County Clerk Linda Bruchmiller retires

Reception in her honor Thursday, May 28, 9-10 a.m.



Linda Bruchmiller announces her retirement as County Clerk of Runnels County, effective May 31, 1998. She held the position of County Clerk since May 1, 1982, when she was appointed to fill the unexpired term of longtime County Clerk Frankie Berryman.

Bruchmiller ran unopposed in all four terms of office, and in late 1997, chose not to seek a fifth term. Her term officially ends December 31, 1998, but she decided to retire early so that she may dedicate more time to the care of her parents. She also intends to expand her ranching interests in Runnels and Concho counties.

Miss Bruchmiller began her employment with Runnels County nearly 29 years ago on September 29, 1969, as Deputy County Clerk to Frankie Berryman, at a salary of \$273.96 per month.

She was born in San Angelo in 1950 and was raised south of Paint Rock. She attended school in Paint Rock, until her family moved in 1966 to Runnels County in the Bethel community, south of Ballinger. Linda graduated from Ballinger High School in 1968 and received a Secretarial Certificate from San Angelo Business College in 1969. Linda is the daughter of Raymon J. and Irene (Dierschke) Bruchmiller. She has two older sisters and one older brother.

According to Bruchmiller, during her sixteen years as County Clerk, there have been over 61,000 real estate documents filed, over 7800 misdemeanor criminal cases filed, nearly 1600 marriage licenses issued, 1050 births, 1850 deaths, and numerous other transactions filed in the County Clerk's office. Since January of 1988, Bruchmiller says she has attained over 300 hours of Continuing Education in her capacity as County Clerk.

In her resignation to the Commissioners Court, she stated, "It has certainly been a pleasure working with each of you. I am very appreciative to have had the honor of working for Runnels County for the past 28 years."

In the May 19, 1998, meeting Commissioners appointed Deputy Clerk Elesca Ocker to fill the unexpired term of County Clerk, effective June 1, 1998.

A retirement reception honoring Miss Bruchmiller will be held Thursday, May 28, from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. at the Runnels County Courthouse. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Library gets \$11,750 in grant funds

The board of directors of the Winters Public Library is pleased to announce the receipt of \$11,750 in grant funds from the Tocker Foundation of Austin, Texas.

This grant is for the specific purposes of focusing grant distributions to small rural libraries serving a population of 12,000 or less. The direction is "to assist libraries in making services more

accessible to individuals who by reason of distance, residence, handicap, age, literacy level or other disadvantage are unable to receive the benefits of public library services."

Grants are distributed to assisting libraries to serve as community information referral centers and provide literacy and bilingual programs.

The Winters Public Library is

one of two from the Big Country Library System to be approved for the grant which was written by Jane Penn of Brady, sister to Bill Spiller, president of the local library board of directors. Ms. Penn is a professional grant writer for Brady and Rochelle schools.

According to Spiller and librarian Joyce Krause, the funds will be used to purchase fiction and non fiction children's books,

children's furniture, a game rug, puppet theatre, displayer, double study carrel, shelves, and a mobile book display.

The library will also install refrigerated air conditioning to replace the old evaporative units.

"We are absolutely thrilled to receive this grant," says Spiller. "Our library is definitely in need and this will give us a real boost."

Man dies in industrial accident at Mueller's

Rolando Ruiz, 32, died in an industrial accident at Mueller, Inc. last Thursday morning. Ruiz, a five-year employee of the firm was moving a large piece of steel weighing several thousand pounds with a remote control crane or "grabber."

According to Mueller officials, as Ruiz set the steel girder on its station and began to move the crane away, a part of the machinery caught on the girder and tipped it over on him. Several workers in the area rushed to Ruiz's aid, lifting the girder off him by sheer strength and adrenalin, according to Harold Browning, manager of operations at the company.

Ruiz worked in the pre-fabrication department of the company and was working on the framework of a large, pre-fabricated building.

According to Browning, Ruiz' fatal accident was the first for Mueller, Inc. in its 30-year history. Browning said it was just "one of those freak accidents."

Ruiz was taken to Ballinger Memorial Hospital where medical personnel attempted to revive him, with no success.

