



City pool to open (maybe)

During their regular meeting Monday night, members of the Winters City Council voted to pen the city swimming pool.

Jack Davis, Jr., City Water Superintendent, reported after a visual inspection of the pool, that he could not see any major cracks or places needing repair. Davis did point out, however, that until the pool is filled with water, there is no way to determine if any leaks are present.

Glen Hoppe, Jr., local resident, is donating the 100,000 gallons of water needed to fill the pool. The water will be pumped from Hoppe's wells into the Winters water treatment plant.

Council members voiced their appreciation to Hoppe for the donation and noted that this will be the only way that the pool will be allowed to open in light of the continuing water shortage.

The pool, which has been dry since the summer of 1999, may possibly have leaks within the underground pipeworks or some other undetectable leak which will prevent it from holding wa-

Davis said if the pool is in good condition and will hold water, that a very minimal amount of water is required to maintain the quality and quantity.

Oil Bidness

We continue with our discussion of what it takes to drill a well.

We left off last time with a typical "oil and gas finder" having completed the process of picking a location and now building a case to support the expenditures required to drill a well.

He or she has used their technical expertise to take geological and engineering data, process it, and use it to project expectations for a new well. Once the case for why a well will encounter oil and/ or gas of some significance is created, there must be some economic justification, as well.

Usually, a projection of expected production is made, along with operating costs, drilling costs, and other expenditures required to drill, complete, and produce the well. This projection is combined with price forecasts, cost inflation forecasts (if desired), and tax implications to show a return on the cost of drilling. If the return, however measured, is sufficient to meet the requirements of the company spending the money, then the well is approved for drilling.

Now, certain regulatory matters must be accommodated, including drilling permits, environmental impact plans, and contingency plans and permits. This usually takes several weeks or months. Once this is done according to principles and practices of the oil field in question, one is ready to start putting together the parts of the work plan that will allow a well to be drilled, completed, and (hopefully) produced.

First, you have to have the rights to drill. If you don't already own the lease for the property on which you want to drill, you have to send out someone (like a landperson, lease scout, or equivalent) to secure the lease for the property where you will drill. The negotiation of a lease is a topic in itself that we will save for another time. Let's move forward assum-

ing the deal is done. Now, you need a rig to drill the hole. And, you need pipe to complete the well (casing, tubing, etc.), so you contract for some. You also need to arrange for logging a well, perhaps someone to

mudlog the well while it is drilling, a company to provide cement for setting casing, and a company to perforate a well if it looks favorable. There are a ton of things you have to arrange or it won't get done, and my list is, by no means, exhaustive. That's why a drilling superintendent or company man is worth their weight in gold.

Finally, you are ready to "turn to the right," and the well starts

Drilling a well is always a test of faith, courage, and perseverance. There will be well kicks, stuck pipe, lost tools, absent service companies, weather delays, and some inevitable bad luck. Eventually, the well will get to bottom.

The task can be daunting, but, for the ones that do it successfully, they never give up, they never assume a well will be their last dry hole, nor do they assume they can't miss. Successful oil and gas people know better.

So, now you are armed with a bit of information on how a well is drilled. I must confess this is the "abridged" version, but don't let that give you the impression it

I only talked about the process, and it made me tired. Others out there make it really happen every day, and their skills can make it look easy but don't be fooled. They are truly professionals in a very complicated business.





This past week, Ramona and I found ourselves in a classroom. At St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Abilene.

No, we are not taking a class for membership there. Rather we were in a class called 55 Alive/ Mature Driving. Sponsored by

American Association of Retired Persons.

the use of a classroom for four hours a day, two days in a row. There were about 20 of us, all retired. Nobody in the room was under 55, and quite a few were older than Ramona and me. Our instructor was honored on his 90th birthday with Joe Houser, who has been teaching this course for many years... I think he said it was 18. He was really a fine instructor, patient. Kind. Understanding. And, "one of us,"... retired and "mature."

He put us at ease right away by having us read the first chapter. May 10. Right away we started to laugh as we read some actual statements taken from Police Reports by some of those over 55 like us. Here

"I collided with a stationary truck coming the other way."

"Coming home, I drove into the wrong house and collided with a tree I don't have."

"My car was legally parked as it backed into the other vehicle." "An invisible car came out of nowhere, struck my vehicle, and

"The telephone pole was approaching fast. I was attempting to swerve out of its path when it struck my front end."

That was truly a "wake up call," for us even as our bellies shook with laughter, there were moments in our driving when we had barely escaped such kind of accidents.

It seems that as we age, we do have things going on in our bodies that make it seem like strange things are going on. Our vision starts to go. Our hearing gets worse. Our reaction time isn't as good. The number one traffic violation for us over 50 is "following too closely." And number 2 is "improper left turn."

So, we got into it for two sessions. We were provided a very good workbook, and we worked our way through it. It really covered the ground. Some the chapter headings were "Judging Yourself," "Physical Changes," "Potential Trouble Spots"... like car phones, parking lots, backing up, and blind spots... where we don't see the care coming around us... on either side. One chapter was on Aggressive Driving/Road Rage. And we had to put that shoe on our foot, as well as those who seem to enjoy bugging us.

