Dimmitt to host two new AFS'ers

Dimmitt will host two American Field Service exchange students, a boy and a girl, during the 1981-82 year.

Gerard John Hehir (pronounced "Hair"), from New Zealand, will arrive in Dimmitt the week of July 18. He will live with the family of Fred and Bobbi Bruegel. His American family will include Wendy, a senior; Mark, a sophomore, and Jon, a sixth grader. The Bruegels have two other daughters, Heidi and KaKa, who are attending college.

Anne Marie Berg of Norway will arrive in Dimmitt the week of Aug. 8. She will live with Bettye Huckabay, legal secretary with the Burkett & Ross law firm.

Hehir is 17 years old. His father is a farmer and his mother is a homemaker and relief primary-level teacher. They live 16 miles from Palmerston North, in the Manawatu province of New Zealand. He has three brothers and six sisters.

Miss Berg is 16 years old. Her father is a professor and her mother is a medical technician; both work at the University of Trondheim. Miss Berg is the youngest of

Cotton, corn and wheat fields south and east of Tam Anne received heavy hail damage in a brief but violent storm last Thursday afternoon.

Truman Touchstone, one of the farmers who suffered crop losses in the storm, said it covered an area about 1½ miles wide and four miles long. Touchstone said that hail was standing four to six inches deep in some areas after the storm, which lasted about 20 to 30 minutes.

Another hailstorm hit the farms south of the Sunnyside community Monday afternoon. This storm was not as devastating, but was still damaging. Farmers in the area reportedly received as much as 1½ inches of rain in less than an hour.

The Dimmitt area has received 1.6 inches of rain during the past week, with more in the forecast.

Rain is generally welcomed in farming communities, but with the recent hailstorms, it's difficult to know whether to laugh or cry when a cloud comes up.

Boundaries are redrawn

Castro County is now represented in State Representative District 86 and in State Senatorial District 31, under the Texas Legislature's massive redistricting plan.

The new Representative District 86 also includes Swisher, Lamb and Hale Counties, and the west half of rural Lubbock County.

House Speaker Bill Clayton of Springlake and James "Pete" Laney of Hale Center both live in District 86. However, Clayton has said that he will not seek re-election to the House next year, and Laney

has not publicly indicated whether he will run for re-election.

Castro County remains in Senatorial District 31, which picked up Briscoe, Hale, and Hall Counties from District 30. The redrawing of the District 31 boundaries simply enlarged the area represented by Sen. Bill Sarpalius of Hereford. Sen. Ray Farabee of District 30 will not be paired against Sarpalius, since Farabee does not reside in any of the counties that were moved into Sarpalius' district.

District 31 is now composed of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Collingsworth, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hale, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler Counties.

The legislature was unable to agree on the boundaries of several congressional districts — including US Rep. Kent Hance's District 19 — before the end of the regular session at midnight Monday. So Gov. Bill Clements will have to call a special session, probably for July, to settle congressional redistricting.

Hance's district has been getting nipped around the edges ever since the legislature's last session. [See BOUNDARIES, Page 15]

Hance feels the heat

As the national spotlight intensifies on Congressman Kent Hance and his fellow members of the Conservative Democratic Forum, so does the political pressure.

It was the CDF — tabbed the "Boll Weevils" after the bloc of powerful southern Democrats who once dominated Congress, and because most members of the CDF are from the South — who provided the swing vote for the House of Representatives' passage of the Reagan-backed cut-and-slash budget. Hance, one of the founders of the CDF, helped lead the Democratic "defection" on the budget vote.

But despite criticism by old-line Democrats and the House leadership, Hance isn't wilting. He's convinced that he's right, and that he's representing the feelings of the people in his 19th District.

"We Democrats have not been keeping a finger on the pulse of the public," he said. "There has been a shift in the last six or seven years in what the people want — and especially what they DON'T want. The party was catering to so many special little

groups that the rank-and-file felt they had been deserted. I think Reagan was elected largely by blue-collar workers."

