



Despite Mayfest festivities, the rains were a welcome sight last weekend in Winters and northern Runnels County. Anywhere from an inch and half to five inches of rain was reported in the area.

Walker reelected in close race; annexation into L-KWCD passes

Incumbent Larry Walker was re-elected to the Winters ISD School Board, Place 7-At Large, by a nine vote margin in Saturday's only contested race. Walker tallied 98 votes, followed closely by Rodrick Bredemeyer with 89, and Steve Esquivel with 31 votes.

Running unopposed, WISD School Board President Allen Andrae received 18 votes to be reelected for his third term on the board at Place 1.

Election clerk Jimmy Butler said, "We saw more voter turnout than we've seen in several years. We attribute that to the Place 7 school board race. We're happy to see so many people out and voting."

In the only other ballot item, the annexation of Runnels County into the Lipan-Kickapoo Water Conservation District was passed by a county-wide vote of 225-189. All three Runnels County boxes carried, with Winters voting 77-35 in favor of the annexation.

"In light of what's happening in water issues in Texas, passing the Lipan-Kickapoo election in Runnels County will give us a lot more local control over future water disputes," said local Lipan-Kickapoo coordinator Randall

Postal workers to collect food on May 12



It's a problem we all wish we

Oil and gas companies, particularly the biggest ones, are making more cash than they know what to do with--literally.

Oh sure, you are sitting there imagining how terrible it would be to have to find places to store all those irritating green pieces of paper. They just keep pouring in the door! What ever shall we do?

All kidding aside, making too much cash can be a problem for corporations who have shareholders willing to bolt for another investment in a heartbeat. Those shareholders want a return on their investment, which requires reinvestment of cashflow in something more than a passbook savings ac-

In the oil and gas business, return on investment has to be high to offset the additional risk. And, investment is usually measured in the "what have you done for me lately" mode. Even if a company consistently returns over 10 percent averaged over a 10-year period, investors may bolt in any one quarter when return drops to something less.

So, bringing in this cash presents a problem: where to invest the cash so that returns continue to be high.

The choices are: buy their own stock back, buy whole other companies, buy reserves of other companies through field acquisitions, or invest in successful exploration and development opportunities. Without this investment, the return will never be as high as it has been (especially now), disappointing current and potential investors.

Buying your own stock has always been popular among big corporations, particularly during times of undervaluations. And, energy companies are certainly undervalued in terms of current profits. Buying your own stock has the advantage of limited downside risk, it increases the value of outstanding stock immediately, and it requires no special skills among management or company personnel to accomplish. However, it is not always seen by investors as all that big of a deal and it certainly doesn't do anything to create long-term

Company acquisitions are great if you can get them. So, this is why you read of megamergers, niche company acquisitions, refining company combinations, and other transactions over the last 18 months. Companies with cash to spend have been looking at every corporate combination or purchase imaginable to put their money to work, but those options are running out. Many of the good opportunities have been exhausted.

Companies have set up teams to look at field acquisitions all over the world to spend money, also. While this can turn up some real growth opportunities, property prices are very high these days. Sellers want prices that reflect prevailing oil and gas prices, but buy-

ers need to hedge that some due to the risk that prices will moderate eventually. This has stalled many transactions, lately.

So, companies are left with what they are supposed to do anyway: find and develop oil and gas properties they already own. This is hard, requires lots of smart people, and can be risky. But, of course, it is how companies got to the point of generating all that cash, anyway.

Some companies are coming to the realization that this is the path left for them, but others are still in denial. It will be interesting to see how this goes--keep your eye on





Older Americans Month 2001: "The Many Faces of Aging"

May is Older Americans middle of the 21st century, every Month and Social Security joins the Administration on Aging and organizations around the nation in celebrating the contributions of older Americans to society, according to Fredi Franki, Social Security manager in San Angelo.

"The theme for this year is "The Many Faces of Aging." It acknowledges the promise and the challenges posed by the United States's rapidly increasing multi-cultural aging population," Franki stated.