And then there were "Safety Considerations," "Signs... like 'Stop," 'School Crossing,' 'No Passing'... what are the shapes and what are the colors?," 'Taking Care of Your Vehicle... is it Safe?," "Intersections," "The Freeway" (which I often refer to as the Valley of the Shadow of I-20), and a really good chapter on that moment that most of us don't even want to face "Driving Retirement." Why should it be so hard to "give up" my driving? I believe it's because most of us think that if we can't drive any more, we don't have our independence. I once knew a man who told his wife, me, and others, that when the time came he was not allowed to drive anymore, "I will commit suicide." And he did. Which was tragic. Most of the time it is our failure to depend on God and others that gets us into trouble. If I live so long that I can't drive anymore, I hope that I will see it as a "gift," a time of preparation. A training in "how to depend" on God.

There are reasons for the course being important. There are 50,000 drivers in the four county area surrounding Abilene who have had no driver training. Those of us who are 55 and older are involved in more crashes per mile than drivers 30-49. And, besides, if you take the course, most insurance companies will give you a 10% discount on your premium.

In Scripture, we don't have rules for driving donkeys or camels. know of no speed zones. Life was pretty much at a walking pace. But we are admonished to love another as Christ loved us. I can't quite toured Sonora Caverns and then picture Him doing road rage. Or tailgating. Or anything like that. I can picture Him being "careful and considerate." And telling us, "Please don't drive faster than your angels can fly."

I can even imagine Him saying, "When you get in your car, and buckle up, take me along. Let me ride with you. And whatever you need to make this trip enjoyable, ask me. And make the highways... Heavenly!" Amen.





Before using any products you are not familiar with, be sure and read the label carefully for rates to use, mixing instructions, and precautionary statements.

Zinc should be applied to foliage of pecan trees when applying an insecticide for casebearer control. Regular zinc applications are needed for good development of pecans. When applying zinc, coverage is important because zinc does not translocate in the tree.

Symptoms of zinc deficiency are small leaves and rosette shoots. Elemental zinc is toxic to most plants other than pecans and grapes; therefore, avoid drift. Never spray young trees that are not actively growing.

TDA to hold public hearing on boll weevil quarantine

The Texas Department of Agriculture will hold a public hearing in San Angelo on Tuesday, May 29, on proposed changes and new rules establishing a boll weevil quarantine in Texas. The hearing will be at 11 a.m. at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center — 7887 U.S. Highway 87 North in San Angelo.

The proposed quarantine regulations restrict movement of regulated items, such as cotton harvesting and hauling equipment, vehicles and raw cotton, from areas of Texas that still have boll weevils into boll weevil eradication zones that have been declared suppressed, functionally eradicated, or eradicated.

"Texas cotton farmers are beginning to win the war against boll weevils - one of the most devastating pests in American agriculture," Agricultural Commissioner Susan Combs said. "The quarantine helps reduce the risk of reinfestation in zones where cotton farmers have devoted their time and effort over the past six to seven years to eradicate the boll weevil."

There are currently 11 active boll weevil eradication zones in Texas covering 6 million acres. The Southern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone was declared functionally eradicated in September 2000.

Under the proposed changes, functionally eradicated means inspectors have found no evidence of reproducing boll weevils in cotton fields in the zone. A suppressed zone can have some reproducing boll weevils present in quantities of .025 weevils or less per trap per week during the growing season. An eradicated area means inspectors have not found any boll weevils for at least one growing season.

The proposed rule changes were published in the Texas Register on May 4. TDA will take public comment through June 4, 2001. Written comments can be submitted to Ed Gage, TDA's coordinator for IPM and Citrus Programs, at P.O. Box 12847, Austin, TX 78711, or fax at (512) 463-1104.

going on-theft of city water. And it is big time. A fellow named Tamaarix and his buddies are the culprits. They are getting the water largely from around the back end of the Winters Lake and nobody seems to notice it happen-

Tamaarix is the fancy name for saltcedar. Many of us do not realize what these plants are capable of doing. The following is a quick review. One mature saltcedar can use up to 200 gallons of water per day-five to ten times more than a big mesquite. Its roots can easily penetrate 25 to 30 feet—usually into the ground water table.

A solid saltcedar stand like those found around parts of the Winters Lake can use from 3 to 5 acre feet of water per acre per year. Saltcedar accumulates salt from the ground and deposits it beneath the plant. The salt buildup actually kills other plants.

One saltcedar can disburse 500,000 seeds in a season—both wind and water borne. It is also a prolific root sprouter. It is believed an east coast nurseryman made the first introduction of saltcedar into North America. The plant has now invaded 1.5 million acres including the entire drainage of our own Colorado River. Saltcedar rates along with fire ants as an expensive pest of the worst kind.

Let us try to calculate how many dollars this plant could be costing the City of Winters. Winters residents pay around \$3.00

There is a lot of water theft per 1000 gallons of water. We in the country pay North Runnels Water Supply Corp. (NRWSC) approximately \$8.60 per 1000 gallons for city furnished water (not counting the monthly charge).

According to one source, the city uses from 13 to 17 million gallons per month (approximately 40 to 50 acre feet). Realize too there is a lot of brush using the water around the two Winters lakes besides saltcedar.

Assume the saltcedar would cover 100 acres of city land. Remember saltcedar can use from 3 to 5 acre-feet per year—we will calculate using the 4 acre-feet. Let's use the \$3.00 per 1000 gallons and not the \$8.60 from NRWSC. Thus one acre-foot of water would cost Winters residents \$977.55. The 4 acre-feet used by one acre of saltcedar could have a value approaching \$3,910.65 a year. This times the estimate of 100 acres of saltcedar could approach \$391,020.00 for the water used by this pest and not by folks in Winters.

Another way to evaluate is "if" just the saltcedar were removed (not considering all the mesquite and other brush infesting the area) there would conceivably be 83 percent more water available from either the lake or from city wells for use during these dry