"This place is like a small, close-knit community," said Browning, "and a number of employees gathered at the hospital." Once he had been pronounced dead, Browning said he informed the employees and a short prayer was said. The pre-fab department was shut down for the remainder of the day.

Ruiz was married with two small children. His body was taken to Saragosa, Mexico, where he was to be buried.

Oil Bidness

It is 'Oil Patch Basics' time again, and we are going to discuss (in some detail) the way an interest owner in an oil well gets paid.

Although it may not seem like it, oil is just like any other commodity, i.e. wheat, cotton, gold, etc. Someone has to actually buy it. Just because it comes bubbling out of the ground doesn't mean that it turns into money all by itself.

The buyer is usually a crude gatherer. A crude gatherer can be a major oil company, a local refinery, a pipeline company, or a totally independent middleman. In any case, the gatherer is the one ultimately responsible for payment for the oil. The total payment does not usually (see below) go to the operator alone. It is paid out to whomever is listed on a 'division order.'

A division order is a document prepared to show exactly who owns what interest in a property. It shows not only working interest owners, but also the royalty owners. It shows all direct owners in a property. In certain situations, an individual on the division order may be representing several other folks, but usually it lists the actual individual (corporate or personal) who owns the interest.

The gatherer pays based on a 'posted price'. That price can change whenever the gatherer cares to change it based on market conditions and competitiveness.

The gatherer will usually issue checks to each owner with detail concerning volumes sold, price, taxes withheld, etc. The net amount left over is the amount on the check to the owner. The gatherer is responsible for paying severance taxes, ad valorem taxes (in most cases), etc. directly to the proper authorities, unless a very special (read that as almost never) arrangement has been made.

The owner will then receive the check in the mail and thus completes the cycle from production to payment to the owners.

But, it is wise to remember that the owner must account for these amounts collected over a year's time for Federal Income Tax purposes. He or she must also keep track of what is happening on a property by the information that is on a stub. The gross production volumes, prices, etc. can be very informational as far as determining the happenings on a property.

In contrast to the methodology described above, in some rare cases, an operator may collect all monies paid out on a lease. This has a purpose.

In such a case, the operator is acting on behalf of investors that may not have all of the time nor

the expertise to collect checks, decipher them, and deposit the proceeds. The operator is charged with collecting payments, subtracting operating expenses, and paying the net to the interest owner.

Or, the operator may just be a go-between to keep investor's names confidential or to consolidate several payments from several gatherers into one check for the owner. In that case, operating expenses may be invoiced but not subtracted from the net proceeds.

In any event, it is every interest owner's dream to be able to have a little money left over after paying operating expenses. Why, a lucky few may even be able to buy lunch at the local diner with the net.



Nephews will be pallbearers.

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
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From The Well

Remembering is so important. It connects us with our roots like a family tree. I came from somewhere. I have ancestors. Ramona has a family tree that is framed and hangs on the wall in our bedroom. It goes way back to the year 1901. The man's name was Egill

Skaldagrimson. He was a poet who lived in Iceland. Even though it is her family tree, I get a feeling of connectedness of roots.

Obviously so do the writers of the Bible. In Genesis, the first book of the Bible, we have several of them — the descendants of Noah: Shem, Ham, and Japheth and the descendants of Esau. Pages of "begats." Matthew and Luke contain genealogies of Jesus. They wanted their readers to know the connection of Jesus to David because the Messiah was to be of the "house and lineage of Jesus."

As we live on Earth, we discover we have other rememberings. Roots that are not primarily biographical. We speak and write of George Washington as being the Father of our nation. Prior to him, we are reminded of our "Pilgrim Fathers." All Christians can claim Abraham as "the father of our faith." It is important for us to know our roots and our history. One man, Carl J. Jung, once said that one single cell in our bodies contains the history of the universe from the beginning until now.

Well, what caused all of this reflection is Memorial Day. Originally, I think, it was called "Decoration Day." Some little woman, compelled by some force "stronger than death" asked permission to decorate the graves on a battlefield. It was Civil War time and the graves were those from both armies, North and South. She didn't want those men to be forgotten. She decorated the graves with flowers like incense and your spirits were lifted.

There were other wars such as the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, the Korean "Conflict," Vietnam, and the Gulf War. One might think that Memorial Day would become bigger because there were so many more who gave their lives in the service of our country.

