## **Seven WHS** tennis players advance to regionals


Winters High School will be sending seven tennis players to the regional competition April 23-27 in Stephenville.



Is it possible that the oil and gas business could do something to reduce the boom-and-bust cycles that are currently the norm?

I have often repeated the mantra that it "is just the way things are and we better learn to accept it." Volatility seemed unavoidable

After all, we are a long term business that is impacted by shortterm supply-demand cycles. To survive in this business, one has to make investment decisions that have 10-year horizons (or longer), such as building new facilities, developing new fields, or buying/ selling assets.

But, one has to endure the pressure brought to bear by the demand cycle, which can put the brakes on prices in a New York minute or cut the brake cable in a Houston flash.

Or, so I thought.

It seems some trained in the black art of economics say there is a potion for what ails the industry.

The prescription?

Long-term sales contracts. You know...an agreement between producers and buyers of crude and natural gas that has a specified term (years, not days or weeks) with a specific price formula. The operative phrase being "long term"

Upon investigation of some of the assertions of those that support the view that a way to smooth volatility is to set prices for longer terms, I have conjured a few ideas of my own.

In fact, the oil and gas business has basically abandoned any type of long term sales contract with a set price. If there is a purchase contract today, it has a variable price component based on a floating reference price that relies on daily trading closes. That is not a fixed contract--it is only an assurance that someone will buy at market prices that will vary with

This change happened back in the 1970's it appears.

So, the basic assumption that the oil and gas industry does not use long-term, price-setting contracts is factual. And, there was a time, before the switch to spot market prices, when long-term Tott - contracts ruled.

And, during the time of longterm agreements, prices were very stable. However, such contracts choked off any volume that was

needed to support a spot market.

Spot markets are necessary to provide lubrication and flexibility to a market even in the presence of long-term contracts. Without them, operators could not negotiate new contracts based on actual demand/supply signals that would translate directly to a spot price. They, instead, had to settle for a long-term price that was subject to manipulation by a few large buyers or even government agencies.

These findings, however, do not necessarily condemn the idea that long-term contracts could moderate cycles of boom and

Next time, we will finish our fact-finding mission and share some conclusions and opinions that will follow.

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
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Pastor Jim Hanson

The week you read this column will be Holy Week. A very special time of the year for the Christians all over the world. It is a time for remembering Jesus. What He went through for the salvation of the world. His suffering and death on a cross lo-

cated on a garbage dump just outside the city of Jerusalem. The agony and the suffering. The blood. How deep He goes. To save us all.

I rejoice with all of you in Winters. As you gather together each noon during this week at the Community Center. With the Ministerial Alliance leading in worship. Winters is truly blessed with a great bunch of ministers, who truly pray together and work together for the good of the community. It isn't always that way. And, whereas in my 46 years of ministry, I have known some pretty good Ministerial Associations, Winters is the best. And the reason is — they truly believe in God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. And, they practice what they preach.

On Tuesday of the Holy Week, Ramona and I will be attending the funeral service for our dear sister-in-law, Helen Kompelien. She was married to Sidney, Ramona's oldest brother. They didn't have children, so they cared for and supported the kids in the extended family. I don't think they missed an "event" in the lives of our five. Confirmation, high school and college graduations, marriages... you name

Alliance it. They were always there. And it always meant several hundred miles on the road!

Helen didn't say a lot. She didn't dominate the conversation. She listened, and she loved. Years later, after they had graduated from school, they would send her a card or remember her in a special way.

She loved the finer things in life... music, good books, and fancy dishes. Her hair was always fixed just right, and she knew how to dress without being showy. She fit in with her husband's family. She was Ramona's teacher in the one-room school house about a mile from home. She lived in a room at Ramona's parents' house. It was there she met Sidney. And some years later they were married.

She was always "Helen." What you saw and what you heard. No pretending to be someone she was not. She was a good woman.

One summer, while they were living on a farm, a tornado came through the yard. Blew the house right off of them. It was truly a miracle that they came out of it alive. She had 200 stitches taken in her body. Grains of wheat were blown under her skin and had to be removed surgically. For years, she had a "low grade infection." Then one day, a rusty nail that had become imbedded in her buttocks, worked it's way out. No more infection.

But the interesting thing about all this., she rarely talked about the storm. She would simply say, "It was a miracle we got out alive, and we are grateful."

She was a believer. Never lost her faith. There were some tough times when Sidney became addicted to alcohol. But she never left him. She stayed with him. And saw to it that he got the treatment he needed, and then enjoyed the later years when he attained sobriety.

Then, the bummer. One summer she noticed that one of her legs wasn't working right. So, she went to the doctor. He ran some tests. And diagnosed her as having "Lou Gehrig's disease." A sentence that is extremely cruel. You just lose all of your muscle strength. And then you can't talk. And then you can't write. And then you lose all control of your bodily functions. And then... you die.

