#### **Sheriff Baird** says Ballinger **EMS** using too much radio time

Carolyn Priddy, Director of **Emergency Medical Services** for Ballinger Memorial Hospital, turned a routine Commissioners Court meeting into a discussion of radio use at Tuesday's special meeting.

Priddy told the Court that Sheriff Bill Baird, on June 13, had told her the EMS was using too much time on the main radio frequency with dispatchers and asked the EMS to stay off the radio. She told the group Baird had said EMS would be contacted by phone when needed.

### One-vehicle rollover takes life of 30-year-old Childress man

A one-vehicle rollover acci- a seatbelt. dent in north Runnels County claimed the life of a Childress dead by Runnels County Preman.

The accident occurred at approximately 5:45 a.m. Friday morning, July 12, 2002, on Home. Texas Highway 153, 1.9 miles west of Winters.

A 1994 Ford four-door passenger car, driven by Kenneth Sherman, 30, of Childress, was traveling west on 153 at a high rate of speed. The vehicle failed to negotiate a curve to the left and began to slide, striking a signpost. The vehicle then rolled over six and onehalf times, coming to rest on its top. Sherman was wearing

#### Dear Mrs. Boles,

I am writing in response to your comments on the recent California court action ruling the use of the Pledge of Allegiance in public schools unconstitutional. I find this ruling disturbing both as a Christian and as a citizen. The fact that our founding fathers built this country on the Christian principles most of us here in Winters, Texas, still hold dear is obvious from even a brief study of history. Knowing that the majority of these men were Christians, it is silly to think that our founding fathers would have forbidden school children from proclaiming America to be "one nation, under God." These very men, I feel quite confident, would be in full agreement with you and me that our nation remains subject to God, whether or not we allow our school children to admit it.

Perhaps dwelling on this Christian world-view is one reason we are losing this battle slowly but surely. Maybe looking at this problem as it relates to God and His role in our nation is not the best way to convince our secular opponents of the folly of their ways. All Americans should have one thing in common, particularly those governing our great nation. We are all subject to the constitution "the highest law in the land." While not everyone in our country agrees that we are subject to God (yet), everyone must agree that we live under the constitution. Opponents of Christianity have long hidden behind a public lack of knowledge and apathy toward the constitution to manipulate its meaning and intent. 

Her name is Narra Nagra. I read about her in the Baldwin Bulletin... a small-town newspaper located in Baldwin, Wisconsin. Tuesday, July 9th edition. She and her husband bought Ray's Southside Restaurant and Citgo Station there.

Both are from India. Dave became a citizen of our country in 1991. Narra attended a boarding school and high school, graduated from college, and went on to get her master's degree in history. In India. She met her husband when he came back to India for a visit. They were married over there in 1997. They have one daughter. Narraa worked as a waitress when they started operating the Southside. She loved it. She learned to know the names of the folks who came to eat there, and loved to serve them. At the present time, she has moved up to running the cash register at the Citgo. I found her to be a very courteous and helpful person when I bought some gas there.

For the last couple of years, she has been preparing herself to citizenship. She took the required courses and was approved to take the oath on June 6 of this year. I had never seen the oath before and was pleased that the newspaper included it. I include it in this column. This is the oath:

"I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty, to whom or which I have heretofore been a subject or citizen; that I will support the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear the true faith and allegiance to the same; that I will bear arms on behalf of the United States when required by law; that I will perform noncombatant service in the armed forces of the United States when required by law; that I will perform work of national importance under civilian direction when required by law; and I take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; so help me God."

Wow! I never knew the depth of commitment we require of people who immigrate to this land and desire to become fullfledged citizens. Most of us got in the easy way ... by being born in this nation. I assume it is our birthright. Narra did it the hard way. And is so proud and grateful to be a citizen. When asked, "Narra, what does being an American citizen mean to you?," she replied, "Proud to be an American!" She also said that many of those who took the oath said it through tears... so grateful and glad to be citizens. When asked, "Narra, what do you do for fun?," she said, "Work!" In America, work is my fun! It's really true. I love waitress work when I do it! I love working in the station." Ever since I read the article I have been reflecting. On myself. And my attitude toward this nation. Maybe I should be required to study and take lessons in our history and those actions and principles that have made our nation great. Or maybe I should go and live in another country and see what it's like not to be able to work. Narra said that there are 400 applications for every position as a history teacher in India... that for which she was trained there. All I know is that her story made me feel glad for her. And helped me appreciate my birthright. And made me feel sad for the many who seem to not appreciate what a privilege it is to live and work in America. In the Bible, there is the story of Esau and Jacob, the two sons of Isaac. Esau was the older and was do to inherit his father's possessions and position. Jacob was the younger. One day Esau came in from hunting very hungry. Jacob had just fixed a pot of stew, and it smelled so good. Esau asked his brother to give him some. Jacob said "No." And then went on to say, "I won't give you the stew, but I will exchange it for your 'birthright," and Esau did. He sold his birthright for "a mess of pottage." 





### Sales Tax Holiday set for August 2-4 —No tax on clothing purchases for three days—

Texas comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander announced that the annual Sales Tax Holiday is coming up August 2-4.

"Start making your shopping list for school clothes for the kids and new clothes for mom and dad," Comptroller Rylander said. "During the Sales Tax Holiday, most clothes and shoes priced under \$100 are exempt from state and three Sales Tax Holidays thus local sales taxes."

Rylander estimates Texans million, including an estimated will save \$42 million in sales tax during the three-day Sales Tax Holiday, including \$33.2 million in state sales tax and taxes.



Candelaria said he's traveled all around the world working for the National Scientific Balloon Facility from his base in Palestine which is operated by New Mexico State University.



The Facility provides balloon operations services and engineering support to the United States and foreign scientific communities. The operations services include inflation, launching of the balloon, tracking, and recovery of the payload.

#### **General Situation**

Much of the area received from 1" to 7" of rain last week and crops have really responded to the improved moisture conditions.
