Gutsy Blizzards surprise Jackets 21-20

Head Coach Lipsey wins debut over former Winters coach

It all started with Menard winning the coin toss and deferring until the second half, and Winters received the opening kickoff for the first game of the season in Yellowjacket Stadium last Friday night.

Brian Pritchard fielded the kickoff at the 14 and returned it to the 29 yard line. After a short gain on first down, Blizzard quarterback Shane Colburn hit rusty Jackson for twelve and a first down.

Colburn then scampered for seven on first and 10 from the 41 yard line, bringing up 2nd and 3. Colburn found Jackson again for a short gain and Jose Vega picked up the first down with a 5 yard run on 3rd and two.

On first down from the Menard 31 yard line, the Blizzards were penalized five for illegal procedure. After an incompletion on first down, and a short gain on second, Colburn scooted for 13 yards to bring up 4th and second, and the first big decision of the new season. And what a decision it was!

With everyone in the stadium looking for the usual off tackle or quarterback sneak, Colburn faked the handoff to his running back and found Jackson who had gotten behind the Yellowjacket secondary. Jackson snagged the 35 yard

pass and ran it in for the initial score of the game with 7:50 left in the first quarter. Jeffery Oats proved true on the point after and Winters had a 7-0 lead.

After Oats' kickoff, the Jackets set up at the 25 yard line. On first down, Menard struck paydirt with some trick-

ery of their own. What appeared to be a toss sweep turned out to be a halfback pass that went for 75 yards and a touchdown with 7:29 left in the first period. The point after was good and the score stood at 7-7.

The next series produced a

first down as Vega picked up twelve yards on a 2nd and 11. After three plays, the Blizzards faced a 4th and 8. Oats lined up in a punt formation but the snap was mishandled. Oats scooped up the ball and managed to scamper to the 37 yard line, but short of a first down.

Menard took over at the Blizzard 37 yard line, and on first down, the Jackets lit up the scoreboard again with a 37 yard run. With 4:22 still remaining in the first quarter, the PAT was good, giving Menard the edge at 14-7.

County employees upset over new insurance proposals

County employee health insurance coverage was the subject of a special meeting of Runnels County Commissioners on Wednesday, August 30.

The District Courtroom was the location of the meeting to allow seating for the expected number of employees present to discuss the insurance coverage.

Paul Martin of Trimble-Batjer Insurance Associates made a 15-minute presentation on the Blue Cross Blue Shield health plan which is to go into effect November 1.

The major change in the county's plan is deleting the county's paying for dependent health insurance coverage. If the proposed health insurance plan is approved by commissioners, the county will only

pay the cost of insurance for the county employee, not for the employee's dependents. However, according to County Judge Marilyn Egan, if the employee will choose to continue on the County's Blue Cross Blue Shield plan, the county will give the employee a \$250 per month increase in pay. The reasoning behind that payment is the county has been told by the insurance company if too many employees drop off the plan the cost to the county will increase dramatically.

Another change in the coverage was in dependent coverage by the company. Children up to age 25 had been covered if they were a full time student at an accredited college or trade school. With the proposed new policy, that age

would drop to 19. County employees who spoke up at the meeting indicated they went to work for the county because of the benefits provided and they could not afford to pay for health coverage for their families. The discussion between employees and commissioners carried on for almost an hour.

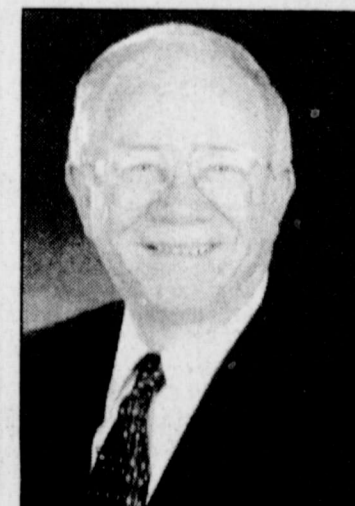
No action was taken by commissioners (all were present for the meeting) and the meeting was adjourned.

