

# **Oil Bidness**

We pick up where we left off last time talking about how a deal can be sold in almost any situation. As you may recall, I was sharing a few nuggets from experienced wildcatters who have sold a deal or two in their time.

We covered making sure the deal was really a deal and the idea of asking an investor to think beyond a single prospect. Now, we are ready to move on to some of the other pillars of a good deal.

So that your sale of a prospect won't be "history", you have to present the background to a potential investor in a clear fashion to the extent it figures into the idea behind your deal. For example, if one needs to know that the zone you are after has been noted in a number of other drilled wells but was overlooked, then you need to say something about it. And, you need to say it in a way that the investor, at whatever level he or she happens to be, can understand its significance.

Included in that history is the ownership and legal stand- your vision or ask for the ing of the mineral rights and surface property. Now comes the vision thing. To sell the prospect to the discerning investor, you need a story: basically, what will happen when the well succeeds. Will it lead to more drilling? How big could it be? What could it mean to you and/or the company you represent? What will the investor stand to gain besides a one time shot of money? The sale comes when the investor is absorbed into the deal by seeing the same vision you do.

But, it isn't just a good news story. The investor deserves to hear the downside, too. What happens if the prospect is a failure? Is that the end of your vi-

sion or are there other paths to get to the same goal? More practically, will there be any financial liability beyond the initial investment? Be ready with a common sense story of the bad-news case.

And, if your potential investor has an accountant, as he/she probably will, you will need to have some economic projections showing all kinds of sensitivities that fairly represent the landscape of the outcomes from the deal. This is all part of assessing the risk and re-

These are pointers for enhancement of your pitch. Of course, you have to have all the technical details nailed down before you get this far.

Maps, logs, calculations, projections, historical analysis, and about 90 other things that every good professional in this business knows about has to be available to the investor. Don't give short attention to the basics of building the deal, technically. If you do, it'll fall apart before you ever get to share check.



You can't say what you'd like to say because it is not to be heard by little cars. (When Ramona was in the hospital, and somewhat under the influence of medication...the

telephone rang. I reached for it, and in the process it came crashing to the floor, and whoever was trying to reach us was "cut off". But I wasn't, and I used a bad word, with much feeling and a lot of volume. It was a clergytype cuss word, to be used only in moments of great frustration. I think I said "suger", rea! loud, because my sainted Aunt Ottelia recommended it as a suitable substitute for the other "s" word. But then, I must not have, because Ramona looked at me with THE LOOK THAT KILLS and said, "Jim, you must not talk that way in the presence of little ones." Now, there were no little ones in the room. Obviously she was in "la la land", or at best, "in" and "out". But I knew better at that moment than to continue the discussion. Later on, it came to me, I should have said "UFF-

But "uff-dah" is unlimited in uses. When someone gives you something really quite wonderful, like a \$50.00 gift certificate to be used at The Homeplace, and you don't know what to say, say "Uff-Dah." The person won't know what it meant, but you do. And so you tell him, "It's a Norwegian word that means 'the greatest and biggest thanks to you.' Or, when something sad happens, and you don't know what to say, "uffdah" will work. Especially if you say it in a mournful way. It is a great word. Fits any occasion. Any time. Kind of like "whatever", that word, which so many of us say, when we don't know what to say. Only it is hard to put any emotion in "whatever", and you can put any feeling you want into "uff-dah."

I think the first time I ever heard the word was when I was a child and my grandma said it. "Uff-dah". I think it was when she misplaced her glasses. Left them under her pillow when she took a nap. She called for me, "Jimmy, would you help me find my glasses? Uff-dah, I just can't seem to find them." Since that time there have been books written on "Uff-dah". Truly. I've seen them. And there have been cards printed with titles like "20 times when it is appropriate to say "uff-dah". Isn't that something?

But, last Sunday, while in church...a small open country church in southern South Dakota, I heard it in church. The name of the church is Romsdahl Lutheran. You can be sure that most of the folks who worship there are Norwegian, and if they aren't, they surely ought to be. And early in the service, just after announcements, the choir director stood up and announced, "October is elergy appreciation month, And today, the treat for Halloween night. 

It was the Blizzards' show on Friday night as the hometown boys put a whoopin' on the Eagles of Goldthwaite at Blizzard Stadium. Shane Colburn went 11-24 for 141 yards but more importantly, with no interceptions in the ef-

The first quarter was a standoff as neither team could mount much of a threat. With about two minutes left in the first quarter Jose Vega blocked a Goldthwaite punt and gave the Blizzards the ball at the Eagle 24 yard line. With 10:58 left in the second period Winters capitalized on a one yard quarterback sneak by Colburn. The extra point was no good and the Blizzards were on the board 6-0.

**ORDINANCE 2002-09**—AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WINTERS, TEXAS, ADOPTING A REVISED WATER CONSERVATION PLAN; ESTABLISHING CRITERIA FOR THE INITIA-TION AND TERMINATION OF DROUGHT RESPONSE STAGES; ESTABLISHING RESTRIC-TIONS ON CERTAIN WATER USES; ESTABLISHING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF AND PROVISIONS FOR ENFORCEMENT OF THESE RESTRICTIONS; ESTABLISHING PRO-CEDURES FOR GRANTING VARIANCES; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Winters, Texas recognizes that the amount of water available to the City and its water utility customers is limited and subject to depletion during periods of extended drought;

WHEREAS. the City recognizes that natural limitations due to drought conditions and other acts

of God cannot guarantee an uninterrupted water supply for all purpose.

WHEREAS, Section 11.1272 of the Texas Water Code and applicable rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission require all public water supply systems in Texas to prepare a drought contingency plan; and

WHEREAS, as authorized under law, and in the best interests of the citizens of Winters, Texas, the City Council deem it expedient and necessary to establish certain rules and policies for the orderly and efficient management of limited water supplies during

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY WINTERS, TEXAS:

drought and other water supply emergencies;

That the City of Winters, Texas Drought Contingency Plan and Water Conservation Plan, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made part hereof for all purpose be, and the same is hereby, adopted as the official policy of the City.

SECTION 2.

That all ordinances that are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby, repealed an all other ordinances of the City not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 3.

Should any paragraph sentence, subdivision, clause, phrase, or section of this ordinance be adjudged of held to be unconstitutional, illegal, or invalid, the same shall no affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provision thereof, other that the part so declared to be invalid, illegal or unconstitutional.

SECTION 4.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage and the publication of the caption, as the law in such cases provides.