Hance was quoted by Newsweek magazine recently as saying that "the only hope for the Democratic Party is a turn in the conservative direction."

He told the News that Reagan's big majority in this region in the Presidential election, plus the comments he hears at his town hall meetings, have convinced him that most people in his district want a more conservative approach to government, that they're tired of Congress throwing money at every problem.

"What I hear at the town hall meetings is that people are concerned that the money being spent hasn't really accomplished anything — or at least it hasn't solved the problems it was supposed to," he said.

House Speaker Tip O'Neill conceded the nation's conservative mood also when he appointed members of the CDF to key committee posi-

tions and said of those who criticized his action, "Let 'em read the election returns."

O'Neill was trying to keep the "Boll Weevils" loyal to the party by giving them more authority. It didn't work on the budget vote, but the CDF members — especially Hance — appear poised to oppose the Reagan Administration on its 10-10-10 tax-cut proposal, and go instead with an alternative tax-cut bill written by Democrats.

As the senior CDF member on the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, Hance (now serving his second term) is expected to play a major role in writing the tax-cut measure. Right now, he's hanging tough with Ways and Means Chairman Dan Rostenkowski and advocating a measure that would reduce

the size of the tax cut, change its effective date, and "target" specific areas of tax relief.

Hance has said all along, at [See HANCE feels, Page 15]

The fifth annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show will be held this weekend at Marvin Schulte's arena, five miles east of Nazareth.

Friday and Saturday events will begin at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday events will begin at 3 p.m.

Children under 12 will be admitted free. Admission will be \$1.50 for other youngsters up to high school age, and \$3 for high school students and older persons.

Bookings for rodeo events will be open from 12 noon until 7 p.m. today (Thursday). Those wishing to enter should call 945-2640.

Unlimited entries will be

accepted in rodeo events. They will include bareback, saddle bronc, bull riding, bulldogging, calf roping (all with \$40 entry fees); barrel racing (\$30 fee); team roping (\$50 per team); and single steer roping (\$50 fee).

Only local entries will be accepted in the Wild West events. They will include a wild mare race, wild cow milking, (\$15 entry fees); boys' steer riding, (\$10 fee); Saturday night bath race and kids' calf scramble (no fees).

The Rough Riders from Nazareth will provide music for rodeo dances on Friday and Saturday nights, from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m., at the Nazareth Community Hall.

Cole named NHS coach

Kenneth Cole, a teacher-coach at Dimmitt High School for the past two years, will be the new athletic director and head football coach at Nazareth High School. He will also teach two typing classes and a bookkeeping class.

Supt. Johnny Mason said that Cole was hired by the Nazareth School Board from among four applicants for the post. He will succeed Bruce Bagnall, who is going into private business.

Cole has submitted his resignation to the Dimmitt School Board, and the board is expected to act on it at its Monday meeting.

For two years, Cole was physical education instructor, defensive coordinator in football and head track coach in Dimmitt. He taught American history in high school.

Before coming to Dimmitt, Cole taught and coached two years at Stratford and two years in Hereford. He was a four-year letterman at Panhandle State University.

Cole, his wife Amy, and their three children will continue to live in Dimmitt.

Lee listed as critical

Officers said that in checking Lee's porch later, they found the automatic pistol, along with a can of WD-40 cleaner-lubricant, a wire brush, and a .22 caliber rifle in a box on the porch.

summer's special session of the Texas Legislature.

The bill to exempt state-produced gasohol from the state road tax for five years — HB 24, by Rep. Dan Kubiak — died on the Senate floor Monday night as the regular session of the legislature came to a close.

Helping with the bill's demise was Sen. Jack Ogg of Houston, who threatened a filibuster against it in the hectic closing hours of the legislative session. Earlier, Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur had delayed the bill in the Natural Resources Committee, creating an 11th-hour crisis for the proposed legislation.

TCGA President Carl King said that if the bill could have gone to the Senate floor earlier for a vote, "we had the votes needed to pass it by the required two-thirds majority."