Commissioners met again in executive session on Thursday, August 31. Emerging from that closed session, commissioners voted to appoint Barbara Heathcott as manager of the Winters Senior Citizens Activity Center. No other business was handled at that special meeting.

Bishop Chamness to speak at FUMC anniversary this Sunday

Bishop Ben R. Chamness, Bishop of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, will be the guest speaker during the morning worship service at the 110th Anniversary at First United Methodist Church (FUMC) in Winters on Sunday, September 9, 2001.

Bishop Chamness received his associate of arts degree from Lon Morris College, bachelor of arts from Centenary College, master of theology from Perkins School of Theology-Southern Methodist University (SMU), and doctor of ministry from Drew University. He was ordained deacon in 1963 and elder in 1965 in the Texas Annual Conference. He preached for 37 years, and from 1996-2000, was District Superintendent of the Houston Northwest District, Houston, Texas. He was elected to the Episcopacy in July 2000 in Albuquerque and assigned to



the Fort Worth Area Central Texas Conference.

Currently, as Bishop of the Central Texas Conference, he is a member of the Southwestern University Board of Trustees, Texas Wesleyan University Board of Trustees, Harris Methodist Health System Board of Trustees, Board of the Central Texas Methodist Foundation, Aldersgate Enrichment Center Board, Methodist

Children's Home Board, and this quadrennium he is chairing the Wesley Foundation Board, SMU Campus Ministry.

Bishop Chamness and his wife, Joye, have two sons and four grandchildren.

During the anniversary worship service, Dr. Clifton O. Howard, District Superintendent of the Brownwood District of the Central Texas Conference, will participate in the dedication of the Lucile Hill Memorial Prayer Room and the re-dedication of the recently remodeled sanctuary. Dr. Howard received his bachelor of arts in 1977 from Texas Wesleyan University and received his master of divinity in 1991. He has preached for 19 years. He was assigned to the Brownwood District as District Superintendent in June 2001. He and his wife, Barbara, have one son.

Oil Bidness

I was talking to a 'non-oil patch' friend the other day (yes, you can be friends with those that do not work in the oil and gas business from time-to-time), and he mentioned about how exciting it must be in the oil business these days. "You know, with the boom and everything."

My first response, was, "Yes, but..."

Why the 'but'? Well, there are certain parts of the business that are very exciting right now and product prices have everything to do with it. But, there are others that are kind of stuck in neutral.

Those owning producing properties, royalties, and service companies are doing pretty well right now. They have direct pipelines, so to speak, to the advantage that higher prices bring.

But (there's that word, again), what about the other players in the business?

Consider those involved in acquisitions and divestments. While there is still some money being made there, the current situation has hamstringed many potential deals. The 'current situation' includes those same higher prices, so what's the holdup? It appears that the level of confidence in the future of those prices,

along with the reality of current prices, is deterring some buyers and sellers.

Do what? Well, if a person thinks current prices are temporary and the way forward is down for prices, then that person will be less likely to pay a price for an acquisition that reflects current prices. If, on the other hand, another person feels that prices will remain at current levels for some time out, then that person would be more likely to pay a price reflective of current prices (maybe even a premium) for an acquisition. However, these types, few in number anyway, are still a little nervous about buying at current prices.

On the sell side, there is a floor of sorts. No one wants to sell at values that are derived from prices lower than prevailing prices. Even if prices do drop, few people want to miss the opportunity to sell their properties at current prices or higher. A bit of a hedge against being wrong, if you will.

There are also many potential sellers who are bullish on future prices of oil and gas and they want prices that reflect values even above current levels.

If you put groups with these diverse characteristics in a mar-

ketplace, you have a natural lessening of activity. Sellers are usually sitting on properties that they will sell at some minimum price. These sellers will encounter potential buyers who are, for the most part, cautious or pessimistic. The result: lots of 'tire kickers' but few buyers.

