## Pecan nut casebearer control: spray now to control pests

bearer pheromone traps established in Runnels County indicate that the time to treat for this pest is now.
The first eggs were found May 14 and first significant nut entry should have occurred around May
$16-18$. Therefore, treatments should be made between May 17 24. This date is much earlier tha normal.
Commerical pecan grower will need to continue monitoring pheromone traps and egg laying after the first treatment. A second application may be needed this year. These trees do not need a heavy fruit load this year or it will further stress the tree. It is recommended to foliar apply zinc to the trees several times during the earlier part of
