His passenger, Terry Tillis of Corpus Christi, was transported by North Runnels EMS to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene with injuries. Aycock reports both men were wearing seatbelts.

Separate one-vehicle accidents happen just minutes apart

—North and South of Winters—

Three people were involved in two separate accidents involving vehicles, each in opposite directions from Winters, on Friday afternoon, May 31, 2002.

A one-vehicle accident occurred at 4:10 p.m. two miles north of Winters when a 2001 Chevy Cavalier flipped numerous times, injuring one. Ruben Edwards Heights, 22, of Abilene, was traveling south on US Highway 83 when he crossed to the wrong side of the road and side skidded into the bar ditch where the car flipped several times before landing upright. He suffered cuts and abrasions.

A passenger, Terry Tillis of Corpus Christi, was transported to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene after being knocked unconscious in the wreck. He suffered a broken finger among other injuries.

Seatbelts were worn by both

men and no citations were issued.

In a second one-vehicle accident at 4:19 p.m., Jay Carrol Brown, 54, of Montgomery, was travelling north on US Highway 83, just three miles south of Winters.

Brown lost control of his 2001 Ford Lariat pickup when the right front tire blew out and the truck left the road and flipped, landing upside down in a field. Brown was wearing his seatbelt and was able to free himself from the pickup on his own. He received no serious injuries.

Both wrecks were investigated by Texas Department of Public Safety Officer Geoff Aycock.

North Runnels EMS, the Winters Police Department, the Winters Volunteer Fire Department, and the Runnels County Sheriff's Department assisted at the scenes.

Vera defeats incumbent Davis for Place 2 seat on WISD board

Manuel Vera defeated incumbent Jack Davis, Jr. in a runoff election for Place 2 of the Winters Independent School District Board.

In a runoff election held on Saturday, June 1, 2002, Vera tallied 39 votes to Davis' 27. Voter turnout more than doubled from the 15-15 tie from votes cast in the May election.

Following his election, Vera said, "I feel there is a lot of work to be done. We have to

start retaining students—we must stop dropouts. There has to be a solution. My biggest concern is retention. Too many students are dropping out in the eighth and ninth grades.

"There is a problem somewhere. I am looking for input from parents." Vera invites parents to contact him, as he hopes to help Hispanics better express their concerns to the school board and Mr. Clack (WISD superintendent).

Tea time is scheduled for 8:30 a.m. Saturday and again at 1:30 p.m. The public is cordially invited to watch the tournament on Saturday. There will be no admission charge.

Twenty-two club members spent an entire day last Saturday cleaning up the golf course in preparation for the tournament, following tornado damage on Friday night. Mesquite and brush were strewn across the greens as a funnel cloud travelled northeast through wooded areas nestled among the course.



IN AN ACCIDENT JUST NINE MINUTES LATER south of Winters on US Highway 83, Jay Carrol Brown, 54, of Montgomery, escaped serious injury when he too was involved in a one-vehicle accident. His 2001 Ford Lariat pickup truck blew a front tire causing Brown to lose control and leave the roadway before flipping upside down in a field. He was wearing a seatbelt and was able to climb from the wreckage himself.

p.m. While kick-off is set for 8:05 p.m. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$2 for students. All proceeds will benefit the Big Country/Concho Valley Chapter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes

Hoppe, the son of Glenn, Jr. and Melinda Hoppe will play defensive tackle and offensive lineman while Joeris, son of John and Rhonda Joeris, will play offensive lineman and linebacker. Oats, son of Donnie and Linda Oats will kick and punt for the South squad.

They were among 84 area athletes selected for the third annual game. Representing 47 area schools, the roster for the North and South squads were announced at a press conference Sunday, February 24 at Wylie High School in Abilene.

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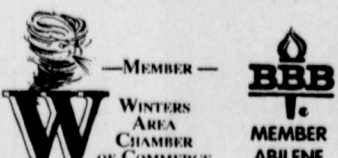
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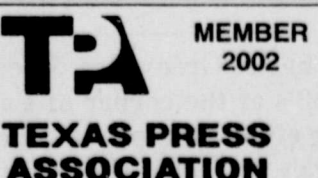
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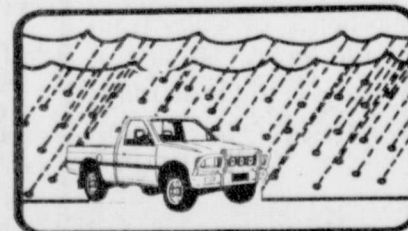
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Community

The springtime warm-up was slow to come this year. Many comments were shared about the desire for winter to be over. Though it was mild, the cold season seemed to drag on. People tried to comprehend the abnormal season. At local

diners, there were ongoing debates about the recent report from the weather forecasters. Once outside, the puzzled people lifted their gazes heavenward. It appeared as though some were losing their hope of a warm summer.