But, sad to say, remembering is not what most Americans are good at anymore. Especially when it comes to things that are important, like "liberty and justice for all," Pearl Harbor, and "D" Day.

We were not ready for World War II. We could have lost, but we didn't. The people of our nation rallied like they had seldom rallied before and have not since. It was an "all out effort," and by the grace of God we won the war.

But since then, something has happened to us. We forget. Memorial Day is plastic flowers in the cemetery and a three-day weekend. A few veterans and a handful of citizens gather at the cemetery to remember and pray. As a nation, we are getting good at forgetting.

Rudyard Kipling, writing a poem after World War I, had these lines as the last of each verse: "Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet. Lest we forget, lest we forget!"

And Abraham Lincoln, in his famous Gettysburg Address, said, "It is for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that the government of the people, by the people, and for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

It is time to remember. Memorial Day is a good day to begin. See you at the Northview Cemetery in Winters at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, May 30th. Our local veterans will be observing Memorial Day. (May 30th was the day designated as Memorial Day — a national holiday.)

First "March for Jesus" rally in Winters on May 30


Sixth graders enjoy Career Day

Career Day was held Friday, May 8 for sixth graders at Winters Elementary.



Reflections

by Coach Ed Henley

When you have been around coaching as long as I have, you get to experience some good and some bad.

My wife and I came to Winters in the fall of 1990, and this move was probably one of the best we ever made.

I have found most people very receptive to my style of coaching. I believe this because the kids are willing to work. Good work ethics and habits have to be taught at home. This is a credit to the parents of this school district.

Another credit to the parents is their support of all activities, whether it is athletics, band, scholastic, agriculture, or whatever.

Over the eight years I've been here, I've collected a few memories that I would like to share:

