We have received many positive responses and a few that do not wish this service.




The basic idea is correct (selling to meet obligations), but there are some subtle forces at work that have kept most properties with their current owners.

Of course, the companies that don't have significant debt, such as the majors, cash-strong smaller companies, and those with low cost oil production are not likely to be forced to sell. But, those companies with whopping debt-to-equity ratios, are starving for cash flow and their properties are not providing it at current prices. So why are they not selling?

Well, along with their loan payments, there is the issue of collateral. The loans are typically reassessed on a calendar basis, with most of those reviews complete by the end of the first quarter of a typical year (March 31). It makes sense for many companies undergoing an end-year review to hold onto their properties to meet collateral/debt ratios.

Face it, one stands a better chance of convincing the banker that a property has a certain value that might be between the previous price and the current priceas long as it hasn't actually sold to establish its market value. Once a person sells a property, the market value has been set. And, if you sell now, you will get an industrylow price.

So, the owners are waiting for their annual review to be over to allow finalization of the final parameters of the loan. Once they pass that hurdle, then debt pay-



tion that they believe a great flood of properties will hit the market in the 2nd quarter. This would make sense considering that a great amount of pent-up supply will become available at that time.

We'll wait and see, but the time for bottom-fishing may be upon us. Do you have your bait ready?


Thirty-Nine Plus meetings changed to second Thurs.





CROPS ACREAGE RE-PORTS—If you have acreages of small grains planted for grazing, harvest for grain, or both, now is the time to begin filing acreage reports.

The final date to file an acreage report for 1999 small grain crops is May 3rd.

If the expected grazing from the small grain crop, (if you because no grazing was available) was less than you normally get from small grain grazing, you need to file an FSA-574 which will serve as your notice of loss for NAP (Non-Insured Assistance Program) purposes.

CROP LOSS DISASTER ASSISTANCE-The Fiscal Year 1999 Budget Bill included \$2.375 billion for emergency financial assistance to farmers who suffered losses due to natural disaster.

Farmers are eligible for compensation either for losses suffered to the 1998 crops (single year) or losses in any three or more crop years between 1994 and 1998 (multi-year.)

Farmers can receive payments under either the single year or multi-year provisions, but not both and USDA will make payments at the higher of the two levels. In addition, up to \$400 million will be used as an incentive for farmers to buy higher levels of crop insurance coverage.

All farmers will get special 25%-35% premium discount on by-up insurance in the future. Payments to farmers will be prorated so that payments do not exceed program requirements and budget limitations.

Sign-up will begin after we have received crop insurance and other information via a computer download. We will let you know

LIVESTOCK ASSIS-TANCE PROGRAM (LAP) EXTENDED-The sign up period for this program has been extended at least 30 days from the Friday, February 5, 1999 deadline. To ensure that all farmers have the opportunity to benefit from this onetime premium reduction for 1999, crops with a sales closing date between July 31, 1998 and February 15, 1999 now have a new sales closing date of March 15, 1999.

City sales tax rebates decrease 8.94%

As reported by the office of State Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander, February sales tax rebates for the city of Winters decreased 8.94 percent as compared to the prior year's February payment.

Winters' rebates totaled \$19,004.11 this reporting period. For the prior year's reporting period, rebates totaled \$20,870.91.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers in December, and reported to the Comptroller in January, plus guarterly returns for sales in October, November, and December, and returns from annual filers for the entire year of 1998.

Receipts in Miles decreased 4.14 percent; Ballinger decreased 18.99 percent and reported \$97,273.47 in payments.

City sales tax rebates to date for Runnels County for the 1999 reporting period total \$133,553.834, a 16.18 percent decrease as compared to last year's period total of \$159,352.25.

The current city sales tax rate for Winters and Ballinger is 1.5 percent. Miles is 1.00 percent.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation is scheduled for Friday, March 12, 1999.


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
