It is "Oil Patch Basics" time, and we are going to discuss the legalities involved in forming your own oil company.

As in most businesses, the entrepreneur must decide how he or she is going to organize the company. Will it be a sole proprietorship, a partnership, or a corporation? (There are variations inside each of these, but, for simplicity's sake, we will restrict our discussion to these three.)

The general definitions of each are as follows: a sole proprietorship is a company owned by an individual with all income and expenses flowing to and from the individual (this is important at tax time-we'll explain more later); a partnership is a company that is owned by more than one person with all income and expense flowing to and from the individuals involved (there are 'limited' partnerships, etc., but we are going to keep it simple, here); and, a corporation is an entity unto itself that may have one or many owners with income and expense flowing in and out of the corporation and not directly to the individual

I hope that all of the attorneys and accountants reading this (can they read?—only kidding!) will forgive my simplistic approach and the technical errors I may make. I am only trying to introduce the general populace to what is out there for organizational choices.

Although it might be prudent to speak to an attorney about your options, there is no law that requires you to do so. Some of the pros and cons of each type of organization are worth mentioning.

In a sole proprietorship, the individual bears all financial and legal responsibility and liability of the business. If someone sues the company and wins a large sum, it must come from the company if there is enough there to pay the award and the individual would be responsible for what the company was not able to pay. Thus, there is no 'wall' to protect the individual from legal and financial liability. On the other hand, the accounting and

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recordkeeping is so much easier. No special forms, except maybe for an assumed name certificate filing (if you have some catchy business name you want to register), are required and filling out tax forms is much simpler.

In a partnership, there is some protection for the individual(s), but only slightly more than a sole proprietorship (different types of partnerships have different levels of protection). The recordkeeping and tax filing is more complicated, but it is a better way to organize a business with several participants.

In a corporation, the best protection for the individual (from liability) is provided. The corporation is like a person—it can be sued and it collects income and pays expenses. If it decides to distribute some income to its shareholders, it can do so (upon instructions of the board of directors). If a corporation is bankrupted, the individuals are protected to a large extent from suffering personal financial loss (except for their investment in the stock of said company). Unfortunately, the filing for corporation status (and the maintenance of such) is more expensive than other organizational set-ups. Also, corporations are double-taxed in that their income is taxed once and then any dividends paid to owners is taxed again (the individual pays taxes on dividends). Plus, Texas corporations are subject to a state income tax in disguise as a franchise tax.

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
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Pastor Jim Hanson

Yesterday was our wedding anniversary. Forty-four (44) years of life together as husband and wife. It has been a good ride.

Our life together started at an altar in a small white frame church with a steeple with a cross on top. In the open country. Saint Lucas Lutheran Church — located about seven miles from a small town,

Cottonwood, Minnesota. In southwestern Minnesota.

It was on a Wednesday night, June 16. We did our marriage vows in the middle of the week, between two Sundays. On Sunday, June 13, I was ordained into the Lutheran ministry. On Sunday June 20, Ramona's brother Bob was ordained. So, because Ramona's eight brothers and sisters were going to be there for both occasions, we did it on a Wednesday...not the traditional Saturday.

I guess we weren't into tradition. We spent a lot of time together on the day of the wedding. My mother and dad did a "Groom's Lunch" at the church in town. All of the wedding party were there, plus a few more. After the lunch, Ramona and I put on some jeans and went out to the neighbors to pick peonies — which were in full bloom. It was a lot of fun. And we talked about a lot of things - mostly about what we were going to do as a married couple.

We came to the church about an hour and a half before the ceremony. Ramona and her bridal party had a lot of primping and fixing to do...and without indoor plumbing, that took some planning and some special arrangements.

