

"The rains came down and the floods came up ... " so goes

the children's church song. While Winters residents were never in danger of any flooding, neighbors to the north in Tuscola, Buffalo Gap and Abilene suffered millions of dollars in damage caused by heavy rainfall over a three-day period beginning July 4.

Because of the rains received north and northeast of Winters, Elm Creek Reservoir was within one foot of being full as reported Tuesday morning (July 9) by Water Superintendent Jack Davis, Jr.

Winters received approximately five inches of rainfall while the Wingate and Wilmeth areas got only an inch.


Davis also reported that water was still running over the spillway from the Old Winters Lake into the Reservoir.

City Administrator Aref Hassan also announced that because of the fullness of the Reservoir, the imposed water restrictions have been lifted immediately.



Randal "Randy" Roberts


NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE-Randal "Randy" Roberts. 38, died Saturday, May 4, 2002 in Nashville.





Quarterly sales decrease 4.2%

As reported May 31, 2002, troller Carole Keeton Rylander, gross sales for Runnels County decreased 4.2 percent for the fourth quarter of 2001 as compared to the same reporting period in 2000.

Sales for the fourth quarter of 2001 totaled \$76,729,485 as compared to \$80,117,206 for the same period in 2000.

Use tax purchases include \$149,958 while \$12,924,794 is subject to state sales and use tax.

For the fourth quarter, there were 427 reporting outlets in Runnels County in 2001 and 457 in 2000.




LOOKING PRETTY GRIM the first of May, the lake level was about 30 feet below normal, even after receiving a 3-inch rain.






According to a recent report, even without much training cows appear willing to walk up to a milking station and spend a few minutes munching grain while the robot's quietly moving parts search for the animal's udder.

Last week, a South Dakota judge ruled that the \$1 per head nationwide beef checkoff is unconstitutional and ordered collection of the fee to stop by July 15.

The beef checkoff program raises more than \$80 million a year with half the money going to the Cattleman's Beef Promotion and Research Board, and the other half to qualified state beef councils.

The National Cattleman's Beef Association says it will appeal the judge's ruling. Secretary Veneman is disappointed with the ruling, and says USDA believes programs like these are effective tools for market enhancement.



Per direction of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) effective immediately the City of Winters will no longer pick up limbs that are more than six inches (6") in diameter and no longer than six feet (6'). Limbs must be stacked neatly together next to the street side of the curb. NO ALLEY PICK UP. NO EXCEPTIONS. Any limbs larger in size or piled in a disorderly fashion will not be picked up. Also, if they or any other items are mixed in with the limbs that meet the specifications, none of the limbs will be picked up. The City will not pick up limbs that have been trimmed by a hired contractor or individual. It will be the responsibility of the contractor, individual or resident to haul them off. There will be no commercial chipping and only limbs picked up by the City will be chipped.

Also, the City will not pick up anything other than limbs (ie: leaves, batteries, tires, metal, carpet, etc.) These items must be disposed of properly by the resident.

Limb pick up day is the last Friday of the month. Please call City Hall prior to the last Friday of the month if you have limbs that need to be picked up.


