

The holidays are just around the corner and the more collected, the better the distribution.



If a company is an independent, there are few options save hunkering down to withstand the worst. For integrated companies (those with refining and marketing business units), there are more options.

Integrated companies can reap the benefits of falling prices by collecting on the positive spread between refined products prices and crude prices. This positive spread occurs as the profit margin between costs of input materials (crude oil) falls by more than the retail prices of refined output (gasoline, for instance). Check to see if your neighborhood gasoline price has dropped by 40% since last year to understand this concept.

This cash flow positive helps offset the bleeding on the production side. That's why you see the big companies showing only soso results (instead of disasterous results), while the independents are running for cover.



He was preceded in death by his wife, Dera Brown.



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
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
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Ever so often someone asks me, "What would you do if you weren't a pastor?" My answer was, and still is, "I don't know." I guess I've always felt the call to be one. My mother used to tell me that when the other children would play doctor, or teacher, or farmer,

I would play preacher. She once reminded me of the time when I was six ---she found me outside in the backyard ("preaching for the birds.")

Anyway, I do love my work. And so, when I receive something that encourages me in my work, I feel twice blessed. That happened to me last week when I came home and found on the table in the kitchen a book. It was titled "The Minister's Little Devotional Book." It was written by H.B. London, Junior and Dr. Stan Toler. And published by Honor Books, Incorporated, P. O. Box 55388, Tulsa, Oklahoma. On the inside cover page these words, "Pastor Jim, October is the month to recognize all the good works our pastor does. In appreciation for all you do, I hope you enjoy this Devotional Book. God bless you and Ramona." And then the signature.

It really moved me, and I called this person and told her so. But that was before I really got into it. On the jacket it says, "In just moments every day, you'll be encouraged by the perceptive works of wellknown Christians who have known what it's like to be a spiritual leader." It says some other things too, but this one really hit home tonight when I sat down to write this column.

For some reason I was down...tonight being election night. It's not that I know who won their election or who lost. At this early hour in the evening, only God knows. And I'll wait until the 10 o'clock news to find out, and if it isn't known then, I'll wait until morning. I guess I can sum up my evaluation by writing, "It used to be government of the people, by the people, and for the people, but now it's government of the party, by the party, and for the party. It used to be campaigning ... now it's war. It used to be debate ... now it's name-calling. It used to be fun...now it's a pain." At least it seems that way for me. The only ones that win are the ad-writers, the T.V. stations, and radios - who get paid big bucks for the advertising. And money does the talking. At least it seems that way to me.

Clerk to opponent Vicki Rutledge's 26%. The two were running for a full term as County Clerk following the retirement of Linda Bruchmiller, longtime clerk.

Ocker was appointed to finish out Bruchmiller's term by Runnels County Commissioners following her retirement. Ocker received 2109 votes to 741 for Rutledge.




Now it was Coleman's turn.




