

## **Oil Bidness**

Some interesting dynamics are ago. at work on the supply side of the world oil landscape. While OPEC holds the line on production, some countries are gaining in supply market share, while still others struggle to keep pace with their own demand.

If projections hold true, the largest single producing country in 2002 will be Russia. For the first time since the fall of the Soviet Union, the United States will result, countries who pay lip serno longer hold the title for the vice to comraderie among produchighest rate of petroleum liquid

Russia will produce 9.2 million barrels per day in 2002, while the U.S. will be able to squeeze out only 9.1 million barrels daily. Saudi Arabia could prodce upwards of 10 million if flooding the world market wasn't a problem, but, right now, it is relegated to about 7 million per day by quo-

Russia will be raising its production 5 percent, while the U.S. will continue a long, slow decline. Canada, Mexico, the North Sea, and South America have also increased production in the last decade.

But, it hasn't always looked like this.

In 1989, the Former Soviet Union (FSU) produced upwards of 12 million barrels per day and the U.S. produced just under 10 million barrels per day. It was a rapid downhill slide to a low of 7.1 million barrels per day from the FSU until things began to turn around in 1999. Production from Siberian oil fields have helped Russian production to increase by 2 million barrels per day since

Demand has also been changing. In 1989, the FSU consumed 8.7 million barrels per day, but, today, it only consumes 3.7 million barrels per day. (Russia has not even come close to the industrial power it once had.) Increasing demand in the U.S., Europe, China, and southeast Asia has consumed what Russia no longer needs, and then some. For comparison, the U.S. consumes 19.7 million barrels per day today, versus 17.3 million barrels ten years

So, while the worldwide supply of liquid petroleum increased about 10 million barrels per day since 1989, demand has increased by a like amount.

In short, what you have is a shrinking role for a producing powerhouse in the U.S. even as its own demand increases. You also have OPEC protecting prices while losing market share. 





Ramona and I have been married for 48 years. June 16, 1954 was the big day. Southern Minnesota was truly in bloom. Green all over. Flowers everywhere. Since neither of us had any money, we picked peonies from the

neighbor's yards. (With their permission, of course.) The chancel of the church was well filled with rose, and white, and purple. We didn't have much. A 1939 Plymouth. I had a degree from a Seminary, an ordination certificate, and a call to serve First American Lutheran Church in Hardin, Montana. Ramona had a

sewing machine. Truly, we got all of our belongings in that 2

door Plymouth—save for my books. They made the trip by mail. Marriages didn't cost much those days. We got by. The most important thing for us was to be married in church, with our families and friends. After all, God invented marriage and the best place to start out on the right foot was to be united as one with our vows at His alter.

Those wonderful words, said to each other, in front of God, my dad (who was the preacher), and a church full of folks who came because they loved us. I was first. I said, with dad's help:

"I, James, take thee Ramona, to my wedded wife, to have and to hold from this day forward, for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, till death do us part, according to God's holy ordinance; and there to I plight thee my troth."

As I said these words I knew exactly what I was saying. There was no doubt and no fear. Just the truth of my life. Just knowing that this was God's will for my life. And for Ramona.

And, as she repeated the words, mine were confirmed by hers. And hers by mine. We both knew, in our heart of hearts, and in the deepest part of our minds, that this was an answer to

So-we committed ourselves to each other. For keeps. We celebrated all day Sunday, June 16. Father's Day—to be sure. Together we have five children. And sixteen grandchildren. Such a blessing. That's why we got married—to be together as husband and wife, and to have a family.

Our first pregnancy lasted but three months. Then Ramona miscarried. It was a time of grief. But then 13 months later our firstborn son, Nathan, was born. Nathan has told us that when he gets to Heaven he wants to meet that "little one who didn't make it on earth." And he wants to tell him, "Thank you. Because if you had been born, I wouldn't have been." And, in the

next eight years God blessed us with four more. The other day, in fact the day after we celebrated our 48th, Ramona went for a "treatment." They call it "Rolfing." It is a very thorough massaging of muscles by a trained practitioner. Her's was a fine young woman of 35 years or so. She asked Ramona, "How did you stay married for 48 years?" Ramona replied, "One day at a time." As they continued the conversation, the young woman asked, "Did you drive up here, all the way from Texas?" Ramona replied, "Yes, we did." The woman then replied, "What did you talk about...all that way?"

You see, she was looking for answers. Her marriage had failed-because her husband did not make the commitment. Much of the time her efforts to communicate just "drew blanks."

