### **Enterprise** under new ownership




We are forever changed for the better, and we look forward to continuing to be a part of these communities that mean so much to us.

## Letter to the Editor

### TNRCC promotes Sept. 10 meeting for water quality

Dear Jean Boles:

Water users in the Upper Colorado River Basin are facing an important issue. Water quality for a 66-mile stretch below E. V. Spence Reservoir has declined due to high levels of chlorides. sulfates, and other dissolved solids. This stretch of the river has been placed on the state's "impaired list," triggering a regulatory process aimed at restoring water quality.

People who live and work in the Upper Colorado watershed have the opportunity to participate in this effort and help make decisions that will affect their communities. A public meeting has been scheduled to form a Stakeholder Advisory Group that will oversee and provide input into the "Total Maximum Daily Laod" (TMDL) process. The public meeting also will include a presentation on TMDLs and provide ample opportunity for ques-

The public meeting will be held Tuesday, September 10, at 7 p.m. in Ballinger at the Runnels County Courthouse, District Court Room, 600 Courthouse Square.

Stakeholder participation is crucial to the success of the TMDL process.



My mother made the best meatballs. I can remember going down town (four blocks from our house in Brookings, South Dakota) to the I.X.L. grocery store, and going up to the meat counter and asking the butcher, "Would you

please get me three pounds of my mother's meatball mix? You know, the one that has pork and beef and veal mixed together?" He did. And the following Sunday... it was "Umm, umm good."

Our daughter makes good meatballs. As does Ramona. And several times this summer she has served them. And they are really good. Not quite as good as mother's, but there is a reason. Where do you find a butcher that can make the mix that mother had... beef and pork and veal?

Anyway, while I was in our son Nathan's office, I found a poem. Written by Garrison Keillor. Actually it is a prayer. And Nate had put it in his church bulletin last Thanksgiving. The people loved it. And so did I. It brought up memories from deep in my well. And now, I send it on to you. (Note: Garrison Keillor is the author of the Lake Wobegon stories heard on PBS and also of several books. This poem is his, and I give him the credit. I have no idea from which book it came.)

"Oh meatballs, lovely meatballs That grace our Sunday meal Another pan of meatballs of beef and pork and veal Adorn a serving platter upon a walnut stand. We thank you for these meatballs from thine and Grandma's hand

Oh lovely mashed potatoes in which these meatballs float In great brown lakes of gravy poured from the gravy boat They speak to us of richness, of blessing and good cheer When spoken to by meatballs, I love the things I hear.

Oh spinach, peas, and onions, Oh beets, beet greens and chard Fresh from grandma's garden, beyond the cool green yard Pools of green lie steaming in pale blue china bowls Around a silver wedding vase of yellow marigolds.

Oh cousins, aunts, and uncles who share this earthy store Gathered 'round this table in 1954 Eves closed and hands are folded as grandpa says the grace Mine alone are open, I look in every face I see your lovely faces together on this day Passing into darkness the voices fade away

I close my eyes to hold you to bring you back to me, Passing slowly passing into a memory. Another Sunday dinner, another table set Children take the place of folks they never met. A little boy is sitting in grandpa's old oak chair I feel his eyes upon me as we say the prayer.

Around this Sunday table, time is passing by Child, I know you see it in our faces, so do I. But thank the Lord for giving us this afternoon again. And now please pass the meatballs — let's eat. Amen."

used with care. West Nile Virus (WNV) is

commonly found in Africa, Eastern Europe, West Asia, and the Middle East. It was fist detected in the United States in 1999 during an outbreak in New York. By mid-June of 2002, it been reported in mosquitoes, birds (such as blue jays and crows), horses, and humans in Texas. There has also been a continued westward movement of the virus. Anyone taking part in outdoor activities should take precautions to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes.

Most people infected with WNV will not show symptoms. Some, however, may have a fever, headache, body aches, and swollen lymph nodes. A small number may develop encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) or meningitis (in-