- **May, 1990** Being hired to be boys head basketball coach at Winters High School.
- **Oct., 1990** Started a Cross Country team. Winning district, then giving it back after I turned us in because of an age problem.
- **Nov., 1990** Beating Stamford 15-14 when Coach Slaughter used by my fake kick extra point play. David Roman threw to Albert Bernal and this got us into the playoffs.
- **Nov., 1990** Winning my first game as head basketball coach against Early. Beating Eula in double overtime at their homecoming activities.
- **Dec., 1990** Winning my first district ballgame against Hawley.
- **Dec., 1990** Winning three games at the Brownwood tournament by a total of five points when Craig Slaughter hit two free throws after the final buzzer to beat Goldthwaite, Craig Slaughter hit two free throws with two seconds to go to beat San Saba, and Greg Tamez hit a three to beat Coleman by one at the buzzer.
- **Jan., 1991** Beating Hamlin by 20 at "The Roof".
- **Jan., 1991** Beating Albany in three overtimes and Stamford in five overtimes in the same week. In the Stamford win, sophomore Josh Bahlman came off the bench to hit a turnaround jumper to give us a two point win.
- **Feb., 1991** Beating Haskell in a playoff game for the first half championship. The game was played before a "Sea of Blue" crowd at Abilene Cooper High School. Keith Gerhart held Haskell's big gun to ten points; he had been averaging 24.
- **Feb., 1991** Beating Hawley for the district championship. Losing to Ranger in bi-district by three points.
- **April, 1991** Winning the district track championship by one point over Hamlin.
- **Oct., 1991** Winning the district cross country meet at Anson by one point. This was made possible by Scott "Scooter" Kozelsky, our seventh runner beating Jim Ned's fifth runner.
- **Nov., 1991** Winning the district championship with 8th grade football team, aka the Seniors of '96. We were 8-0-1.
- **Nov., 1991** Setting scoring records at the Blackwell basketball tournament that are still records today:
 - **Feb., 1992** Finished the season with a 15-15 record. This was done with no starter over 6 ft.
 - **Oct., 1992** Advanced to regionals in cross country as district runner-up.
 - **Nov., 1992** Won the Blackwell Invitational for the second year in a row. Beat Roby at Roby on a shot at the buzzer by Vennie "with the left hand" Reyes.
 - **Dec., 1992** Vennie scored 8 points in the last 30 seconds to beat Brownwood JV by two.
- **Jan., 1993** Beat Stamford at Stamford in double overtime. Down by 14 with six minutes to go, Vennie Reyes hit four 3's to help tie it up and Adrian Albarado hit the big bucket to put us ahead to stay in second overtime.
- **Feb., 1992** Beat Jim Ned at Jim Ned after Jim Ned had beaten us at home. Beat Hamlin at "The Roof" to finish 21-10 — one game out of the playoffs.
- **Nov., 1993** Winning Blackwell Invitational for third straight year.
- **Dec., 1993** Lose double overtime game to Bronte in Roscoe Tournament. Beat Coleman at Coleman by 30 points. Probably the best we played at any time during the year.
- **Feb., 1994** Finished 13-17. We didn't live up to the expectations I thought we were capable of achieving.
- **Oct., 1994** Winning the first of four straight district cross country championships.
- **Nov., 1994** Watching the now famous "Drive" at Lowery Field in Lubbock to beat Springlake-Earth in regional football playoffs.
- **Dec., 1994** Watching John Paul Belew go down with an injury in the quarterfinals football game against Hamlin.
- **Feb., 1995** Finished season 4-18. We played hard even in the season-ending loss to Jim Ned, the district champion. We had a chance but were beaten by four.
- **Oct., 1995** Winning the second straight district championship in cross country.
- **Nov., 1995** District champions in football.
- **Dec., 1995** Cold night at Frenship, losing to West Texas High School in quarterfinals.
- **Jan., 1996** Lost hard-fought game with four overtimes at Roscoe 91-86 in basketball.
- **Jan., 1996** Lost to Jim Ned at Jim Ned and Stanton in double overtime back to back. This put a serious damper on our title aspirations. But this was minor in comparison to the loss of friend and fellow classmate, Justin Mitchell, who was killed in an auto accident.
- **Feb., 1996** Beat district champion Jim Ned to end our season 10-9.
- **Oct., 1996** Third straight district championship in cross country. This one was extremely sweet because Ozona and Eldorado were ranked 3rd and 5th in the state, respectively.
- **Jan., 1997** My worse loss ever, and how my guys helped me through it.
- **Feb., 1997** Going into the last week of the basketball season, six things had to happen. On Tuesday, three of those things happened. On Friday, the things that needed to happen, happened.
- **Feb., 1997** A cold third quarter killed our chances against Ozona in the special playoff game. Finished 15-16 for the season.
- **Oct., 1997** 4th straight district championship in cross country. We hadn't beaten Eldorado all year until the district meet.
- **Nov., 1997** Placed third at the regional meet in Lubbock. Advanced to the state meet for the first time. Not only did we advance to the state meet, we placed third — one of my proudest moments as a coach.
- **Jan., 1998** After the "infamous incident" with the t-shirts, we started 0-4 in district basketball. We finished strong, winning our last four in a row, throwing a monkey wrench into the district race.
- **April, 1998** The Athletic Banquet and how proud I was of the cross country and basketball teams that I had coached.
- **May, 1998** Former and present athletes stopping by to wish me well. It was great to be appreciated and know that somehow I had been a part of their lives.

I have had many thoughts while writing these memories, most of them pleasant. Whether retirement is a reality or if I will coach again can only be told in time. I always wanted Winters to be my last coaching position; if it's not, I'll always wish it could have been.



HYPOGLYCEMIA AND HYPERGLYCEMIA

Part 2 of 3

What are the symptoms of each?

Many people do not have symptoms, even when their blood-sugar level is either extremely high or low. For that reason, it is *crucial* that you test your blood-glucose level.

When symptoms *do* occur, the symptoms of hypoglycemia include shaking, clumsy, or jerky movements; blanched or pale skin; fast heartbeat; difficulty paying attention or confusion; sweating; dizziness; hunger; impaired vision; weakness or fatigue; headache; tingling sensations around the mouth; and sudden moodiness or behavior changes.

When they occur, symptoms of hyperglycemia include extreme thirst, frequent urination, high levels of sugar in the urine, dry skin, hunger, blurred vision, drowsiness, and nausea.

The only way to be certain that your blood sugar is either too high or low is to test your blood sugar regularly. Your doctor will tell you how often you should test yourself and what your blood-sugar levels should be. Stick to the schedule recommended by your doctor. You should also test your blood whenever you feel an insulin reaction beginning.

