nutrition and health information on the Web, sorting the fact from the fiction can be a challenge to
many consumers. Consumers should start their information searches by visiting sites which are backed by government or professional organizations such as the USDA, the American Dietetic Food Information Council. ood Information Council.
These organizations have perts on their staff and promote reliable nutrition and health information based on science. Their web sites are kept current, provide information with references that can be checked for accuracy. On the other hand, web sites
that use personal stories to pro that use personal stories to pro-
mote health and nutrition remmote health and nutrition rem-
edies, make unrealistic statements about nutrition, or use words like "conspiracy" or "poison" should be viewed with caution. Even if the information is valid, you may not be getting the complete picture. What about personal web sites? Many experts have their
own web sites and promote valuable information. Consumers who visit personal web sites
should look for credentials as well as references that can be checked For example, if a person claims that he/she is a registered dieti-