I was one to say, "Don't lose heart." I encouraged others by reminding them of former seasons, when snow fell in June! I reminded them of the mild winter we'd had and how we can enjoy these days as well (just put on a coat).

"Great is thy faithfulness, O God my Father; there is no shadow of turning in thee.

Thou changeest not, thy compassions, they fail not, as thou hast been, thou forever wilt be."

My fear is that as people lose hope of a new season, they will also lose hope in God. Changes can occur in other areas of life with little or no concern. But, when the weather doesn't follow our preconceived patterns, we start to question the presence of God.

*"Summer and winter and springtime and harvest, sun, moon, and stars in their courses above
join with all nature in manifold witness to thy great faithfulness, mercy and love."*

The church has set aside hymns, prayers, and service themes to help us cling to the promise of the new season. Wisely, the services were set for this time of year as people dealt with cabin fever. Annually the masses tire of the cold and wet and want to see new life return with the greening of the forest and field. Annually the message must be announced that God has not forgotten us.

We aren't a "farm economy" any more, although I wish we were. As a community, we once relied on the annual harvest to keep our community afloat. A good harvest meant that the local merchants would move a good portion of their inventory. As a whole, we were connected to the soil, the plants and livestock, the seasons as they ran their course. Now, only a portion of our people is agriculturally employed, the rest work and live in climate-controlled environments.

Why the concern for seasonal weather and the warmth of the springtime day? Because we remain tied to the land. We are tied through the faith we profess in song, reading, and service. We also trust in the land more than we do the present economy. You can't feed your family on silver, gold, nor dollar bills! We still need the fruit of the earth. (Genesis 1 says that God gave us every plant yielding seed for food!)

Be it through need or habit, we are tied to the soil and the seasons. As long as we remain connected to the creation and God's creating power, we will long for proof of his work. It is appropriate to long for the new season or new day. It is not appropriate to doubt that God is still at work blessing us with his goodness.

Now that the temps are rising, I am abusing myself. I am playing catch up in the gardening, the tilling, the planting, and the transplanting. The summertime toys are migrating out into the yard. The "plan" of getting the work done earlier fell apart as the weather didn't cooperate. But I work, knowing that God continues to bless us because GOD IS FAITHFUL!



Blizzards named to All-District honors

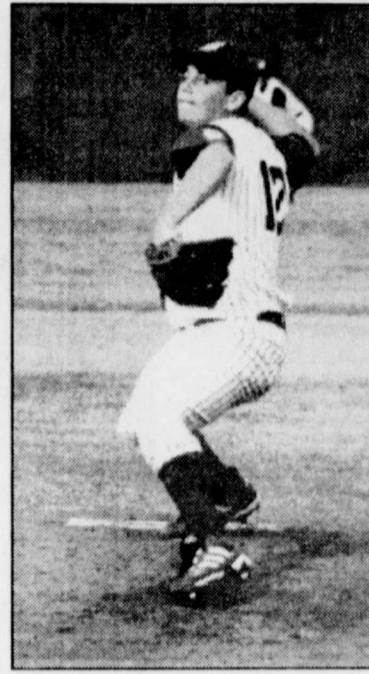
Three members of the WHS Blizzard baseball team have received 9-2A All-District honors.

New testing requirements for third graders next year

Students who will be third graders the next school year must meet new state testing requirements.

Students must pass the reading section of the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) during their third grade year in order to be promoted to the fourth grade. These requirements will continue with all third grade students in the future. Additional testing requirements concerning promotion will be tied to the fifth and eighth grades in the future.

WISD Superintendent Danny Clack said, "It is vital that parents become involved with the new testing standards by becoming informed about the content and timeline of the tests."

Clack added that visiting their child's teacher on a regular basis, contacting the counselor for testing information and reading a wide variety of books and other materials with

the child are suggestions for gaining an advantage on the tests.

He also said it is a good idea to reduce television time and plan family learning activities that will support the child's learning. "Ask questions about what the child has read, discuss the meanings of new words and compare one story with another," Clack urges. "Encourage the child to write letters to friends and relatives."