Social Security pays monthly retirement benefits to more than 31 million retired workers and their family members. More than nine in 10 Americans who are age 65 or older get Social Security benefits," she said.

She noted that by 2030, minorities will represent 25 percent of the elder population. By the

third older person will be from a minority group. "Social Security contributes

greatly to the financial security of minority communities as well as older Americans," Franki stated.

Social Security benefits generally represent a larger share of the income of minority communities. Social Security benefits are about 1/3 of the income of elderly Americans in the society at large; for African Americans and for Hispanics, the figure is almost 40 percent.



Hendrick Hospice had a banquet the other night. This one was for volunteers. The folks who are a very important part of the Hospice program. Hospice does not just provide professional care: doctors and nurses and social workers... the folks who get paid. It also has a host of folks who are

volunteers. Just ordinary folks who want to help other folks who are going through very tough times.

I was a Hospice Volunteer Chaplain for 25 years... in three different places. Crookston, Minnesota; Odessa, Texas; and Winters. It was a real blessing for me. As volunteer chaplains, we do not replace the family's pastor. We are just there to see to it that the patient and the family have their spiritual needs met. It was a blessing for me to be a part of that wonderful program.

Part of the blessing, a big part I would say, was seeing the other volunteers work with and for the patient and the family. Some were "gofers." They would "go fer" groceries, or pick up supplies for the house. Some would provide transportation. Others would "patient sit," give the primary caregiver a break for three of four hours. Some would even spend a night... to give the caregiver a chance to sleep a full night. They were the smilingest folks I ever knew. One guy I knew took his patient fishing. And it was o.k. The first time they even caught a few fish, and the patient taught the volunteer a new way to catch them. I can't begin to tell you the many ways that these volunteers made life better for folks who had a terminal illness or their family.

The theme for the banquet that night was "Volunteers are Stars." Not "movie stars," but rather like stars that shine in the night. They are "light bringers" who brighten up the days and nights for sick folks. There were little stars sprinkled over the white table cloths and balloons moving through the air. And there were awards given... to volunteers. Some who worked in the office, some Hendrick Hospital. We all were so glad to see them honored.

But, the most special part of the evening was our speaker. Let me tell you about him, and what he does as a Hospice Volunteer.

He's not a big man. But his eyes shine like the stars, and his smile is so big... it just takes you in. Even his words bring life and joy and brightness to your soul... no matter what he is saying. He is a Hispanic who brings the very heart of God to all he ministers.

His name is Sam. I forget his last name. But I don't think I'll ever forget him. Or his speech. For he didn't just talk. He also sang. And whistled! When he goes to visit a hospice patient, he will visit with them. Talk about whatever. But then he will ask "What is your favorite song?" Sam says that the three favorite songs are "Amazing Grace," "How Great thou Art," and "In the Garden." I'm not surprised. They children up to their 19th birthday. and are special. but it's nice to know so many others feel the same way... So personal. Intimate. And real. It is "Amazing Grace that saved a By wretch like me, who once was lost but now am found." And it is the Lord, my God, who births awesome wonder in us. And it is He who "walks with me and talks with me and tells me I am His own."

The point is Sam sings these songs. He doesn't just talk about them. And he also whistles them... and the singing and the whistling bring music to their minds, and bodies, and souls. At their home. In the hospital room. Wherever.

What a gift he brings! What a gift he is! Sam told us of a time when the family was gathered around the bedside of their loved one. Sam asked his question, "What is your favorite song? Wingate baby has rough road ahead

Little Meagan Renea Prather is too young to understand why she spends so many days being poked and prodded by doctors and nurses. But she does understand the unconditional love of her mother and father and other family members, and is quick to answer with a toothless grin and twinkling eyes.

On April 24, Meagan underwent another surgery — this one to

repair a cleft palate, one of several birth defects she arrived with on October 10, 2000.