The bill to exempt Texas-produced gasohol from the five-cent per gallon state road-use tax for five years — an incentive aimed at helping the fledgling new industry get started — had the support of Gov. Clements, Lt. Gov. "Bill" Hobby, and House Speaker Bill Clayton.

Joining the TCGA in lobbying for the bill's passage were Diamond Shamrock — which plans to build a fuel-alcohol refinery in Dimmitt — the state's farm cooperatives and

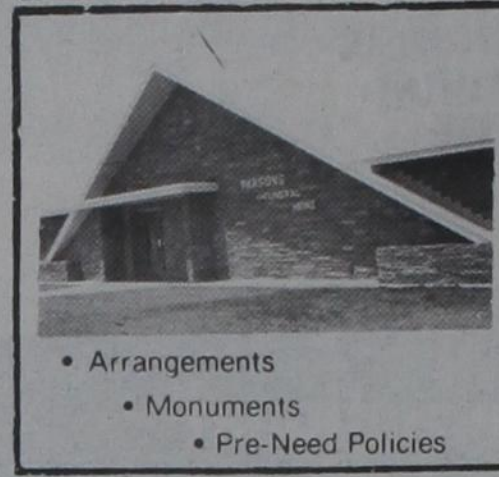
Braddock named to group

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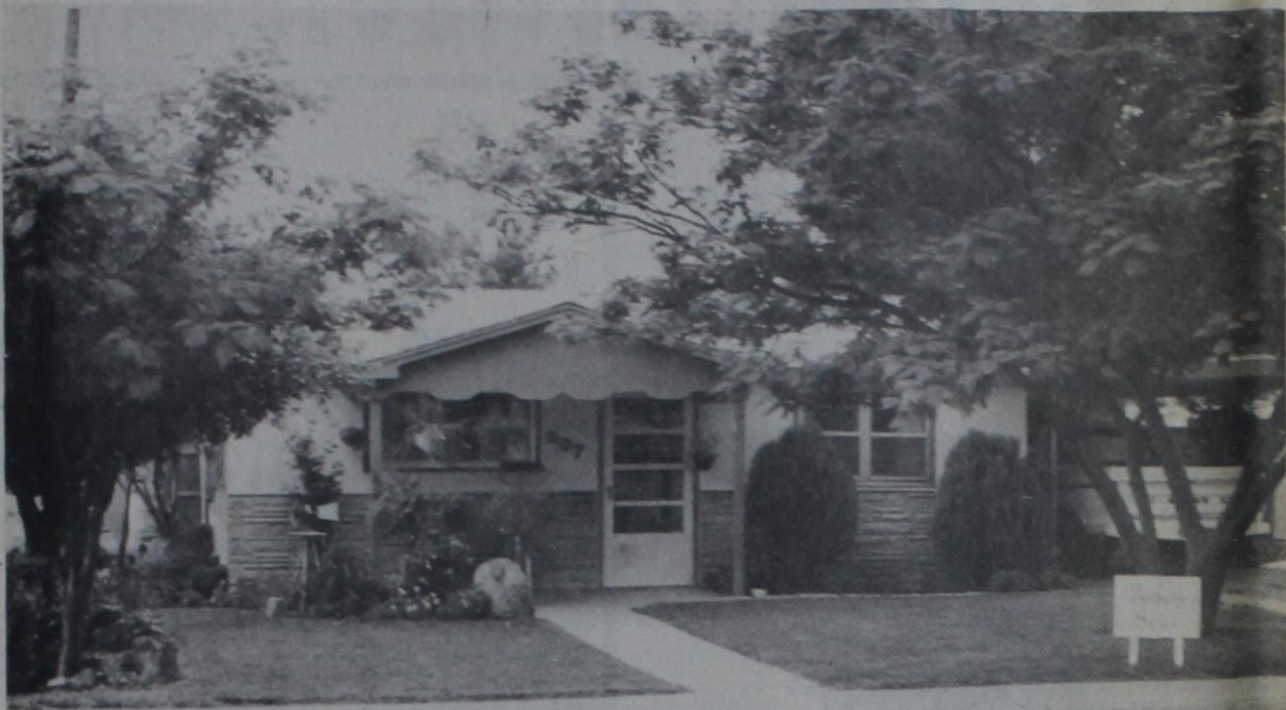

