Commissioners continue study on courthouse security

Tuesday, February 12, the Runnels County Commissioners approved all action items. The two-hour meeting was filled with information for the Commissioners.

Steve Kirby with Secure-Tech Systems of Dallas gave a presentation on a wireless emergency call system. This presentation was similar to the one given by Guardian Security Systems at the January 15 meeting.

County Judge Marilyn Egan explained that the money to buy a security system for the courthouse has been put aside from fees collected in court. Egan also stated that this money could not be used for any other purpose.

No decision was made at the meeting.

Joe Stephenson, representing the Ballinger Masonic Lodge, requested the Court exempt the Lodge from prop-

After a lengthy meeting erty taxes. After explanation that House Bill 1689 passed by the 2001 State Legislature exempted all qualified organizations in the county, the court approved the exemption for all organizations meeting the criteria set by the Legislature.

> Allen Belk presented a report on the trapper program in Runnels County. Belk was substituting for Marty Gibbs, Runnels County Extension Agent, who was at the San Antonio Stock Show. The County pays for half the program costs and ranchers pay the other half.

> Volunteer payments from county ranchers have slowed down and Belk indicated that the Predator Program might ask the County for more money. Commissioners asked Belk to meet with his committee and present the Commissioners a list of needs. No action was taken.

> The Court approved an easement requested by St. Joseph

Catholic Church to lay a water line in the north ditch of Nichols Street and in the east ditch of Bennie Street in Rowena.

Used county equipment was approved to be placed in the Wingate Lions Farm Auction on April 6, 2002.

A rental agreement was entered into with the Second Baptist Church of Winters for the lease of a vacant lot to be used to park equipment for Precinct

A new copier lease with Xerox was approved for the sheriff's department, replacing an old copier.

The next regular meeting was changed from Tuesday, March 12, to Monday, March 11, because of elections being held at the courthouse. A called meeting will be held Tuesday, February 19.

All commissioners were present for the February 12 meeting.



Oil Bidness

Well, not to worry, they've develop and produce. fixed it.

Fixed what, you say?

They have fixed the problem with drilling offshore California. What problem, you say?

THE problem. The sad fact that many Californians would like to consume oil (lots of it) produced anywhere but California. From which, they have the idea that any drilling offshore California's "pristine" (more on that another day) beaches is bad-even if it is 200 miles offshore in federal waters.

Several months ago, when a new energy crisis seemed ready to grip this country, the federal government ordered that leases already held by oil companies offshore California (and in other less interesting venues) should be allowed to move forward. The idea was to support domestic U.S. energy production by expanding the universe of undeveloped acreage for operating companies.

Some of these leases were shackled by more than two decades of bureaucratic runarounds, local planning commission outright heavy-handedness, and state government confiscation (successful but illegal) of the rights of the federal government to lease its property.

But, as might be expected, howls of protest arose from Sacramento and environs about unfairly forcing California to carry the burden of the new energy crisis. After all, why should the largest consumer of energy be concerned with producing its fair share when they have an image to protect?

So, some California senators have come up with a solutionat least for California. It actually makes some business sense, but, as you will see, it does nothing to add domestic production or enlarge the universe of potential development for the United States.

There are two key problems.

It takes some prime development area off the table for the future (California), thus not adding to our potential future energy supply. And, secondly, it precludes other companies from bidding on the leases in the Gulf of Mexico that will be swapped, thus potentially suppressing competition in a very competitive area.

This deal looks good at first glance, but it really serves to bypass the best interests of the country as far as I can see.

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
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
Last Friday we buried Ramona's big brother, Sidney. He was the oldest of nine. Ramona was the youngest. It was a good funeral. Funerals can be good, you know. And for folks who believe in Jesus and the promise of the resur-

rection from the dead... it was more of a "send-off" than an "ending." And that's the way this one was. A celebration. A family affair. It was good to be able to fly up and be reunited with Ramona's folks... and ours. Four of our five children could make it, and four of our grandchildren. Four of Ramona's siblings, and many nephews and nieces and cousins. Three of our boys, a son-in-law, and me made up a men's quintet, and we sang "Just a Closer Walk" and "Softly and Tenderly Jesus is Calling." Tim, our oldest, sang a solo. Bob, Ramona's brother and a retired Lutheran pastor, spoke on behalf of the family. After the service, we filled the church basement with ourselves and filled ourselves with food. And fellowship. Hugs and kisses, tears and laughter, babies and old grandpas, and every other kind and age of relative and friend. Gathered to remember Sid and commend him to Jesus for eternal life. Upbeat, it was. "Until we meet again... at Jesus's feet." We left with hope in our hearts.

And, we left with a message in our heads and in our hearts. For the theme of the service was "Our Big Brother." That's what Bob talked about, and that's what the preacher talked about. Sidney was that to many of the folks there... by blood for the few, and by choice for many. His greatest work on this earth, and the one he enjoyed the most was being a school bus driver. And, storyteller. He loved to take the kids on the bus, he loved to tell stories, of earlier times. Like when highway 50 was a gravel road, and county road 10 was wagon wheel tracks and then car wheel tracks on the prairie. Like the time his sister, on her first outing as driver of the family car, leveled the mailbox as she took the corner too fast. Those kind of stories.

But these last 8 years were tough. His wife got Lou Gerhig's disease, and, now it was his turn to care for her. His prayer was that he would live longer than she, so she wouldn't be left without him to be there for her everyday. And the last three years, "day and night." His prayers were answered, and after his mission was accomplished, he pretty much just waited for his time to come. And go. Home. But, that which remains in my head and heart since the funeral... is the whole matter of brothers. And big brothers. I had two. The oldest died last fall. My earliest memories of him are mixed. Since he was seven years older, he was kind of bossy. And when the folks were around, he liked to tell me what I could and couldn't do. I do remember one day when I was eleven, down on the farm ... that I got even. My uncle and aunt had a collie dog by the name of Bobbie. We became good friends. One of our jobs was to get the cows. Up from the grove down in the pasture and into the barn. Whenever I would say "Sic em," Bobbie would take off for the cow that was lagging behind, and nipping at her heels, got her moving in the right direction. So, when my big brother was telling me off that day, I just pointed at him and said to Bobbie "sic him," and he did. Such a commotion. My brother ended up standing on top of the tractor and yelling at me, "Call off the dog!"

But, I must go on to say, that as time went on, we became the best of friends. In fact, we used to talk about it. And would sometimes say, "We're not only brothers, we are best of friends."

We don't get a lot of help from the Old Testament on how we are to act as brothers. Cain, Adam's oldest, killed his brother Abel. And Jacob tricked his brother, Esau, into getting his father's blessing. And Joseph was sold into slavery by his big brothers. So I suppose that there is precedent for bad feelings between brothers and family members.

But in the New Testament there is no excuse for bad relations between brothers. In the family. And in the family of God. The Apostle John puts it so well. In I John. "This is the message you have heard from the beginning, that we should love one another and not be like Cain who was of the evil one and murdered his brothers." (3:11, 12) And, "If anyone says 'I love God' and hates his brothers, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen, cannot love God whom he has not seen. And this commandment we have from him, that he who loves God should love his brothers also." (4:20, 21)