The second child born to Melissa and Joe Prather of Wingate, Meagan has an older brother, Luke Dalton, who is just an ordinary three-year-old. But, despite her mother's normal pregnancy, little Meagan drew a different lot in life.

"She's our miracle child," says Melissa. "She was born at 3:13 p.m. but Joe and I were not allowed to see her until about five o'clock the next morning."

The doctors told Joe and Melissa that their little girl had several problems including a missing bone in her left arm, a missing left rib, a short bone in her left leg, immobility of her left knee, club feet, fatty deposits around her spinal cord, bladder problems, and only part of the normal bones on the left side of her back.

Melissa said as soon as Joe looked into his tiny daughter's eyes, he knew she could beat all


"Many people wonder why she has the brace on her arm," says Melissa. "We prefer that people be open with their curiosity. We'd much rather have them come right out and ask us instead of staring and whispering."

The cleft palate repair done on April 24 has hit a setback in that one of the sutures came loose, leaving a drinking straw-size hole in the roof of Meagan's mouth. So a return trip to Medical City Hospital in Dallas was scheduled for May 10 to repair the hole.

Although the family has no personal medical insurance, a government disability program covers most expenses.

As far as other surgeries are concerned, "We'll just have to take them as they come and as she grows older and stronger," says Melissa.





Pest Management News

By Richard Minzenmayer, Extension Agent-Entomology (PM)

GENERAL SITUATION—

Temperatures have warmed up and moisture conditions have changed dramatically in the past two weeks (last week of April and first week of May). It's amazing how fast dry conditions have returned to Concho Valley.

Wheat is in a moisture deficit right now. Armyworms and cutworms are moving out of pastures and into wheat, sorghum, and haygrazer fields by the thousands. In some areas, the ground is literally crawling alive with worms. Most of the wheat is in the milk to a soft dough stage.

ARMYWORMS-Armyworms continue to be a problem throughout the area.

Producers are encouraged to continue inspection of wheat, sorghum, and haygrazer fields for armyworms and their damage. During the last week of April, armyworm numbers ranged from 3 to 22 per square foot. The highest numbers are usually found in close proximity to pastures or wheat fields with high plant density and still lush green.

Will sorghum and haygrazer come back if the leaf area is removed above ground? The growing point is still below the soil surface. Much of the leaf can be removed without killing the plant. However, growing conditions need to be favorable and sorghum is usually always slow to recover even when conditions are good.

So monitor your stands carefully. You may get by just spraying the field margins.

WIREWORMS & CUT-WORMS-With the excellent crop of weeds this spring, comes wireworms and cutworms which could be a problem at planting

False wireworms have already been a problem in some sorghum fields, and producers that are practicing minimum-tillage or nowireworms. Cutworms can cause producers to lose 5 to 50 percent of their stand. The cutworm species that seems to be causing the most problem in this region is the variegated cutworm that exhibits both climbing and army-type be-

Climbing cutworms climb the stems of herbaceous plants, vines, and shrubs and eat buds, leaves, and fruit. The army-type behavior is best described as cutworms that occur in great numbers, and after consuming all the vegetation in one area, crawl along the ground by the thousands to new vegetation.

The complete life cycle of the variegated cutworm from egg, larvae, pup to adult varies from 40-48 days. The females lay their eggs in bare patches of 60 or more on stems or leaves of low plants, on twigs or branches of trees, or on fences and buildings. Up to 2,000 eggs can be laid by a single female and hatch in 3-5 days. They may feed for 3-4 weeks before they reach maturity. Then they burrow into the soil and pupate. The moths emerge in 14-30 days. There are 2-3 generations per year.

SCOUT SCHOOL, JUNE 4 & 5—The Tom Green/Runnels County Pest Management Committee is sponsoring a scout school on June 4 & 5. This is the only scout school in the state that provides both an intensive classroom and real field experience in a two-day session.

The school will be at the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in San Angelo. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. CEU credits will be given at that time.

