

You might say that he is truly a "babe in Toyland." But, you want to know his favorite place to be and his favorite thing to do? The backyard, where there is a wonderful window box sitting on the deck, filled with dirt. He picks up a handful, squashes it, molds it, lets it sift through his fingers. He gets a stick and stirs it up. And smiles. Something deep within him knows that he had best stay close to the earth...in touch...hands in and on.

This past week, I saw a funeral procession. The first vehicle in line was a big tractor! How wonderful! That man who had spent the most of his life in a tractor, working the soil, seeding the soil, fertilizing the soil, harvesting the crops...knew... Reality! All humanity exists because of six inches of topsoil...and the fact that it rains. Councilman Nelan Bahlman moved to not accept the proposal from Prater Equipment, and Councilman Joe Gerhart seconded. Motion carried.

Mr. Hay reported that the lagoons are almost finished and the pipeline is being laid for the irrigation system which should be

pumping water in 2-3 weeks. City Manager Hassan told the council that the Housing Finance Corporation Board held its first meeting and officers had been appointed. A preliminary offer has been proposed for land on which

to develop duplex housing units.

The city's request for assistance from the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife was once again declined due to lack of funds, according to Hassan. He stated there is still a chance the funding might be obtained later this year.

Also denied for lack of funds was a grant proposal for chemical protective suits and detection equipment for the Volunteer Fire Department from the Department of Public Safety.

Hassan shared a letter from the Department of Justice which approved the city's application for another police officer. The Department will pay \$50,916.00 over a 3-year period. Winters has asked for a waiver for the matching funds of \$12,729, which is still under consideration. However, Winters will still be able to hire another police officer, regardless of whether or not the waiver is approved.

I would appreciate your assistance in making known the true facts to the taxpayers and voters in Runnels County.


Incorrect reporting such as this makes me even more appreciative of your unbiased and correct reporting of the meetings of the Commissioners Court.





Contact Dermatitis

What is Contact Dermatitis?

Contact dermatitis is a skin inflammation caused by direct physical contact with a substance to which the person is sensitive, provoking an allergic reaction. Typically, an itchy or scaling rash appears at the site of contact. The hands are most commonly affected, although contact dermatitis can occur anywhere on the body.

What Causes Contact Dermatitis?

The body's immune system normally protects the body against foreign organisms such as viruses and bacteria. When allergic responses occur, the immune system overreacts to harmless substances, such as household cleansers, leading to inflammation, redness, and itching.

Specific substances that commonly cause contact dermatitis include dyes used in clothing, shoes, and hair products; chemicals in rubber compounds, cleaning products, or cosmetics; metals (especially nickel); detergents; and urushiol, an oily substance in the leaves of poison ivy.





Long-running Ag Day program to undergo changes

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





Certain muscle cramps can signal severe problem

Muscle cramps during exercise are often the first sign of an enzyme deficiency that can ulti-

mately cause kidney failure. "People often ignore this problem by attributing the muscle cramps to lack of conditioning," said Dr. Yadollah Harati, a neurologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "These cramps should not be confused with normal muscle cramps that occur when we are at rest or after exer-

cise." Pain caused by the enzyme deficiency occurs in the exercised muscle usually five to 20 minutes into exercise and is often severe enough to cause a person to slow

down or stop. Such cramps are the first indication that the muscle is not converting glycogen, the sugar stored in muscles, into lactate, the sugar needed for strenuous muscle ac-

Ignoring the condition can lead to muscle breakdown and severe kidney failure.
