You are going to be surprised to hear this, but I have at least one true.
I tend to want to over simplify things. I love to put things into a box. It helps me cope with situafacts, but it puts me in danger of missing the point of some things. It seems that I am not the only one with this fault.
As I read all of the commentary concerning the recent negative movement in oil prices, I note that many pundits are guilty of my sum. Everyone seems to want causes and consesum up the causes and conse-
quences in 36 inches of newsprint.
And, unless the reader is one of the rare breed that prefers to read in-depth analysis, they take he written or verbal report at face value. In my opinion, this leads to the following inescapable conclusions by the gen
outside the oil patch: utside the oil patch:

1. The oil price drop is some-
hing oil companies can live with by making more money from gasoline sales.
2. If a company does feel some pain anyway, they can just stop investing in space-age technology for a while.
3. OPEC still controls the price 4 . 4. Prices for gasoline should
always be under a dollar or someone is gouging the public.
4. Oil companies are in th
midst of a covert operation to ge midst of a covert operation to get more gas guzzling vehicles on the
road (i.e., Sport Utility Vehicles, road (i.e., Sport Utility Vehicles,
etc.) Despite the fact that most do-
mestic producers do not have re mestic producirs subsidiaries, many reporters still believe they do. Too many facts might get in the way of the story here, I suppose.
While many business reporters have ignored the oil patch for the last decade, a few have at least
kept up with the industry buzzwords. Everyone in our business is talking about new technology and its impact. Apparently someone overheard this and put it in their story. There seems to be the mistaken idea that investing in new technology is something that can be turned on and off with a spigot. The oil patch is
long-term. Always has been -long-term
still is.
While OPEC still carries weight in the oil markets, non-
OPEC producers are producing a higher percentage of daily production than ever before. This, combined with the advent of oil trading at the NYMEX, have
taken control of prices away from taken control of prices away from
OPEC for the foreseable future. Everyone seems to ignore the fact that oil prices would be at an equivalent level to early 1970 prices, adjusted for inflation,
they were $\$ 1.70$ per gallon. Con pare your paycheck and your
gasoline bill in 1998 to 1974 gasoline bill in 1998 to 1974 a see how cheap fuel is today.
cretly pushing the wider use of higher-consuming vehicles, lower
gasoline prices have an impact. At gasoline prices have an impact. At current gasoline prices, an eco-
nomic decision to buy a vehicle nomic decision to buy a vehicle
is based more on what it costs per is based more on what it costs per
month than what it costs to keep it running. Compare to Europe, where gasoline is equivalent (because of taxes) to $\$ 3$ to $\$ 5$ per gallon.

Although many try, you can't put the oil and gas business in a small box and explain it to others within those confines. The reason
it turns out that way anytime there is a major change in the economics of the business is because no one cares unless they see it at the gas pump.
We may have to live with the situation that way, but I don't have to like it.

We were reminded that this earth is a temporary place for all of us, and that none of our healing's are permanent...except for the soul.
So - here we were in the room...waiting. A nice room. With two comfortable chairs. T.V. Big window. Light. Cheery. But - as you are waiting - some feelings of apprehension, some feelings of fear. Mos of all, for me, were some regrets. As I looked at Ramona I began to
think of all the opportunities I had had in our life - to tell her how much Iloved her and more important to show her the same And how these past 44 years together had flown by. There was no way to make up for the lost time.
Thank God for forgiveness. Thank God for His love. And, even if I had missed many opportunities in the past, there was nothing to prevent me from telling her now - that I truly love her and am most grateful to God for her, and we could, and did, pray together.