This has been the case for a year or more now, and the acquisition/divestment marketplace has been dragged down. The only deals getting done are those where the buyer realistically sees hidden value of some sort (the seller doesn't see it or doesn't have the inclination to capture it).

That doesn't mean that doing property transactions is a dead art. It just means buyers and sellers have to be more creative and diligent to make it happen.

That has never been an insurmountable hurdle in this business.

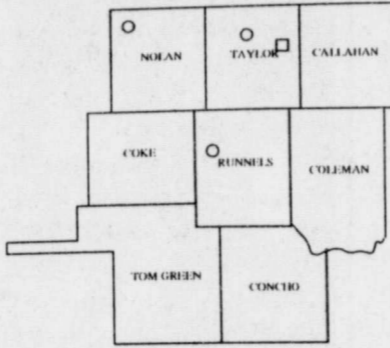

Anita DeLeon Chavez

ARLINGTON—Anita DeLeon Chavez, 76, died Friday, August 31, 2001, at her home in Arlington.

She was born July 26, 1924, in Jame, Coahuila, Mexico and married Juan Chavez Segovia in Mexico. Mrs. Chavez was a certified practical nurse and immigrated to the United States in 1955.

She lived in various cities in Texas and Greeley, Colorado. In the United States, her life career took a change and after finding herself as a single mom with eight children, she and her children began work as migrant workers moving around wherever the work could take them. In the early 60's, Mrs. Chavez became a missionary for the United Methodist Church-Rio Grande Conference.

She married Reverend R.O. Chavez in 1975 in Ballinger, where she resided. She and Reverend Chavez were instrumental in the building of Asbury United Methodist Mission (a Hispanic mission) in Ballinger.

Mrs. Chavez was preceded in death by her mother Margarita Cortez; her father Vicente DeLeon; two sisters, Felicitas and Maria De La Luz; two sons, Abel Chavez and Joel Chavez, Sr.; and her husband, Reverend R.O. Chavez.

She is survived by four sons: Reverend Doctor David Chavez and wife Cecilia of Arlington, Juan Andres Chavez and wife Vickie of College Station, Daniel Chavez and wife Maribel of El Paso, and Jesse Chavez and wife Lydia of Wichita Falls; four daughters: Noemi Chavez Silva and husband Juan Francisco of Rio Grande, Rachel C. Valdez and husband Richard of Abilene, Elizabeth Acuirre and husband Eliberto of Wichita Falls, and Lanea Coler and husband Michael of Roswell, New Mexico; 29 grandchildren; and 22 great-grandchildren.

Prayer services were at 7:00 p.m. Sunday, September 2, at Rains-Seale Chapel in Ballinger. Services were at 10:00 a.m. Monday, September 3, in the Rains-Seale Chapel officiated by Reverend Doctor David Chavez and Reverend David Martinez. Burial followed at the Evergreen Cemetery in Ballinger directed by Rains-Seale Funeral Home.

On the next possession, the Blizzards gave the ball back on an interception and Menard set up at the Blizzard 21 yard line. On first down the Jacket quarterback rolled right and kept the ball to the Blizzard one. The Jackets scored on the next play but the extra point was missed and this would later prove to be a crucial part of the battle. With 2:54 left in the first quarter, the home team held a 20-7 lead. The next series resulted in a 38 yard punt by Oats, setting up Menard at the Winters 40 yard line and ending the first quarter.

The eventful first period seemed to give Menard an easy outing. But the Blizzards had other ideas.

Joey Joeris recovered a Menard fumble at the 41 yard

line on the first play of the second quarter. The Blizzards were forced to punt on their first series of the second period. Oats' kick pinned the Jackets inside their own 10 yard line with a 36 yard punt.

