I met the man in the school office at Volga Middle School, in Volga, South Dakota. He was Pastor Jim nicely dressed, black suit, white shirt and tie. I noticed a special Hanson lapel pin-a big one. The three firemen raising the flag on the ground in New York. Only this pin was gold. Later I found out

that it was a gift to him from the firemen in New York City for the 100 days that he donated his services as a counselor and friend.

The man's name is Dan Heidt. He is a bodyguard by profession. His fee is \$2500 a day, plus all expenses. He can charge that much because he is that good. One of the five best bodyguards in the U.S. Because of his experience facing attacks on those guards, and because he is a Christian. Thrivent, an insurance company, hired him as a traveling teacher, to go to middle schools all over the U.S. and give talks to middle school students and their teachers. His topic: how to make your school a safe place. Of course the salary is far less, but he likes it more. He loves the young people.

He has given many days to schools like Columbine, where the two young men went to school one day and killed their classmates because they wanted to "get even".

He has been to schools where similar things have happened, but Thrivent and Dan much prefer giving to schools where nothing like this has happened yet. To get into prevention.

My son-in-law, Dan, and I followed him to the gym where he was to make his presentation. The students were seated in the bleachers. Down front was a speaker's stand. In front of the speaker's stand were 4 rows of photo portraits of famous people. People like Bob Hope, Michael Jordan, Jennifer Lopez, and Princess Di. All clients of his. People he has guarded with his body. One of the students asked if he had guarded Selena. He had, and he had told her not to go visit her "friend" alone. The president of her fan club. But she did anyway, and was killed by her "friend."

But he didn't talk about the celebrities. He talked to the students. He told them how to prevent Columbine-type situations. Very simple. Down to earth.

"When you see, in your school, a group of kids picking on another kid ... putting him down, roughing him up, spitting on himget them to stop. If you feel you can't do it alone, get a teacher or some other adult to help you. Because it is the victims of that kind of activity the become the shooters and the killers."

He told them, "Practice the golden rule: Do unto others as you would have them do to you." He told them to respect their fellow students, their teachers, parents, and other adults." Every time you practice the rule-you are helping make your school a better, safer place." He held their attention, and mine, for an hour. Then he was on his way to do another talk, forty miles away. Six a day. To help make our schools safer places. A bodyguard, but more then a bodyguard. A man of God, who like Jesus is ready to "take a hit" in order to save another's life. A man who believes that if we would just do what we say when we say, "love one another", "the world would be a better place. And what better place to spread the news than in the middle schools of the U.S.A. I know the kids listened. I talked with a couple of them just the other day, who heard him speak two years ago in another state. They said, "He's great." I asked "Are you doing the rule?" A pause-and then, "More than we used to."

to San Angelo in November, 2002. The Moving Wall is a half scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C.

This is the nation's first memorial designed and built to be brought to the people. It has traveled to every state in the union and to several foreign countries.

Visitors will find nothing for sale at the Moving Wall display site and there will be no solicitations for money there. They will find only the names of more than 58,000 men and women killed in Vietnam. Forty-seven of those names are Concho Valley Vietnam veterans.

The Moving Wall is coming Veterans of America Chapter 457. It is intended to bring healing and reconciliation for veterans and non-veterans alike and it also functions as an education and historical role.

Vietnam Combat Veterans, Ltd. maintains the Wall and has been transporting it to communities throughout the nation since 1984.

Concho Valley Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 457 is sponsoring the visit of the Wall and is responsible for the \$3,000 cost of the visit, as well as other associated expenses. 


