# Hail hits Tam Anne, Sunnyside

Cotton, corn and wheat fields south and east of Tam Anne received heavy hail damage in a brief but violent storm last Thursday afternoon.

54th Year - No. 36

Truman Touchstone, one of the farmers who suffered crop losses in the storm, said it covered an area about 11/2 miles wide and four miles long. Touchstone said that hail was standing four to six inches deep in some areas after the storm, which lasted about 20 to 30 minutes.

Another hailstorm hit the farms south of the Sunnyside community Monday afternoon. This storm was not as devastating, but was still damaging. Farmers in the area reportedly received as much as 11/2 inches of rain in less than an hour.

The Dimmitt area has received 1.6 inches of rain during the past week, with more in the forecast.

Rain is generally welcomed in farming communities, but with the recent hailstorms, it's difficult to know whether to laugh or cry when a cloud comes



## Hance feels the heat

As the national spotlight intensifies on Congressman Kent Hance and his fellow members of the Conservative Democratic Forum, so does the political pressure.

It was the CDF - tabbed the "Boll Weevils" after the bloc of powerful southern Democrats who once dominated Congress, and because most members of the CDF are from the South - who provided the swing vote for the House of Representatives' passage of the Reagan-backed cut-and-slash budget. Hance, one of the founders of the CDF, helped lead the Democratic "defection" on the

budget vote. But despite criticism by old-line Democrats and the House leadership, Hance isn't wilting. He's convinced that he's right, and that he's representing the feelings of the people in his 19th District.

We Democrats have not been keeping a finger on the pulse of the public," he said. 'There has been a shift in the last six or seven years in what the people want - and especially what they DON'T want. The party was catering to so many special little

In addition, 1980 changes in the social security law make it easier for disabled beneficiaries to test their ability to work by reducing the risk of losing benefits. For example, even though monthly benefits may stop following a trial work period, those payments can be started again quickly if a person is still disabled and is forced by his or her condition to stop working within a year. Also, Medicare protection can continue for up to three years after a disabled person stops getting benefits due to work.



**UETERAN'S SERUICES** By BEDFORD W. SMITH County Service Officer considered by Congress.

The Veterans Administration and the Dept. of Justice have begun a nationwide effort to collect debts owed by veterans who attended school under the GI Bill. Most of the monies owed to

the agency stem from educational overpayments while the veteran was in school or from defaulted education loans.

VA's aim is to collect debts of under \$1,200 in instances where the veteran has not made any repayment arrangements. The veteran will first be notified by letter of the indebtedness, then be advised that approximately thirty days remain after receipt of the letter to pay the debt in full or make other arrangements for payment before the necessary court action is taken.

Debts in excess of \$1,200 are being referred to the Dept. of Justice for collection. As a general rule, the Justice Dept. will demand immediate repayment of the debt. They are prepared to litigate the matter in court and also will utilize various post-judgment remedies such as taking liens on properties, garnishing salaries and attachment of bank accounts and other liquid assets.

These combined collection actions are being taken pursuant to Public Law 96-466 and a recent "Memorandum of Understanding" between VA and the Department of

Provisions of the bill would allow the government to report the names of the delinquent debtors commercial credit rating bureaus. Another provision would permit the government to withhold wages of federal employees who owe monies for education and loan payments.





And even with the recent severe budget cuts, he reminds his constituents, the federal government is still spending more than ever, and is still operating at a deficit.

But since a tax cut seems inevitable, Hance favors, at most, only a 5% reduction in income taxes the first year, followed by 10% in 1982 and 10% in 1983. 

> "Because some women have no independent credit history, they may find credit accounts they've shared for years with their husbands suddenly terminated upon death or a divorce," specialist explains.

'This sudden loss of credit, often when they need it most, can create a tremendous strain on the budget and the emotions," she adds.

BUILD CREDIT RECORD Here are her suggestions

for building a credit record: Start your credit history in your own name - for example, Carol Bryan White, rather than Mrs. William White or just Carol White.

Open a savings account and a checking account in your own name. Add to the savings account regularly, and don't overdraw your checking account. These two steps will demonstrate your ability to manage money.

Apply for a charge account at a local store. Pay bills promptly and in full so no finance charge will be

In addition, apply for a gasoline or national credit card and use other accounts as references.

UNDERSTAND CREDIT Your credit history is a record of your payments on credit cards, charge accounts, installment loans and mortgages. It's important to keep all payments current so your credit history will show you to be a responsible financial manager.

Many creditors rely on this credit history - or "track record" - in deciding whether to approve credit for you when you request it.

In most cases, a local credit bureau gathers credit information about you and sends it to creditors who ask for it. Here's another step to protect yourself: ask your creditors to report credit

information in both spouses'

names. Ask your credit Bureau for a form requesting this be done on accounts opened before June 1, 1977. Accounts opened after that date usually are reported in both names, although it's a good idea to check with your credit bureau occasionally to make sure this is being done.