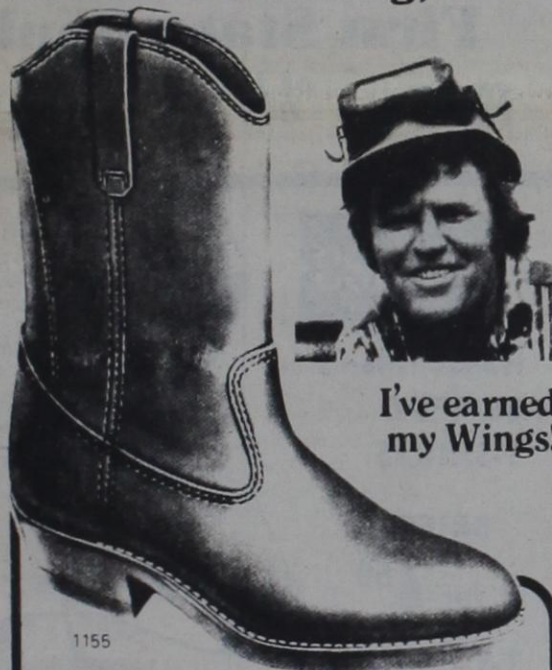

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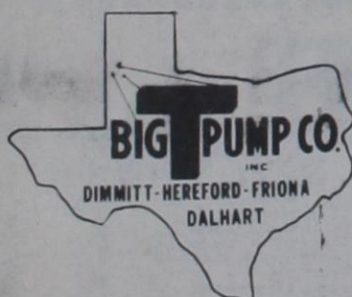

Social Security in Castro County

Do you receive monthly disability checks from social security? If so, you can expect to have your claim reviewed at least once every 3 years unless you have a severe condition considered permanent.

Until recently, disability claims were reexamined only in a limited number of circumstances. For example, a review usually was made if a beneficiary reported a return to work or if he or she had a condition considered very likely to improve.

To a large extent, social security relied on voluntary reports from beneficiaries about medical improvement or work activity. While a majority did report, some did not. Recent studies have shown that there are some people on the disability rolls who no longer meet all requirements for benefits.

The Social Security Administration has started a large-scale effort to make sure that only eligible individuals continue to receive disability checks. This major initiative is consistent with the goal to improve the administration of

the disability insurance program. The increased reviews also give SSA a headstart in complying with a provision of Public Law 96-265 that goes into effect in January 1982. That provision requires that all social security disability cases be examined at least once every three years except when the disability is permanent.

In part, the new law recognizes that many advances in medical science and rehabilitation techniques have been made over the nearly quarter of a century that social security has paid disability checks. Many people who had little hope for recovery from a serious accident or illness in 1957, when disability payments were first made, would today have a better chance of returning to gainful work.

Legislation over the past decade (such as the Rehabilitation Act of 1973) has also helped by reducing physical and attitudinal barriers and enabling more disabled people to gain fuller participation in all aspects of community life. This year during International Year of Disabled Persons, a substantial public and private effort is underway to further this progress.

In addition, 1980 changes in the social security law make it easier for disabled beneficiaries to test their ability to work by reducing the risk of losing benefits. For example, even though monthly benefits may stop following a trial work period, those payments can be started again quickly if a person is still disabled and is forced by his or her condition to stop working within a year. Also, Medicare protection can continue for up to three years after a disabled person stops getting benefits due to work.