On 3rd and 10 from the 16, the Jackets tried a screen pass to the right. Rusty Jackson was on the same page and snagged the ball on the eleven and had clear sailing to the end zone. With 8:38 left, Oats was again true on the extra point and the gap closed to 20-14.

The rest of the half was a bit of a staring contest with both teams blinking at times. The highlight was an interception near the end zone by Jeremy Hope with 3:06 left in the half.

The second half began with Menard receiving the kickoff

and being forced to punt. Winters was set up on its own 23 yard line but the Blizzards would go three and out. Then Menard did the same, but the Jacket punt was very short and Jackson returned it to the Menard 42 yard line.

The Blizzards put it together featuring runs by Pritchard and Vega, and a completion from Colburn to Mark Moreno. Colburn capped off the drive with a one yard quarterback sneak with 10:18 left in the final quarter. Oats was again true to give the Blizzards the lead in a steady drizzle that set in at half time.

On the next series the Blue team fumbled and Menard recovered on the Blizzard 33 yard line. After two plays, the Jackets returned the favor as Matt Moreno pounced on a fumble at the Winters 24 yard line. After being turned away on 4th and one, the Blizzards turned over the ball on downs at the Menard 40 yard line with 1:47 left.

The Blizzard defense shut down the Jackets and Winters took over on downs with 30 seconds left. Colburn then took a knee as the Blizzards killed the clock to preserve Coach Lipsey's debut as a 21-20 win

over his former mentor, Coach Robin Byrd.

Those of us who witnessed this game last Friday night saw a Blizzard team show a lot of character after falling behind 20-7 in the first quarter. They didn't look for the gate; they looked for an opportunity and found it, then made the best of it.

After the game, a beaming Coach Lipsey said, "I'm so proud of this team. I'll remember this for the rest of my life."

Editor's note: According to Lipsey, Coach Byrd had told him that he hoped their contest would be a one-point game. Guess Byrd got his wish.

The Blizzards will meet Goldthwaite this Friday in Blizzard Stadium. Kickoff is at 8 p.m.

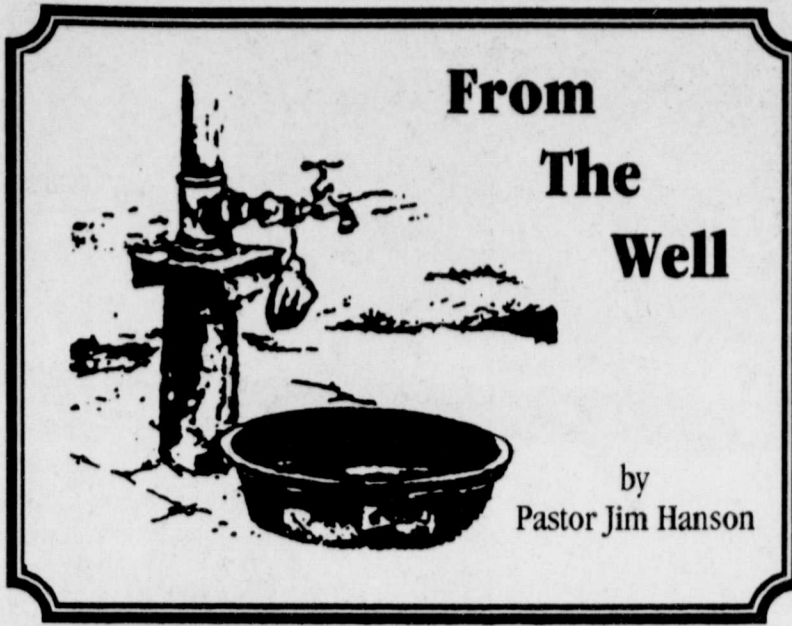

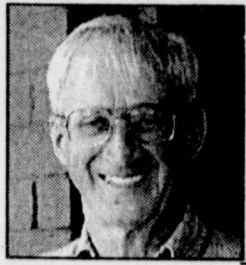

In Revelation 14:13, there is this revelation — "And I heard a voice from heaven saying, 'Write this: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord henceforth. Blessed indeed, says the Spirit, that they may rest from their labor, for their

deeds follow them!'"