The program will allow the experienced to become familiar again with scouting cotton and associated pests and economic

Educational material will include information on cotton's physiology, varieties, diseases, and insects. In addition, the material will include color photos of insect pests as well as color photos of the natural enemies present in cotton

COTTON—Cotton planting is just around the corner and producers are encouraged to keep to the basics.

Fertilize for a realistic yield goal. The more I study, visit, and experience the use of conservation tillage, the more sense it makes to practice minimum tillage where it's feasible, especially on dryland production. Remember soil temperature needs to be 65°F for eight to ten days at an 8inch depth.

I think for this year a good weed control program is very important (Roundup Ready technology may not be enough.)

Continue to pray for rain and higher commodity prices.

Predator awareness workshop scheduled in Wingate

The Texas Agricultural Exten- tors???" and will conduct a lab sion Service is sponsoring a "Predator Awareness Workshop" to be held on Thursday, May 17, at The Shed in Wingate from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The workshop is meant to bring producers up-to-date on the latest in predator-related management, research, and population dynamics. Animals to be discussed include: coyotes, feral hogs, foxes, bobcats, and mountain lions. Participants are eligible for six continuing education units (CEUs) toward a private applicator license recertification.

Registration opens at 8:00 a.m. The morning session starts at 8:30 a.m. with a "Predator IQ" pre-test and CEU paperwork. Ken Cearley, San Angelo-based Extension wildlife associate, will be the early morning speaker. He will present "Appreciating Preda-

practical on interpreting physical evidence of predation.

A number of predator biological profiles will be presented by video and by Texas Wildlife Damage Management Service staff. Cearley will wrap up the morning with a talk on predator control and wildlife management.

Following a catered lunch, Cearley will open the afternoon session with an update on the "Predators in the Classroom" school curriculum enrichment program.

The program will then split into four 20-minute concurrent predator control demonstrations taught by TWDMS personnel. Session A is "Non-Lethal Approaches;" Session B is "Leg Hold Traps and Snares;" Session C is "M-44 Device and Livestock Protection Collars;" and Session

D is "Aerial Gunning and Call-

Participants will reconvene following the concurrent sessions to hear a spokesman from the Texas Department of Health speak on predators as disease vectors. Cearley will follow with "A Code of Ethics for Predator Management."

The remainder of the day will feature the topics: "Preventing Illicit Use of Pesticides in Predator Control Programs;" "Sheep and Goat Predator Management Board Update;" and "Predators: A Matter of Perspective."

Participants are encouraged to pre-register by calling the Runnels County Extension office by Wednesday, May 16, at 915-365-2219. Cost of the program is \$10 per person payable on the day of the workshop.

The Big Gully

The Grand Canyon is a monumental tribute to soil erosion. This gaping cut in the earth is more than 275 miles long, up to 18 miles wide, and a mile deep. The erosion is powered by the mighty Colorado River that has dumped an almost unthinkable amount of soil material into the Gulf of California.

Geologists are beginning to understand the canyon is relatively young and not all that old as old things go. Sedimentary rocks indicate the Grand Canyon area was once a large landlocked, but shallow, freshwater lake. Gradually the lake began to overflow and the "Big Gully" started its erosive journey across the southwest.

What in the world, you may ask; does the Grand Canyon erosion have to do with Runnels County? Consider both places lose soil to erosion—so let's com-

Grand Canyon erodes at about 1/64 of an inch per year according to data supplied by Science News, Volume 158, relatively slow considering the tremendous cutting power of the Colorado River. We here in Runnels County may lose this much from a slick field in one wind erosion day-1/64 of an inch is not all that much.

Cropland fields in Runnels County, however, can erode soil at a much faster rate. We often observe noticeable small gullies occurring in our bare fields as a result of one rain. Let's say soil losses in these shallow gullies eroded down to plow depth (about four inches). Figure it out-it would take the awesome horsepower of water flowing through Grand Canyon approximately 256