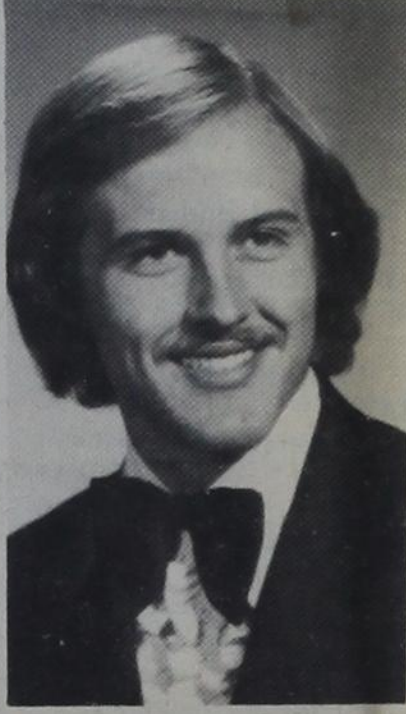

VETERAN'S SERVICES

By BEDFORD W. SMITH

The Veterans Administration and the Dept. of Justice have begun a nationwide effort to collect debts owed by veterans who attended school under the GI Bill.

Most of the monies owed to the agency stem from educational overpayments while the veteran was in school or from defaulted education loans.

VA's aim is to collect debts of under \$1,200 in instances where the veteran has not made any repayment arrangements. The veteran will first be notified by letter of the indebtedness, then be advised that approximately thirty days remain after receipt of the letter to pay the debt in full or make other arrangements for payment before the necessary court action is taken.

Debts in excess of \$1,200 are being referred to the Dept. of Justice for collection. As a general rule, the Justice Dept. will demand immediate repayment of the debt. They are prepared to litigate the matter in court and also will utilize various post-judgment remedies such as taking liens on properties, garnishing salaries and attachment of bank accounts and other liquid assets.

These combined collection actions are being taken pursuant to Public Law 96-466 and a recent "Memorandum of Understanding" between VA and the Department of Justice.

Legislation to improve the federal government's collec-

tion efforts is now being considered by Congress.

Provisions of the bill would allow the government to report the names of the delinquent debtors to commercial credit rating bureaus. Another provision would permit the government to withhold wages of federal employees who owe monies for education and loan payments.

1 (10-oz.) pkg. spaghetti
2 T. cooking oil (divided)
1/4 C. sliced mushrooms
1/4 C. chopped onion
1/4 C. green pepper
1/2 C. shredded Mozzarella

cheese
1/2 C. pizza sauce
4 T. butter (divided)
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 slightly beaten egg
1/2 C. grated Parmesan cheese
Cook spaghetti according to package directions and drain. In frypan, place 1 tablespoon oil and heat to medium temperature. Add chicken and stir-fry about 5 minutes or until chicken is opaque. Remove chicken, place in large bowl and reserve. Place remaining 1 tablespoon of oil in frypan and add mushrooms, onion and green pepper. Stir-fry 2 minutes. Remove vegetables and add to chicken; blend in mozzarella and pizza sauce. Place cooked spaghetti in another

large bowl; add 2 tablespoons butter and pepper; toss well. Add egg and mix. In oven-proof frypan, place remaining 2 tablespoons butter and heat until bubbly on medium heat. Place half of spaghetti in pan. Add chicken mixture and spread evenly. Top with remaining spaghetti and sprinkle with Parmesan. Bake, uncovered, in 350-degree F. oven 20 minutes. Remove, let stand 10 minutes and cut in pie-shaped wedges. Makes 4 servings.