She never really complained. She did say one day, "I'm so grateful. If I had to get this disease, I'm glad it came late in life." She took life as it came. And she never saw herself as a victim. And blamed no one for her condition. For sure... she didn't blame God. Whenever I took communion to her or prayed with her, her eyes "glowed." As bad as she was physically, she was strong spiritually.

So, Sunday after church, Ramona and I will drive up to Marshall, Minnesota, to join the family and return Helen to the Lord. And, just as He did not lose her in giving her to us, we will not lose her in returning her to Him.

In some mysterious way, it seems that her death and burial come at just the right time. Tuesday of Holy Week. In the context of the suffering and death of the Lord. 



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### Letter to the Editor

## In support of the marriage act

Dear Editor,

I would like to bring to everyone's attention that an important issue is now before the Texas Legislature that is crucial to the future of families. I received this information from Tom Minnery, Vice President, Public Policy of Focus on the Family. Please allow me to share the details.

At issue is the protection of marriage, in the form of the "Defense of Marriage Act." Marriage is the foundation of society and is the best possible structure for raising children. Thus, it deserves a special place in our culture, including laws that are designed to support and strengthen the family. Texas is one of only 15 states in the nation that does not have a law clearly defining that marriages performed in other states will only be recognized in Texas if they are between one man and one woman. Without this protection, Texas may be in danger of being forced by the courts to recognize samesex marriage or civil unions performed in other states. Already, same-sex couples from every state, including Texas, have had a civil union performed in Vermont and have returned home, ready to challenge existing marriage laws.

Similar marriage protection bills have been stalemated in the Texas Legislature in recent years for the same reason it is being held up this year. A House committee hostile to the family is not allowing it to move forward. If it gets out of committee, there is every indication that it will pass by a wide margin. We need a concerted effort to force this leg-

islation to a full vote of the state legislature. The bill is also expected to encounter problems in a Senate committee. One or more of our legislators are members of these problem committees. A massive telephone and mail campaign would put pressure on your legislators to move the "Defense of Marriage Act" forward.

Please make your voice heard on this important issue.

Often, bills move rapidly through the Legislature, so when you receive the information, your prompt action will be critical.

## Locals' granddaughter keeps terminal condition at bay while participating in stock shows mother said.

When Amanda Cooper was diagnosed with cystic fibrosis, her family didn't know how long she would live.

The 18-month-old could not gain weight regardless of how much she ate. And her mother, Sherry, had read that children with cystic fibrosis rarely live past 8 or 10 years.

So before Cooper, who is now 17, ever entered the January 2001 Wall Livestock Show ring with her animals, she already had won. Cooper also showed in the Tom

Green County Livestock Show. Cooper has been showing in stock shows since fourth grade. As a third grader, she and her mother had watched a show in

Winters, and Cooper said she wanted to show lambs. After her first show, Amanda told her mother she didn't want to show animals ever again. A few months later, though, Amanda asked her mother when could they

buy another show lamb. "I have always loved animals," she said. "And I like showing lambs. Pigs are stinky. I love the lambs and I love the people.

"Whoever said lambs don't have personalities have never been around lambs. Each one has its own personality."

Cooper wears a permanent intravenous device, or stent, between two ribs on her right side that can be accessed periodically using a needle. She used to wear an IV in her arm, but her veins have deteriorated too much, her

The device has to be replaced every seven days to avoid infec-

Before a show, Cooper and her mother clean each of her animals. The dust during stock shows makes it hard for the teenager to

through sweat. Their lungs become covered with a sticky mucus that is hard to remove and promotes infection by bacteria.

"It's a hard dose for a new mom to take," Sherry said. "To hear you are only going to have this precious gift for 10 years."

breathe and she begins to cough. When that happens, she has to go home for breathing treatments, much the same as people with

Cystic fibrosis afflicts about 30,000 American children and young adults.

People with cystic fibrosis suffer from chronic lung problems and digestive disorders.

Cystic fibrosis also affects vitamin absorption by clogging other organs, and causes patients to excrete high levels of salt

But with the help of medical advances, the median life expectancy has been extended to just less than 30 years. Sherry knows one cystic fibrosis patient who is in her fifties.

Mrs. Cooper spends some of her free time trying to educate people about cystic fibrosis. She said many of the symptoms are like asthma, but much worse.

"Some friends don't know much about it," she said. "And when I tell them, they don't listen. It's hard for them to under-

stand. When I tell them it's a terminal illness, they sometimes go the other way. They don't know how to deal with it. And some are

more pity friends than real friends." Sherry said she spends as much time as she can with her daughter, while at the same time trying

not to neglect her 11-year-old son,

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T.J. She wants Amanda to experience as much of life as she can. However, she is careful not to spoil her daughter.