Earlier that day, Ramona and I had strolled through the church cemetery, which was located just in back of the church. We saw the graves of many of her relatives, including her mother and dad. One of the last things her dad did before he died, the previous October, was to give her hand to mine. Yes, we were of the old school. It was the custom, then, and I think it is a good one, to ask the parents of your "intended" for her hand in marriage. So, after I heard Ramona say "Yes" to my asking her to marry me, I went up to the hospital where he was spending his last days, and asked, "Mr. Komplien, I truly love your daughter Ramona, and I ask you to give her hand to me in marriage." For a moment, he hesitated, and a great gulp started deep in my soul. But then he smiled, and said "Yes." I wanted to shout "Hallelujah!"

And then we talked, he and I, about Ramona. She was his youngest of nine children, and had spent twenty-two and a half years at home on the farm with him and his wife. She had given up her chance to go to college in order to stay home and care for her mother who had terminal cancer. After she died, she went back to Minneapolis to work at Dayton's, a large department store, sort of like Dillard's in Abilene. Only not in a mall. And then, when her father was diagnosed with cancer a few months after his wife died, Ramona came home to take care of him. So, she was very precious to him. As she was and is to me.

It was our last conversation — and he gave to me his most precious gift. So, it seemed only right that we should spend a little time at their grave site, thanking God for them, and, in our own way, letting them know what we were doing. Life goes on, on earth, as well as in heaven. It was a necessary connection, and a very moving one.

That night Ramona and I stood before that altar, before my father,

and took the vows:

"I take thee, to be my wedded wife (husband), to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death us do part according to God's holy ordinance; and there to I plight thee my troth."

Yesterday, as we began the day, it seemed only right that we should renew our vows. So, we did. After living in five different communities, raising five children, being blessed with thirteen grandchildren, and experiencing all the conditions in our commitment, the vows still work. These words, "to have and to hold...to love and to cherish...'til death...according to God's holy ordinance" are worth repeating. And more so, worth doing ... every day. Thank God for Christian marriage.

# The war goes on

At first each plane had 6 to 8 crewmen and a crew chief. All of them participated in maintaining and flying the plane.

About a year later, they switched to production line maintenance. This meant that non-flying mechanics were doing the engine changes, props and the 100-500 inspections. The flying crew chief and aerial engineer did the daily preflight, 25 and 50 hour inspections, and took care of the maintenance flight forms. That was a vast improvement over working 24 to 36 hours straight flying to get a downed plane back in the air and flying after.

Joe Emmert never forgot the sense of alarm he felt on night flying and first saw "angel fire" on the wing tips. This is a glow caused by static electricity generated by the friction of the plane moving through the air. Seeing it for the first time made the hair stand up on the back of his neck.

Hendricks Field was built partly in the swamps and was bordered with swamp, water, and citrus groves. There were alligators, large bass, plenty of big mosquitoes, and snakes in the water beside the

About the middle of 1945, Willie Rolph and Joe were fishing together at Lake Istapoga. They waded out about 50 feet in waist deep water past a sandbar that was about 2 feet deep and into real deep water. About that time, a 14 foot alligator stuck its head up between them and the shore. They tore up a lot of water getting back to dry land, and decided they had all the fishing they could stand.

The swamps near the Everglades caught on fire around Lake Okeechobee and the rotten vegetation deep in the swamps smoldered. It was dangerous to walk anywhere near it as the swampland caved and gave way under you and that would be the end.

A large part of Florida was draped in thick black smoke which irritated our eyes. We flew in low visibility over the area of the fires which destroyed much vegetation and wildlife. This was about

His personal crew chief, and aerial engineer, was Master Sgt. Augustus Roberts of the 76th Air Base and Base Headquarters Squadron. He worked over the other squadrons as a supervisor.

When Joe was fairly new to the flight line, they were ordered to put wing jacks under a plane and pack the wheel bearings. When they completed their job, Sgt. Roberts came out of the line shack and ordered them to pull the wheel off the plane and repack the bearings. He supervised the repacking and impressed the men with its importance.

It had to be done right or the lives of everyone on board would be lost because of poor workmanship. And they became more careful as they had to fly in the plane.

Joe said, "Our base flew submarine patrol off the Miami coast after the German subs torpedoed two ships less then two miles apart. One could get airsick and seasick at the same time while flying at a low altitude, watching intently for a silhouette or periscope. You had to take your eyes off the water or risk losing you breakfast."