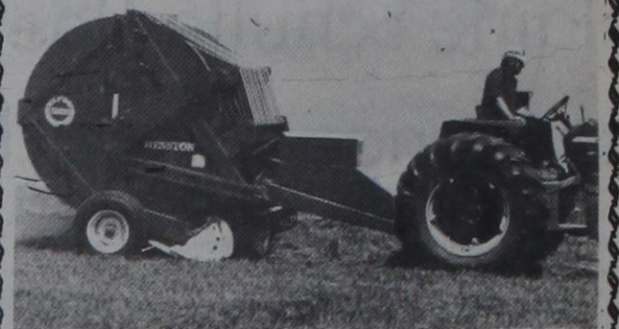

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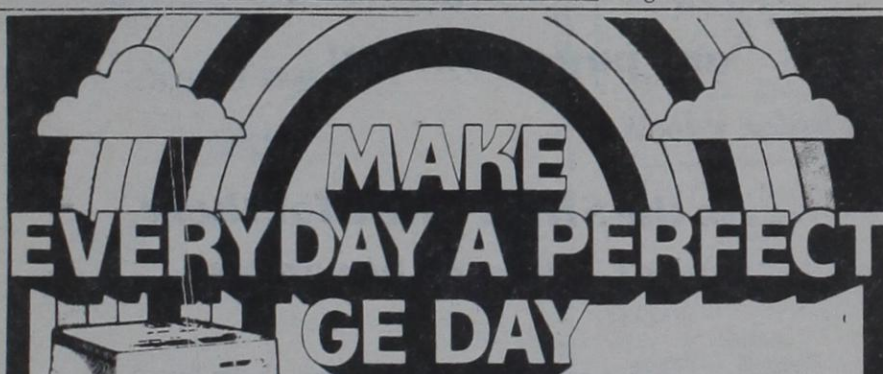

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Police chief concerned over burglary, vandalism

Police Chief Ron Mitchell presented the program at the Dimmitt Kiwanis Club meeting Monday. He reported on the work of the Dimmitt Police Dept. during 1980. He said that the office investigated 716 offenses during 1980. He reported \$21,046 in recovered property and \$41,788 in property loss for the year. A problem lately, he said, is that the merchants are not securing their buildings. Patrolmen usually find un-

locked buildings in downtown Dimmitt each night, he said. Another problem that the department is dealing with concerns juvenile offenders, their shoplifting and vandalism. The police department presently has five patrolmen, Mitchell said, adding that experienced officers are difficult to find because most of them go to larger towns. A new, inexperienced officer must have 340 hours of school within six months of employment before he can be certified, Mitchell explained.

The city pays \$80 for tuition and books, expenses and his salary while an officer attends the school. Mitchell stressed that the city police and the Castro County Sheriff's Office cooperate with each other and get along well. The Dimmitt Police Dept. has marking equipment available for residents to use. Those interested in marking their property for future identification in case of theft are urged to contact the police for loan of the equipment, Mitchell said.

[Continued from Page 1] ate courses which cover self-discovery, individual improvement, self-awareness and public speaking. Involves 90 hours of classroom instruction. "Adventure I," lasts 12 hours, and costs \$400; "Adventure II," 18 hours, \$600; "Adventure III," 24 hours, \$1,500; and "Adventure IV," 36 hours, \$2,500. The "Adventure" series may be purchased out of sequence and can be taken separately. If the entire series is taken, it can be repeated at no charge anytime.

Both the Wilsons and the Spencers were pleased with the motivational programs. "The course motivates you to recognize the importance of God, family and country in your life," Wilson said. "This course has brought families back together that were on the verge of divorce."

The group stressed several times that the primary emphasis of Challenge was not money making, and that it involved no investments. "You're buying the courses, you're not buying the right to sell," Wilson said. "Anybody can go out and sell the courses — you don't have to take the courses to do that."

They said that a person could sign up to become a sales trainee at the end of any meeting without purchasing anything. A sales trainee earns a 20% commission on sales.

Mrs. Spencer explained that, in order to become an Independent Sales Agent (ISA), you create \$5,000 in sales volume, attend a five-day workshop in Dallas at a cost of \$375, and lead two more people to your ISA in Challenge. The \$5,000 that a person spends on the "Adventure Series" may count for his or her needed sales volume. An ISA earns a 50% commission, according to Mrs. Spencer.

"Anybody who wants to sell the courses has to start as a sales trainee. Everybody starts even," Spencer said. "The president of the company started as a sales trainee." In regard to money-making prospects with the company, Wilson said, "I'm not taking this course to make money — I'm taking it to make me a better person. If Retha and I never sold a course, we'd be happy with what we've gotten out of it."