"If you do, they become rotten people," she said. "And rotten people are hard to deal with. You have to have limits."

Amanda also enjoys painting. She has entered two paintings in the Tom Green County Crafts

"It's relaxing," she said. "It takes my mind off things. Sometimes I get lost in it and I don't hear what people are saying to me."

Amanda plans to enroll in Abilene Christian University and become an art teacher. Until then, she just wants to enjoy each day.

"I'm not really afraid," she said. "I know I will be with God when I die."

Amanda is the daughter of Ray and Sherry Cooper and the granddaughter of Earl and Edrie Cooper of Winters. Ray is a 1970





## Richard L. Perryman, Acting

State Director for USDA, Rural Development, has announced that even though half of the fiscal year has passed, there are still ample funds available for Very Low and Low Income Housing Loans, Guaranteed Housing Loans, and 504 Loans and Grants (Repair & Rehabilitation only).

Borrowers can often qualify for these purchase/build loans with no down payment.

To be eligible for financing, the home must be located in a rural community with a population of less than 10,000 or on a farm or in open country, not closely associated with an urban area.

Under certain circumstances, loans can be made in towns and cities with populations between 10,000 and 25,000.

Never assume that an area is not eligible for the loan program. Anyone interested in owning their

housing in rural areas own home is encourage to contact the Brownwood Rural Development Office for details on eligible areas.

The loan may be made for up to 100 per cent of the market value. In this instance, no down payment is required, but there are closing costs. For a guaranteed loan, the lender may loan some closing costs, depending on the appraisal. Theoretically, someone could move into a home for zero out of pocket expenses. However, not all costs associated with buying a home can be financed. All loans must be secured by a first lien on a residential property.

**April is Child Abuse Awareness** Month. Instead of my usual question-and-answer column, I would like to talk about ways you can help abused children.

#### REPORT SUSPECTED CHILD ABUSE

State law requires anyone having reasonable suspicion that a child is being physically or emotionally abused or neglected to report the case immediately to a law enforcement agency or to the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (TDPRS). Failure to report suspected child abuse or neglect is a crime punishable by imprisonment for up to 180 days and/or a fine of up to \$2,000.

The law does not require that the person reporting be certain that a child is being abused or neglected before reporting, only to have reason to believe it.

In an acute case, or when a child appears to be in immediate danger, it is best to call 911 or the local law enforcement agency for immediate action. Cases can also be reported to Child Protective Services, the division of TDPRS that handles child abuse and neglect. You can call the TDPRS toll-free hotline 24 hours a day at

#### (800) 252-5400. SUPPORT CHILDREN WHO REPORT ABUSE

Regardless of your relationship to an abused child, your responses, attitudes, and actions can be critical to his or her overall experience and eventual healing.

If you don't vote -

Support programs that assist victims of child sexual abuse.

One of the greatest resources a child victim has is a local child advocacy center. A multi-disciplinary team of child advocates, law enforcement officers, prosecutors, and Child Protective Services staff combines efforts to ease the child's trauma. Interviews are conducted in a child-

friendly environment, and every effort is made to reduce the number of times a child must relate what happened.

My office provided more than \$1.3 million to fund our state's 2. Keep your tone even and children's advocacy efforts last year. More than half of this money is for the direct services provided through the 60 centers located in communities across Texas.

Achild's advocacy center is an important link between child victims and a resource that my office provides to them and their families: financial assistance with expenses related to the crime.

Last year, Crime Victims' If the child needs immediate Compensation, a section of the Crime Victim Service Division of my office, paid out more than \$5.1 million to assist victims under the age of 17. More than 16,00 of those we helped were under the of 17. More than 1,600 of those we helped were under the age of 12. The Crime Victims' Compensation Fund helps pay medical bills, as well as expenses related to counseling. It can also help a child victim's parents with lost wages for taking their child to doctor or counseling appointments or to court events related to the crime.


Jan Burns wasn't born in the saddle, but she got there as quick as she could. She's been riding since she was four and has won over a hundred buckles in barrel racing.

## Rust in wheat & oats

Rust is a fungi that appears on the plant surface. Fungi are tiny, 60°F. thread like microscopic plants, commonly called molds. They require a source of energy, but unlike green plants, cannot use energy from the sun to make food.

They must get food from other sources such as the wheat plant. When these plant-feeding fungus types become numerous, a disease epidemic develops.

The infection element of the leaf and stem fungi is capable of penetrating into a plant directly and will enter through the plant breathing pores or wounds.

Plants have many microscopic breathing pores called stomates on the surface of the leaves. This is a common spot of infestation.

Once the fungal infestation element becomes established inside the plant, numerous strands of hyphae start growing and feeding in the plant tissues. Invaded tissue gradually dies as the fungus feeds on it.

