Commissioners forced to change order in new county jail contract

Reluctantly, Runnels County Commissioners approved a change order to the contract between the county and Denard Electric on the new jail during a special Commissioners meeting on Monday.

The change order was for an additional \$3,049.00 for fire alarm strobes and smoke detectors required by the Americans With Disabilities Act.

Commissioner Ricky Strube questioned why the architects did not have the strobes and detectors

Judge Marilyn Egan said she supposed they were just overlooked.

Because the strobes and alarms are required by law, commissioners voted to approve the additional to the contract.

Commissioners also approved a contract for public health services between the Texas Department of Health and Runnels County.

Judge Egan said the contract would allow the county to receive \$3,039.00 which would be di-

Judge Egan told commissioners that the money could be used by the services for training and/ or purchase of new or additional equipment.

The Department of Human Services will be offered a new one-year lease at \$350.03 per month on the space they currently occupy in the courthouse annex. Previous discussion as to whether or not the lease would be renewed apparently prompted the DHS to request the extension of the lease. The new lease will also require DHS to pay electric and gas ser-

Oil Bidness

You are going to be surprised to hear this, but I have at least one fault. I know it is a shock, but it's

I tend to want to over simplify things. I love to put things into a box. It helps me cope with situations that have many facets and facts, but it puts me in danger of missing the point of some things.

It seems that I am not the only one with this fault.

As I read all of the commentary concerning the recent negative movement in oil prices, I note that many pundits are guilty of my sin. Everyone seems to want to sum up the causes and consequences in 36 inches of newsprint.

And, unless the reader is one of the rare breed that prefers to read in-depth analysis, they take the written or verbal report at face value. In my opinion, this leads to the following inescapable conclusions by the general public outside the oil patch:

1. The oil price drop is something oil companies can live with by making more money from gasoline sales.

2. If a company does feel some pain anyway, they can just stop investing in space-age technology for a while.

3. OPEC still controls the price

4. Prices for gasoline should always be under a dollar or someone is gouging the public.

5. Oil companies are in the midst of a covert operation to get more gas guzzling vehicles on the road (i.e., Sport Utility Vehicles, etc.)

Despite the fact that most domestic producers do not have refining subsidiaries, many reporters still believe they do. Too many facts might get in the way of the story here, I suppose.

While OPEC still carries weight in the oil markets, non-OPEC producers are producing a higher percentage of daily production than ever before. While oil companies aren't se-

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cretly pushing the wider use of higher-consuming vehicles, lower gasoline prices have an impact. At current gasoline prices, an economic decision to buy a vehicle is based more on what it costs per month than what it costs to keep it running. Compare to Europe, where gasoline is equivalent (because of taxes) to \$3 to \$5 per gallon.

Although many try, you can't put the oil and gas business in a small box and explain it to others within those confines. The reason it turns out that way anytime there is a major change in the economics of the business is because no one cares unless they see it at the gas pump.

We may have to live with the situation that way, but I don't have to like it.



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

"You're going to have to have surgery." These were the words said to Ramona by Dr. Lee just a few weeks ago. "I'll not be doing it - you will have to make arrangements." With those words, we started out on a different direction...we headed north. To

Abilene.

For most of our life together, Ramona and I have enjoyed good health. Not many days in the hospital — for either of us. So, this was a new thing. We found a doctor - one recommended to us by some of our friends. Ramona's problem was her bladder, and she needed what is called a "bladder suspension."

We soon learned what that was all about, and the things we would need to do to get ready. We made all the arrangements. And, last Monday, the last day in March we arrived at Hendrick Hospital in Abilene. 5:30 a.m. In the admissions area.

We weren't alone when we got there. There were several families there. The admissions people were most kind and helpful. We signed a bunch of papers, and were led to the room where Ramona was to stay. It was located in a wing called "MOTHER CARE." I thought that was special. Ramona is no longer bearing children, but, because of the nature of the operation, was housed among those who were about to or had just delivered a baby. Really, she had earned the right to stay there, having birthed and raised 5 children. I told our kids that I was taking good care of their mother.

In the admissions area, you, or at least I did, feel some residual anxiety. When you see a young man in a wheelchair, who is obviously not feeling good at all, and is truly afraid of what might be the matter, you catch a little "fear." If not for yourself — for him. We were reminded that this earth is a temporary place for all of us, and that none of our healing's are permanent...except for the soul.

So — here we were in the room...waiting. A nice room. With two comfortable chairs. T.V. Big window. Light. Cheery. But — as you are waiting — some feelings of apprehension, some feelings of fear. Most of all, for me, were some regrets. As I looked at Ramona I began to think of all the opportunities I had had in our life — to tell her how much I loved her, and more important, to show her the same. And how these past 44 years together had flown by. There was no way to make up for the lost time.

Thank God for forgiveness. Thank God for His love. And, even if I had missed many opportunities in the past, there was nothing to prevent me from telling her now — that I truly love her and am most grateful to God for her, and we could, and did, pray together. And when we made the trail to the operating room, I thanked God that I hadn't

blown this one...too! Well, it all turned out well. The doctor came to me after the operation was over (it didn't take much more than an hour for the surgery itself) and said, "She's doing fine. The surgery went very well. Now it's just a matter of the healing process to take over."

What a relief! And when they wheeled her in, hair messed up, groggy with anesthesia, and half asleep and not making much sense...she was a sight for my sore eyes. All I could say was, "Thank you, Jesus." "Thank you, Dr." "Thank you, nurses." And, in my mind, "Thank you hospital. And the healing arts. And the whole history of discovering the wonder of the body and how it all works. And, the discovery of ways of repairing and healing the body."

Ramona had a very successful operation. A "bladder suspension." One of our friends asked, "Does that mean that her bladder wears suspenders?" We laughed. But - I think I'll ask the doctor about that

I guess I had an operation, too. Some repair for my heart. Some repair for my head. To recover the grace to say "thank you" and "I love you" to my wife every day. And, each day together to say, or sing, "This is the day the Lord hath made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it!"



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

"Hunters should see lots of birds," offered Dr. Marcus Peterson, turkey program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). "Production last year was way above average, particularly in the Edwards Plateau, so there'll be lots of jakes on the ground. I would also expect there to be a lot of mature

gobbler out there, too." Rio Grande turkey hunting season opens March 28 in South Texas and runs through May 3. and in the remaining counties, a spring turkey season begins on April 4 and runs through May 10.

In addition to possessing a valid Texas hunting license, turkey hunters are required to purchase a special turkey hunting stamp. The annual bag limit on turkey is four.

According to Ralph Suarez, a Ballinger-based TPWD biologist, "We're expecting a real good hunt this spring. Things should get off. to a quick start because gobblers are starting to talk already and range conditions are good.