About the legal problems of Challenge, Wilson said, "Most all of the complaints have come from people who have no conception of what the company is all about." The attorney general's suit against Challenge Inc. seeks restitution, damages and civil penalties of \$10,000 each to be levied against the defendants, Challenge Inc.; Ed Rector, chairman of the board; Bud Shelton, and Bruce Mosely, Lubbock area director.

Among the requirements of the temporary injunction to which Challenge agreed are: —That anyone purchasing the courses be made aware at the time of purchase that the buyer may cancel the transaction at any time prior to midnight of the third business day after the date of the transaction; —That those selling the course must disclose the name of the company involved in the transaction as Challenge Inc. at the initial contact, and that the transaction involves the purchase and sale of motivational courses and materials;

—That representatives of Challenge Inc. are restrained from making any representations that its business operations are lawful; —That, in the event that transportation to the initial meeting is by bus or similar mass transportation, defendants shall disclose to any prospective purchaser, at the time of initial contact, that such travel will be expected, the duration of such travel, and that, in addition to the transportation itself, such travel is also used to "jack up" the emotions, feelings and excitement of the prospective purchaser.

[Continued from Page 1] his town hall meetings, that he's opposed to accompanying a budget cut with a tax cut if the government is still operating at a deficit.

And even with the recent severe budget cuts, he reminds his constituents, the federal government is still spending more than ever, and is still operating at a deficit.

But since a tax cut seems inevitable, Hance favors, at most, only a 5% reduction in income taxes the first year, followed by 10% in 1982 and 10% in 1983. He favors targeting cuts to exempt the first \$600 of a person's interest from savings, to raise the exemption level on the Estate and Gifts Tax to \$600,000 and to reduce the taxes on capital gains and the "penalty tax" on the income of overseas American workers.

He says the percentages, provisions and timing of the tax-cut plan which he favors would cost the federal government only \$14 billion, vs. \$45 billion under the Reagan-backed plan. While home to speak at Dimmitt High School's baccalaureate service, Hance confirmed that he has "faced more pressure in the past few weeks than in my entire political career."

The pressure is over the tax-cut options, and it's coming mainly from the nation's biggest financial interests.

"Wall Street is scared to death of the 10-10-10 tax cut," Hance said. "If Wall Street sees the federal deficit stay above \$25 billion next year, you're going to see the interest rate stay up there around 16 to 18 percent."

As the battle rages, the congressman who grew up eating popcorn at the Carlisle Theater here is appearing regularly on the pages of Time, Newsweek, the Washington Post, the Baltimore Sun, the Wall Street Journal, the New York Times, and other major publications across the nation.

He's getting the attention because he's helping lead a unique movement in Congress, because he's helping shape a pivotal voting bloc at a pivotal time in the nation's course.

The tax-incentive bill originally was proposed by TCGA, working through the Texas Energy Advisory Committee on Agriculturally Derived Fuels.

In the wake of the bill's regular-session demise, King said, "It was the vested interest groups that killed it."

King predicted that most companies that were planning to produce gasohol in Texas will now ship their alcohol — and maybe their entire plants — to surrounding states which do provide the tax incentives.

"But we'll move ahead under the free enterprise system, and hopefully we'll get it passed in the special session," King said.

The first State Senate version of new congressional boundaries took Castro and Deaf Smith Counties out of District 19 — to Hance's surprise and dismay.

"I had never had any doubt about Castro County, but lo and behold, they took Castro County out of my district on the first proposal," Hance said.

Castro and Deaf Smith were added back in, but then the legislature couldn't come to terms on the southern boundaries of the district.

"In the Senate version, I'd lose Midland and Martin Counties and pick up all of Ector," Hance explained.

"In the House version, I'd lose Midland, Martin and Dawson, and would pick up Winkler, Crane and all of Ector."

The boundaries of several congressional districts in South Texas also were unresolved when the legislature ended its regular session.