Just yesterday, I had the opportunity to reflect on this revelation. I conducted a funeral service for a good friend of mine. Seventy-nine (79) years old. Good farmer. Loved the land. Loved to labor on the land. He had told his wife a number of times, "If I should have a heart attack and die, out in the field, repairing a piece of machinery — don't feel bad. I'll have gone doing what I love to do."

But, he was more than a farmer. He was a husband to his wife in the best sense of the word. When they made their wedding vows years ago, they took! Leroy did not die in the field, doing what he loved to do. He died of cancer in the hospital. But until almost the end, his wife was his caregiver. When I commended her for her love and faithfulness during the past 10 months, she replied, "I would have been happy to keep on caring for him for a lot longer!" Which tells you, not only about his wife, but also about him.

When we gathered as a family before the funeral — to share remembrances — it was a great time. To be sure there were tears. But also laughter. We heard testimony after testimony. About his love and caring for all of them. From the children and the grandchildren. From brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, daughters-in-law, and son-in-law.

It was a feast of love. One of them related how he had accepted her two children from a previous marriage "as if they were his own grandchildren." Wide open were his arms. How he had told his children, "Just remember this, no matter what the problem is, you come home. We'll work it out." He was a family man.

He was a church man, and, more than that, a believer. When it became evident that he was not going to recover, the family had rings made (James Avery's) with a cross and a crown of thorns inscribed. They wore them, as did he, to remind each at all times Who was carrying him and Who was carrying them. As a final gesture, they removed their rings and put them on a chain and placed them in his hands as he lay in the casket! Just as the Scripture says, "Love never ends."

The church was packed. Every space was filled. Chairs in the aisles. Children, teenagers, young couples, middle-aged folks, and seniors were there. To pay respects. To grieve. And to give thanks to God for the love that has come from Him through him to them.

Oh, he wasn't perfect. He was a sinner saved by grace through his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. But he left on earth, a treasury of memories and acts of love that will not be forgotten. And His deeds left their mark. And, as the passage indicates, his deeds followed him. Treasures in heaven. "Where moth and rust do not corrupt and where thieves cannot break in and steal."

That experience caused me to reflect on the meaning of labor. What we do with our lives. The labor we do for the Lord and in the Lord. It lasts. It never ends. It is rooted and grounded in love.

It caused me to ask of myself, "What on earth am I doing for the Lord's sake? And for others?" And to rekindle the flame of love, His love, in me.

And, for sure it beats what one person said about someone who had died, "She liked to make money. To travel, and to shop." Lord, have mercy. What deeds followed her. And where?

Just some reflections on a revelation. And, hopefully, on what are you doing? On earth. For heaven's sake. "For their deeds shall follow them."