Whenever the results of your blood-sugar test indicate that your blood-sugar level is high or low or whenever you feel a reaction coming on but cannot test yourself, treat yourself immediately. It is better to treat yourself than to wait!

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Pest Management News

Pecan nut casebearer control

Surveys for pecan nut casebearer eggs conducted in the area indicate that the time to treat for this pest is now. The first eggs were found on May 16 and first significant nut entry should have occurred around May 20 or 21. Therefore, treatments should be made now. This is earlier than last year, probably due to the hot, dry weather conditions.

Adult female moths will soon be laying eggs on the pollinated nutlets. Eggs should hatch in 4 to 7 days, then the young worms will attack the nutlets. Eggs are usually placed singly on the tips of nutlets. Eggs are flat and blue-greenish white in color when first laid, but take on a pinkish red color after 1 or 2 days. Eggs are small in size, about the size of a pinhead. Young worms hatching from eggs, first feed on left buds and then attack the small nutlets.

At least 100 pecan nutlet clusters should be checked on trees in home yards for eggs and worm feeding damage. Check trees two to three times for the next two weeks. When eggs are detected, chemical treatment should be applied in 3 to 5 days. Where feeding damage is detected, chemical treatment should be made that day. Homeowners who are short on water may want to consider not spraying for casebearers this year and just spray trees with zinc. If you load the trees with nutlets and it remains hot and dry, it will stress the trees and produce very poor nuts. This is a year you will need lots of water to maintain tree vigor.

There has been several questions on what insecticides to use for pecan nut casebearer control. A short summary of insecticides labeled for pecans and their uses are:

- Lorsban® 4E, chlorpyrifos,

provides good control of most insects and good to fair aphid control. It is labeled for black pecan aphids, hickory shuckworm, pecan nut casebearer, phylloxera, fall webworm, and spittlebug. It is also labeled for yellow pecan aphids in combination with pyrethroid insecticides.

- Sevin®, carbyl, has several formulations. Early season applications tend to flair aphids and mites. Sevin provides excellent control of pecan weevils.

- Thiodan®, endosulfan, is labeled for black pecan aphids, pecan nut casebearer, and spittlebug. It is highly toxic to cattle, both oral and dermal. It is also highly toxic to humans.

- Diple®, bacillus thuringiensis, and other Bt products provide good control of pecan nut casebearer, fall webworms, and walnut caterpillar. These biological materials are very easy on beneficial insects and will not flare secondary pests. Residual is short-lived.

Before using any product you are not familiar with, be sure and read the label carefully for rates to use, mixing instructions, and precautionary statements.

The pecan nut casebearer has three generations per year. It is about 42 days between the occurrence of each subsequent generation. Some years the second and third generations of this insect may cause considerable damage. Total nut loss is usually during the first generation because an individual larvae may destroy a complete nut cluster.

Zinc can be applied for foliage of pecan trees when applying an insecticide for casebearer control. Regular zinc applications are needed for good development of pecans in this area. When applying zinc, coverage is important because zinc does not translocate in the tree. Symptoms of zinc deficiency are small leaves and rosette shoots. Elemental zinc is toxic to most plants other than pecans and grapes; therefore, avoid drift from phytotoxicity. Never spray young trees that are not actively growing.

Hormone herbicide regulated areas

The northwest part of Runnels County will be a herbicide regulated area again this year, according to Mike Mauldin, Runnels County Extension agent.

The dates that this regulation is in effect is May 26 to October 1, 1998. All persons within the designated area are asked to abide with these regulations.

The regulations are as follows: That portion of Runnels County beginning on the west county line at the point of intersection with the Colorado River, east-southeasterly along the Colorado River to its intersection with U.S. Highway 83, thence north along U.S. Highway 83 to its intersection with the north county line, thence westerly along the north Runnels County line to the northwest corner of the county, thence southerly along the west county line to the Colorado River, the point of beginning, is regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law. In regulated area, no permit is required from October 1st through May 25th of the following year. The application of Ester formulations of regulated herbicides is prohibited from May 26th through September 30th of each year. The application of other regulated herbicides will be allowed beginning May 26th through September 30th of each year provided that a spray permit is obtained prior to each application.
