Oil Bidness

By Reg Boles ©1998

In the midst of the recent shortterm developments in the oil patch, there are certain long-term, bigpicture events that are shaping the present and the future of the oil and gas business.

I heard an interesting point of view the other day regarding this very subject and thought this would be the best time to share it with you. The thing most interesting about it was its apparent opposition to my own conventional wisdom.

We are all aware of the consolidation that has taken place over the last 10-12 years in our business. Oil companies and service companies have made several combinations that have served to shrink considerably the number of players in this game. It seems there may soon be only two service companies and about five oil companies.

This observation holds true to some extent; however, the more subtle change is a significant, albeit less visible, occurrence. And, the change is quite unexpected.

If you examine the industry closely, you might be able to detect this shift.

The incremental result to the industry consolidation and re-organization is that there is actually a greater compartmentalization in the oil patch.

By this, I mean that there are companies that are actually filling niches instead of being broadbased companies. During the 1970's and early 1980's, companies that could do a lot of things in a lot of places were the successful models for profit in the oil and gas business. But, now, there are more and more companies that are specializing in certain skills, applications, and locations.

This is directly opposed to my assumption that there would be less specialization because there are less and less companies.



What this portends for the future is not altogether clear; however, it does indicate that anybody operating in the oil patch better have something they are good at. Otherwise, somebody else will come along with a particular skill or acumen that will allow them to have a competitive advantage.

Next time, we will examine this in some detail to consider what it may mean for the future of producers and service companies.







Crossed over the moon and then disappeared. He sniffs at the air that's still dry as a bone,


And takes one more look at the seeds that he's sown. He'll be back tomorrow if somethin' don't change,





He told me to check at Base Operations. He turned to Lt. Rogers and said, "Lieutenant, let's go to my office."

As a truck came by Lt. Franks and I caught a ride to the barracks areas. I don't know what was said to Lt. Rogers, but I never saw him again.

DIABETES

Your Doctor's Role

Because people with diabetes are more prone to foot problems, a podiatrist may be on your health-care team.

You should call or see your doctor if you hve cuts or breaks in the skin or have an ingrown nail. Also, tell your doctor if the foot changes color, changes shape, or just feels differently (for example, becomes less sensitive or hurts).

Your diabetes doctor should inspect your feet carefully at every visit. Remember to take off your socks and shoes while you wait for your physical exam. Also, at least once a year, your doctor should check your feet for blood vessel, muscle, and nerve problems.

If you have corns or calluses, your podiatrist can trim them for you. Your podiatrist can also trim your toenails if you cannot do so safely.

Caring For Your Feet

1. Wash your feet every day. Dry them carefully, especially between the toes. 2. Check your feet every day. Be sure to look between the toes, at the toe webs, and on the bottoms (use a mirror). If you cannot see well, have a friend or relative check your feet every day. Also feel the temperature of your feet. If they feel hot or cold, something could be wrong.

3. Don't put your feet into hot water. Test water before putting your feet in it. 4. If your feet are cold, wear socks. Never use hot water bottles, heating pads,

or electric blankets. You can burn your feet without realizing it. 5. Don't cut off blood flow to your feet. Don't wear garters. Don't smoke.

6. Do not use chemicals on corns, calluses, or warts. Over-the-counter products are often too strong for use by people with diabetes. They can burn your eet. Also, do not cut corns or calluses yourself.

Cut your toenails to follow the curve of your toe. Do not rip off hangnails. 8. Wear flat shoes that fit your feet.

9. Consider wearing comfortable walking shoes every day.




10. Check your shoes before putting them on. Make sure there are no stones, nails, or other sharp objects in them and that the shoe itself is not rough and the lining is not torn.

11. Choose socks carefully. Padded athletic socks protect your feet and make walking more comfortable. 12. Never walk barefoot.


13. See your doctor at the first sign of infection or inflammation.





Much to do about mulch

Are you aware of the advantages of using a mulch in your garden? In one stroke, you can reduce weed problems, improve soil structure, attract beneficial earthworms, keep the soil most and cool, prevent erosion, and add nutrients to the soil. In short, good gardeners have much to do with

mulch. Texans should be thoroughly familiar with mulch; after all, nature has been depositing it for years on the floor of our Texas forests. Mulch is a ground covering, and the springy carpet of the forest floor is a natural example. The forest carpet decomposes, adding nutrients to the soil beneath. An organic garden mulch does the same thing for the garden, adding humus to the soil and improving its structure. Man simply takes his cue from nature, applying his own ground covering, natural or inorganic.

By depriving developing weed seedlings of light, mulch minimizes weed problems in the garden. The occasional weed that does appear is easier to pull. This easy weeding is the result of an-

other benefit: moisture retention. Mulch slows moisture evaporation, protecting tender new roots from overheated soil while also lessening the watering chore.

A mulch can consist of inorganic or organic materials. Organic mulches include straw, pine needles, and bark. Inorganic mulches include gravel, stones, and even plastic.

Availability is one factor to consider in selecting a mulch. Your choice of mulch depends on your personal preferences as to what looks the best and will be readily available.

Of the materials listed, sawdust is probably the least desirable (even though it is available in most parts of Texas) because of

its ability to rob nitrogen from the garden plantings. The key to using sawdust successfully as a mulch is to find well rotted and aged material.

If you are tired of seeing the weeds in your garden doing better than the plants, or if you want to reduce your water chores and your water bill, give mulch a try in your garden.