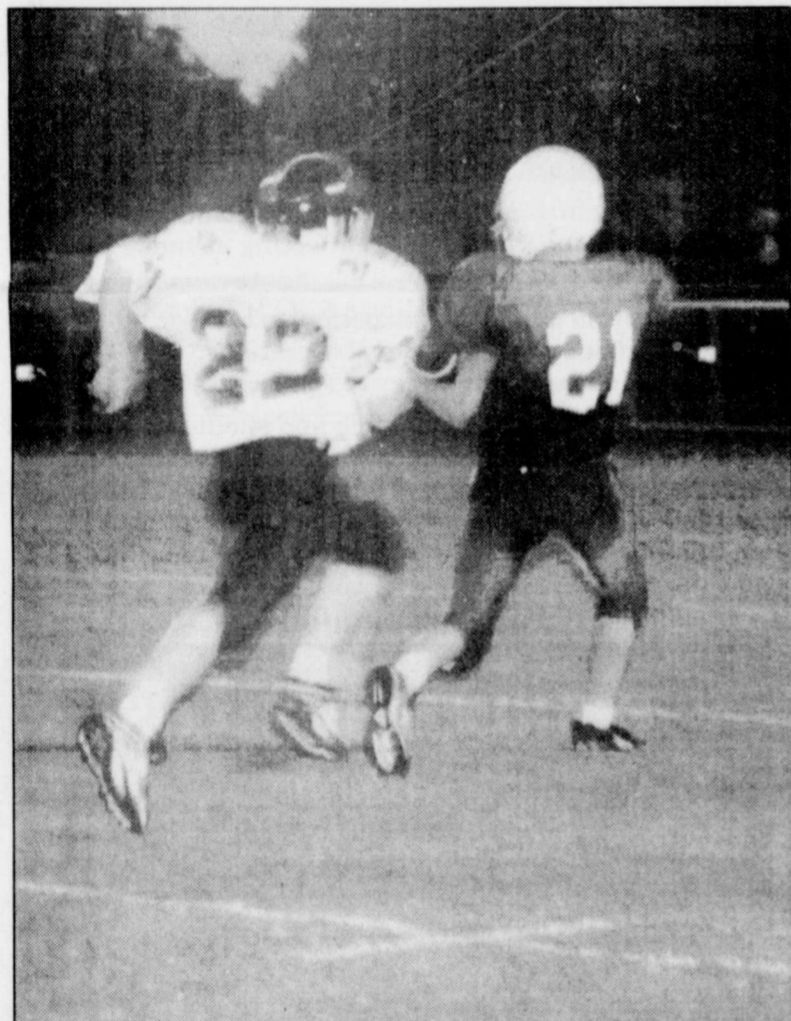

Stewards of the Soil

Rains are a blessing

Did you ever notice the difference a rain makes? The rains we received during the latter part of July seemed to be extra special. It turned our whole world from brown and gray and dry to beautiful green.

Pasture and range grasses especially benefited. One old rule of conservation is "If you are going to do grass a favor then give it a rest the last two months before frost." What this rest does it lets grass put on its "winter coat." It lets grass lay up a root reserve for its growth next spring. It helps it survive the cold of the coming winter. Another old saying about grass is "weak going into winter means weak coming out."

However, rest would not have benefited grass all that much here in Runnels County had it not rained. We were so dry that grass was unable to grow even though there was no livestock grazing. The "green" changed all that. It turned the entire situation from bleak to beautiful.

