Eula School Tax Vote Scheduled

Patrons of the Eula School District will vote Saturday, August 15th on whether to raise the tax rate from \$1.25 on the \$1.00 assessed valuation to \$1.50.

The School Board explained that the higher tax rate was needed to meet the new state regulations in regard to the num-ber of subjects offered.

One teacher is being paid out of local maintenance funds now and another will need to be added in 1960 - 1961.

Physics will be offered for the first time this year and the Ele-mentary science program is be-ing strengthened. Additional ing strengthened. Additional science equipment will need to be purchased. The school plant must be repaired and maintained.

The rising cost of education has caused Eula's share of the Minimum Foundation Program to increase and the district evaluation is decreasing.

Eula is the only school dis-trict in Callahan and one of the very few in this area with a pre-sent \$1.25 tax rate.

The tax hike will apply, if passed, on the 1960 tax renditions.

Social Security

Disability Pay
Disabled workers who have not applied for social security disability benefits because they are receiving disability payments from another Federal agency, or under a State Workmen's Compensation program, should get in touch with their local social security office without delay.

According to R. R. Tuley, In

According to R. R. Tuley, Jr., manager of the Abliene social se-curity district office, many such workers can now get social se-curtly disability benefits. More-over, benefits can go back as far as August, 1958, if an appli-cation is filed before September 1. 1959.

Under the law in effect prior to August 1958, a worker's social security disability payment was reduced by the amount of any other disability benefit he received under a State Workmen's Compensation program, or from another Federal agency. In a number of cases this meant that no social security disability payment could be made. As a result many workers would not have benefited by the "disability freeze" did not file a claim. 

Water Safety Act In Effect Aug. 11th By J. O. Musick PART II

Purely and simply: the intent is the promotion of boating saf-

Accident-

In essence, the Act requires the operator of any boat involved in accident causing death, injury or property damage, to stop, render assistance, give his name, address and identification in writing to any person injured, or to the owner of damaged pro-

In case where an accident re sults in death, injury or property damage in excess of \$100.00, the operator of any motorboat must file a full description of the ac-cident with the Texas Highway Department; such report is not admissable in court as evidence. Intoxication

Any person who operates any vessel, or manipulates any wa-

Upon conviction, the person may be fined not less than \$50.00 or more than \$500 and/or be im-prisoned for not more than six months.

Penalties

A person who violates any section of the Water Safety Act is guilty of a misdemeanor. Upon gullty of a misdemeanor. Upon conviction, such persons may ther, was delighted this week (where another penalty is not provided) be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 or more than \$50.00.



The machinery is already being put in order to conduct this vast undertaking which will last only a few weeks. Some 170,000 persons will be employed on a temporarty basis to assist the Census Bureau officials in this mammoth effort.

job to recruit people to do the work. All persons to be hired must pass a qualifying test showing them capable of gath-ering and submitting the proper

numbers and types of people in a given area and the rate at which the area is changing in size and character. Details used in advertising of almost every product conceivable is a matter of judgment based on information from the census.

The application of many state, municipal and Federa laws depends on the size of a state, county or municipal popu-lation, since this information is qualifying factor.