#### Leaf Rust

Leaf rust pustules (uredia) develop primarily on the upper surface of leaf blades. Pustules are round to oval, about 1/50 inch in diameter, light red, and filled with spores (urediospores).

These spores are easily dislodged by the wind or rubbing and accumulate as red dust on hands, clothing and machinery. Rust increases water loss from leaves so they die prematurely.

The optimum temperature for sporulation and infestation is approximately 70° Fahrenheit (F) and infestation can occur within four hours if leaves are wet.

New pustules erupt within to seven to ten days. Rust development is slowed drastically with cooler temperatures or a shorter leaf wetting period.

At 60° F a wetting period of eight to ten hours is necessary. Very wet conditions reduce spore dispersal. Epidemics generally develop when favorable moisture

exists and temperatures are above

Since the leaf rust loss results from the early kill of the upper two wheat leaves, the faster an epidemic develops the greater the loss. Loss can be roughly predicted by matching severity on the flag leaf growth stage. If the flag is severely damaged prior to the milk stage, the approximate loss in yield is 25 to 40 percent. If the disease damages the flag leaf between the soft and hard dough stages of the developing wheat, yield losses are usually less than

#### 10 percent.

**Stem Rust** Stem rust pustules (uredia) develop on leaves, especially on leaf sheaths, necks, glumes, and awns. These pustules are 1/16 to 1/4 inch, much larger than leaf rust, dark red in color, considerably longer than wide, and are often evident on both the upper and lower leaf surfaces. Pustules raise and break the epidermis making them rough to touch. As the wheat matures the pustules turn black and remain rough.

Wheat is its most common host, but will attack barley, rye, oats, goat grass, and wild barley. With the use of early maturing wheat varieties and resistant varieties stem rust has been reduced to a minor disease.

Chemical Control

Under severe disease situations, the use of chemical control in conjunction with cultivar resis-

tance may prolong the useful life of that particular cultivar.

Several fungicides may be used to control diseases that have reached economic threshold lev-

The mancozeb-containing fungicides (Dithane, Manzate, and Penncozeb) are protectants. They must be in place prior to infection to achieve control.

Mancozeb does not enter the plant, but provides a protective barrier to the disease causing organism.

Since most of our wheat has leaf rust already, the fungicides of choice would be Stratego, Tilt, or Quadris, which are systemic fungicides. These fungicides enter the plant and move systemically to some degree within the conductive tissues. They may be protective, eradicant, or both. The eradicative properties can stop disease development even though infestations have already occurred; however, symptoms remain if present at the time of the fungicide application.

When control of a disease Stem rust greatly increases complex is needed, a mixture of gicide may be required.

#### Sign-up begins for Pasture **Recovery Program**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that sign-up has now begun for the Pasture Recovery Program.

Under this program, eligible farmers and ranchers whose pastures were damaged by natural disaster, including drought, can receive payments to help them reestablish forage crops.

is funded at \$40 million and is available only in counties that suffered natural disaster damage

#### House votes on two bills to repeal the estate tax

On Wednesday, April 4, the House passed legislation that would eliminate the estate tax

over the next ten years. For a long time now I have supported estate tax relief for small businesses, family farmers and ranchers, and other owners of small estates. If the Senate passes similar legislation, I am confident that President Bush will sign estate tax repeal into law later this

The House considered two ver-

I voted for both proposals, I believe the minority proposal was far more preferable.

The minority version would have raised the exclusion to \$4 million per couple, starting this coming January, and the exclusion would have been increased to \$5 million by the year 2010.

I preferred this version because it would have provided more im-The Pasture Recovery Program mediate relief from the estate tax for virtually every person in the 17th Congressional District.

The majority version will eventually bring about total repeal of the estate tax, however it will be slowly phased in over the next decade and this means that many folks won't realize the benefit of estate tax repeal for years to come.

As with all tax cuts or spending bills, we need to be aware of their impact on the budget, and we must avoid returning to the days of deficit spending.

The National Grain Sorghum Producers also came before the House Agriculture Committee this week and offered their recommendations for the next Farm

sions of estate tax relief and, while ers Federation and so many other commodity groups, the Sorghum Producers believe there is a need for a national counter-cyclical safety net.

They also believe that this safety net should be based on county and regional production and counter-cyclical support payments should be constructed on a commodity-by-commodity basis.

#### Senate votes to increase Ag. funding in budget

I was encouraged this week to see that the Senate seems to be much more interested in increasing funding for agriculture than the House is.

On Wednesday, the Senate passed an amendment to the fiscal year 2002 budget resolution to provide an additional \$63.5 billion to the agriculture portion of the budget over the next ten years, including \$5 billion in emergency spending for 2001.

A number of groups including the National Cotton Council, the National Wheat Growers, the National Farmers Union, and the American Farm Bureau Federation have told the House Agriculture Committee that there is a need to increase agriculture spending by an additional \$9 to \$12 billion per year.
