## Prominent couple killed in car-train crash

County residents were stunned Friday by the deaths of James and Reta Welch, two of the area's most prominent civic leaders, in a car-train collision at udan. Tay, Lamb County authorities said Wamb County authorities said. Welch was driving the couple's 1992 Chrysler Fifth Avenue when he made a V-turn on an uphill grade
from a dirt road onto an open railroad crossing in front from a dirt road onto an open railroad crossing in front
of an oncoming Santa Fe freight train, authorities said. The train, which the engineer said was traveling 55 mph , collided with the right front side of the Welches'

## car, collapsing the engine housing, dashboard and right front door. The force of the impact hurled the car <br> o a church conference.

 Lamb coner pole 80 feet away Lamb County Justice of the Peace Carolyn Harmonsaid Mr. and Mrs. Wer Mr. and Mrs. Welch both were killed instantly. from the vehicle, Harmon said
"There is some, Harmon said. "There is some difference of opinion as to whether they werc wearing their seatbelts," Harmon said. "I
think Mrs. Welch had her seatbelt on, and that the force of the impact tore it loose."
The couple reportcdly were en route to the Lubbock
Airport, where Mrs. Welch was to catch a plane to go

In reconstructing the accident, authorities said that the Welches-who lived in the Bethel community near Sudan from the north on FM 303 and needed to cros the Santa Fe tracks to reach US 84.
Because of highway construction on US 84, the railroad crossing on FM 303 was barricaded and they were detoured eastward along Railroad Avenue, an unpaved road running alongside and below the Santa
Fe tracks, to the crossing at FM 1843, half a mile away.
FM 1843 intersected with the railroad tracks at an
angle, requiring Welch to make a 100 -degree turn while driving uphill. From the stop sign on Railroad Avenue where it intersects with FM 1843, it is only
feet from the turning point to the rairoad tracks freet from the turning point to the railroad tracks. view in that direction is obscured by two large electrical-switch housings, some light-pole abutments and a guard rail on the west side of the intersection. Also, "because of the slant of that intersection, the
driver is going to be slanted back behind the passenger driver is going to be slanted back behind the passenger
as he looks back down the track, and he's have to really lean out to sce," Harmon said.

The Dimmitt City Council voted Monday night to apply for a Community Development Block Grant east water tower.
Dimmitt Mayor Wayne Collins told the council that the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission would help in putting the application together. He said making the application does not obligate the city unless
the project is selected for funding. the project is selected for funding.
Then the city would have to come up with a portion of the project cost. Collins estimated the replacement cost at a little over $\$ 300,000$, and said the city would probably have to come up with $\$ 50,000$ of that. 30 applications are received each year for Block Grant projects and only six are funded each year. However, he said water projects usually enjoy a pretty high priority in funding selection. He said it could take as many as three repeated applica-
tions, one each year, for the project tions, one each year, for the project
to be approved.
Collins said the last Block Grant
project the city had was the flood control project in the northwest part of town, which was several years
ago. ago. Collins said the old tower is
rusted and probably has other prob lems. He said a larger capacity towe would improve the water pressure and would help keep down the insurance key rate for the city.
In another matter, Collins an nounced that the three at-large posi-
tions on the city council are expiring this year, along with his term as mayor. A city election will be called for May 3. Candidate filing started Monday, continuing through March 19. Early voting will be held April
14-29. The three at-large council members are Carole Dyer, Malcolm meynolds and Lyman Schroeder.

 tree in just a few years, and the tree in just a few years, and the Texas.Oak wilt is the worst plant disease in Texas and there's a widespread effort to control it. Experiment Station forest pathologist Dr. David Appel says the
staewide management plan is working well. Oak wilt is found in much of Central Texas from Corpus Christi to north of Dallas and there have been more recent attacks around Midland in West Texas
Appel says you should not buy
firewood from infected areas. Also be careful not to wound your tree during the springtime when the fungus is most easily spread. Appe says even after oak wilt is detected in your area,
can take.
Digging a trench that's at least 100 feet from the infected tree can help prevent the spread of oak wilt. Appel also recommends injecting your healthy tree with a fungicide, al though neither
is foolproof.