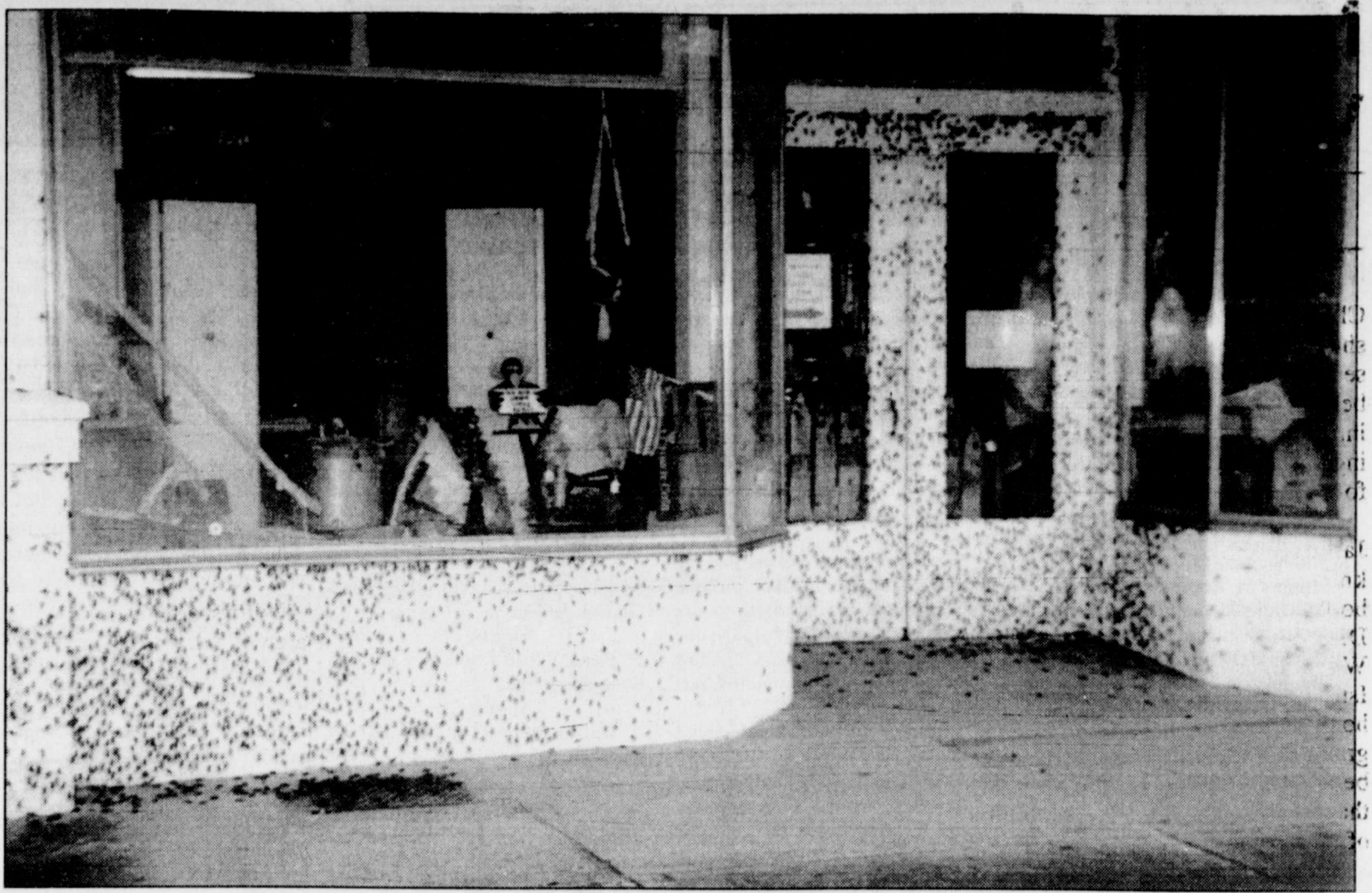
This one series of rain does not mean the drought is over. We hope it is over. The last 4 years have been tough for folks in the agricultural industry—especially folks trying to produce crops during the warm season. It was tough on wild-

life of all kinds. It was tough on folks in town trying to keep their trees and lawns. It was tough on our economy.

Notice what has happened to trees during these dry times. Pecans, elms, big mulberry trees and other species decades old did not all survive. One woody species that did well, extremely well, was mesquite. Even seedling mesquites seemed to thrive. Mesquites seem to be taking over our little part of the world. They take our water and they take our grass and they take our money and they take away from the natural beauty of our county.

When Mother Nature was calling all the shots she did not tolerate many mequites. She had a few but very few—just enough for the right balance of natural diversity. She controlled mesquites with fire. With fire and what we term deferred rotational grazing she built an almost unimaginable vastness of the most productive grassland in the world. She grazed it with some 50 million buffalo, herds of antelope along with others species and the grassland flourished.

We thank the good Lord for our rains. Green truly is beautiful.