Joe knows what they are talking about when the following are mentioned: turbulence, near midair collisions, plane crashes, weightlessness, pilot and/or tower error on television.

They flew through hurricanes on instrument flights. On a clear day, they put green plastic on the cockpit windows and the pilots used red goggles. They could not see out of the cockpit on instrument flights.

In his 3-1/2 years on the flying crew, Joe was often afraid when they were flying high altitude on oxygen and hit turbalance(they called it low pressure areas.) He once was sitting in the bomb bay on a platform, with an oxygen age group, and in 3-on-3 compemask on, when suddenly he hit tition.

the top of the fuselage. What seemed an eternity later, he hit the floor of the platform. That was on a clear day. They might have expected it in a thunderstorm, or hurricane, but not on that day! Next on to Florida

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



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

BYLAWS OF COLEMAN COUNTY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE INC. ANNUAL MEETING **ARTICLE II** 

**Meeting of Members** SECTION 1. ANNUAL MEETING. The annual meeting of members shall be held at such time, during the month of July as the Board of Directors may direct, and such meeting shall be held at such place in the Cooperative service area, as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports covering the previous fiscal year, and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. If the election of directors shall not be held on the day designated herein for any annual meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as con-veniently may be. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution

of the Cooperative. SECTION 2. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called by the President, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority thereof, or upon a written request signed by at least ten per centum (10%) of all members and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Secretary to cause notice of such meeting to be given as hereinafter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within the County of Coleman in the State of Texas specified in the notice of the special meeting, or elsewhere within the area served by the Cooperative as may be designated by the Board of

SECTION 3. NOTICE OF **MEMBERS' MEETINGS.** Written or printed notice stating the place, day, and hour of the meeting and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or by persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the Cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members at any such meeting.

SECTION 4. QUORUM. As long as the total number of members does not exceed one thousand (1,000), at least fifteen per centum (15%) of the total number present in person shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. In case the total number of members shall exceed one thousand (1,000) then at least one hundred fifty (150) of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members.

If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting trom time to time without further notice.

SECTION 5. VOTING. Each member shall be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. At all meetings of the members at which a quorum is present all questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by mail, except as otherwise provided by law, the articles of incorporation of the Cooperative or by these bylaws. If a husband and wife hold a joint membership they shall jointly be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members.

SECTION 6. VOTING BY

MAIL. In addition to the method of voting for directors of the Cooperative as provided by the existing bylaws and by a member being present and voting in person, each member shall be and is hereby permitted to vote by mail for directors of this association. At the time notices of members' meetings are given as provided by Article II of these bylaws and with a notice of member's annual meeting, or any postponement thereof, there shall be sent to each member either personally or by mail a ballot which shall contain the names of all members who have been nominated as candidates for directors with a statement of the number to be elected and with appropriate instructions to the member to vote for such members: EACH MEMBER SHALL BE INSTRUCTED AFTER VOTING FOR THE REQUIRED NUMBER TO SIGN SAID BALLOT AND RE-TURN THE BALLOT TO THE CO-OPERATIVE AT ITS OFFICE PRIOR TO THE DATE OF SAID MEETING. Said ballots when so received shall be retained and placed in a locked ballot box until the date of the members' meeting at which time shall be delivered to the inspectors of Election and counted together with the votes cast in person at such members' meeting. The Directors who receive a plurality of the vote shall be elected. Drawing by lot shall resolve, when necessary, any tie votes.

SECTION 7. ORDER OF BUSINESS. The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows:

1. Report the existence of a quo-

2. Reading of the notice of the meeting and proof of the due publication of mailing thereof, or the waiver or waivers of notice of the meeting, as the case may be.

3. Reading of unapproved min-

utes of previous meetings of the members and the taking of necessary action thereon.

4. Presentation and consideration of, and acting upon, reports of officers, directors, and committees.

5. Election of directors.

6. Unfinished business.

7. New business. 8. Adjournment.