We talked about it later. Ramona said, "I should have told her that we had committed ourselves to each other, but, even more, that "we pray together every day." It's true. Just like the saying goes, "The family that prays together, stays together!"





#### **Funding IRA with Mutual Funds Offers Key Benefits**

Recent changes in the tax laws allow you to put in more money each year to either your Roth IRA or "traditional" IRA. #### **General Situation**

#### **Cotton Aphids**

Monitor your fields regularly. Aphids are usually found in the underside of leaves, but right now they are on stems and terminals as well. Watch closely because predator numbers are very low at the present time and aphids can cause significant damage to seedling

**Cotton Fleahoppers** We were blessed in many

areas with some rainfall and these improved moisture conditions have encouraged lots of weed growth. As producers plow out or burn down these weed hosts, fleahoppers will move to squaring cotton. Fleahoppers can and do delay crop maturity.

As plants increase in size and fruit load, larger fleahopper populations can be tolerated without yield reduction.

#### Grasshoppers

Grasshoppers are moving into cotton and grain sorghum fields in some areas. The largest numbers are moving out of pastures or rangeland. Most of what we are seeing right now are the differential and twostripped grasshoppers.

Control measures are most effective when grasshoppers are small. Border treatments around the field can sometimes reduce excessive stand loss.



#### BYLAWS OF COLEMAN COUNTY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. ANNUAL MEETING **ARTICLE II** Meeting of Members

SECTION 1. ANNUAL MEETING. The annual meeting of members shall be held at such time, during the month of July as the Board of Directors may direct and such meeting shall be held at such place in the Cooperative service area, as shall be designated in the notice of the meeting for the purpose of electing directors, passing upon reports covering the previous fiscal year and transacting such other business as may come before the meeting. If the election of directors shall not be held on the day designated herein for any annual meeting, or at any adjournment thereof, the Board of Directors shall cause the election to be held at a special meeting of the members as soon thereafter as conveniently maybe. Failure to hold the annual meeting at the designated time shall not work a forfeiture or dissolution of the cooperative.

SECTION 2. SPECIAL MEETINGS. Special meetings of the members may be called by the President, by the Board of Directors, or by a majority thereof or upon written request signed by at least ten per centum (10%) of all members and it shall thereupon be the duty of the Secretary to cause notice of such meeting to be given as hereinafter provided. Special meetings of the members may be held at any place within the County of Coleman in the State of Texas specified in the notice of the special meeting, or elsewhere within the area served by the cooperative as may be designated by the Board of Directors.

SECTION 3 NOTICE OF MEMBERS' MEETING. Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting and, in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which, in case of a called, shall be delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than twenty (20) days before the date of the meeting, either personally or by mail, by or at the direction of the Secretary, or by the persons calling the meeting, to each member; provided, however, that with respect to all meetings at which directors are to be elected such notice shall be so delivered not less than ten (10) days nor more than fourteen (14) days before the date of the meeting. If mailed, such notice shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States mail, addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the records of the cooperative, with postage thereon prepaid. The failure of any member to receive notice of an annual or special meeting of the members shall not invalidate any action which may be taken by the members of any such meeting.

SECTION 4. QUORUM. As ling as the total member of members does not exceed one thousand (1,000) at least fifteen per centum (15%) of the total number present in person shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. In case the total number of members exceed one thousand (1,000) then at least one hundred fifty (150) of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at all meetings of the members. If less than a quorum is present at any meeting, a majority of those present in person may adjourn the meeting from time to time without further notice.

SECTION 5. VOTING. Each member shall be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matter submitted to a vote at a meeting of the members. At all meetings of the members at which a quorum is present all questions shall be decided by a vote of a majority of the members voting thereon in person or by mail, except as otherwise provided by law, the articles of incorporation of the cooperative, or these by bylaws. If a husband and wife hold a joint membership they shall jointly be entitled to one (1) vote and no more upon each matters submitted to a vote at a meeting of the

SECTION 6. VOTING BY MAIL. In addition to the method of voting for directors of the Cooperative as provided by the existing bylaws and by a member being present and voting in person, each member shall be and is hereby permitted to vote by mail for directors of this association. Said ballots when so received shall be retained and placed in a locked ballot box until the date of the members' meeting at which time shall be delivered to the inspectors of Election and counted together with the votes cast in person at such members' meeting. The Directors who received a plurality of the vote shall be elected. Drawing by lot shall resolve, when necessary, any tie votes.

SECTION 7. ORDER OF BUSINESS. The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows:

Reporting the existence of a quorum.