Discuss with the child's teacher the results of the reading inventory that each student takes in kindergarten, first grade and second grade. The reading inventory is required under Texas state law and is an important process to monitor progress and to support the overall quality of reading instruction that the child receives.

Pest Management News

by Richard Minzenmayer, Extension Agent-Entomology

General Situation

Its amazing what little rainfall will do to perk up attitudes and put life back into area pastures. Runnels County received up to 5.0 inches of rain this past week. Tom Green and Concho Counties received up to 2.0 inches in places.

Unfortunately, Winters, Rowena, Olfen and the Paint Rock area received severe hailstorms with the thunderstorms. Several thousand acres of wheat were damaged to some extent.

Grain sorghum was beat up in these areas as well. Not much cotton was planted. Cotton planting should begin as soon as fields dry out.

Assessing Hail Damage

Grain sorghum and corn are rarely damaged by hail until they reach the 5 to 7 leaf stage. Before this time, the growing point is below the soil surface and in the whorl where it is

protected.

Once past the 5 to 7 leaf stage, the growing point is above the soil surface. Sorghum fields can look ugly and ragged and still be capable of producing an almost normal crop.

Even shredded and broken leaves are capable of some photosynthesis if they are connected to the main plant. A strong healthy root system, good soil moisture and favorable, sunny weather are most important to a rapid recovery.

Cotton Scouting Program

The cotton scouting program began June 3rd with a scout training and began locating survey fields monitored weekly throughout the growing season, contact your gin manager.

Operation Enduring Freedom—1999 WHS graduate returns from duty in Arabian Sea

America is facing a threat that is jeopardizing security at home. Tasked preventing any further attacks are the men and women of the USS Princeton (CG 59). Sailors like Winters' Larry D. Hoyle, already on a routine six-month deployment, sailed into harm's way to provide support during the earliest stages of Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF).

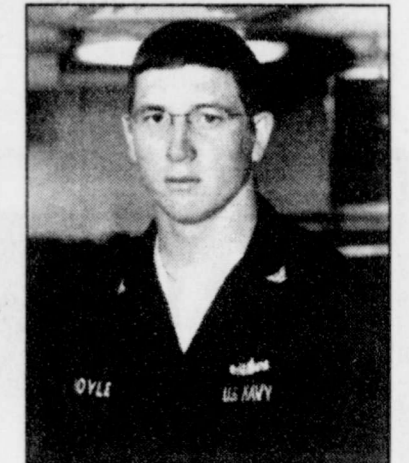
The San Diego-based guided missile cruiser Princeton returned home on January 23 as part of the Carl Vinson Battle Group. The crew of 409 Sailors spent 111 consecutive days in the north Arabian Sea conducting operations and strikes against Afghanistan.

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Hoyle, signalman on board Princeton, is the 20-year-old son of Jeff Hoyle and grandson of Hilda and Larry Thompson, all of Winters. Hoyle, who communicates with other ships, aircraft and chore activities using signal lights and semaphore flags, finds rewards in his job.

"The most rewarding aspect of my job is the respect. I like it when someone I don't even know comes up to me and says "thanks," said Hoyle, a 1999 graduate of Winters High School.

During the Princeton's recent deployment, the ship supported the battle group by simultaneously detecting, classifying and tracking potential air, surface, and subsurface targets. The cruiser is equipped with a variety of weapons, including ship and helicopter launched torpedoes, deck guns, surface-to-air and surface-to-surface missiles, electronic jammers and decoys.

With four commercial air-

craft engines to propel it through the water, the 9,466-ton Princeton is capable of sustained speeds in excess of 35 miles per hour. The cruiser can come to a full stop in less than 1,000 feet with the use of its controllable reversible pitch (CRP) propellers. All of these capabilities allow the ship to deploy and respond rapidly to any crisis.

The navy deploys its Sailors and assets to maintain a presence in the waters of the world. Maintaining forces abroad demands hard work from each and every Sailor. It means standing watches, applying safety procedures and qualifying for more advanced duties. It is also a time to reap rewards and build memories. "The most interesting thing on deployment was when received orders to patrol and get ready for war after the Sept. 11 attacks," said Hoyle, a two-year Navy veteran.

Hoyle's commitment to the war on terrorism was integral to Princeton's successful deployment. This success demonstrated America's military might, and a commitment to support the enduring fight against terrorism.