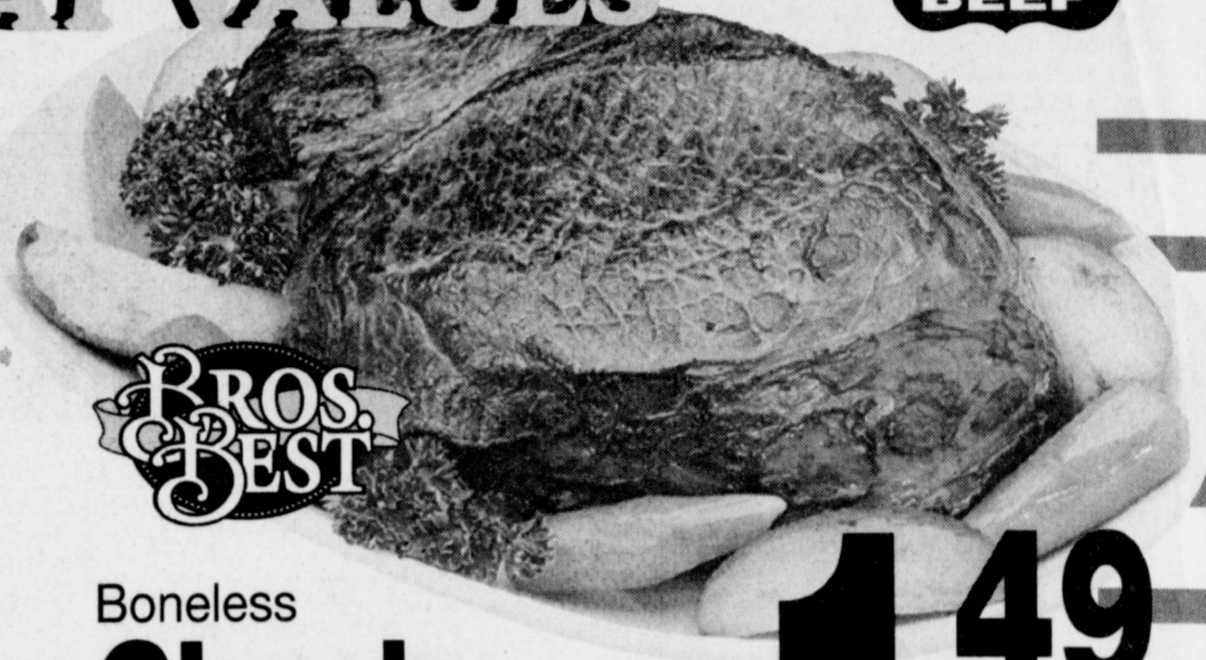

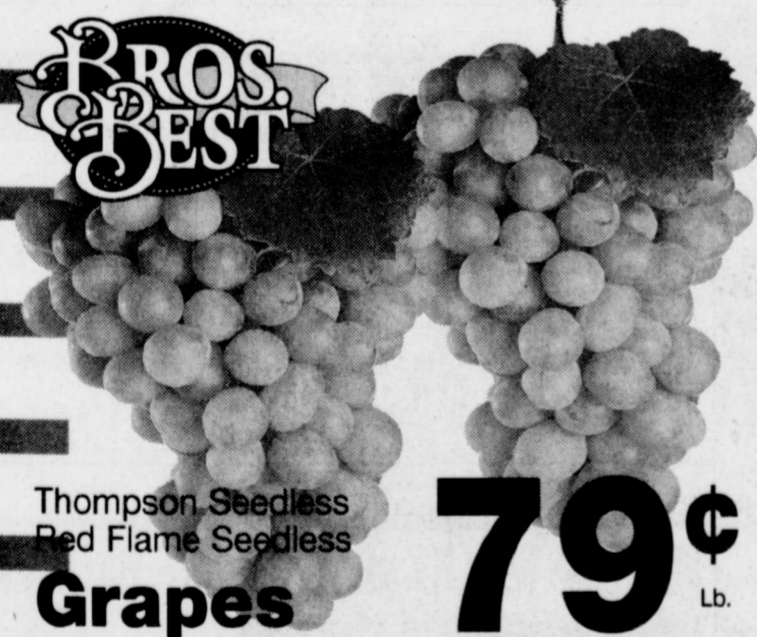
